RIGHTFULLY QUIET NIGHT

It is year seven of local law enforcement's highly efficient five-year plan to control a potentially riotous Halloween weekend in Isla Vista, and no end to the no-tolerance policy is in sight.

Implemented in 1993, the Halloween ordinance was created by the Santa Barbara Board of Supervisors in response to the increasingly wild Halloween tradition in I.V. and has continued due to its effectiveness, said I.V. Foot Patrol Lt. Butch Arnoldi. Last year was the first additional year of the implementation of the plan or the Halloween Festival Ordinance, which prohibits amplified music Oct. 28 through Nov. 2 between the hours of 7 p.m. and 6 a.m.

"I feel it has been very successful - last Halloween was a good example of what the plan

was meant to do. Last year people had controlled parties by invitation only; they closed the gates of their property, put up tarps and basically kept their parties contained. After the parties people left cups and cans at the party as opposed to dumping them on DP like normal," he said. "Basically, people act like mature adults, and when you act like mature adults, we will leave you alone. I wish every weekend was like last Halloween."

The other part of the ordinance calls for no second chances and no warnings to be given out, said Sheriff's Sgt. Bill Turner.

"No tolerance means we take away the discretion from the peace officer," he said. "If we see a crime committed, they will be cited, arrested, detained or whatever is required. The officer is not given a choice."

Additional officers on the streets will help the

R.A.S KEEP WATCH FOR EVIL

The Residence Halls Association and the Office of Student Life intend to maintain tight security policies, stressing prevention and safety for the Halloween weekend.

UCSB residence halls security will again be stepped up for surrounding days Halloween, according to RHA President Lindsay Stevenson.

Precautions include a strict noguest policy, extra staff on duty for extra hours and locking all exterior doors except the lobby, she said.

"We want to make sure everyone coming into the building lives in the building, reducing the flow of outside people," she said.

According to Stevenson, the rules are in place to decrease the abuse of drugs, alcohol and the possibility of sexual assault or sexual harassment coming from

nonresidents entering the halls.

"We're trying to keep residents safe," she said. "We're looking to keep risks low."

Violators of residence hall policies will face disciplinary action that may include housing sanctions or community service, according to Residence Halls Judicial Affairs coordinator Joyce Ester. She added that each incident will be dealt with individually, taking into account any past

Students looking for an alternative to Isla Vista parties need venture no further than Storke Plaza on Saturday, courtesy of the thirdannual Halloween dance.

Nicknamed "Y2Ku-Kuy" after a traditional Mexican boogie monster, the MUJER and El Congreso-sponsored dance will be held from 9 p.m. until 2 a.m. and will raise money for educational programs for both organizations. According to MUJER Co-chair Joanna Romero, the groups are looking to provide a safe alternative to Isla Vista parties.

"We are promoting an alcohol-free event to everyone and we hope that many students will come," she said. "They can drop by after partying in I.V. if they want."

Clinton Urges Support of African Nation



WASHINGTON (AP) -With the president of Nigeria by his side, President Clinton today called on international leaders to ease Nigeria's debt and on the Senate to loosen trade restrictions with the African continent.

"Barriers to trade are barriers to opportunity for Africans working hard to catch up in a global economy and for Americans who want to work with them," Clinton said. "That's why it is vital that the Senate approve the African Growth and Opportunity Act which is now pending."

Clinton extolled the leadership of President Olusegun Obasanjo, a former military leader who advocated democracy and was elected to his nation's top post earlier this year.

"We must do more to

realize the promise of this moment for Nigeria, and for Africa," Clinton said.

The president said he would work to ease Nigeria's \$31-billion debt, because it is "neither morally right nor economically sound" to force

first official visit will yield a pledge of more U.S. aid and an end to a U.S. ban on flights because of lax airport security in Nigeria and drug smuggling.

Nigeria, Africa's most populous nation, has billions in oil wealth but is struggling with \$31 billion in debt, a declining standard of living and wide-

Nigerians to choose between paying their debts or educating their children.

Clinton is seeking to help Obasanjo turn his nation into a stabilizing force for the rest of Africa. He met at the White House today Obasanjo, who took office in May and is hoping his spread unemployment.

Clinton, who has advocated debt forgiveness for poorer nations, is less concerned with that than with events that have unfolded since Obasanjo took office.

