



Sedgwick Debate Ends: Gardner Pledges Funds \$1 Million Will Be Donated for Art Museum

After months of heated debate and on-campus furor, UCSB administrators announced Monday they will preserve the university's portion of the Sedgwick Ranch, reversing highly controversial plans to sell the lush woodland property.

The 5,866 prized acres — home to three varieties of oak and at least two rare natural vernal pools — was going to be sold to generate money for a new campus art museum, but the plan was scratched last week after UC President David Gardner announced his decision to provide funding for the museum. Gardner announced that the Office of the President will provide UCSB \$1 million for the art museum and ongoing maintenance at the ranch. In order to get the money, however, UCSB must first match Gardner's pledge with \$1 million of its own, according to a UC press release.

Gardner is "personally interested" in preserving the ranch for UCSB because of "his days at UCSB.... He was an administrator on campus (and) is familiar with the intentions of the donors," according to Rick Malaspina, assistant director for news services for the president's office.

The source of the \$1 million to be given to UCSB is "undeter-

Revised Plans for University Growth Meet with Approval

Initial response to the university's newly revised Long Range Development Plan, released for a 45-day public review Monday, appears to be generally positive from faculty, students and community members.

The LRDP sets the university's goals for expansion through the academic year 2005-6. It calls for 62-percent physical growth and a maximum enrollment of 20,000.

Commencement Ceremonies Too Full, Students Left Out

An estimated 30 seniors will be unable to participate in their appropriate commencement ceremonies this weekend due to an unprecedented number of students wishing to take part in this year's seven separate processions, according to university officials.

Both the Social Science I and II ceremonies are full because almost 1,000 more students are considered seniors this year than last year.

"There were substantially more students to deal with but the same number of ceremonies," said Carolyn Buford, UCSB's commencement information coordinator.

The Dean of Students Office mailed 5,800 commencement information packets to every student with 155 units or more in January, according to Buford. Additionally, a higher percentage of eligible seniors chose to go through ceremonies this year. Next weekend, 3,647 students will participate in ceremonies, while only 3,235 participated last spring.

"This is the biggest graduation class ever.... We have two and one-half hours (during each ceremony) to push them across the stage," Buford said.

Some of the overcrowding was created because too many impacted majors are in the same ceremonies, according to Buford. Ceremonies are limited to 900, but the Sunday 9 a.m. Social Sciences II ceremony has been extended to accommodate 1,011 students, and the Saturday 4 p.m. Social Sciences I ceremony will now accommodate 910 students, she said.

An internal greek judicial council determined last month that Phi Sigma Kappa fraternity violated university principles by promoting sexism when some of their members sang "Phi Sig Raiders" during fall 1989 serenading.

As punishment, the Greek Peer Review Board ruled that the chapter give a five to 10 minute talk on sexism to each fraternity and sorority next fall. The chapter must also "produce a page on the issues of sexism from both the men and women's perspective, including a section on serenading, which will be submitted to every chapter for inclusion in their respective pledge/associate member manuals.'

The matter was referred to the nine-member GPRB af-ter an investigation by the UCSB Dean of Students office concluded that the fraternity had not violated any university policies. The university initiated the review after three women, joined by more than 60 protestors, held a press conference in front of the fraternity's Cordoba Road chapter house on April 18 accusing the members of racism and sexism.

Although members of the greek community believe the sanctions are fair, the women who authored the com-plaint are dissatisfied. "They're slapping them on the ĥands," Andi Blackshaw said.

"The people who were making these decisions were from within the greek system. It's not like they brought in some objective body," she added.

"I don't think (the sanctions are) adequate and I don't think they're severe enough I would like to see social probation for a year, and I would also like to see some sort of public apology," Kerry Church said. The GPRB also recommended that "Panhellenic and

IFC will inform the university that the greek system supports a universitywide task force on racism and sexism." which was one of the original requests made at the press conference.

Further, the GPRB recommended that "the greek system will create a community standard promoting the elimination of sexism, racism, heterosexism, violence against women and other forms of oppression." Phi Sig President Kevin Coordt said he is glad the inci-

dent may bring positive change. "I feel the GPRB hearing was very thorough. I am pleased to see that their decision recommends many systemwide changes, all of which

University Police Dept. Employee Arrested on Charges of Embezzling

A UCSB Police Department administrative assistant will be arraigned Thursday on charges that she allegedly embezzled between \$1,000 and \$1,500 from the department between July 1989 and January 1990. Viola Rita Valdez, 33, was arrested May 17 after the de-

partment concluded that she may have been responsible for missing cash deposits, but has not yet been charged by the Santa Barbara County District Attorney.

