Jacques Cartier To Give Dance Drama Wednesday

Jacques Cartier, who has earned the title of America's greatest one man theatre, will present a dance drama entitled "The Noble Czar" as the opening show of the Artist Series Wednesday evening in the college auditorium. This colorful event will start at 8:30 p.m. Cartier employs the arts of the dance, of pantomime, and of spoken drama in an unusual performance enriched by spectacularly beautiful costumes. His appearance here will be the first on the Pacific coast following ten performances on Broadway in New York.

His portraits of nine of Russia's most fabulous rulers shown in chronological order, from the cunning Boris Godunoff to Nicholas II, reveals the history of Russia in all of its magnificent splendor, its ruthless drama, and its inevitable climax. The "Czar" has been acclaimed by public and press alike in almost every large city in the United States, and Canada and Mexico as the finest work of Cartier's career.

Typical of the praise accorded Cartier is the following report which appeared in the San Francisco Chronicle after his appearance in

the bay area: "Judging from last night's exhibition, the extraordinary performance of this brilliant solo player ranks with the finest in the theatre today . . . His amazing portraits of those amazing Russian Emperors left us breathless—they are sheer genius! The series makes a tense exciting drama rich with hilarious comedy and stinging tragedy, and should be seen by those courageous souls who seek to understand Russia."

College students will be admitted free of charge to the show Wednesday night upon presentation of their student body card at the door. The price for faculty, service personnel and children is 35 cents, general admission is 60 cents, and reserved seats, 80 cents. Tickets may be purchased in the student body office.

Henrik Ibsen's play "Ghosts" went into rehearsal this week in the play production class under the direction of Mr. Ted Hatlen. Full rehearsal will be underway next week.

Scheduled to be presented to the public Thursday and Friday, November 15 and 16, "Ghosts" is a serious drama with Ibsen's underlying theme of children paying for the sins of their fathers predominating. Central character of the play is that of the son, Oswald, played by Warren Anderson. Oswald had inherited a fatal disease from his father, and the plot is the trials of Oswald in his bitterness at his fate.

Other characters are the mother, Mrs. Alving, portrayed by Margaret Wheeler; Manders, the pastor of the parish—Manders will be done by Clyde Boutillier; a carpenter, Engstrand, enacted by Dean Dillman, jr.; and Regina Engstrand, maid in Mrs. Alving's service, played by Phillis Friedman.

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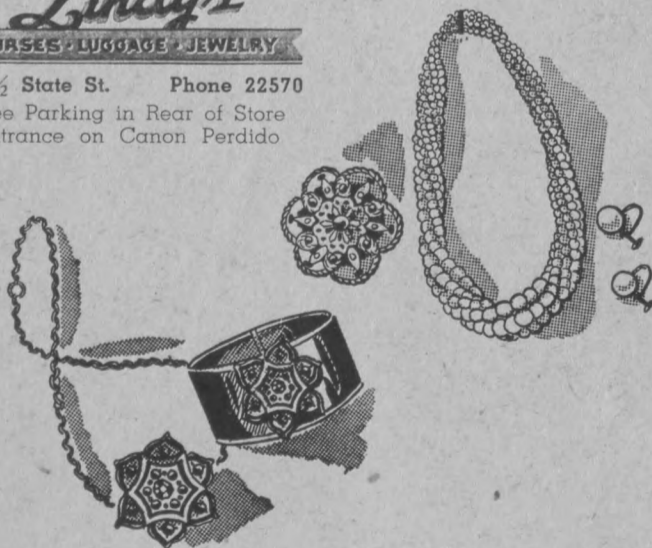
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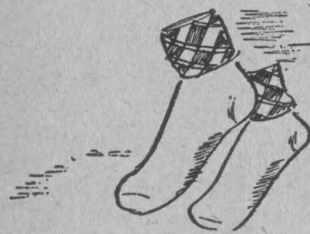

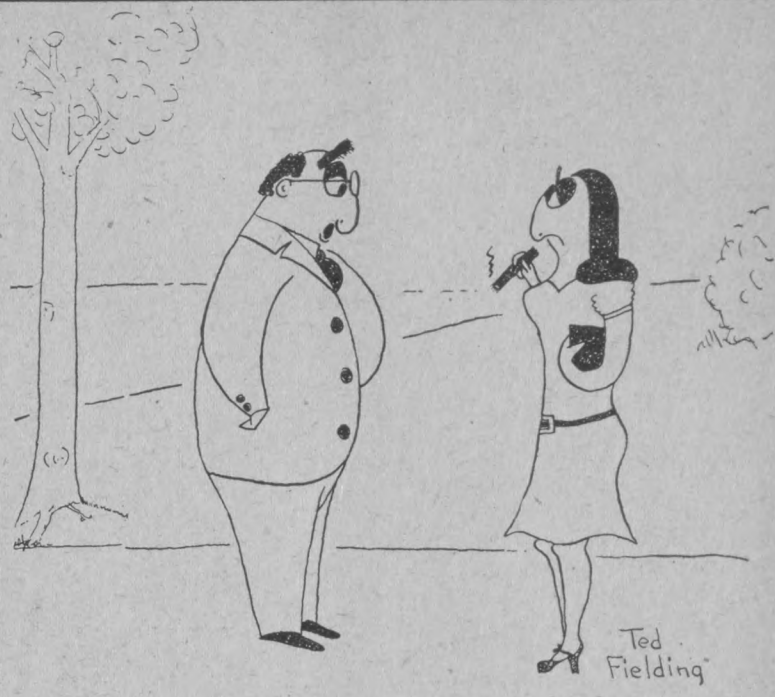
