REGENTS PASS UC BUDGET

The Regents of the University of California recently authorized an operating budget of \$1,993,917.44 for Santa Barbara College for the 1953-54 fiscal year.

For the entire University, a budget of \$71,087,951 was accepted, of which \$54,445,473 has been provided by the legislature, the balance coming from student fees, sales, charges and miscellaneous, and donations and endowment income.

The total is \$5,362,928 greater than the 1952-53 budget. The increase will provide principally for new activities and extension of recently inaugurated activities to which the University is committed in order to meet its responsibilities to the growing state of California, and a 3.5 percent larger provision for maintenance of regular and continuing activities.

DR. OAKESON TO DENMARK

Dr. Barbara B. Oakeson, Associate Professor of Zoology, will attend the 14th International Congress on Zoology to be held August 1 in Copenhagen, Denmark. This event is held every five years and Dr. Oakeson attended the last one held in Paris.

She will deliver a research paper on "Variation in Three Races of White-Growned Sparrows". A subject upon which she has done much investigation and study.

NATURE STUDY INSTITUTE

This 21st Annual Institute of Nature Study and Conservation will follow immediately after the Summer Session—August 10-22—and offers two units of upper division credit. It is a practical course designed especially for teachers. Field trips in connection with seashore life, native birds, insects, native plants, western trees will be offered. A special division of Elementary Science methods is also available.

This event is planned by University of California Extension and will use the Museum of Natural History as headquarters. Application forms and information may be obtained from UC Extension Office, 906 Santa Barbara Street.

GOLETA OPEN HOUSE EXCEEDS EXPECTATIONS

Nearly 300 people journeyed out to the Goleta Campus last Wednesday, the turnout far exceeded the anticipated number of visitors. Much credit for the large turnout of townspeople must go to an editorial in the Santa Barbara News-Press on Tuesday night. The Summer Session Social Committee, sponsors of the open house, had expected about 50 people to show up for the event, and naturally were quite pleased with the huge crowd.

The 300 people presented one problem, however. The Art Gallery was set up to show the color movie, "Santa Barbara: Pacific Paradise", to a limited number. When it became apparent that even with standing room it would be impossible to accommodate the crowd, a second showing was scheduled.

Due to the tremendous interest showed in the open house, there is a possibility that another will be held sometime during the summer.

DISTINGUISHED VISITING PROFESSOR

Dr. David B. Bardner, Head of the Department of Child Development and Parent Education at Utah State Agricultural College is participating in an interesting home economics course on "Family Relationships in Contemporary Life".

He holds a PhD degree in Educational Psychology from Cornell University and for several years has been identified with counseling and guidance activities in his native state of Utah.

His special task in this Summer Session course is to present the subject of relationships and interactions of family members in home life. Other participants in the course are Dr. Ruth Major and Mrs. Marie Wilson, both Assistant Professors of Home Economics.