Valdez was responsible for depositing cash received after bicycle auctions and from registration fees, according to UCSB Police Chief John MacPherson. After reviewing an audit completed last January, the department discovered Valdez had not deposited the funds some months, while she only made one deposit during other months.

Valdez began working at UCSB in 1976 as a typist/clerk in the Office of Financial Aid, according to Public Information Officer Margi Weeks. She transferred to the EOP/SAA department after four years, serving as the principal clerk a position she held for eight years until transferring to the police department June 5, 1988.

Valdez is currently on administrative leave, pending the outcome of the case against her. Whether or not she re-ceives severence compensation will be based on the results of the court trial, MacPherson said. Her salary was \$2,146 a month at the time of her suspension.

When asked if it was particularly trying to arrest a fellow cohort, Mac Pherson paused and said, "The answer is yes. It certainly is difficult.

Valdez, who resides in Santa Barbara, was unavailable for comment.

Archeologist Succumbs to Sickness

Former UCSB archeology professor Albert C. Spaulding died May 29 at ness. He was 75 years old. Spaulding came to UCSB in 1966, at the time one of the most highlyesteemed archeologists in the field. While teaching at the University of Michigan in the 1940s, he developed the statistical method of data collection that is now standard in archeology.

Among his achievements while at UCSB was a four-year term as dean of Santa Barbara's Cottage the College of Letters and outstanding contributions Hospital after a long ill- Science from 1967 to to the field in 1985. 1971. Spaulding continued teaching until his retirement in 1983, when he was granted the status of professor emeritus in the anthropology department. Spaulding received several awards during his career, including the Society for American Archeology

Distinguished Service Award in 1981 and a 50th Anniversary Award for "We're going to miss him terribly," said anthropology department Chair Michael A. Jochim. "He was a unique man in his field, and a major figure in archeology throughout the country. He was also an exceptionally nice man.'

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Dedicated Teaching Assistants Receive Awards for Excellence

Three of UCSB's most dedicated TAs were awarded the Graduate Student Association Teaching Assistant Excellence Awards at the final GSA meeting Tuesday night.

The three TAs receiving this year's honors, Jim Egan, Mark Kumler and Dan Sparks, were selected from categories representing the humanities, social sciences, and physical sciences — including math and engineering — respectively, according to GSA Academic Vice President Doug Gurevitch.

President Doug Gurevitch. Sixty-two of UCSB's approximately 700 TAs were nominated for this year's award, according to Gurevitch. The award carries a \$1,000 stipend, raised from last year's award of \$250, which may have contributed to the higher number of nominees over previous years, Gurevitch added.

Reaction among the winning TAs varied. Jim Egan, a TA in the English department, said he "wondered if they had gotten it right," when he heard his name called. "There are a lot of good TAs in the English department and in the humanities, so I was surprised and flattered they picked me," Egan said.

lieves he was selected because students appreciate the comments he makes on their papers, and his accessibility.

Mark Kumler, who is currently studying cartography in the geology department, won the award while only in his second year at UCSB. Kumler said he was "quite surprised" to win.

surprised" to win. The most important function of a TA, Kumler said, is "to show enthusiasm for the course material and to encourage students to learn for themselves. Hearing your students say, 'Oh, now I get itl' is the most rewarding thing about teaching," he added.

Dan Sparks, currently working toward a master's degree in physiology, was the winner in the physical sciences. Sparks said that

can get across. "You can tell when the students understand it and when they don't. As long as you're in there pushing to help them understand it, that is what is important."

that is what is important." The selection process for this year's award began when nomination forms were filled out by students and professors earlier this year, Gurevitch said, adding that anyone can nominate a TA.

All TAs nominated submit an account of their workload to a GSA committee, comprised of four graduate students, which then reviews the letters and prepares a short list of nominees. The committee then asks permission to see all of the TAs' evaluation forms, which are reviewed along with the nomination letters, from which the final selections are made, Gurevitch concluded.

The GSA gives these awards each year because "it is important to point out people who are going above and beyond their duties," Gurevitch said.

