DISCUSS OLYMPICS

Talk on Youth Movement in
Modern Europe and
Boat Races

Facts concerning the Youth Movement in Europe, and the Olympic Star-boat races will be discussed by Mr. Glen Waterhouse and Mr. Woodbridge Metcalf of the University of California, Tuesday morning, April 27, in assembly.

The two men will tell of their experiences while members of the United States' team in the Olympics as well as their tour through Europe. They will also entertain with some singing.

The assembly is sponsored by the campus 4-H club, and according to Ted Rohlfen, president of the organization, the program will be very entertaining and well worth attending.

Mr. Waterhouse is the assistant club-leader of California and is connected with the professorial staff at Berkeley. Mr. Woodbridge Metcalf is an extension forester of the United States Forestry department, and also gives lectures on forestry at Cal. Both men will wear their official yatching uniforms at the lecture.

The 4-H club on the campus which is sponsoring the event is composed of students who have been active in 4-H work before they enrolled in school. At present the club has an enrollment of twenty-two members.

Polls Open from 7:30 A.M. to 4 P.M.;
Results Will Be Announced
at Six o'Clock

Students of Santa Barbara State college will go to the polls today to officially designate their choice for the positions of Student Body president, vice-president, secretary and yell leader for the coming year.

The election committee, composed of Captain Paul Jones, Barry Simmons, Dorothy Riche and Al Lathim, will have complete charge of the polls which will be open from 7:30 a.m. until 4 p.m. Votes will be counted at that time and official

notification of the results will be given at 6 p.m.

El Gaucho will send a special representative to the tabulation of votes.

Place of Voting

The election will take place in the old student body office, not in the new one as heretofore stated. Students are urged to bring their student body books, but if they are lost, strayed, or stolen, the unfortunates must go to Fred Allred's office to receive proper identification before voting.

Eight Running

The candidates have been campaigning for over a week and those still eligible for votes include Danny D'Alfonso, Dave Pollock and Harold Sanderson for president; Millicent Lincoln and Ann Seymour for vice-president; and Jean McArthur and Lois Scheppele for secretary; Jack Kitchen is uncontested for the office of yell-leader.

Members of the track team who journeyed north today voted yesterday in Captain Jones's office. These votes were sealed and will be counted with those cast today.

Election rules state that there may be no campaigning within 20 feet of the polls.

Shop Boys Study Wasp Airplane Engine

Roaring over the campus after school hours, an airplane motor has been sounding forth as the result of the finished project of six industrial education students of the internal combustion course. The motor is a Wasp loaned to the class by the United States Navy.

While at first there were slight class conflicts over the time when the motor might be run, the department settled the difficulty and is now asking for a special building to be devoted to airplane work. A second motor, a Packard Liberty, has been loaned by the army.

The 9-cylinder has a horsepower of 450 and an r.p.m. of 1,700. It consumes 20 gallons of gasoline per hour. Work of the students included mounting and conditioning.

Mr. William L. Rust, industrial education instructor, and Elmer Jefferies, associate of the Western Air company, were in charge of the work with Malcolm Woodhead, David Westcott, Jeff Powell, Richard Chatten, and Clair Shackelford, aiding.

