- (b)—All students, veterans and non-veterans, who did not receive admission cards on Monday or Tuesday must report to the Admission Line No. 1 of the Men's Gymnasium to receive Admission cards.
- (c)—Non-Veterans with admission cards report to line No. 2 in the Men's Gymnasium for payment of fees.
- (d)—Veterans with starred admission cards report to Women's Gymnasium for Registration book. Account card with local address must be filled out and turned in.
- (f)—All students report to East door North Hall to make Housing Statement to Deans, obtain student body cards from Graduate Manager, and arrange physical examination. All returning students who were not in attendance during the Fall of 1946 or the Spring of 1947 must schedule a physical examination at the time of Registration.

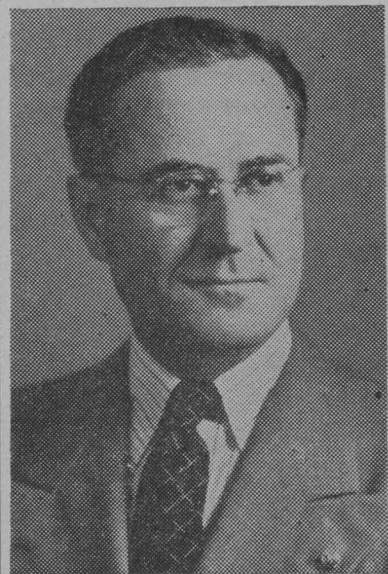

## University of California Enlists! All Male, Non-Vet Frosh Drafted

Frosh student, huh. Bub, you're in the Army now!

In case the news hasn't been gently broken already, here's the straight stuff . . .

A new University of California ruling makes two years of college ROTC training mandatory for all entering freshmen who are physically fit and have not served at least one year in the United States armed forces. Mid-year frosh are covered by this ruling—Gaucho sophomores are exempt.

### VOLUNTEER VETS

To cover veterans who might wish to continue military studies, make money, and gain a reserve commission, an advanced ROTC group has been formed. This category is strictly voluntary.

### Library Hours

Library hours will be 7:45 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. Monday through Thursday, and 7:45 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Friday, with library service available 9:00 to 12:00 a.m. on Saturday. Dr. Donald C. Davidson, head librarian, announced recently.

Members of the advanced group will draw pay at the rate of 66c per day plus \$105.00 for a two-week summer camp training program. After successful completion of a two-year enlistment, the group graduates will receive reserve commissions in the Army of the United States.

Military schedules for the frosh group will consist of classroom study in military science and tactics for one hour on Tuesdays and Thursdays, plus one hour of unit drill on Fridays. Advanced group men will receive five weekly hours of training.

### BIG ASSEMBLY

Everything is furnished ROTC members except KP—Uniforms, rifles, textbooks, and any other equipment. All the rookies have to do is learn how to use them.

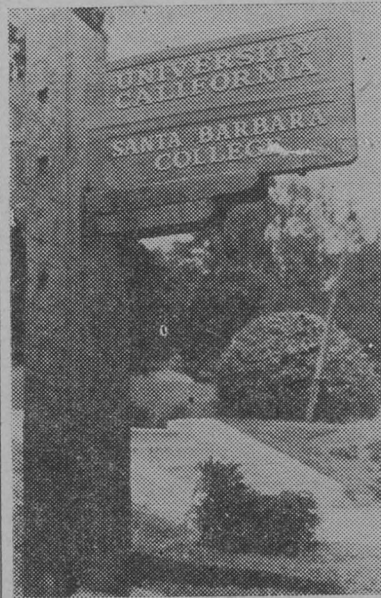
Here's what you do . . . If you were "drafted" and have no cause for exemption, report to the auditorium promptly (Army time) at 9 a.m. You will be quietly "inducted." If you have legitimate cause for exemption, go to the ROTC Office in Room 204, Ebbets Hall—just above the cafeteria. *Whether exempt or not*, all freshmen must attend the 9 a.m. assembly.

Eligible veterans who are interested in the advanced group should contact the ROTC office immediately.