Added GSA External President Reinhart Lutz: "We really want to show our massive appreciation of our graduate students, and we want to send the message to the campus community that the GSA takes teaching very, very seriously."

Please Don't Hurt 'Em, Hammer

A 23-year-old local man was arrested by police May 25 after he allegedly attacked and injured another local man during a dispute, according to police records.

Police arrested John Sherman Foster at approximately 10:45 p.m., based on the reports of the victim and a witness to the attack. Dennis Leudesiaire, 30, reportedly entered the Foot Patrol office with head wounds which required emergency medical treatment and told police he had been attacked by Foster, claiming that Foster had struck him with a hammer.

When a deputy contacted Foster, the suspect was allegedly holding a large claw hammer, and had a substance which appeared to be blood on his shirt, but was uninjured. Foster was arrested and charged with assault with a deadly weapon.

The attack reportedly occurred when Leudesiaire confronted Foster, claiming that Foster was in possession of a backpack that had been stolen from Leudesiaire. According to police records, a witness reported that Foster, who was seated in the back of a van on Estero Rd. at the time of the argument, suddenly struck Leudesiaire on the side of the head with a hammer.

Leudesiaire was treated at Goleta Valley Community Hospital, where he received 40 stitches in his ear. He also reportedly suffered a broken ear drum and a major concussion.

What Boltcutters? This Pair Here?

Four students were arrested May 26 after witnesses contacted police and reported that the suspects were attempting to steal bikes from the outdoor racks at Francisco Torres Residence Hall.

Police arrived at the scene at approximately 1:02 a.m. where two members of F.T.'s security staff were detaining Brice Hardt Hendricks, 18, Scott Alan Cohon, 19, and Brian Vaughan Breschini, 18. Hendricks and Breschini attend Hartnell College in Salinas, and Cohon is an Isla Vista resident who attends Santa Barbara City College.

Deputies later arrested a fourth suspect, Kirk Lewis Haney, 18, who witnesses had reported as being involved in the attempted theft. Haney attends Cal State University at Long Beach.

According to police records, a witness noticed the four suspects approaching the bike racks carrying a pair of bolt cutters and a sledgehammer. When the witness observed the suspects moving through the bikes, apparently searching for likely victims, he reportedly shouted at them to stay away from his bike.

When security personnel approached the suspects, one was allegedly attempting to cut a lock with the bolt cutters, while another was reportedly pointiding re-peatedly on a Kryptonite lock with the sledgenammer.

The lock held. The sledgehammer-swinging suspect's claim that he was not attempting to steal a bike did not. He and the other three were arrested for conspiracy to commit theft and criminal conspiracy. Police also requested that an additional charge of criminal conspiracy be filed

Breschini allegedly told officers that the suspects had purchased the bolt cutters in Salinas that day, then drove down in a pick up truck to "steal bikes."

From Where?

Police arrested a 19-year-old Lompoc resident after he allegedly repeatedly gave false information to the deputies who contacted him on Del Playa Road May 26.

Deputies reportedly observed David Chu walking in the 6600 block of Del Playa at approximately 10:40 p.m. carrying a can of beer. When they stopped Chu and asked him for identification, he said he didn't have any, but told officers his name was "David Mau" and that he was 20 years old.

He told a deputy that he lived on "Uranus Street" in Buellton, but the officer knew better and was aware that Uranus is not in Buellton. Chu then admitted that he lived in Lompoc, but continued giving false information about his name, age and address. He was eventually arrested and taken to the Foot Patrol office for booking.

lems with her paperwork, but was able to stay in her ceremony after she and her parents complained in person and in writing. "We pay something like \$50,000 to go to school here. We deserve to go through the ceremony we want," Figueras said. And yet more students were stifled by the confusing forms required for commencement. Students must fill out up to three separate forms to graduate and/or partake in ceremonies. Jason Spievak, a senior political science major, began signing forms in early April to attend ceremonies this June. He told the registrar representative that he wasn't officially graduating but that he wanted to walk through ceremonies. He later discovered he had only registered his name in the commencement booklet but was not signed up for ceremonies, Spievak said. He was going to be moved into Social Sciences III, but after filing a petition and "being extremely persistent," he was allowed to stay in his assigned ceremony. However, Public Events Director Valerie Halverson believes her office made directions as clear as possible




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other ceremonies for reasons such as nonrefundable plane tickets or unchangeable hotel reservations.