Specifically, the White House notes that Nigeria acted as a mediator in Sierra Leone's civil conflict

and has taken steps to curb corruption, such as canceling questionable government contracts and recovering assets stolen under the regime of late military leader Gen. Sani Abacha.

"What we're witnessing here is a coming-of-age, if you will, for Nigeria under the Obasanjo government," said National Security spokesperson Jim Fallin. "Obasanjo's leadership bodes well for our future relationship and successes."

Among matters on today's agenda was oil -Nigeria provides about 10 percent of the oil exported to the United States. Obasanjo wants U.S. help in reviving Nigeria's economy by leveraging its oil wealth; Clinton is interested in coordinating the assistance Nigeria is getting from 18 federal agencies under an umbrella effort, the U.S.-Nigerian Joint Economic Partnership Commission.

Israelis Deport Apocalyptic Christian Plotters



JERUSALEM (AP) -Israel will deport 17 Americans, two Britons and an Australian suspected of membership in Christian doomsday sects.

Two Britons were put on a flight to London today, and 11 of the Americans are scheduled to depart for New York City early Friday, police spokesperson Rafi Yaffe said. Seven other detainees will be deported in the coming days when space becomes available on flights, he said.

A second Australian was released because she had already purchased a plane ticket.

Israeli police arrested 21 foreign Christians on Monday for allegedly preparing the ground for groups from abroad planning apocalyptic acts for the year 2000. The raid, in a neighborhood on the Mount of Olives, was the third Israeli operation in recent months against such Christian groups.

Israel has been on increased alert for doomsday Christians who are suspected of planning violence to set off a chain of events that they maintain would bring about the second coming of Christ.

Eleven of the 20 Christian foreigners exercised their right to appeal their deportation to the Interior Ministry. The ministry said today it would heed police advice and uphold the deportation of all the foreigners.

The Christians, many of whom have lived in Israel for years, are followers of the groups House of Prayer and Solomon's Temple. They rented apartments on the Mount of Olives, where tradition says Jesus will return.

In January, Israel deported 14 members of the Denver-based Concerned Christians group on suspicions they planned to commit mass suicide in Jerusalem. And earlier this month, it deported a group of Irish and Romanian pilgrims it suspected of extremist tendencies.

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) - A man who refused to when he recently butchered a goose. complete a Breathalyzer test because he couldn't blow hard enough without wetting himself should not have lost his drivers license, a judge ruled.

Judge Rochelle Friedman ruled this week that John A. Carlin had a valid physical reason for not complying with the police order.

Carlin, 41, of Lambertville, N.I., pleaded guilty to drunken driving following his arrest in January 1998. About a month later he was notified that his license was being suspended for a year because of his refusal to complete the breath test.

Carlin appealed in Bucks County Court but lost. The court ruled he never proved he had a medical reason for not taking the test.

In reversing the decision, Friedman wrote that requiring medical evidence was "ludicrous," especially when "laypeople know, without visiting a doctor, the physical effects of needing to use the bathroom when a bathroom is not available.

"I would have taken the test, but I couldn't," Carlinsaid Tuesday. "I kept telling the police I had to go, that I had to go real bad, but they wouldn't listen."

Foot Patrol to process arrested revelers more efficiently, said Arnoldi.

"This weekend we will have between 70 to 80 officers out at night," he said. "We will have peace officers from I.V., Goleta, Carpinteria, Lompoc and Santa Maria. We will break them into four-person groups, including a sheriff's lieutenant and at least one liaison from the I.V. Foot Patrol in every group. We will also have jail-transportation vans and field-booking teams out, so we can process law-breakers quickly and have the officers back on the street quickly.'

Sophomore anthropology major Tristan Johnson said law enforcement, not students, has gotten out of control given the past few years of relatively low-key celebra-

"I think 80 cops in I.V. is ridiculous," he said. "Why don't they just have a cop stand in front of every house on D.P.? With that many cops, people will be more guarded about their behavior, but at the same time I think it's a little absurd.

I.V. Property Owners Association Executive Chair Chuck Eckert said owners view the Halloween ordi-

"Fortunately, the bull was taken by the horns. The policy toward amplified music has helped things a lot," he said. "Since it has been implemented, Halloween has become much more sane. We haven't seen any deaths in the last few Halloweens as we did 10 years ago, and I think there has been an overall decrease in anti-social behavior."