### ROTC EXEC. MEN

The ROTC executive committee is well staffed by Regular Army officers and non-coms. Santa Barbara College's unit is commanded by Col. Richard Gray McKee. The ROTC's executives differ considerably, nevertheless, from the K. P. callers in the regular Army.

The Student Body is not the only element to enlarge at the Santa Barbara College. The faculty has swollen to meet the demands of an oversized enrollment. The following is a list of the new teachers at the University of California, Santa Barbara College:

In the Art Department, Miss Eleanor Morrisey, MA, will be Instructor of Art. Miss Morrisey, who has taught on this campus before, just returned from Mills College where she was doing graduate work.

Dr. Kurt Baer, from Occidental College, will be Associate Professor of Art.

In the Education Psychology Department, Mr. Marion H. Groves, from the University of Chicago, will be lecturer in Psychology. He expects to receive his degree of Doctor of Philosophy during the current semester.

Mrs Betty Irish, MA, will be lecturer in Elementary Education. She received her MA degree from Stanford University, and has been a San Diego County Elementary School Coordinator. She will now supervise student teaching.

In the English Department, Dr. Lawrence Wilson, from the University of Connecticut will be Assistant Professor of English. Dr. Joseph Stull, a Ph. D from the University of Iowa, will be instructor in English. Before coming to Santa Barbara, he was teaching at Buttler University.

In the Foreign Language Department, Mr. Donald W. Peter, MA, from the University of Oklahoma, will be lecturer in German and Spanish. Dr. Perigord will lecture in English on French Literature and civilization. Dr. Perigord, who is professor of French at UCLA, received his BA from the University of Toulouse, France,

and his Ph. D from the University of Minnesota.

In the Industrial Education Department, Mr. Arthur Schreiker will be instructor in Machine Shop.

Mr. Joseph A. Sayovitz, MA, from Rocky Mountain College, Montana, will teach electricity.

Mr. Robert A. McCoy, from the University of Ohio, will teach photography.

In the Department of Mathematics, Dr. Leonard Hall will be instructor in Mathematics and Physics. Dr. Hall received his Ph. D and taught at Brown University.

In the Military Science Department, Colonel McKee will be Department Chairman.

In the Music Department, Mr. Clayton R. Wilson, MA, will be a woodwind instructor. He received his degree from Northwestern University, and taught at the University of Texas.

## Vet Guidance Center Open to Collegiates

The aim of the Center is to assist the veteran in choosing a suitable vocational objective and in planning the program necessary to reach this objective. Interest inventories, aptitude tests and achievement tests are available to any veteran of World War II without cost.

### TRAINED COUNSELORS

Trained counsellors are available to interpret the results of these tests and to help in planning a program of education and training.

A complete vocational guidance service is offered, and an up-to-date library of employment and vocational information is provided.

Appointments may be made by dropping a card to the Veterans Administration Guidance Center, room 519, Balboa Building, Santa Barbara, by telephoning 24957, or by calling personally at room 519, Balboa Bldg.

The Center is open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

## Earnings Report Needed From Vets To Keep GI Money

Blanks for veterans to fill out, giving estimates of earnings, will be distributed next week at the University of California, Santa Barbara College. This is the first of a series of special actions planned on the local campus this year seeking a smooth flow of subsistence payments.

"With the reductions being made in Veterans Administration staffs," declared C. D. Woodhouse, Coordinator of Veterans Affairs, "veterans in college face greater delays than before if procedures are not followed closely. In view of this, we are doing all that we can to assist veterans in filling out blanks promptly.

### RETURN AT ONCE

The blanks calling for information on estimates of compensation will be given to veterans Monday and Tuesday. Woodhouse is urging veterans to fill out these forms, as required under Public Law No. 346, and return them at once, for forwarding for certification of subsistence payments.

Woodhouse estimated that 72 per cent of the 1250 veterans who attended Santa Barbara College last year received income from outside jobs, ranging from odd jobs to full-time positions. He pointed out that veterans may make up to \$110 a month in outside earnings without interfering with the amount of subsistence payments.

Veteran enrollment at the College this year is expected to hit its peak of around 1500.