RANCH: University Reverses Controversial Plans, Land Will not be Sold

Continued from p.1 mined" as of yet, Malaspina said, but since UCSB is required to raise its money first, "there is time to identify a funding source," he added.

UCSB is currently conducting a study to determine how much money can be raised toward matching Gardner's promise, and will "kick off a fundraising campaign" after its completion next year, according to Vice Chancellor for Institutional Advancement Edward Birch. UCSB acquired the land

in 1968 when local artist Francis Sedgwick and his wife Alice bequeathed it to the university, under the condition that it not leave university ownership. When the university announced plans to sell the hilly terrain earlier this year, opponents claimed it should be kept as a natural preserve.

UCSB's 75 percent of the

ranch will now be divided into two parts: a 3,500 acre natural reserve and a smaller parcel for "general campus use," Birch said. The remaining 25 percent that was given to the Sedgwick heirs will be sold, he added.

The larger reserve will be used for "research and teaching," Birch said, but he was not sure what purpose the smaller parcel will serve. "We just don't know yet," he said. UC maintenance funding for the natural reserve will be used to build and maintain fences, to keep brush trimmed for fire prevention and to pay guards to stop trespassing and vandalism, Birch said.

Robert Norris, chairman of the UCSB chancellor's advisory committee on natural reserves, is relieved by UCSB's decision to preserve the land. "The property is a beautiful sample of South Coast range environment," he said, and "it is large enough to offer considerable class and research use."

Noriss expressed skeptical concern about whether money for land maintenance will continue in the future. "With no money to maintain the land, money might have to come out of other reserve programs," he said, adding he is pleased that "they do have some money to operate on now." It is unknown which portion of the ranch will make up the heirs' 25 percent, but Norris believes it will most likely be the areas containing the ranch house and other buildings.

If the portion of the land containing the buildings is sold, Noriss said the university should construct new buildings on the land. "We will need lab space for researchers to work" and shelters to protect users during inclement weather, he added.

Continued from p.1 to the university community and that it failed to address impacts on Isla Vista. Other problems stemmed from proposed building sites, including one site on Storke Campus which failed to acknowledge the existence of the Associated Students Greenhouse on the land. Planners did not become aware of the greenhouse until early December.

Although Chancellor Barbara Uehling originally called the first draft "responsible," the administration has changed several elements in the new revision.

Mathematics professor Ken Millet, the chair of the LRDP steering committee, said the November version had problems, but he believes the new plan alleviates most complaints.

"I'm much more pleased with the current draft," Millet said, adding that the changed plan boasts a "whole range of responses to concerns voiced."

John Buttny, the assistant to Third District County Supervisor Bill Wallace, has monitored the LRDP's impact on Isla Vista. He said that although the first draft was "grossly inadequate," the latest version shows improvement.

Among the positive steps Buttny cited was the addition of a 13-page supplement to the LRDP addressing Isla Vista. "We like the direction" the new report takes, Buttny said.

Less pleased with the revision was UCSB library assistant Peter Shapiro, a staff participant in the Greenhouse project. Though the greenhouse is now acknowledged in the plan, Shapiro was angered by wording that stipulates, "in the longterm, housing has a greater priority for use of this site." Shapiro believes this language indicates an intention to destroy the greenhouse, which has been in operation growing rare plants for

many uses since 1976. "It's totally outrageous." Shapiro said. Though the plan offers the alternative of incorporating the greenhouse into a new housing structure or relocating it, Shapiro doubts an incorporation will take place and believes moving the current structure is "unrealistic" due to its costliness. Millet said student housing is the plan's number-one priority, given that it seeks to accommodate 35 percent of UCSB students in university-owned housing; currently 22.1 percent live in university housing. He added that he believes both of the proposed alternatives for the greenhouse are feasible.

A.S. Internal Vice President James Siojo, a member of the LRDP steering committee, also voiced a positive reaction. "They've been very thorough, (and) I'm substantially impressed" with the supplement on I.V., Siojo said, adding that he has only begun to read the document in detail.

The administration will hold one hearing to solicit pubic input into the plan on July 9 in Santa Barbara at the County Board of Supervisors hearing room at 7 p.m. UCSB Assistant Chancellor of Budget and Planning Robert Kuntz said they chose to hold a single hearing downtown for the community's convenience, and because of good facilities and ample parking.