UCSB and university-affiliated residence halls, as well

as some landlords, are restricting overnight guests during the weekend, according to Community Housing Office manager Roane Akchurin. "Ninety percent of landlords have had clauses in their leases for the last seven years addressing the holiday weekend. All on-campus housing, as well as the three off-campus housing affiliates have a no-overnight guest policy," she said. "This is a legal clause, but most students don't realize that they have

The intent of the no-tolerance policy is to make the streets safe for everyone, Turner said.

"It maintains a higher level of sobriety," he said. "This decreases random acts of violence and makes it safer for children to trick-or-treat, which is what Halloween is supposed to be about."

Bartlein & Co. property management Vice President David Russo said Halloween has improved in I.V. in the last few years, and he doesn't expect anything out of the

"We treat this weekend like any other. We don't have any clauses in our leases regarding Halloween," he said. "I think the Foot Patrol has done a wonderful job in the last seven years. It used to be really bad 10 years ago. The problem was that every Halloween other UCs and colleges from across the state would bus in people. The place would get trashed; people who didn't live here weren't concerned with what happened to I.V. It was a mess."

Turner added that expectations are high due to the success of the last few Halloweens.

"I have been here for 30 years and about two or three years ago, I saw for the first time something that was very calming - nice, young kids trick-or-treating on DP," he said. "It was a great thing, and I don't expect it to be very bad at all this year."



HALLOWEEN IN ISLA VISTA

Third only to New Year's in Times Square and Mardi Gras in New Orleans, Halloween in Isla Vista was placed among the best parties in the U.S. It's not Sleepy Hollow, but it was once almost as wild. Read on.

Isla Vistans have always had more to fear during the Halloween season than the traditional ghosts, ghouls and goblins. The popularity of the holiday's festivities has brought thousands of party-goers from across the country, making Isla Vista famous nationwide.

The late 1980s and early 1990s saw the peak of Halloween revelry, when crowds of more than 40,000 people materialized in I.V., bringing with them the havoc, mayhem and chaos traditionally associated with the pagan holiday.

IT BEGINS

Halloween has not always been the die-hard party holiday for Isla Vista that it eventually became. The first newsworthy Halloween didn't take place until 1978 when I.V. Foot Patrol officers were pelted by rocks and bottles thrown for no apparent reason. The incident was dubbed

Santa Barbara Sheriff's Sgt. Ken Reinstadler, who has been working Halloweens in I.V. for 21 years, said since 1978, I.V.'s reputation as the place to be for the holiday grew uncontrollably.

"It seems that the news about Halloween in I.V. spread by word of mouth through college students from college to college. We started noticing that the majority of hell-raisers were from outside of the city," he said. "We confirmed this by tracking the citations that were given out over Halloween. The amount of kids from other schools grew and grew to the point where we'd go on emergency activation all night long, and every officer available would be out there.'

OUT OF CONTROL Sheriff's Sgt. Bill Turner said an article in a popular gentleman's periodical in the early '90s added to I.V.'s party reputation.

"Playboy magazine had an article of party places to be and they made a reference to Isla Vista on Halloween," he said. "In my opinion, this started it all. Soon we saw different fraternities and sororities charter buses from all over the U.S."

While Playboy's 1991 article did increase I.V.'s Halloween notoriety, the holiday brought out-of-towners for years before that. I.V. saw its biggest turnout of partiers in 1987, a year that brought 35,000 revelers, 1,096 arrests and one plunge over the cliffs of Del Playa.

Other big years include 1986 with 30,000 people, 1991 with 25,000, and 1992 with 30,000. From '87 to '93 at least five people were admitted to hospitals in critical condition after falling off the cliffs of DP.

A 1987 Daily Nexus editorial summed up many people's feelings toward the direction that the annual festivities had

"UCSB has joined the ranks of Palm Springs and Ft. Lauderdale as one of the prime annual displays of all-out human stupidity. ... Regrettably, the fact remains that most of the fun has been drained from the event," the editorial stated.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE HIGH YEARS

Despite feelings that the event had started to get out of control, Halloween provided a unique opportunity for many Isla Vistans to express their creativity, particularly in the area of costumes. Even into the late 1980s when the holiday seemed focused solely on partying, there was a strong competitive spirit to come up with outrageous and creative costumes. Anything from a portable kissing booth to "walking , 69" to a Ronald Reagan/Rambo combination (called "Ronbo") could be seen parading down the streets of the I.V. Reinstadler laughingly described some of the more outlandish outfits that he has seen over his years of working I.V. Halloweens.

