These are among the finest fishing waters in California. Reservations must be made by June 24 at the Associated Students Business Office in the Student Union. The fee will be \$7.50.

The galley will serve breakfast and dispense sandwiches and soft drinks throughout the day at extra cost. Excursionists may, of course, bring their own food if they choose. Fishing equipment may be rented at the pier, and bait will be furnished. This is an unusual opportunity to see the islands and fish.

Folk and square dancing will be featured every Wednesday from 7:30-9:30 in room 110, building 422. Half or full-day fishing tours may be arranged through calling Norm's Landing, Stern's Wharf in Santa Barbara (5-8583), or Goleta Pier (7-2104). Ladies rate special rates on certain weekends. Among future summer events to plan for is the fabulous summer barbeque, scheduled for July 9. No fee will be charged campus residents, and the non-resident:fee will be only 75ϕ .

NATURE STUDY INSTITUTE

Summer session students may pack in two weeks' additional schooling locally through a unique outdoor program - the Institute of Nature Study and Conservation - sponsored by University of California Extension. Headquarters will be the Museum of Natural History in Santa Barbara, and the dates are from August 3-15.

A new course this year is "Western Trees," which will be taught by Dr. Katherine Muller, director of the Santa Barbara Botanical Garden. Dr. Aryan Roest of California State Polytechnic College, and also of UCSB's 1959 summer session faculty, will teach ecology and conservation.

Other courses listed are on seashore life, native birds, elementary science methods, rocks and minerals, astronomy, and native plants.

Students deficient in any section of any division must retake the entire division and will be responsible for any part taken whether passed formerly or not.

No appointment is necessary in advance. Students will merely appear at the time indicated. However, a <u>Statement of Study</u> is required of each student.

This document may be obtained at the office of the student's major department or the department of Education. Before signing it a student should spend at least ten hours in study - preferably with a tutor, Dr. Durflinger warned. The Statement must also be signed by a faculty member.

PARKING NOTES

Summer students and all new people parking on campus are requested to display the proper parking permit on their vehicle windshields. This sticker is obtainable through the Police Department office on campus (building 427, room 202) for \$1.00.

SUMMER LECTURES FEATURE VISITING FACULTY