Redwood Summer: Call to All Students

If you've been following the newspapers, including the Nexus, you should have come across a few articles relating to a certain incident that occurred on May 24 in Oakland. Two Earth First! members, Judi Bari and Darryl Cherney, were the victims of a bomb that was planted in Judi's car. They were immediately arrested for "transporting explosives," although the police had no evidence of the bomb being theirs. As Dave Karoly and Cindy Headley pointed out

in a recent Nexus article (Daily Nexus June 1, "Earth First! Attacked But Not Defeated), Darryl and Judy would have to be moronic to carry explosives under the front seat of their car, or as the police later changed the allegation, under the back seat. Judi suffered a broken pelvis and Darryl suffered the humiliation of being detained without a cause.

Bari has been threatened in the past. As stated in Alexander Cockburn's column in the Thursday, May 31 Los Angeles Times, Bari spoke at a rally two days before the explosion where she nervously joked about the 45 death threats she had received. Last August, a logging truck (a connection should be made here: the logging companies are precisely who Earth First! is targeting for their clearing of old growth forests) rammed into the back of Judi's car, but the police said there was not enough evidence to prosecute.

Luckily, no one was injured, but the incident was a hint of things to come. First, a "coincidental" car accident. Next, a "coincidental" bombing, with "coincidental" death threats throughout....

The connection that was made above between Earth First!, Bari, and the logging companies should be ample evidence for a prime suspect of the bombing: *The logging companies*! Bari and Cherney had recently begun to organize a national recruiting effort to bring anyone interested in the fate of the forests together to block the cutting of old-growth Redwoods in Northern California. The timber companies are exploiting the forests, which have taken centuries to reach their majestic heights, merely for the satisfaction of short-term profit. 95 percent of the Redwood Forests have already been cleared, and much of that land is no longer sufficient to refurbish the trees that have been lost. Bari's and

Cherney's efforts to stop the logging companies' raping of the earth threatened the profits of these exploitative companics, therefore the loggers tried to exterminate them.

nics, therefore the loggers tried to exterminate them. The most recent article on the incident came on June 1, in the Times. It reported that a "letter writer" claimed responsibility for the actions. A person claiming to be "the Lord's avenger" spoke of attempting to punish Bari for allegedly opposing abortion foes and defying trees. Judi was accused of being "possessed of the Devil." The letter writer explained that "The Lord cleared my vision and revealed this unto me outside the Baby-killing Clinic(*sic*) when Judi Bari smote with Satan's words the humble and Faithful servants of the Lord who had come here to make witness against Abortion." The writer seemed a bit confused. He or she went on to say that he or she was offended again because "this possessed demon Judi Bari spread her Poison to tell the Multitude that trees were not God's gift to Man but that

trees were themselves gods and it was a sin to cut them.... I felt the Power of the Lord stir within My heart and I knew I had been Chosen to Strike down this Demon." It seems a bit odd that this so-called "Lord" would have wanted revenge on someone trying to save part of His/Her so-called creation. The writer must not have read the part in the Bible that talks about stewardship....

Judi and Darryl were on their way to Santa Cruz and then to Santa Barbara to deliver their message about clearcutting of the Redwoods in Northern California. Moreover, they were seeking interested individuals to enhance the group effort to stop the overcutting of forests through peaceful and non-violent protests. Bari and others call for "sustainable yield practices," which allows trees to be cut at the rate that they grow. Anything more is environmentally unsound. Anything less is socially unsound, for this creates lost jobs. Judi and Darryl are concerned not only with the well-being of the trees, but also with the well-being of

people.

Judi was also a prominent organizer for the IWW (International Workers of the World), a group that seeks to ensure the rights of the workers, mainly through unions. On Wednesday, Apr. 11, 1990, a group of Earth Firstlers, including Judi and Darryl, renounced the act of tree spiking, a technique intended to deter the cutting of old-growth

forest. Previously, EF! had neither condemned nor condoned the act, but a statement made in an IWW publication, *The Industrial Worker*, was made that was intended to discourage tree spiking. The statement made clear that EF! had as much concern for human rights as they do for environmental protection: "Timber corporations care no more for their employees than they do for the life of the forest. Their routine maiming and killing of millworkers is coldly calculated into the cost of doing business just as the destruction of whole ecosystems is considered a reasonable by-product of lumber production. These companies would think nothing of sending a spiked tree through a mill, and relish the anti-EF! publicity that an injury would cause." It is senseless, therefore, to deem Judi and Darryl misanthropes. The Redwood Summer campaign il-

The Redwood Summer campaign illuminates the issue of non-violent action. Attempts to halt their efforts have

included harassment, car slamming and terrorism. However, the planter of the bomb may have done exactly opposite of what he or she intended. More people now know about Redwood Summer than previously, and there will now be more participation than there would have been otherwise.