"For a while, large costumes resembling certain male appendages were the big thing to do. I remember one year, (laughing) let's just say that this was a huge phallus with about eight guys in it running down the street, and the guy in the very front had a fire extinguisher, and he was spraying people with it out of the front of the thing," Reinstadler said.

"Then there was this guy in a gorilla suit hanging around and chumming up to the officers, trying to get his picture taken with them. Well at this time, there was no problem with the officers having their pictures taken, so when the deputies were looking forward and smiling to have their picture taken with this guy, he would pull out this large, grotesque object from his groin area and make lewd gestures toward the officers for the camera," he said.

Turner said some of the more humorous moments for him occurred when party-goers would not realize that he was a real officer. "I used to think it was great

when people would come up to me and say something 'hey dude, great costume' and then offer me a beer or a joint or somelike that.'

at all. ... There were years when we were outnumbered 300 to one," he said. "For law enforcement to go into these sort of crowds, you just hope to keep people from getting hurt or you getting hurt yourself. ... It was very scary at times."

Reinstadler agreed that the Halloween situation eventually got out of control. "We had every type of assault imaginable, from violent assaults and fighting, to sex-

working, which I think is the largest number we've had," he said. You want to keep everyone in line, but with these numbers of people, it's very difficult. I mean, you can't shoot these people and you can't take them on. I've been in situations in years

past when people start pelting us with bottles and rocks, and it gets so bad that we think 'let's retreat,' and you can't let that happen because then it would be sheer anarchy."

CRACKING DOWN

In 1993, feelings of total loss of order and control during the Halloween season led to the adoption of a resolution banning live music, excluding visitors from residence halls, a policy ensuring that any illegal behavior will end in arrest and a campaign to discourage out-of-towners.

Members of the university, the Sheriff's Dept. and Santa Barbara County developed what is known as the no-tolerance policy. Turner explained that under the ordinance, officers are obligated to arrest all law-breakers.

"No one is given a break. Each and every officer out there is not in charge of using discretion. There is no warning, anything illegal will definitely end in citation or arrest," he said.

Reinstadler said the campaign discouraging out-of-towners has also helped to maintain order in I.V.

"Basically we've tried to get across that if you come to I.V. to raise hell on Halloween, it won't be fun, and you're going to end up in jail," he said. "The mentality of the people we were dealing

with, that's the only thing they'll understand. It's effectively quelled the pandemonium."

The implementation of no-tolerance policy has drastic a 1 1 y decreased Halloween activity in Isla Vista. Arrests over the holiday went from 1,096 in 1992, 184 in 1994, and down to 13 1997. Turning

what some have compared to as a "police state" over Halloween has helped to reduce crime and arrest statistics, but it has at the same time harmed other areas, such as local business.

Co-owner of Isla Vista Market, Lee Johnson, said Halloween business has decreased significantly since the policy went into effect.

"One Halloween day before the ordinance, we did double the business of a normal weekend day. Now we're almost not as busy as a normal weekend night," he said. "I think that something had to be done because it was a little out of hand and scary, but I think they've gone over-

Congreso External Co-chair Antonio Orozco said the dance will create a safe and festive environment for students.

"I think that publicity was done a lot better this year, and we put the word out a lot sooner," he said. "I also feel that the relationship between El Congreso and MUJER is a lot stronger. ... It's going to be a good event."

Admission is \$4 for students wearing costumes, \$5 for those without costumes.

The RHA has alternative activities planned for the weekend, including a Casino Night from 9:30 to 12:30 on Friday and a Black Light Dance from 9 p.m. to midnight on Saturday at the De La Guerra dining commons.





That's the weekend I saw a Weber barbecue come flying off of the second floor balcony and hit the ground. This act shocked one of our visiting friends, but the shock was soon eradicated with more beer. The local liquor stores and markets found themselves in a dilemma when they started running out of beer and other alcoholic elixirs to sell to the ethanol-thirsty masses. Out of all of the arrests made by the Sheriff's Dept. that weekend, the majority were for open containers and not having any identification as proof of drinking age.

