# **Petitions Due Today From All Candidates**

Election petitions of all candidates are due today at 4 p.m. in the office of the Graduate Manager, complete with the necessary signatures, according to Al Rasmussen, Elections Committee chairman. Candidates should present 250 bonifide signatures, except aspirants for class representative, who need only 50 names of their own classmen.

The 1948 campaign began in earnest this week with the appearance of banners, posters and pictures of the 42 entries. Candidates were reminded by Charles Bates, chairman of the Publicity Committee, that handbills and painting on streets, curbs, sidewalks or any other unauthorized surface have been forbidden by the campaign officials.

## DEMOCRACY IN ACTION

On Monday night you will have an opportunity, probably your only opportunity, to hear in informal discussion the three men who are seeking the office of student body president. One of them will be your student leader next year, and what all of them have to say about the many recognized problems troubling our campus will be of importance to you.

This political meeting, with open question and comment on Gaucho political, financial and administrative problems, is American democracy in the best sense. Such meetings, where voters assume the responsibility of inquiring interest in their government, and where candidates meet the test of public debate, stem from the oldest roots of this country. Thus our New England founders established the democratic tradition, and thus we can carry it on.

Next year you will be governed by a man whom you will elect next Wednesday. Next year, grumbling about his leadership will be too late. It is up to you to discover in advance what he stands for, and what kind of government he will give you. You have your chance on Monday night. The time, 8:15. The place, Pine Hall 100.

Shipwreck Voyage

After the war, during which he served in the American and foreign merchant marines and in the Royal Australian Air Force, Caldwell sailed 7400 miles across the Pacific to Australia, alone in a 29-foot sloop. Having lost his food and instruments in a hurricane, he lived on half a pint of water a day for 53 days at sea, until he landed in the Fiji Islands and was cared for by natives. A book on his experiences is now in the hands of publishers.

## Mock Marriages To Add to Formal May Dance



The White squad will be captained by Frank Kirkland, varsity co-captain, and will field such familiar players as Al Katich, Max