Earth First! is making a call to all students interested in participating in this momentous environmental action. The opening event will be on June 20, and will be an effort to shut down Louisiana Pacific's log export dock in Somoa, just south of Eureka in Humboldt County. By participating in the non-violent protest, you can show the planters of the bomb that they have failed miserably and show the timber companies that environmental and human injustices will not go unnoticed.

These committees were established to keep an eye on people; their primary function is to report anyone who engages in anti-Castro activities to the police.

Second, Fidel Castro has violated the human rights of his

own people. He ordered the arrest of the members of the Cuban Committee on Human Rights, which was formed secretly to document the human rights abuses in Cuba. Elizardo Sanchez, Adolfo Rivero and Enrique Hernandez were the last members of the committee who were arrested. Their crime: they had informed a Reuter news correspondent in Havana of the arrest of two other members of the committee, Dr. Domingo Jorge Delgado and Jose Luis Alvarado. The reporter was expelled from Cuba and the members of the Cuban Committee on Human Rights are still in jail.

A 17-year-old boy, Antonion Frias Sosa, who had taken photographs for the committee and had a copy of the International Human Rights Declaration in his possession, was also arrested and then mysteriously died in police custody. Aramis Taboada, who went to jail for trying to form a free trade union, also died in a Cuban prison.

trade union, also died in a Cuban prison. Therefore, when you say "the basic needs of the people were deemed to be more important than so-called personal freedoms," again you are not telling the whole truth, for Fidel Castro is the one who has deemed that the basic needs of the people are more important than everything else, and Fidel has already deemed that freedom of speech is not a basic need. If you believe as Fidel does that human beings are animals, that we do not have the moral capacity to reason, then I can see why you might believe that freedom of expression is not a basic need.

Third, and most important, Fidel Castro a tyrannical distator who, like every tyrant before him — Adolf Hitler, Joseph Stalin, Mao Tse Tsung — is driven by his greedy desire to stay in power. 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

The American Way: Fake Love, Fast Cars, Free-Loaders

The object of education in this country is education or at least, it should be. Yet as many as 40 percent (source: L.A. Times, 24 May 90) of the seniors graduating this year will not, in fact, be celebrating an educational accomplishment when they walk across the stage at commencement. What they will be celebrating is a punched ticket: a cre-dential, and not an education. Why is this?

The answer is that these "students" cheated their way through school. Admittedly, however, cheating has be-come something of the "American way." Many of these chronic frauds cheated through high school, cheated on their SATs, and are cheating now in college. These people will not, as many of them believe, get suddenly "cured" after graduation, because life is a process and not a series of connected events or goals (one is never "done" in any real sense until one dies). On the contrary, these frauds-in-educated-clothing will cheat on LSATs, MCATs, GREs, and anything else required to sweat their dishonest way up the next rung on their ladder to "success." They will cheat on their taxes, cheat on their husbands and wives, and in the end they will lie in a hospital room, feeling somehow cheated of life.

I will not here repeat the tired bleatings of our school teachers, who once promised us that "cheaters never pros-per." These same well-meaning people also assured us that "crime doesn't pay." Cheaters and criminals do prosper. And yet, for all the anger I feel toward these people, I must admit that they are in large part the necessary product of a culture that has always tended to view a post-secondary education as simply a means to an end, and not an end in itself. Combine this with a "have it all" mentality, and a modern tendency to exchange the quality of our moments for the quantity of them, and you begin to wonder why everyone doesn't cheat just to stay in school, much less to get good grades. How is the modern student expected to "keep all the balls in the air," juggling a necessary social life with a necessary academic life and, for many, a neces-

sary part-time job? For that matter, how is the modern college graduate expected to be a great spouse/lover, great father or mother, great employee, and great community activist all at once? This is the malady of our age.

