Riviera Campus Hosts Meeting of Western College Association

Many of the leading educators in this part of the nation will meet on the campus on April 1 for the Spring meeting of the Western College Association, representing 42 institutions of higher learning in the West. The announcement was made by Dr. J. Harold Williams, Acting Provost and a member of the Association's Executive Committee.

This is the first meeting of this organization on the local campus. It is expected to attract some 300 delegates.

This Association was recently given a responsibility as the accrediting agency for the colleges and universities in the Western states. This recognition came from the American Council on Education and the National Commission on Accrediting Procedures and makes the Western College Association one of six regional accrediting agencies in the United States.

Setting up the machinery in handling accrediting procedures will be one of the important items on the agenda during the meeting here.

Dr. Monroe E. Deutsch, Vice-President and Provost, Emeritus, of the University of California, is President of the Western College Association and announced that the major theme of the meeting would be "What Are the Responsibilities of a Free College in the Present Day?"

Most of the day's meeting will be taken up with the giving of papers on various phases of education, each of which will be followed by a discussion period.

After weeks of careful planning, construction will begin bright and early tomorrow morning on booths for the Santa Barbary Coast carnival sponsored by the Associated Students every year.

QUAD PROGRAMS HIGHLIGHT 'COAST'

Quad Programs will be featured in addition to the usual Booth entertainment at the 1950 Santa Barbary Coast carnival, it was disclosed today by Jim Mulick, Quad Program director.

Shows will be held on the stage on the Quad steps at 8, 9, and 10 p.m., with entertainment and auctions for the WSSF fund. The 8 o'clock show will be presented by the Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity, with a repetition of their 1949 Homecoming winner, "Listen and Be Saved."

Entertainment at 9 o'clock will be wrestling, two out of three "falls," between two of the foremost "pugs" of the Riviera, "Darling Jack" and "The Dirty Dane." This segment of the show being produced by Sigma Pi fraternity.

10 o'clock will feature the Sigma Tau Gamma fraternity Combo including Rocky Goodrow and Norman Willis, with the presenting of the awards for the Coast immediately following the last auction of the evening. Auctions will display primarily cakes and cookies donated by the various sorority and women's living groups, with all receipts going to WSSF. A dance in the cafeteria will follow the 10 o'clock show.

"Manhattan Tower" is Feature Number in 12th Dance Concert

Gordon Jenkin's well-known "Manhattan Tower" will be one of the featured numbers in the 12th Annual Modern Dance Concert to be presented March 30-31 in the Riviera Auditorium.

Since the carnival is a benefit affair, twenty percent of the net profits of all the booths and concessions will be donated to the WSSF and the Student Union Fund.

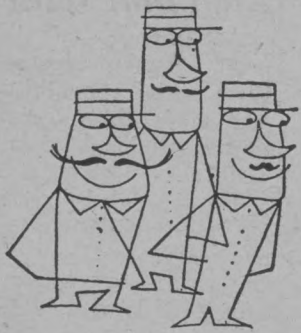

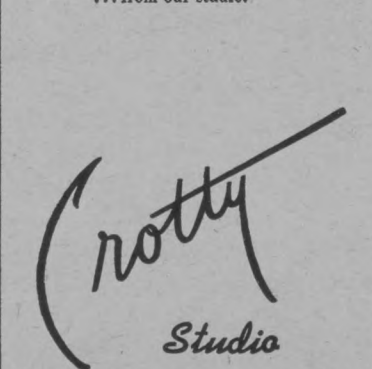

Gauchos Play USC Two Games at L. A.

Santa Barbara College's baseball team meets its second CIBA opponent of the season yesterday and today when it tangles with power packed University of Southern California at Bovard Field in Los Angeles.

Coach Spud Harder's nine, defeated twice in seven games, will take on a Trojan team undefeated in college competition this year. In 1947 and 1948, the year SC captured the NCAA championship, the Gauchos handed the Trojans their first defeat of each season at Santa Barbara, 13-8 and 6-5.

