C.A.A. Pilots Fly Without Accidents

WASHINGTON, D.C.—(A.C.P.) Student pilots in U.S. colleges are careful and take no chances.

That's the conclusion that must be drawn from the report of the Civil Aeronautics Authority that collegians have flown more than 36,000 hours without a serious accident.

Begun in August, 1939, the C.A.A. pilot training program now has 9,310 participants. Exactly 1,200 of these have reached the solo stage of their training program.

"Of all the professions, that of teacher most needs the full four years of liberal arts work. To include in these four years more than a minimum of specific teacher training courses defeats the whole purpose of our efforts." New York university's Dean H. E. Hawkes believes emphasis should be placed on training future teachers what to teach, not how to teach.

Housing Citizens Ask For Action at Council Meet

The soap box orators and wild-eyed radicals who cry that democracy is dead and non-existent would have received a mouth-closer and eye-opener had they attended the special session of the Santa Barbara council Monday evening in the city hall concerning the controversy of federal housing.

It was truly an exhibition of "democracy in action" as a full house of public-minded citizens turned out to support the recommendations of the housing committee that Santa Barbara take advantage of the opportunities of federal housing and slum clearance.

The State College was not without representation, as Dr. Harry Girvetz, a member of the committee, Dr. George Outland, Dr. Helen Sweet and several students argued the cause of federal housing and its advantages.

The result of the meeting was a step forward by the council when they accepted the committee report, commended it highly, and promised to act upon it within 30 days.

A few facts brought out by the survey showed: 422 houses in the East quarter are unfit for human habitation; 333 are without bath and 200 without individual toilet; families of six to twelve members lived in houses varying from one to four rooms; 65 per cent of all tuberculosis cases occur in this one district; the houses are assessed at an average of \$273.00 per house; the average family income is \$650 annually.

In the words of Dr. Outland before the council "We in Santa Barbara by all means want to take advantage of this aid."

Said Dr. Sweet: "I find it difficult to answer questions (concerning the slums) when the case is so clear. Something must be done."

Toughest competition will be met first as they pull into San Jose today to meet the Spartans in a contest that will probably decide the ultimate winner of the loop gonfalon. The Spartans will field one of the best teams in San Jose history with talent going at least two deep at every spot in the infield. A crop of fine hurlers and some hard hitting outfielders mark the outfit as highest hurdle in the path of a Gaucho championship. Harder took a well balanced unit composed of regulars Mickey Berman, first sacker, Eddie Markham, second baseman, Don Ripsch, third baseman, Jack Fitzgerald, shortstop, Shanty Stansbury, catcher, Bill Adamson, left field, Joe Blake, centerfield, and John Chickereilli, in right field. Lowell Steward Cracks Local Cage Scoring Record

In an unpredictable season which saw Willie Wilton's Gaucho cagers crack almost every one of their existing records, Lowell Steward, loose-limbed sophomore sensation, emerged as 1940 scoring champ for the 2C2A champions, tallying 270 points for a new local scoring record. Tommy Guerrero, the Gauchos' All-Conference forward, took over second place with 239 points.

Steward, besides cracking the seasonal record, also broke the scoring record for a single game when he popped in 27 points against San Francisco State College.

The Gauchos by winning 21 games added another new mark to the local records and also set up a new seasonal team scoring record of 1059 points. One of the most unique of the new records was Steward's feat of making good 56 out of 76 foul throws awarded him.

McArthur Heads Local Tracksters In Initial Meet

Getting their initial taste of major competition, Roy Bohler's cinderpath squad goes south tomorrow to engage in the annual Long Beach Relays against such track powerhouses as the University of Southern California, National champions, U.C.L.A., Stanford, and others of the same caliber.

Eleven men, headed by Captain Bill McArthur, will make the trip to compete in several open events as well as the four man quarter mile sprint relay and the four man medley relay events.

