WELCOME TO THE 1963 SUMMER SESSION

Each year at this time it is my pleasure to greet all those who participate in the Summer Session, both staff and students. I should like to impart to you the genuine feeling of welcome which is shared by all those who have had a part in planning this Summer Session. It is our sincere wish that your study and associations here may represent substantial progress toward your educational goals.

For the third consecutive year we welcome a group of teachers of mathematics who have been selected to participate in the National Science Foundation Mathematics Institute. We are proud of the record established by this Institute, its able staff, its well designed program, and its fine group of participating teachers.

Next I should like to greet another group which has become a very significant part of the Summer Session program on the Santa Barbara campus during the past four years. I refer to the high school students, just turned seniors, who join us annually to become college freshmen temporarily in order to experience firsthand the inspiration, the stimulation -- and even the trials and tribulations -- of University learning and living. The group this year is the largest we have had and numbers approximately 300. We believe they will establish a record for accomplishment as well as for numbers.

CAMPUS FEATURES WEEKLY FOREIGN FILM SERIES

Films from five foreign countries will be shown during the summer film series sponsored by the arts and lectures committee. The prize films will be shown every Sunday evening, beginning June 16, at 7:30 in Campbell Hall. Admission to students, faculty and staff is 25 cents.

A delightful romantic comedy from Germany, "Film Ohne Titel," or "Film Without a Name," will begin the series. Starring Hildegard Neff, the picture was made in 1948.

The second film in the series, scheduled for June 23, will be "A Man Escaped," directed by Robert Bresson and released in 1957. A tense story of wartime imprisonment and determination to escape, the movie is a French product.

On June 30, the feature will be "The Quiet Man," a romantic story of Ireland. The film stars Maureen O'Hara and John Wayne against a background of beautiful scenery of the Irish countryside.

Sixteenth century Japan is the setting for "Ugetsu," a brilliant film which explores the reality of a peasant's life and his dreams of riches and glory. Directed by Kenji Mizoguchi, the Japanese film will be shown on July 7.

As this is being prepared it appears that we may have the largest enrollment in Summer Session on this campus since the early fifties. If these indications are correct, some of you may experience difficulty in enrolling in the classes of your choice, despite our best efforts. Please inform us of your problems. We shall do everything possible to find a solution.

Your attention is directed to the announcements of lectures, films and recreational events to be found elsewhere in this issue. You are urged to make full use of these opportunities. Please note carefully the official announcements which are inserted from time to time in El Gauchito for your information and guidance.

POLICE REGULATIONS FOR BICYCLES, CARS DURING SUMMER SESSION

The campus police department will continue its 24 hour service during Summer Session. In addition to maintaining a lost and found service, rendering first aid and transporting persons sick or injured, the department will continue to patrol the campus round the clock.

According to Capt. W. A. Lowe, all motor vehicles and bicycles on campus must be registered with the department, including those belonging to registrants who are not

regular UCSB students. Fees are \$1 for vehicles and 50 cents for bicycles for the summer.

After paying the fee for vehicles, the owner is issued a parking decal which entitles him to use A (parking for faculty and staff), B (for residence hall students) or C (for students living off campus) facilities.

Racks are provided for bicycle parking, and areas where riding is prohibited and clearly marked. These include central academic areas where bikes are not permitted between 7 a. m. and 3 p. m. on school days.

The police offices are open in Building 427, Room 202, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. The police emergency number is 2221.

CAMPUS SWITCHBOARD GETS NEW TELEPHONE NUMBER

Beginning tomorrow, the University telephone switchboard number will change from 967-5611 to 968-1511 (Dial 8-1511 locally.) The changeover will not affect campus extension numbers, though some separate numbers will be altered.

There will be no interruption of service to campus phones while the changeover is taking place, according to the General Telephone Company. An operator will supply callers with the new number should they dial the old one.

The change in number was the result of construction of the new Ellwood sub-station from which the University telephone system will be serviced.

CAFETERIA SERVICE IS A LA CARTE

A new plan for cafeteria service is being offered this summer by De La Guerra Commons, presenting a variety of dishes on an a la carte basis. Each item will be individually priced, eliminating "special" meals at a set price.

INTENSIVE FRENCH DURING SUMMER

Two intensive French courses will be offered on campus this summer. Elementary French will be taught during the regular six-week summer session, and a post summer session course in Intermediate French will be offered during the next five weeks.

Both classes are limited to 35 students who are screened for admission. Director Mark J. Temmer, assistant professor of French at UCSB, reports that emphasis in these accelerated programs will be on the oral method of learning.

The Intermediate French offering is being co-sponsored by EPIC (Experimental Program, Instructors for Colleges). Participants in this program, especially designed to prepare outstanding students for careers in college teaching, will be given priority in enrollment.

LIBRARY FACILITIES EXPANDED IN TIME FOR SUMMER SESSION

During the past school year, the UCSB Library added almost 56,000 books - representing an increase almost identical to the entire eight-year period from 1951 to 1959.

This increase in holdings has multiplied the listing in the card catalogue to approximately 223,000 volumes.

Library services include reserved books, curriculum materials study room, smoking area complex, a sun-deck for reading and conversation, a typing room, listening rooms and a graduate reading room.

During the summer, books may be checked out for two-week periods and may be renewed at the end of that time. A fine of 15 cents per day is charged for the late return of each book. All books must be returned to the library by the last day of summer session.

HIGH SCHOOL SUMMER SESSION AT SANTA BARBARA

Some 300 high school juniors from 350 applicants throughout the U.S. have been admitted to the fifth annual summer program for high school students.

These exceptional students will be afforded an academic preview of college life from June 15 to July 26 when they enroll in freshman and sophomore level university courses and earn from five to six and one half units of credits. They may later submit the credits for evaluation when making formal application to the University.

Participants are required to choose a course in geology, music appreciation, or public speaking, and may complete their summer programs with additional offerings in the sciences, foreign languages and humanities. A faculty advisor is assigned to each high school student from among histeachers.

Six Public Lectures

SOUTH HALL WILL BE SCENE OF UNIVERSITY DISCUSSION SERIES

A program of six public lectures is on the agenda for the summer months on campus. Leading off with "The Image and Direction of the Social Studies" by William McLaughlin on Tuesday, June 25, the series will be followed by Father Frederick Debuyst who will discuss "Contemporary Church Art and Architecture" on Tuesday, June 27. "Sudan: A Case Study of an Emerging Nation," will be the subject of Henry A. Turner, professor of political science and chairman of the department at UCSB, when he speaks on July 2.

The following week, on July 9, John Wisdom, professor of philosophy at Cambridge University and a visiting professor at UCSB, will lecture on "A Feature of Wittgenstein's Technique." David J. Danelski, assistant professor of political science at the University of Washington, will examine "Human Rights in a Democratic Society," on July 16, and Francis Haskell will end the series with a discussion of "Authority and Subversion: Some Political Implications of Artistic Style."
