## Petitions Due Today From All Candidates

Election petitions of all candidates are due today at 4 p.m. in the office of the Graduate Manager, complete with the necessary signatures, according to Al Rasmussen, Elections Committee chairman. Candidates should present 250 bonifide signatures, except aspirants for class representative, who need only 50 names of their own classmates.

The 1948 campaign began in earnest this week with the appearance of banners, posters and pictures of the 42 entries. Candidates were reminded by Charles Bates, chairman of the Publicity Committee, that handbills and painting on streets, curbs, sidewalks or any other unauthorized surface have been forbidden by the campaign officials.

### Political Parley

The Legislative Council on Tuesday night approved a political meeting for 8:15 p.m. next Monday at which presidential candidates will present their platforms and discuss current campus issues. A general campaign assembly is scheduled for 11 a.m. the following day, when all candidates will be introduced to the voters. Classes will be dismissed.

On Wednesday, May 5, election day, polls will be open from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. both the Riviera and Mesa campuses.

## Kinsey Report on Discussion Agenda In Sociology Conclave

Such subjects as "Some Comments on the Kinsey Reports" and "Predicting Success or Failure in Marriage" will highlight the meeting of the Pacific Sociological Society meeting being held today and tomorrow, according to Doctor Gwynne Nettler, assistant professor of sociology, who is on the advisory council for the society.

The conference will be held today in the Garden Room of the Carillo Hotel and tomorrow in Pine Hall 100. Morning sessions will begin at 10:00, afternoon at 2:00, and evening at 7:30.

Other topics on the agenda are "Social Influence of Movies on Teen-Age Children," "General Theory of Behavior," and "Professors in Retirement."

All interested students are invited to attend any or all of the sessions.

### GOEDHARD WANTS CENTRALIZATION

Neil Goedhard, fraternity-sorority endorsed candidate for Associated Students president, offers a program of "centralization and equal coordination" of all campus activities in seeking the highest ASSB office. "If elected, I hope to unite all groups into a cooperative unit," he declares.

To further his policy of centralization, Goedhard proposes first to establish a central purchasing and supply unit, operating through the College Bookstore, to handle such items as band and athletic equipment and materials for La Cumbre and *El Gaucho*.

### Transfer Bookstore

He will also seek the transfer of the Bookstore to the status of student bookstore, to highlight the ideal of centralization.

To avoid conflicting interpretations of the ASSB constitution such as have occurred in the past, Goedhard would establish a student body supreme court, composed of five members, to make constitutional decisions in the same manner as the United States Supreme Court.

### Faculty-Student

Special rates to student events would be offered to faculty members as a first measure of "increasing friendship between the faculty" (Continued on page 2, col. 1)

### CALDWELL-BROADER REPRESENTATION

Broader representation in Student Government with a view to raising the level of student spirit and interest in campus life is the keynote of the platform of presidential candidate John Caldwell, running on an independent ticket.

To achieve this aim, Caldwell proposes a revision of the ASSB constitution "to extend student government to every group and every student." Suggested changes include increasing the proportion of student officers elected at large by adding a corresponding secretary and four representatives at large to the Council; and electing, rather than appointing the officer who controls student funds. Caldwell also questions whether the yell leader, elected at large, is qualified to represent the students politically.

### Fair Budget

"A more intelligent apportionment of student funds, with a just allotment to every department" is another goal aimed at raising

The budget, the spirit of the school or lack of it, efficiency, or lack of it, in student government, who runs student council and why, will all be discussed at an open "town meeting" next Monday night when the three presidential candidates present their platforms to the voters for discussion and debate. The meeting will come to order at 8:15 in Pine Hall 100.

As the campaign assembly on Tuesday morning will limit speaking time to five minutes for the major candidates, and less for class representatives, the political parley will be the only opportunity Gaucho voters will have to hear and question the candidates at length on their views of current campus problems.

Neil Goedhard, John Caldwell and Charles Bates will each discuss the various planks they propose "if elected." The meeting will probably be thrown open to questions from the audience after each has spoken.

According to present plans, the three candidates for yell leader, Bob Lorden, Wendell Kirk and George Outland, will end the meeting with a rally.

