SUMMER CONCERT ON CAMPUS JULY 11

Santa Barbara College summer students are cordially invited to attend a musical concert on Wednesday evening at 8:30 p.m. in the Campus Auditorium (across the street from the Student Union). This summer concert is offered free of charge and will feature the brilliant dramatic soprano, Frances Cassard, and Shirley Munger and Dr. John Gillespie, duo-pianists.

Miss Cassard, a visitor in Santa Barbara, has sung leading opera roles in Florence, Rome, Naples and Venice and has concertized widely. The young artist has made extensive studies of the music of near and far-Eastern countries and her program will include a group of songs from Japan. She will also present a selection of songs from the great world religions and two operatic arias.

Miss Munger and Dr. Gillespie, both accomplished concert pianists and members of the UCSBC music faculty, will present two short transcriptions of works by Each. The Sonata in D-major by Mozart will comprise the classic portion of the two-piano selections, concluding with a suite for two pianos by Arensky.

STUDENT HEALTH SERVICE OFFERS POLIO VACCINE

Summer Session students under 20 years of age may now receive immunization against polio at the Student Health Center, Bldg. 478. An increase of Federal-purchase polio vaccine has made it possible to extend the age limit of those eligible to receive free vaccine to 19 years of age. The previous limit was 14 years. The Santa Barbara County Health Department is cooperating in the college immunization program.

Dr. W.T. Robbins, director of the Student Health Service, said that students who have not yet reached their 20th birthday who wish to be infimized against poliomay do so be registering at the Health Center no later than 11 a.m., Mon., July 9.

Sufficient vaccine will then be obtained from the County Health Department and first injections will be administered Monday afternoon, July 9, as well as on the following day. The second and final injection will be given during the last week of Summer Session.
