# Kelly Jump-Starts Gaucho Run, Titan Bus

Guard Fuels 68-58 Win With 12 Assists; NMSU up Next

The chant came raining down from the Thunderdome rafters, but for Cal State Fullerton, victims of a 17-2 second-half surge and the steady brilliance of Ray Kelly, the message was clear
— there was little left to do but "start the bus."

Trailing 52-50 with six minutes remaining in the second half, the UCSB men's basketball team (17-6 overall, 10-4 in the Big West) ran roughshod over the tiring Titans (10-14, 6-9) down the stretch on its way to a 68-58 win before 4,623 fans Saturday night.

Kelly, the Gauchos' ju-nior point guard, saved his best for last, fueling Santa Barbara's comeback with two steals and numerous assists as UCSB simply ran away from the Titans, who were playing their fourth game in eight days. Kelly finished with a career-high 12 assists to go with his seven points and three rebounds, and drew rave reviews for his moves down the stretch.

"No doubt about it, (Kelly's) playing very, very





1st-Place UCSB Wins Big at Hawaii

After losing the first of a pair of weekend games at Honolulu against secondplace University of Hawaii, the UCSB women's basketball team found itself in a precarious position — to retain sole possession of first place in the Big West Con-ference (as well as to keep from losing two consecutive games for the first time all season), it needed a victory in a building in which it had never won, and against a top-20 team at that.

Piece o' poi. The 29th-ranked Lady Gauchos put on an impressive late run to beat the 13thranked Rainbow-Wahines, 67-56, Sunday night. The win moves UCSB (19-4 overall, 12-2 conference) once again alone atop the Big West, while the loss drops Hawaii (18-3, 9-3) into third place behind

UNLV. In Friday's game, UCSB was forced to play catchup for most of the contest, but sent the game into overtime before losing to Hawaii, 86-79, after the extra period. UCSB's Lisa Crosskey led all scorers with 24 points,

and it was her three-pointer with 38 seconds remaining, which capped a 10-point run that gave Santa Barbara its first lead of the second half, 72-70.

In the Lady Gauchos' win on Saturday, they took the edge early in a defensive struggle, as spotty shooting by both squads sent the teams into halftime with UCSB up 33-25. After the break the Lady Gauchos got their offense going in a big

However, the Rainbow-Wahines chipped points off Santa Barbara's lead as the minutes went by. Guard Valerie Agee capped the comeback by converting a layup with 4:05 remaining, putting Hawaii up for the first time in the half at 54-53.

The Hawaii lead very

quickly became its last of the half, as UCSB's Erika Kienast scored the game's next six points to put the Lady Gauchos back up 59-54. Crosskey then went on a seven-point run of her own, her three-pointer making it 62-54 with only 1:37 remaining.

"It's nice to have veteran players," UCSB Head Coach Mark French said after the game. "We put (Crosskey) back in with 11

minutes left and with four fouls. We ask her to play

smart and she does." The Lady Gauchos ran the final seconds off the clock to come away with their first-ever victory at Hawaii. Kienast led the winners with 18 points and 14 rebounds, with Crosskey also scoring 18 and Barbara Beainy adding 12.

"It's great to win here,"

## Men Pick up Win **Over Fresno State**

In the end, as it often seems to do, it came down to the

big guns.
Up 4-2 entering the doubles competition, the UCSB men's tennis team needed only one win out of three doubles matches against defending Big West champion Fresno State on Sunday to win the match, 5-4, but that

win was by no means a sure thing.

A scrappy Bulldog team had been giving the Gauchos problems all day and seemed to be getting stronger as the afternoon proceeded, a comeback victory being a dangerous possibility. But no such comeback was going to occur, as UCSB's #1 doubles team of senior David Decret and sophomore Laszlo Markovits won a dramatic, well-played match against Fresno's #1 doubles team 7-6, 6-4 to insure a victory for the Gauchos in their first conference match of the season in front of 114 fans at the UCSB East

On a perfect day for tennis, the Gauchos played strong as a team, improving their record to 1-0 in conference play and 2-3 overall. The team came out pumped up and seemed determined to win, something that was probably the result of two weeks off and a change in practice schedule that UCSB Head Coach Don Lowry instituted after


an embarrassing loss to South Florida three weeks ago.
"The guys needed to be pushed, they were becoming complacent," Lowry said. "I opened up the practices to challenge matches the last couple weeks, no one's spot was safe, and it really seemed to wake up the guys."

The players took Lowry's message to heart. Sophomore Henrik Rosvall, who was coming off a disappointing performance in the South Florida match, played inspired tennis in his singles match, winning, 6-2, 6-1. His victory, along with an impressive 6-3, 6-7, 6-4 win by senior Bill Pham in the #3 spot, left it up to the big guys, Decret and Markovits, to come through.