There were no cliff divers, no rapes and no assaults to my recollection. If a fight did break out at a party it was quickly quelled because everybody just wanted to have fun. The only accident I saw the whole weekend involved two drunks on beach cruisers crashing into each other head-on on Camino Pescadero in broad daylight. All that came out of that incident were a couple of bruises (mostly to the ego), some scrapes, cheers from the crowd and a handshake and laughs between the two would-be kamikaze pilots.

Yes, it was crowded; yes, everyone was silly drunk;

and yes, it was chaos, but it was unforgettably fun and there could never be another Halloween weekend quite like that of 1987. I know because I was here for Halloween of 1992 when it happened to land on a weekend once again, but this time it wasn't so fun.

It seemed as if every wannabe homeboy decided to invade Isla Vista for the sole purpose of being stupid and fighting with anyone and everyone that seemed to "dis" them. There were assaults and this time the arrests showed an increase in said crime. I can remember coming out of my front door and there was a full-scale brawl in progress right in my driveway with people I'd never seen before.

It was at this point that local law enforcement decided enough was enough, and thus began the "no tolerance" stance taken by the Sheriff's Dept. regarding Halloween weekend in Isla Vista. The first year for this type of enforcement was Halloween of 1993, and this time it was the police that went berzerk, since most were back-ups from the surrounding area and had no clue as to what to expect other than what they had been briefed on before hitting the streets. The rest is history.

This year will probably be no different than the past few Halloweens since 1993, and in a way I'm glad because while history can repeat itself, you can't relive the past. Halloween 1987 was simply the best and it could never be outdone. It's kind of like the original Woodstock in 1969 versus Woodstock '99. The "peace and love" atmosphere was replaced with a "burn and thrash" mentality. I'm no sociologist, but I can conclude from my observations that the fun Halloween we had back in 1987 can never be again, due to the idiot mentality so common these days in so many people. Whatever happened to just having fun?

So it is with the fondest of memories of a Halloween weekend way back in 1987 that I end this story; with the sadness of the knowledge that it'll never again be the way it was. That's a bummer because it was a fun time for everyone that was here for that crazy weekend. Those days are over, but from what I can remember I'm glad I was in on the fun along with those 60,000 others.



CONDOMS ARE GOOD, PART TWO

Editor, Daily Nexus:

This Friday from 12 to 1 p.m. is the quarterly "Condom Alert." As part of the Student Health Service and Peer Health Education Program, the sexual health peers will wear bright orange T-shirts and pass out over 1,000 free condoms to everyone that they see.

In past quarters, condoms have been passed out in the dining commons, the UCen and in front of Campbell Hall, the Arbor and the walkways in between. As part of the Sexual Health Program, the alert is part of our goal to educate students about reproductive health issues, such as birth control methods and sexually transmitted diseases so that related problems can be prevented.

Tests indicate that latex condoms, when used correctly with a contraceptive spermicide during vaginal intercourse, have an effectiveness of 97.5 percent in preventing pregnancies, 99.9 percent effectiveness in preventing transmission of STDs and even *higher* for HIV prevention.

Most condom failure can be traced back to the user. Either the user stored the condoms incorrectly, put it on incorrectly or used an oil-based lubricant,

which will cause the latex to break down and eventually tear. Be *sure* to read the enclosed directions with *every* condom.

The statistics for the UCSB campus say that students use condoms 41 percent of the time when engaging in vaginal sex, only 5 percent of students use condoms for oral sex, only 16 percent of students who engage in anal sex use condoms and only 23 percent of students use condoms every time they have sex. We are hoping we can increase condom usage by making it easy and giving you a free condom.

STRESS CAN DRIVE YOU TO DRINK

Around this time, when stress starts to build up and alcohol consumption goes up along with it, it is best to stop and think about the situation and educate others about it. During National Collegiate Alcohol Awareness Week, which was Oct. 17-23, STAR (Students Teaching Alcohol and other drug Responsibility) made presentations to educate people on the problems that can occur through binge drinking.

According to a recent survey, 94.1 percent of UCSB students have consumed alcohol in their lifetime, and it is important for these students to know the consequences of binge drinking. Every year, people are victims of drunk drivers and rape by an intoxicated person. For this reason, STAR circulated pledges in which 100 college students signed a petition agreeing to drink in moderation (one to four drinks per sitting) so as to avoid these experiences. We thank those people for taking the time to sign these pledges, and hope that those who did not sign keep in mind that moderation is important. We would also like to thank Chancellor Henry Yang for taking the time to write a letter in which he encouraged each of you to evaluate the role of alcohol in your life.

