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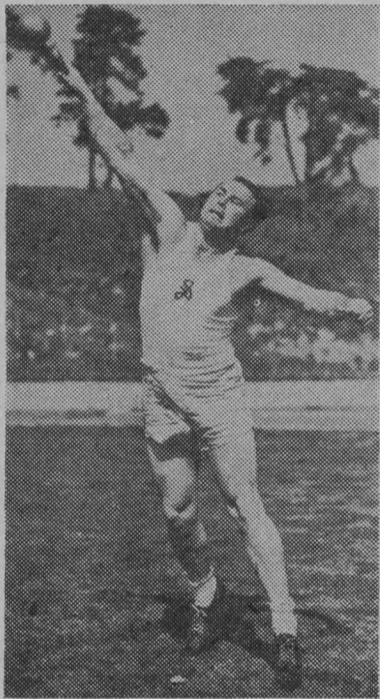
College Red Cross Chapter To Open Fund Campaign

The drive, the first of its kind on this campus will continue throughout the entire week from March 11 to 15. Directing the rally will be Jean Calderon, rally chairman, and Red Cross officials. The program will feature music, dancing and the introduction of Raymond Acevedo, chairman of the Riviera campus drive and student secretary for the drive, Carmella Civitelli.

Monday night, representatives from the various sororities and other organizations will talk about the drive at their various meetings. Announcements will be made at the meetings of all organizations during the week by representatives who were given instructions on March 6 at 4:00 in room 10 by Kay Updegraff, vice chairman of the Red Cross, and Mildred Ramey, chairman of the group representatives.

Women who have volunteered to work in the Red Cross booth in the Quad during that week were given a similar orientation lecture Thursday, March 7. The group helping will be under the direction of Joan Frye.

The executive board of the college chapter, headed by Mrs. Francis Karpe, is particularly anxious that college students and faculty cooperate to the fullest extent, as this is the first to be sponsored by a special college chapter. Estimates are that the low quota of \$700 will be reached early during the week.

EDITORIAL

In an effort to replenish and preserve the natural resources ravaged through the toll exacted by all-out war production, the California Conservation Council has set this week, March 7-14, as California Conservation Week.

Few native Californians are aware of the fact that in their state are areas which have proven to be the driest, the wettest, the sunniest, the foggiest, and coldest, the hottest, the lowest, the highest, the flattest, the most rugged, the most fertile, and the most alkaline land in the United States. In view of this diversity of character throughout the state, it is of considerable importance that special efforts be made to preserve and save what resources have survived the exploitations and waste of war.

Each day during the week is being devoted to a special phase of the conservation program, covering the particular resources of the state which face the most critical shortage, in some cases to the extent of near-extinction.

Yesterday was designed as bird and tree conservation day. Today is set aside for reeducation and reminding each resident of the state of his or her responsibility in the prevention of forest fires, the worst obstacle to conservation. Care in smoking habits when in the state's forests, and co-operation in fire prevention to safeguard timber, watersheds, grazing and farm lands and wild life is of utmost importance at this time. Tomorrow's program concerns "plugging" state clean-up campaigns and recreational area beautification plans. Sunday, the importance of conservation in the life of a community is to be emphasized.

During the following week, such problems as safety practices on the farm, and in the home, in conserving the soil, increasing food production, the critical shortage of water and its effects on the future supply of fish and game, and the considerable danger faced in the total loss of California's mineral and oil supplies, which are not renewable, will be considered in turn, and possible solutions suggested.

On the final day, a general overall consideration of the ways in which each individual can actually gain in health and efficiency by strict observance of conservation practices each day will be made.

In defining their use of the word conservation, the Council describes it as "an attitude of mind, and a way of living. Learn why and how, then do things the right way; it's easier, safer, and much more profitable."

Gauchos Nine Drops First Game of Season To All-Stars, 7 to 3

The Santa Barbara Gauchos dropped what looked to be a rather wild season's opener to Maj. Eddie Markham and Bill Lillard's All-Stars by a score of 7 to 3, at Cabrillo Field, Saturday afternoon.

There was a lot of smooth play in evidence with the opening stanzas of the ball game; particularly in the infield. The All-Stars took an early lead in the first inning when the first batter up, Fitzgerald, third baseman, hit a beeline double to center and was later knocked in by Lillard's long fly ball after being advanced to third on a sacrifice hit.

The Gauchos came back, however, in the last of the fifth to take the lead following a powerful double hit by Vasquez, which allowed Helfridge who was previously walked to make it home. A sacrifice by Metcalf advanced Vasquez to third and he later scattered to home plate on a wild pitch. This put the Gauchos on top 2 to 1.

The All-Stars came back in the sixth, secured the lead, climaxing a series of walks and wild pitches, and held it for the rest of the ball game.

Coach "Spud" Harder was not discouraged with the Gauchos' play, however. The All-Stars took the field minus a pitcher, necessitating a toss up between Keegan and Scott, both Santa Barbara men, to see who would pitch for whom. Scott pitching for the All-Stars showed nice control and plenty of know-how in backing up the bases. Keegan, starter for the Gauchos, also had good control and probably compiled the best record over any of the pitchers on the field.

This was definitely a practice game and Harder's experimenting with pitchers, which circumstances necessitated, was a serious factor when looking for the score board. However, certain mistakes have been ironed out and from now on we will have our pitching staff to ourselves, so we should be in high gear when that U.C.L.A. game rolls around, March 15.
