UCSB IS SITE FOR KTTV'S
"A CAMPUS IN ACTION" TELECAST

KTTV will move its remote cameras to the University of California, Santa Barbara for its monthly visit to "A Campus In Action," next Sunday, June 30, at 6:30 p.m. on Channel Eleven.

Areas to be investigated during the program include the marine biological laboratory and the biological sciences department. Program host Bill Welsh will interview Dr. Demorest Davenport, Chairman, Department of Biological Sciences and Dr. Adrian Wenner, Assistant Professor of Biology, and Dr. A. Russell Buchanan, Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs.

Viewers will be shown examples of how bees use sounds to communicate as the cameras go close up on a glass sided beehive and the special instruments devised to record the bee sounds.

In visiting UCSB, "A Campus In Action" goes right onto the Pacific beach where students are shown in their studies collecting marine specimens for use in biology classes.

The program also will investigate the founding, history and future plans of UCSB as well as introducing the men in charge at the college.

LECTURE SERIES GETS UNDER WAY WITH TALK TODAY IN SOUTH HALL

"The Image and Direction of Social Studies" will be the topic of William E. McLaughlin, Vice President of the Santa Barbara Council for Social Studies and Secretary of the California Council, when he speaks in South Hall Lecture Room at 4 o'clock this afternoon.

Also the director of the secondary curriculum for Santa Barbara City Schools, McLaughlin formerly was Chairman of the Department of Social Studies at San Marcos High School. He also has taught history and economics at Newport Harbor High School and world history, American history and American problems at San Marcos.

McLaughlin has been associate editor of the California Social Science Review and was editor of American Values in the Secondary Schools, published by the Santa Barbara City Schools in 1961.

The second lecture in the series will be delivered by Father Frederick Debuyst in South Hall Lecture Room at 4 p.m. Thursday, June 27. Father Debuyst's topic will be "Contemporary Church Art and Architecture." (Cont. on pg. 2)

BRIEF POWER SHUTOFF FOR CAMPUS FORCES RESCHEDULING OF SUNDAY FILM

# SUMMER ENROLLMENT JUMPS AT UCSB

An increase of over 33 per cent over last year is reported in the preliminary enrollment figures of summer session at UCSB.

A total of 1308 students are attending the six week session which began June 17. This figure includes 307 high school students who are participating in the special summer program for those who have completed their junior years and 51 recipients of grants to attend the National Science Foundation Summer Institute for High School Mathematics Teachers.

Enrollment in the high school program which allows exceptional secondary students to take college level courses during the six week period has increased 270 per cent over last year when 84 students were enrolled in the program.

A fine will be levied for lost or mutilated packet cards and registration cards -- \$1 each for single packet cards and registration card, and \$5 for all packet cards.

Before filing, all freshmen must have their official study list signed by the Dean of the College of Letters and Science and all high school students in the special university program must have their cards signed by their advisers.

SCIENCE AND CONSERVATION WORKSHOP WILL HOLD ANNUAL MEETING JULY 29

The 31st annual field science and conservation workshop will meet on campus from July 29 through August 9 featuring a special opportunity for teachers to relate their nature and biology instruction to the California scene.

Offered by the University Extension in cooperation with the Santa Barbara Botanic Gardens, Museum of Natural History and the Conservation Council, the workshop is staffed by five UCSB staff members and Capt. Crutchfield Adair of the Museum of Natural History.

During the first week, courses offered include, Outdoor Science Education in Elementary Schools, Archaeology in Action, Rocks and Minerals and Seashore Life.

The second week's program includes Outdoor Science Education in Elementary Schools, Astronomy, Archaeology in Action and Native Plants.