Other speakers will be Cole Weston, Independent Progressive Party candidate for Congress, Dave Patton, IPP candidate for the state assembly, and a UCSB student.

Da Silva has indicated that his subject will be "The Free Press." The other speakers will emphasize local and national problems, defeat of universal military training and the draft, and youth problems.

Admission to the meeting is free and all interested students are invited to attend. Students for Wallace, composed of UCSB students, will be one of the sponsoring organizations of this rally.

### VILLAGE INCIDENT

Dear Editor, An incident occurred at University Village Monday night which aptly demonstrates the attitude of a great many of the faculty and administration to the present generation of college students. The women residents were told that they must leave the study hall by 10:30 pm from now on.

Let us examine just how illogical this is.

1. Women, from ages 17 to 21, old enough to get married and raise children, were told by implication that they were too immature to be allowed to study in a hall where men students also were studying. If they are too immature, then it's a sad commentary on American womanhood and on the educational system under which these women were reared. Again, if they are too immature, isn't it about time that our colleges worked to develop maturity instead of trying to squelch it under mid-Victorian rules?

2. College is the place and time to study. If a girl has enough motivation to burn the midnight oil, more power to her. The "Village" is widely known for its inadequate facilities for studying. To deny the women the few facilities (no matter how poor) for studying is to deny them an education.

Evidently, a few of our faculty and administrators don't realize the tremendous change the veteran has effected in college life. The modern day college student is mature, self-reliant, and wishes to be treated as such—not as a child.

I will admit the women's reactions were not the best that could have occurred, but when people are treated as children, they will react like children. Treat them as intelligent adults and they will act like intelligent adults.

and student government." Goedhard also pledges himself to work for new uniforms for the Gauchito band, and for the creation of a freshman women's honor group, to consist of some hundred members and to be called "The Whip." Eligibility would be based on participation in campus activities.

### PJC President

Goedhard, now finishing his sophomore year, came to UCSB from Pasadena Junior College, where he was president of Associated Students last year. While in Pasadena he also was manager of the Tournament of Roses Band and founded the Conference of California Junior College Presidents, of which he is the head. The group represents 56 colleges throughout the state.

The candidate is chairman of the Finance Committee in the present student government, and is a member of the Artist Series, Athletic Control, Press Control Boards and the Legislative Council. On the Gauchito varsity baseball team he is utility pitcher.

A political science major with aspirations in the field of public administration and politics, Goedhard spent three years in the Navy as a quartermaster third class.

school spirit. Caldwell declares that he believes a great saving could be effected through more efficient management of student administration.

Citing evidences of "waste and loss in buying and management" in the cafeteria, Caldwell pledges himself to work for lower prices, better food and more appealing menus, with the possibility of transferring the cafe to student ownership.

### Co-op Housing

He also proposes to investigate facilities for cooperative student housing. "There isn't much we can do," he says, but with the closing of University Village more housing will be needed, and I believe a city-wide survey would find it."

A junior, Caldwell is president of Beta Delta fraternity and of the Knights, junior men's honor group, as well as vice-president of International Relations Club, co-chairman of the Barbary Coast committee, and publicity chairman of WSSF and the Gauchito Round-ups.

### Shipwreck Voyage

After the war, during which he served in the American and foreign merchant marines and in the Royal Australian Air Force, Caldwell sailed 7400 miles across the Pacific to Australia, alone in a 29-foot sloop. Having lost his food and instruments in a hurricane, he lived on half a pint of water a day for 53 days at sea, until he landed in the Fiji Islands and was cared for by natives. A book on his experiences is now in the hands of publishers.

