Out on the Pampas

Italians Seize French Line

Because the army of Italy was reported to have taken or attempted to have taken over control of the Addis Ababa-Djibouti railroad for the transport of troops and war materials, a serious dispute is said to be brewing between Italy and France. As this line is the only modern method of communication, France will refuse to give up any rights regarding it in this region. Italy has now conquered all Ethiopia but the southern region including the important city of Jijiga.

Democrats Win Over Republicans

With the closing of recording of votes in California's primary election which took place on Tuesday last, the total Democratic vote was one third greater than the Republicans. More than 55 per cent of eligible voters cast their ballots. Democratic delegates pledged to President Roosevelt received four times the number of other slated delegates. On the Republican ticket unpledged delegates received 337,945 votes compared with 250,349 for those pledged to Governor Alf M. Landon. Hoover hailed the recent California election a victory for the Republican party.

Again French Stocks Crash

From Paris yesterday came reports that with the start of trading, many domestic stocks dropped so rapidly that the tickers were unable to keep up. Issues of the Bank of France dropped 200 points the first hour. Hotchkiss and Creusot fell likewise. Flight of capital from France was indicated by the fact that foreign values went up a little.

Fight Over Relief Bill

While the house of representatives is preparing for the fight over the relief bill, it has been reported that the PWA bloc rejected the White House proposal for continuation of the PWA because the president refused to compromise on the relief bill. The battle was opened by having the house appropriations committee report the second deficiency bill with a total of \$2,364,229,712.00. Hopkins estimated that the proposed bill would aid 10,000,000 persons.

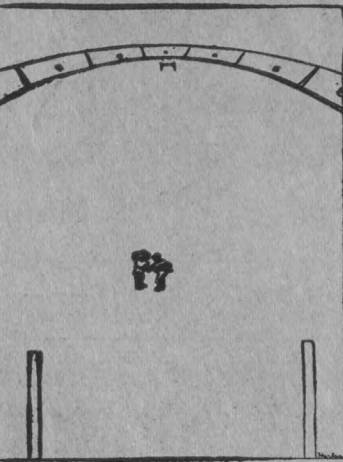

Gaucha Gab

Eleven school records in track have been broken or tied this past year. These are more than have been broken any other year and it certainly shows Santa Barbara has hit a new high in the track and field sport. Eight of these have been broken by sophomores and the other three by juniors. Looks as though we can look forward to an even better showing next year.

Howard Yeager, sophomore, has equaled one school record and broken two others. In the triangular meet against Chapman and Loyola at the start of the season Howie stepped a hundred in 9.9, tying Jimmy Anderson's record set in 1926. 14.7 was his mark for the low hurdles set in the Pomona meet. The mark smashed Kelliher's and Keim's old time of 25.2. The broad-jump mark was cracked wide open when he leaped 23 feet 3/4 inches at the All-Conference Meet to tumble Jack Vince's mark of 22 feet set in 1924.

50.3 in the 440 and 2.2.8 in the 880 are new school marks recorded by Larry Bowlus in the Redlands meet and Pomona meet, respectively. The old marks made by Larry last year were 50.9 and 2.3.8.

Virgil Hooper, State's sophomore distance ace, took down the mile and two mile marks when he ambled the mile in 4.35.2, and the two mile in 10.27.4. The old marks were held by MacDonald and were registered last year.

Captain Bill Crow tied Vince Barnett's high hurdle time of 15.6 in the Redlands meet, and four days later at the Pomona meet his pal Bill Gray, sophomore, ran the highs in 15.5 to capture the record.

147 feet 6 inches in the platter-throwing event was made by Jean Campbell, sophomore, at the Long Beach Relays to eclipse his old mark of 137 feet made in the Santa Barbara Open last year. Jean also threw the hammer 115 feet 5 inches last November to garner another school record for himself.

Neil Beat, junior, pole-vaulted 11 feet 11 1/2 inches in the Southern California Conference Relays to beat Toby Holcomb's mark set last year.

Louis Trigueiro, State's new frosh star, tossed the javelin 177 feet 6 and 1/4 inches at the all-conference meet last week to miss the school record by 5 inches. The irony of it all was that Louie had a mark of 179 feet, but fouled in making it.

State should have no trouble in grabbing first and second in meets next year with Trigueiro and Freddie Monson coming up from the frosh. Freddie took second behind Louie in the All-Conference with a heave of 168 feet 6 inches, but Freddie has been tossing the javelin only a little over a month and has been improving steadily.

Spike Artists Enter in Open Meet Saturday

10 Varsity and 6 Freshmen Compete for State Track Team

Meeting in the biggest track contest to be held in Southern California this year, athletes from all over the state will gather tomorrow in Peabody Stadium for the annual Junior Chamber of Commerce Open Track and Field Meet. Team honors will be a fight between two U.S.C. teams that are entered.