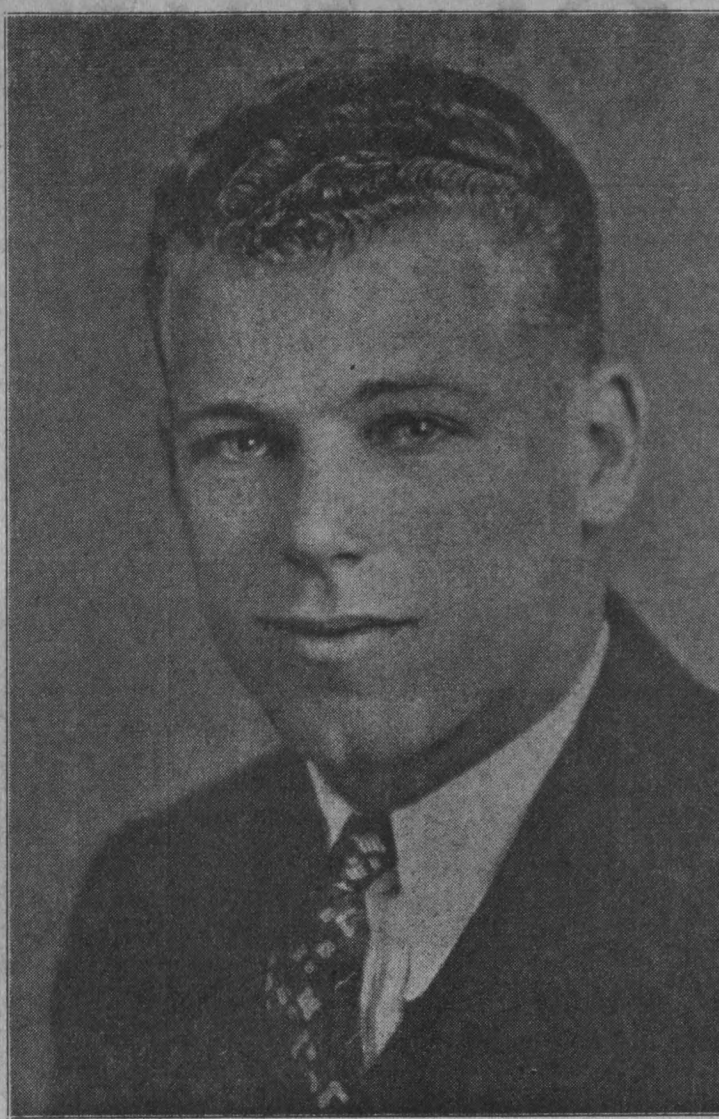

Varsity and Frosh Go North

Denno and Kelliher Have Squads in Good Shape for San Jose Meet

This morning at 7:00 o'clock, the Gauchos Varsity and Frosh track teams left Santa Barbara to travel north to San Jose where they will engage the Spartans in a two way meet tomorrow morning.

Fresh from their victory over the University of Redlands and La Verne college, the Varsity tracksters are expected to return home with another win to their credit. The constantly improving performances of Tooley Palmer in the 880, Wells and Gibson in the 880 and the 440, Beat and Gibby Martin in the pole vault and Howard Yeager in the 100 yard dash and broad jump, should make these men potential threats in their events. A close race between "Iron Man" Stalmack and Yeager is predicted in the 220 yard low hurdles. Bill Gray is expected to continue to lower the school high hurdles record by topping the tall barriers in 15 seconds flat.

The strength of the Spartans is not known but they have a javelin thrower who is consistent at 190 feet and a miler with a mark of 4:36 which will undoubtedly win first place in these events.

The Frosh will do battle against the San Jose Frosh in a meet which will be held in conjunction with the varsity meet.

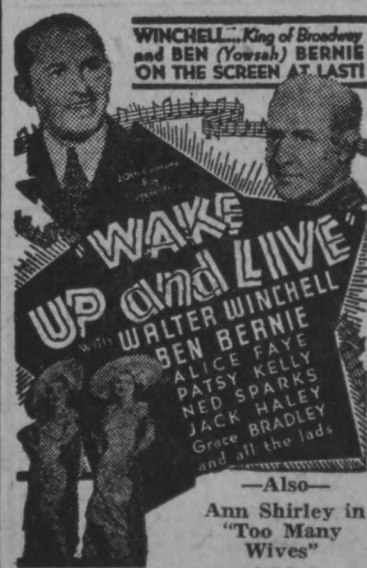

but the terrific bombardment of the past few days indicates the extreme desperation of the Fascists. They poured 250 shells into the heart of the city yesterday, killing and wounding noncombatants as usual. There are about 2,500 Fascists cut off from their supporting lines who face either annihilation or capture, and Franco has been unable to rescue them thus far. After six months siege, the Fascists are as far—or rather farther—away from capturing Madrid than they were at the beginning.