### Intrasquad Game

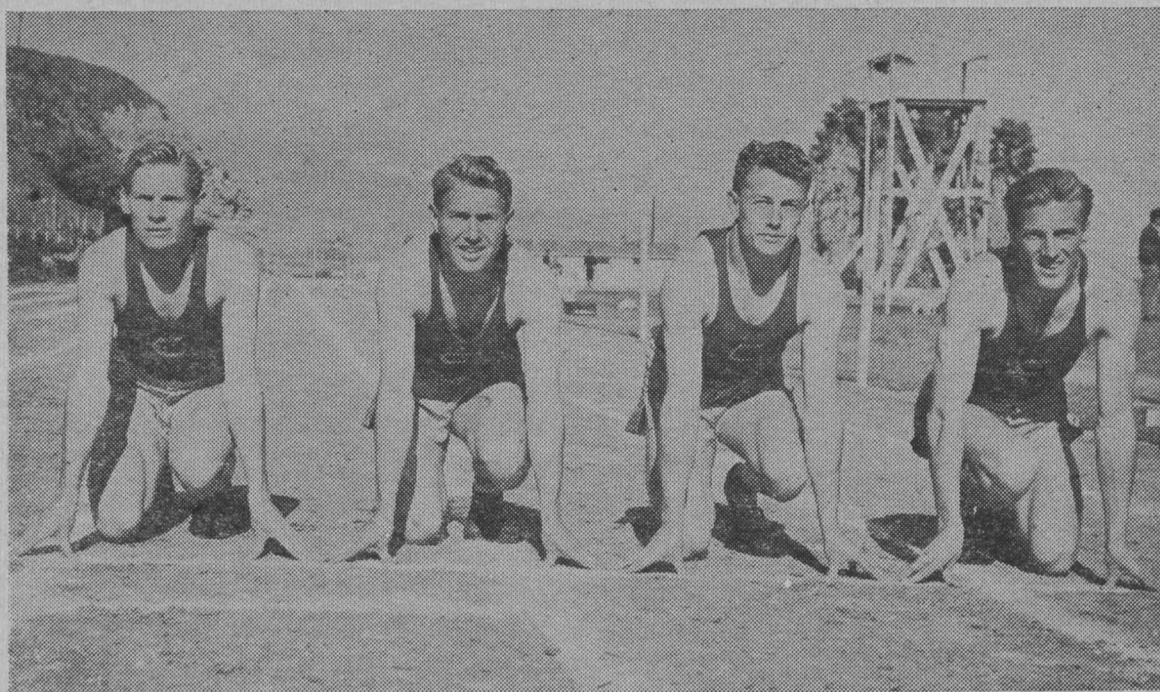

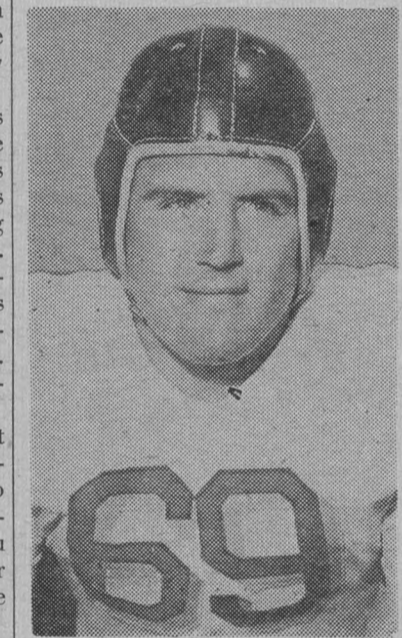

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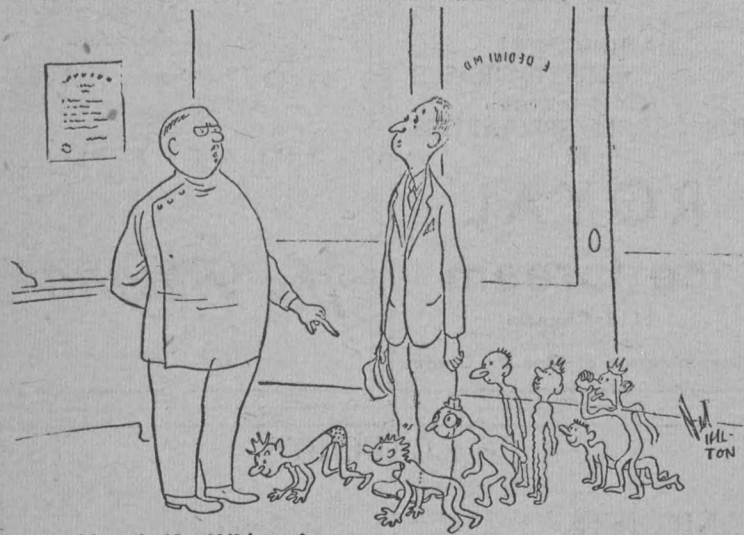
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