STAR, who are peer health educators trained through sociology 91B and sponsored through Student Health Services, strongly emphasize that we are not an abstinence group. Instead, we promote moderate and responsible use for those who choose to drink and support for those who choose not to. Because of this, STAR believes it is important for all students to feel they have a choice about alcohol use and to make informed choices. Keep in mind that the choices you make today will affect you tomorrow.





Cook in oven at 350 °F until cheese is melted (about 10 minutes).







Gauchos Exact Revenge on Cal Poly Mustangs

Ahhh, sweet, sweet revenge.

After a five-game upset to Cal Poly on Oct. 7, the #8 UCSB women's volleyball team was determined to show that it is a better team than the one that lost to the Mustangs three weeks ago. And the Gauchos did so in a timely fashion Thursday night at the Thunderdome, sweeping Cal Poly 15-4, 15-7 and 15-5 with a well-balanced attack.

"When somebody beats you, you always want to come back and beat them," UCSB Head Coach Kathy Gregory said. "We heard that Cal Poly said that they wanted to prove that [their victory] wasn't a fluke, and we wanted to prove that we're better than that.

So they brought out the best in us; it was one of our best performances."

Santa Barbara did not take long in getting even with the Mustangs, as the match only lasted an hour and 14 minutes. In game one, UCSB was in complete control, out-hitting Cal Poly .486 to .182. In the second frame, the two teams were deadlocked at two apiece after a number of sideouts. Santa Barbara finally went ahead 4-2 on two Mustang errors and never looked back. The Mustangs were as close as 12-7, but UCSB ended the game on three consecutive kills by freshman outside hitter Brooke Niles. The final game was a bit sloppier for the Gauchos, hitting only .257 but having the same results as the previous games. Santa Barbara jumped to a 5-0 lead in game three after the Mustangs committed four straight errors. Again the Gauchos would not look back, finishing the game and the match at 15-5.


The Mustangs' senior middle blocker Kari DeSoto ate the Gauchos up in the previous match, swinging for 24 kills in the Cal Poly victory. However, DeSoto was a focus of the UCSB defense and recorded only 15 kills Thursday.

"Tonight we knew exactly what to do," Gregory said. "We had to commit on DeSoto and that's what we did, even though she got some kills. But the big thing is that we played balanced. [Senior middle blocker] Michelle Christ played her heart out. She came out and they didn't even see her."

If Cal Poly really did not expect Christ to have a strong performance, it should have. She led Santa Barbara with 13 kills and committed only one error in 21 swings for a .571 hitting percentage.

Turnaround Season Comes to an End for UCSB This Weekend

The UCSB women's soccer team will cap off a comeback season with two nonconference games against Loyola Marymount and Fresno State this weekend. With their Big West schedule behind them, the Gauchos (8-8-1 overall, 5-4 Big West) will finish the year in front of their home fans against the Bulldogs on Halloween Sunday, after traveling to Los Angeles to face the Lions on Friday.

When looking at the statistical output of the 1999 Gauchos, one does not need to delve very far into the numbers to find that this year's squad is vastly superior to last year's team. A sampling: In 1998, UCSB scored 13 goals the entire season and was shut out 10 times. This year the team has already found the back of the net 24 times and has been held scoreless a mere four times. Furthermore, UCSB has notched 30 more points than it did in '98 (67-37) and has boosted its record from 4-14-1 to 8-8-1.

"We're all kind of sad it's coming to an end," said sophomore forward Tiffany Dawson of the '99 season. "Everyone on the team stepped it up from last season. We're looking forward to next season because we know we can get even better. This weekend we want to go out with a big bang and play really well in our last two games."

The Gauchos have two tough opponents in their final weekend, squaring off against the Lions and Bulldogs. At 11-4 overall, LMU is one of the tougher nonleague opponents UCSB has faced all year. However, Santa Barbara Head Coach Paul Stumpf believes the Loyola road game to be the easier of the two that the Gauchos will play.

"[LMU is] probably a little bit more beatable than Fresno State,"
Stumpf said. "They play a system that we match up well against."
