SPANISH POLITICAL SCIENTIST LECTURES ON EUROPEAN UNITY IN NORTH HALL

Manuel Jimenez de Parga, a renowned Spanish political scientist, will discuss "Spain and European Unity" in a lecture at 4 p.m. tomorrow, Wednesday, in North Hall Lecture Room.

The guest lecturer is currently on a nationwide trip under the auspices of the U.S. State Department.

During his stay, he will lecture at the Berkeley and UCLA campuses, and will attend the Republican National Convention in San Francisco.

ROBERT HAAG WILL PERFORM THIRD PIANO CONCERT OF BEETHOVEN SONATAS

Robert Haag, pianist, and instructor in music at El Camino College, will perform the third concert in his series of four recitals, at 8 p.m. Thursday in Room 1250 of the Music Building.

The guest artist will perform a group of Beethoven sonatas as part of a cycle of seven concerts he is presenting this year. The three concerts remaining in the cycle will be performed in the fall at El Camino College.

UC FILM WILL BE SHOWN ON KEYT

"Which Campus," a film depicting all campuses of the University of California, will be featured on KEYT, Channel 3, at 7 p.m. tomorrow, Wednesday, July 8.

The film, showing all the operating campuses, as well as Irvine and Santa Cruz, is designed to give the prospective student aid in deciding which UC campus is best suited to his needs.

Campus scenes and a discussion of the academic orientation of each are included in the 30-minute film.

LIBRARY POETRY READING BY GARY SNYDER WILL BE SECOND LECTURE IN SERIES

A poetry reading by Gary Snyder, poet and author of two books, will be the second event in the Summer Lecture Series. Snyder will read at 4 p.m. Tuesday, July 7, in South Hall Lecture Room.

The poet, who has written "Riprap" and "Myths and Texts," is on his first visit to the U.S. in five years. Since 1956, he has lived almost continuously in Japan where he has been studying the traditional Zen Buddhist training methods.

Since returning to this country, Snyder has read his poetry on the Berkeley campus and in San Francisco.

Snyder is a westerner born in San Francisco. He attended Reed College and has done several years of graduate study in Chinese and Japanese at Berkeley. This fall he will teach a poetry class at Berkeley.

ENGLISH FIIM CLASSIC, DUTCH SHORT
ARE ON SUNDAY FIIM BILL HERE

"On Approval," an English film classic starring Bea Lillie and Clive Brook, heads the Sunday film bill of fare this week in Campbell Hall.

Admission to the 7:30 p.m. showing is 50 cents.

Made in 1944, the film was directed by Brook. His performance and that of Miss Lillie have received critical acclaim throughout the world.

"On Approval" will be accompanied by a short subject, "The House," a Dutch production which has been called a progenitor to "Last Year At Marienbad."

NEW DEPARTMENT OF DRAMATIC ART

The division of the Department of Speech and Drama into two separate departments - the Department of Speech and the new Department of Dramatic Art - has been announced.

Specialization in two areas - rhetoric and public address - are offered the speech major, as well as speech pathology. The undergraduate curriculum in dramatic art offers a four-year course in both the theory and practice of acting, stage direction, stage and costume design and playwriting.

A new building housing both departments will open in the fall, with a main auditorium that seats 400, an arena experimental theatre and other facilities.