And come through they did. Markovits, who was re-

covering from a recent bout with the flu, looked sharp in

winning his single's match 6-1, 6-4.
"I think I played well because I had some time to rest up and prepare," Markovits said. "This was a very good Fresno State team, along with UC Irvine, they're the Big West team to beat, we needed this win."

The other go-to guy for the Gauchos, Decret, won a tough, back-and-forth match with Fresno's #1 player, top-30 ranked Greg Andersen, 4-6, 6-2, 6-4. Decret started off slow, looking hesitant at times in the first set, but he picked up steam in the second set and finished

strong in the third, breaking Andersen to win.

The match featured not only good tennis but interesting dialogue. Both players were vocal when frustrated, but Andersen seemed to be carrying on a non-stop conversation with himself; one time exclaiming that his service was so bad that if he lost he was going to cry right then and there (he didn't). His outbursts became so alarming that one time, after winning a point, Andersen let out a banshee scream to which Decret responded, "This guy's a

Decret's victory led to a possible Gaucho clinch without doubles competition, but #6 Mark Ellison couldn't win after having a match point, losing 4-6, 6-3, 7-5.

## Spikers Get Back to Winning Ways

UCSB Defeats UCI in Four Games

After losing to Pepperdine last Thursday, the UCSB men's volleyball team took its frustrations out on UC Irvine over the weekend, by rolling over the Anteaters Saturday night, 15-6, 15-5, 6-15, 15-10.

Santa Barbara dominated the opening games of the match, executing perfect offense to take a quick two-game lead. Led by the tough serving of hitters Stace Lougeay, Todd Ahmadi and Eric Fonoimoana, the Gauchos literally served Irvine off the court, totalling 10 aces on the night.

"We absolutely smoked them in the first two games," setter Jeff Zevely said. "But they're a pretty scrappy team, and they played a lot better in the third.'

In the third game, the Anteaters completely turned the match around, as Irvine hitter Leland Quinn came into the match and fired up the Anteaters to a 15-6 victory, while

notching up 21 kills on the night.

"Our passing really broke down in the third game,"
UCSB Head Coach Ken Preston explained. "We had a lot of passing errors, and things just weren't going our way."

Riding on their confidence, the Anteaters took a 10-7 lead in the fourth game to put the Gauchos back on their heels. But UCSB rallied behind the excellent serving of hitter Sean Stafford, who served seven straight points to lead Santa Barbara to a miraculous 15-10 comeback.

"(Irvine) got up, and just couldn't put us away," Preston said of the fourth game. "It reminded me of what we've been doing all year."

Lougeay led the Gauchos for the second match in a row with 18 kills, but this time he had some support, with an overall team hitting percentage of .320.

Fonoimoana was next with 17 kills, while Ahmadi proved that he's back by racking up 13 kills in his first true start back from injury.

"(Ahmadi's) going to add a new dimension on the team,"
Preston added. "This is the first time we've played this lineup all year. I changed the positioning of the lineup as well as who's playing, and it seemed to go pretty well.

UCSB is now 4-8 overall, and moves to fourth place in the WIVA's DeGroot Division with a 2-3 conference record, while the Anteaters (1-6) remain at the bottom of the

The Gauchos will next travel to UCLA on Wednesday at 7:30 p.m. in a makeup match that was rained out two weeks ago. The #4 Bruins will then return the favor by facing the Gauchos in Rob Gym Saturday night at 7:00.

## Women Defeated Twice by Top-Ranked Teams

The UCSB women's tennis team had the opportunity to play some of the best teams in the country this weekend. Although they struggled, the Gauchos dis-played the determination and talent that characterizes

The Gauchos traveled to the University of San Diego on Saturday to face #16 Mississippi, but were defeated in a close match, 5-4, by the Rebels.

That loss followed another tough defeat the previous day at fourth-ranked UCLA, 6-3, after the Gauchos (2-6 overall, 1-0 in Big West) and Bruins were tied, 3-3, after an extremely competitive round of singles play.

UCSB's #1 player, Debbie Goldberger, defeated UCLA's Cammi Foley, 6-1, 7-5. Goldberger had beaten Foley earlier in the year at the Rolex Regional

But it was Goldberger and teammate Kathy Peterson's loss in doubles play to UCLA's Mamie Ceniza and Iwalani McCalla, 6-3, 6-1, which proved to be the turning of the matc

"I thought we had a shot to win the match going into doubles play," UCSB Head Coach Chris Russell said. "Debbie is nationally recognized as one of the top doubles

players. Peterson is inexperienced, but has responded well. They were just a little off that day."

UCSB's #2 singles player Laura Rutledge lost to the Bruins' Ceniza, 6-0, 6-2. The Gauchos' #3 seed, Lynn Coakley, beat UCLA's top freshmen recruit Paige Yaroshuk, 6-4, 7-6. Another big win came when UCSB's Peterson defeated Jenny Baker of UCLA, 6-4, 6-3, while the Gauchos' Courtney Strauss and Suzy Drage were beaten in their singles matches.

