#### SPAIN AND THE FRACAS

The Spanish insurgents are slowly but surely advancing on Madrid. Loyalists have drafted laborers and office workers to strengthen the fortifications of the city. Officials claim the defenses will be "almost impregnable" to a Fascist attack. New orders have been issued to conserve the food and power supplies. Fascist lines have advanced to within 20 miles and predict they will enter the capital within a few days.

#### ITALY'S DEMONSTRATION

The courageous Ethiopians who fought to the last and succeeded in continuing their guerilla warfare tactics were caught and punished. Thirty Italian bombing and transport planes carrying 500 men and local warriors sympathetic to the Italians were necessary to render Mussolini's punitive measures successful. Italy must feel greatly elated over this last demonstration of its power.

Admiral Harry G. Hamlet of the maritime commission is confident he can negotiate peace between the ship-owners and the longshoremen. #### Hail, Men's Club

Through some misunderstanding, some men on the campus do not fully understand the proper use of the Men's club room. The first purpose of the room is that it remain a place of rest, for study and discussion of the day's problems.

In a recent editorial, entitled "Problem Children," the actions of a few were taken to be the standard of the majority a statment which would not hold true in any case. A few men using the club room improperly can call criticism down upon the heads of all campus men.

A few violators of the Men's club rulings have been promptly reprimanded and corrected. Dave Pollock, president of the club in speaking for its members, assures the student body that no misconduct will be associated further with the Men's club room.

It is indeed unfortunate that misdoings of a minority should be magnified, and credit should be given to the Men's club officials for their excellent work in the maintenance of these rulings.

# Search for Knowledge

A survey from the University of Nebraska made by Dr. S. M. Corey, professor of educational psychology, shows predominant reasons for students entering colleges.

First in importance was "the recommendation of high school teachers and administrators." Others in the order of choice were "proximity of the university to the student's home," "family influence," "prestige of the institution," "economy," "availability of desired courses" and "influence of friends."

Although not absolutely scientifically accurante, Dr. Corey's statistics are interesting. One fact is especially outanding. Of the seven students who gave "influence of athletics" as their reasons, five rank in the lowest psychological test and none in the highest.

### Three Cheers

Again the spirit of cooperation is evidenced at Santa Barbara State this year. The new seating system, supervised by the Sophomore Squires, was a definite success at the La Verne-State football game last Friday night.

The idea, based upon practical usage at many large universities, was enthusiastically adopted by the students. While the Squires played a large part in its enforcement, the attitude of the rooters themselves in condemning a disobedient associate and lauding a conforming supporter was instrumental in the final success of the plan.

Mustangs Overpower State First Year Men on Muddy Field

Out-scored but not out-rought in a football game which resembled a swimming meet, the fighting Freshmen lost a 25 to 0 encounter with the exceptionally strong Cal Poly outfit last Saturday afternoon at San Luis Obispo. The game was marked with frequent fumbles caused by the rain which let up only in the first and last quarters.

In the opening period of play, the green-and-orange clad Poly players scored on a sustained drive from mid-field, which featured a 15 yard pass to the Frosh 6 yard line. Fumbles by the Yearlings paved the way for two Cal Poly touchdowns in the second quarter.

The Freshmen came back in the second half, fighting mad, but hard luck in the form of fumbles and intercepted passes continually blocked the Gaucho babes' efforts. Cal Poly was held scoreless in the third quarter, but pushed over a touchdown in the final period of