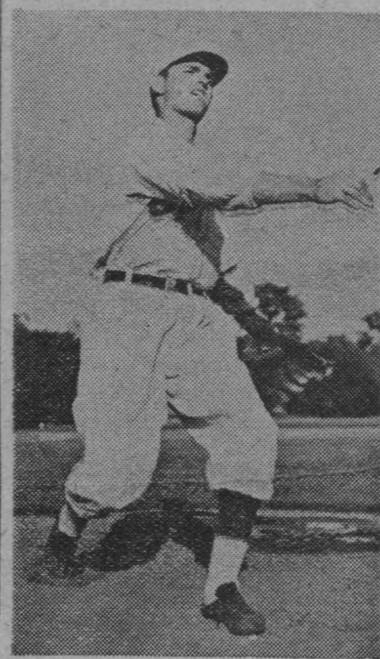
Men making the trip include Wolfe Heinberg in both shot put and discus, Gene Campbell, who holds the school discus record at 147' 2", Chuck Crow, record holder in the pole vault at 12' 9", Al Sprague, javelin school record holder with a mark of 184' 10", Jim Kilroy, freshman timber topper, in the high hurdles, Hovis Bess, ex-Riverside sprint king, in the open 100 yard dash, and McArthur in the novice 100 yard dash.

Bess, McArthur, Burdette Gandy and Bill Morgan will form the four-man sprint relay team and will probably give a good account of themselves as all four men are capable of hitting 10 flat or better in the 100 yard dash.

Herman Stauss, Bess, Bill Mosk, and Captain McArthur will comprise the four man medley relay squad in which two of the men run 220 yards while the other two run quarter miles apiece.

Although not much is expected of the Gauchos because of the high caliber of competition they are running into, several of the men such as Campbell in the discus and Bess and McArthur in the 100 may surprise in their specialties.

Santa Barbara will have its first dual meet of the season here on April 6 against the 1939 2C2A track champions.

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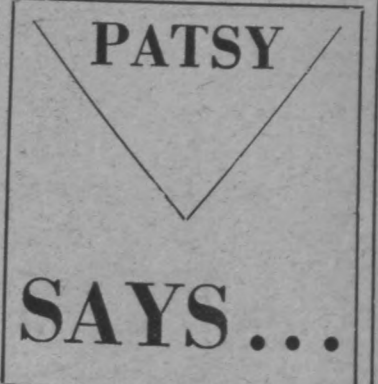

Some of us will go home . . . some of us are already here, and there's a certain amount of buzzing around about a town called "Balboa."

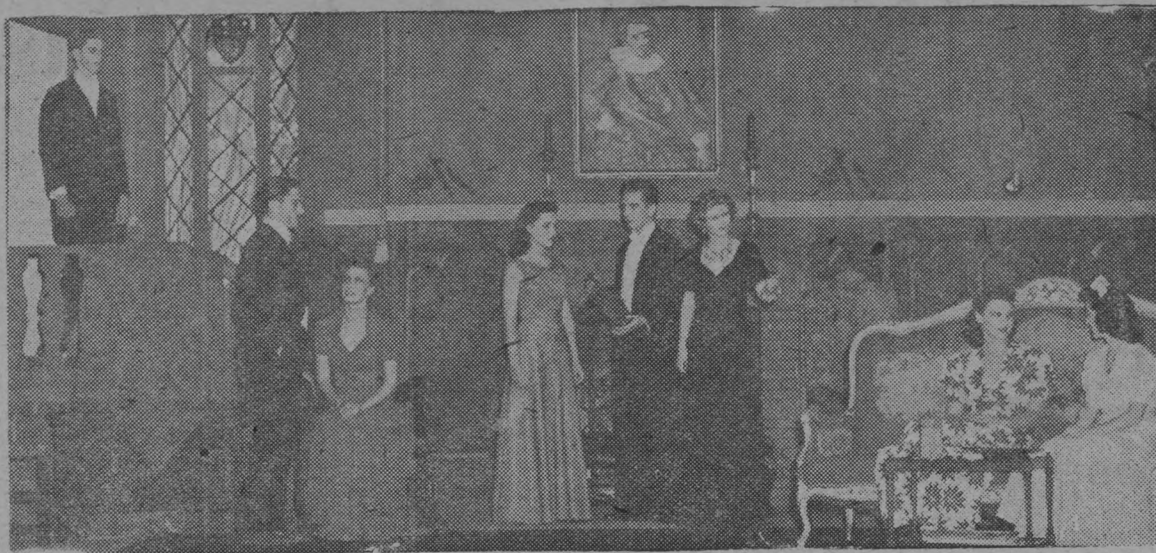
Then too, some of us might remember the old adage—"all work and no play makes jack and plenty of it."