Saturday garnished a closer overall match, but once again UCSB was defeated by an extremely talented team

in the 16th-ranked Rebels.

Goldberger, though, suffered a rare loss when she faced the Rebels' Paloma Collantes, the second-ranked player in the nation, by an impressively close score of 6-4, 6-4.

In the #2 singles spot, Rutledge took some chances and defeated the Rebels' Alison Hill, 6-4, 6-3, while Coakley also was victorious over Mississippi's Pascale Piquemel, 6-2, 7-6. The other two victories were controversial forfeits when Mississippi pulled out of two doubles matches after securing the team victory.

'In that situation we would rather finish the match than just take the win," Russell said. "That's why we're playing these schools, to develop our players."

Cori Close scored 16 for UCSB in the losing effort, with Kienast adding 12 points and 13 rebounds.

The loss was the first for UCSB since Jan. 16 and ended the Lady Gauchos second eight-game winning streak of the season.

Junior right-hander Travis Rodgers pitched his second consecutive complete game in the series finale but in a losing cause. Freshman David Smith made his first career start for the Broncos (3-8) and threw six shutout innings to earn the victory. Bronco catcher Randy Ortega proved to be the difference with a solo homer and an RBI single that accounted for two of SCU's three runs.

Santa Barbara had loaded the bases in the eighth on a dropped third strike, a walk and an infield single, but that's when Drysdale came on to close the door. The Gauchos still had a chance to tie after scoring their two unearned runs in the ninth inning but Drysdale struck out UCSB's Doug Smaldino looking to end the game.

UCSB, who scored 72 total runs in the season's first 10 games, scored 42 during the weekend off an SCU pitching staff that en-tered the series with a team ERA of 7.41.

Continued from p.1A good basketball right now," UCSB Head Coach Jerry Pimm said. "He understands the game better now. He sees that there's no hurry out there. He knows now what he wants to do, instead of just winding up. He's a 'thinking' guard, not an 'instinct' guard. He's reacting to what he's seeing, and that makes him very tough to play."

Indeed, Kelly's performance made it tough on Fullerton, which had traded baskets with the Gauchos for much of the second half. But with Kelly at the helm, most everyone was waiting

on the expected — the spurt that has become indicative of UCSB's success this year. And, none too soon for Kelly himself, come it did.

"We have a big spurt every game, it seems like. We'll score 10 straight points in transition — it's usually just a matter of time, it just hap-pens," said Kelly, who just fell shy of Brian Shaw's single-game school record of 13 assists. "But the main thing to our transition is our defense. When our defense really turns on, it gets every-

thing else going."
Senior forward Lucius Davis was the benefactor of the second-half surge, scoring eight points in the 17-2 run that gave the Gauchos a commanding 67-54 lead

with 1:33 remaining. He finished with a game-high 26 points, many of which came courtesy of Kelly dishes on the fast break. The conference's leading scorer was quick to put his night in perspective.

"Early on, there was a real flow to the game. I was throwing the ball away, missed some open shots, but we pulled it out to-night," Davis said. "It was all our defense down the stretch."

Junior swingman Mike Meyer started the decisive run with a three-pointer with just under six minutes left, giving the Gauchos a 53-52 lead they would never relinquish. After two free throws by center Sam Rob-

son, the Gauchos electrified the Thunderdome. Robson blocked a shot by Titan Agee Ward, and Kelly picked up the loose ball. He knifed down the court, freezing the CSUF defense with a brilliant behind-theback dribble, and found Davis on the baseline, who finished things with an uncontested dunk.

Two Kelly steals sand-wiched between free throws by Meyer and Kelly resulted in two more baskets for Davis, an insurmountable 67-54 lead, and grief for Fullerton Head Coach John

"Santa Barbara is about as good as any team in the league in the last four minutes, and they showed that

tonight," Sneed said. "We had too many mistakes to-night in 'crunch time,' ones we couldn't afford because Santa Barbara really capitalizes on them."

Meyer had a game-high eight rebounds to go along with 10 points, due in large part to "a lot of extra shooting with Coach C (Assistant Coach Bobby Castagna) and a lot of extra work," according to Meyer.


Aaron Sunderland led the Titans with 21 points, 10 above his average, while Ward added 16. UCSB, which figured to have problems on the boards with Fullerton's tenacious front line, instead outrebounded the Titans 27-11 in the second half and 38-26 for the game.

The Gauchos will now try to take a major step towards the NCAA tournament tonight when they host New Mexico State at 9 p.m. in the Thunderdome in front of a national television audience, with second place in the Big West and a possible top seeding in the Big West Tournament at stake. It will be the final home game for Gaucho seniors Davis and Kason Jackson.

"It's going to be 'Sweet Lu's last stand,' and I want to go out right," Davis said. "Kason and I want to beat New Mexico State, and with their win this year (a 72-63 Aggie win Jan. 9), there's definitely a revenge factor there, too. It's my last game here - we'll get it going."


