MILITARY INTELLIGENCE UNITS ACTIVATED FOR FOREIGN LANGUAGE STUDENTS

A group of Military Intelligence units will be activated at Santa Barbara College of the University of California in August, it was announced today.

The commanding officer will be Dr. William to study, and a significant study program. F. Aggeler, Chairman of the Department of Foreign Languages and a major in the Organized Reserves.

The reason for organizing these units, Dr. Aggeler said, is to utilize the foreign language ability of faculty members and students. Membership in the units will be throught sale of surplus property aboard limited to these two groups. The former will fill the officer positions, while students will comprise the enlisted person nel. To be eligible, a faculty member or student must be fluent in a foreign language.

Organization of the new units, which is part of the Army Department's Affiliation Program, has been approved by the Regents of the University of California. Similar units are in operation on the Berkeley and Los Angeles Campuses.

Separate units will be set up for different languages, Dr. Aggeler said, the exact number not having been determined yet. The program will be synchronized with the school year. It is planned to hold three meetings a month for eight months. Refresher courses in the languages may be included in the program.

APPLICANTS OF THE FULLBRIGHT ACT

Norway and Holland have been added to the list of countries in which American graduate students may study under the Fullbright Act.

This announcement was received by Dean of

The notice stated that there will be 25 openings in each of these countries during the academic year 1949-50, in accordance with the educational exchange programs approved by the Board of Foreign Scholarships.

Applications for this year must be made immediately, Dean Sweet said. Generally three months are required to process applications.

Basic requirements for applicants are a B.A. degree, facility in the language of the country in which the student desires

Seventeen other countries will be open for applications for 1950-51. Later announcements will be made covering these.

The Fullbright Act authorizes the use of foreigan currencies and credits realized for educational exchanges. Americans are sent to institutions in the countries concerned, and foreign students are brought to the United States for study for providing they do not displace American students in our educational institutions.

The Secretary of State is responsible for the general administration of the Act. The selection of participants if made by the Board of Foreign Scholarships after preliminary screening by the Institute of International Education in New York. Applications are sent to the latter office.