Harder's top moundsman, tiny Bob Johnston, will pitch the opener with Corkey Johnson scheduled to go the following day. Johnston, a right hander pitching his second year of varsity ball, has won two of three starts. Johnson, a sophomore with a blazing fastball, also has a 2-1 record.

Only Losses

The Gauchos' only losses have been to UCLA and to Pepperdine in the second half of a double bill. Wins were scored against Santa Barbara Alumni, Los Angeles State and Pepperdine. An 11-inning game with Whittier last week ended in a tie after the match was called on account of darkness.

Santa Barbara College will play 10 of its 22 games against CIBA opponents, including USC, UCLA, Stanford and California. The Gauchos play Stanford Tuesday, March 28, in their first home game of the year.

'Mural Cage Tourney Tightens as Teams Apply Final Pressure

As this issue went to press, a big night in the Fraternity Division of the intramural cage tourney was on tap. Two of the four teams that were tied for first place would be shunted down to the number two spot.

The games featured the Delta Tau Delta "A's" versus the Sigma Alpha Epsilon "A" squad, and the Delta "B" team against the SAE "B's". The next issue of the *El Gauchito* will carry the results of the clashes of these four undefeated teams.

Monday evening's contests saw the Club Division main contenders emerge victorious as the Rockets and the Dogger House quintets both came out on top.

The Rockets, with Clyde Francisco hitting the nets for 11 points, dumped the previously undefeated Foul Five 35-29. Bill Blaker and Jack Evans each accounted for 14 of their team's points as the Dogger House dropped the IVCF from the undefeated bracket 57-28. The Shamrocks gained a forfeit win over the Reds in the final game of the evening.

The Gauchos linksters, whose only match this season was a 17-4 conquest of Cal Tech at the Montecito Country Club, will meet the Southland's top college golfers in the open play.

"College golf is getting healthier every year," Irvine said. "We have the strongest team in several years and we don't expect to give away strokes to anybody."

The veteran ex-pro said his top seven squad members are all seniors and added that a traveling squad limit of four men has stimulated competition this spring.

Jess Dawson and Ernie Reid, both two-letter men, are the top rankers on Irvine's club. A steady golfer and top competitor, Dawson works out conscientiously every afternoon he can get on the course. Reid, a Santa Barbara boy who came up through the caddy ranks, shoots regularly in the low 70's regardless of playing conditions.

Other lettermen on the team are Don Nearing, who learned his golf caddying in Minnesota; Pete Reid, a Los Angeles boy with a peerless short game; Bill Birmingham, a careful shot maker from Santa Barbara; and Bill Emmons, one of the longest ball hitters on the squad.

A newcomer to the squad is Bill Kelso, who played with Willie Wilton's basketball team this season. Kelso was ranked 17th in the nation among junior college golfers while attending Kansas State College. He knows the angles and should add a lot to Irvine's 1950 hopes.

Carter will send Don Crie, Walt Houtz and Robert Lahey into the mile event with Crie, Houtz and Galen Pierce getting the call for the two mile run. Crie, who took place in the mile at Occidental, improved his best performance mark by a full ten seconds.

Arvin Smith and Charles Welch will carry the colors in the 440 with Ted Vick in the 100 yard dash. Slated tentatively for the high hurdles are Dick Barr and Bob Bethurum with Forrest Staffanson in the 880 event.

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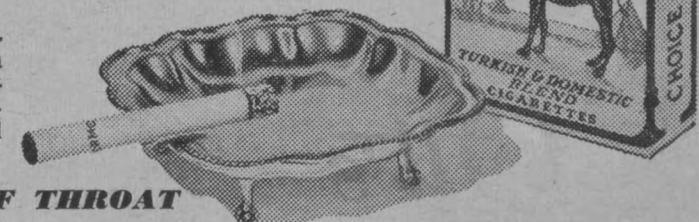
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
