ADMISSION APPLICATIONS DUE AUGUST 15 FOR NEW STUDENTS

Students attending the Summer Session who plan to apply for entrance to the regular Fall semester must file for admission by August 15, according to the announcement by Dr. L.F. Walton, acting registrar.

FINALS-BOUND GAUCHOS STRANDED AS BUS DRIVERS STRIKE

"Give a Gaucho a lift" became more than a tradition this week, when busriding Gauchos found themselves without rides due to a walkout of Santa Barbara Motor Coach Corporation bus drivers.

The transportation company stopped service at midnight Saturday marking the beginning of a full-scale strike of all of the firms drivers, mechanics and repairmen as a result of the breakdown of wage negotiations underway.

No plans have been made as yet to provide any substitute bus service during the strike. Picketing of the bus company began Sunday by the Teamster's Local 186.

The union demands a 10 per cent increase in wages for all classifications, the maximum allowed by Federal wage coilings. This would boost the wages of drivers, now making \$1.36 an hour under the two-year contract which expire Tuesday, 13.6 cents an hour.

The Santa Barbara Transportation Corr offers a raise of 10 cents per hour which they say is all that is possible under the fare increase granted last Thursday by the City Council.

There is no settlement in sight rendering the plight of Gauchos climbing the hill for finals a serious one. Car drivers are urged to go out of thein way, if necessary, to pass bus stops heavily used by students, and to help provide transportation until the crisis is past.

A fifth home game has been added to the Gaucho 1951 football season, it was announced recently by Dr. Theodore Harden director of athletics. The game will pi the Gauchos against the Amphib Forces and will be played the night of October 27.

Harder stated that the College had been trying for several months to add a service team to the Gaucho gridiron schedule. The Amphibious Forces is a naval unit located at San Diego.

It was also announced that the season opener will be played at Pomona College on September 29, a day later than previously announced. First home ga me for the Englemen will be on Friday, October against Occidental.

Other La Playa games are versus Whittier College (Homecoming), Los Angeles State and Pepperdine. Out of town opponents are Pomona, Fresno State, Cal Aggies, Cal Poly and San Diego State.