I suppose, then, that the elimination of academic fraud in all its various manifestations is only a pipe dream. In America, only monks (who sacrifice social life for academic accomplishment) or geniuses (who need sacri-fice nothing to make good grades) can be expected to get



an education. Besides, academic fraud has taken on the trappings of an accepted institution: many fraternities and sororities are actually organized on the principle of fraud. They maintain well-organized test and term-paper files and presumably aid their members in resume construction; they show members where and how to "apply" for as many "honors" and "honor societies" as possible, and or-ganizing events to "benefit their communities." Not all greek organizations are like this, and many individual greeks are outstanding members of their social and academic communities. Even so, however, this does not counter my assertion that many fraternities serve to encourage the means-to-an-end mentality associated with cheating

And fraud is not entirely the fault of students either. Faculty and administration also bear some of the responsibility. Professors who use the same versions of their tests — year after tired year — actually encourage the percep-tion that fraud (much less teaching, a fact in the case of research-oriented scholars) is of no concern to them. Many professors do not bother to attend major examinations, and do not ensure that these examinations are property proctored: typically a graduate student will sit reading a book during the test. After all, isn't it silly to treat adults as if they were children by pacing back and forth through the room? At UCSB, the administration did no service to Letters & Sciences students when it ceased providing blue books for essay examinations. Those few professors who are concerned with academic fraud have been forced into awkward and second-best solutions such as booklet

swapping and stamping. Finally, I should perhaps admit that my definition of "education" may be too narrow and too demanding. After all, learning how to swill large quantities of cheap fizzy beer, fake love or sincerity in a relationship, brown-nose or badger a professor for undeserved grade revisions, and neatly tuck a car cover around a shiny new "Beemer," still represent a kind of learning, right?

This has motivated my good friend to seek out a fair and impartial listener, other than our friends and our parents, to hear advice and voice various concerns about the relationship.

When each session is through, we always sit together and talk about what was said and accomplished during the meeting. While conversing in our special talk recently, I discovered that the latest discussion topic concerned her endeavor to effectively communicate her feelings to me, and the intimidation she would feel as a result.

I asked my friend what she thought about that, and she offered that it might just be "the whole problem;" and though a slight one, one she did not want to get worse. This was not that easy to hear, but hell, I was so intent on grabbing this "problem" by the throat, I asked her to go on and to please tell me how she came to this conclusion. She replied that her counselor explained (to her) that because of my ethnic background (I am of Mexican heritage), there is a tendency to be domineering and intense towards things - especially a relationship. We stopped right there. I cannot express how surprised I was to hear this; and the fact that it came from the mouth of a university employee of the counseling center, no less. Was I hearing things? No; she swore he said that. I was dumbstruck! To believe that because I am of Mexican roots I expect my friend to succumb to my every whim and walk under me as if a woman's only function is providing a man with a hearty meal each day and partner to copulate with each night is not only a racist remark, but shows how really ignorant some people can be, and the (unfortunate) tendency for people of one arrogant and chauvinistic race or culture to spew forth ugly, illogical and bigoted remarks about a culture different from theirs. The counselor's unethical and injurious statement did not influence my friend in any way, as she denied his ludicrous and laughable theory (she has no Ph.D. or degree, just a warm heart). My real concern, now that I am over the shock, pertains to the future of UCSB's dogmatists and the thousands like them who choose to remain secure in their zealous bigotry. I am about to graduate from UCSB this summer, and though I will be leaving the immediate area, I also will be entering a larger span (of the "real world") where people hold these unfavorable opinions about ethnic groups and their cultures without fair, compassionate and complete examination of the facts. I, for one, do not believe psychology (or sociology) to be a science, but that does not make it understandable and acceptable for them to teach, especially in our day, that Mexican men generally are the "superior patriarch" in a relationship and deserve respect,

obedience, and loyalty without earning it or reciprocating it. It's preposterous!

Racism exists on this campus! You now all (I hope) see how it can be found in the deepest, darkest corners of this institution of learning. I am writing this very personal letter to prove to all other victims - my brothers and sisters that I finally understand ...

To the foolish racists who abide in those dark corners, I have nothing to say except that I believe your minds are like the pupil in the eye; the more light myself or anyone else can pour on it, the more it will contract. MARC JOSEPH GARCIA