The Peabody field has been worked upon during this last week, and it will be in fine shape for the classic; among the notable improvements is the changing of the pole vault runway so that it now is perfectly level. Last year a new record was set in this event, but it was not allowed because of a twelve inch drop in the approach.

State Enters Sixteen

State will be represented by ten varsity and six freshmen, but because of the stiff competition the Gauchos will not be favored to annex any of the team trophies. Several of the Hilltoppers will stand a big chance of copping a gold medal, the most likely winner is Howard Yeager in the broad jump and low hurdles. Howie jumped out 23 feet 3/4 inches last week at Redlands, but he should be able to add from several inches to a foot on to this mark when he jumps in the Stadium pit. In the low hurdles Yeager will be running around a curve, and if he can get his step, he will be right up in the money; his second place in the conference meet made by running about 24 seconds stamps him as a dark horse in this event.

Virgil Hooper is a possible winner for the Gauchos in the mile. Hooper had some hard luck in the meet last week, but running in a cooler climate he ought to do much better. Jean Campbell is a probable place winner; he took second last year. If Jean will forget what is expected of him, he'll throw the platter out of the lot, but if he starts to worry about what other people are thinking of his prowess, he may muffle his chances. There is nothing wrong with Campbell now; he demonstrated that after the discuss competition was over last week by hurling it out over 140 feet, and he can do that any time he sets his mind to it.

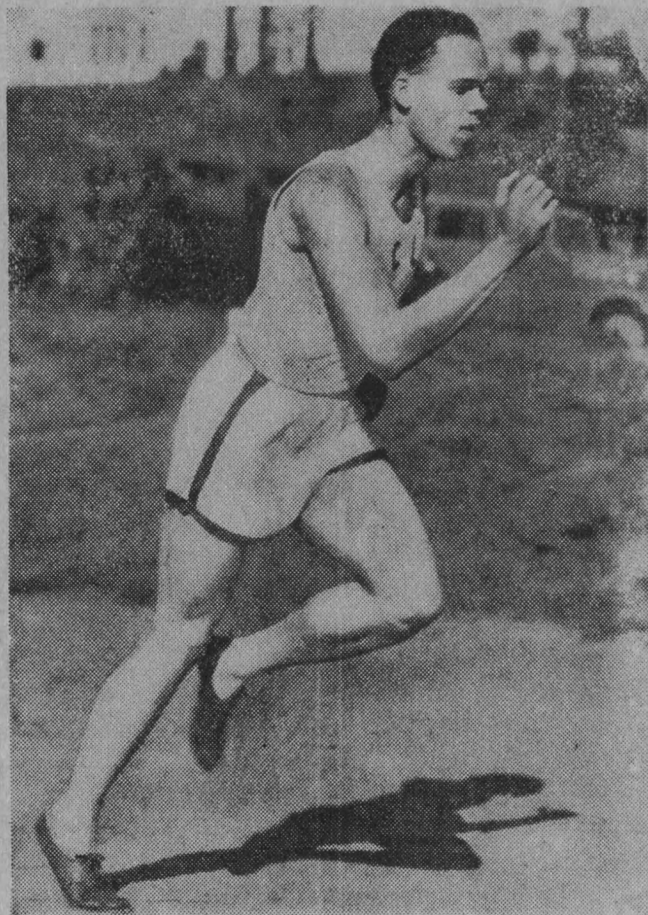
Rygh Runs 2 Mile

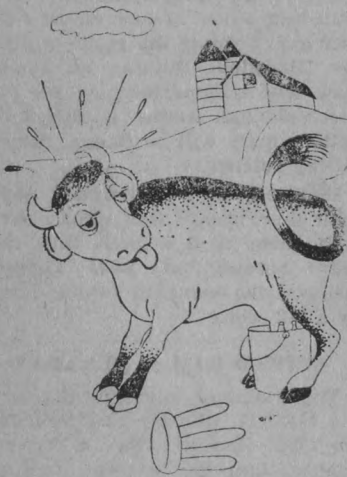

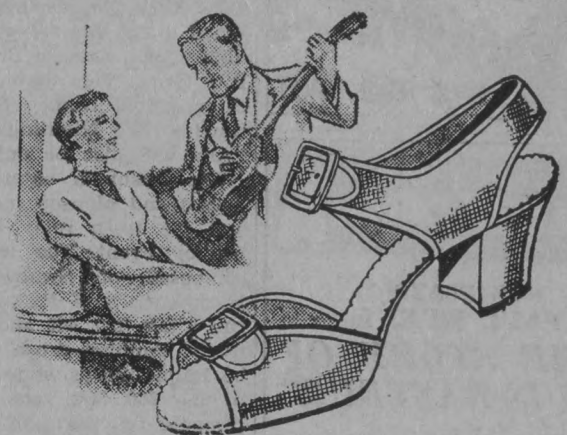
