Basham Gives Views on New Organization

"Class spirit and organization and a better general organization of the whole student government are the paramount issues before the student body," said Garryn Basham, president-elect of the student body in an interview yesterday. "I think the chief concern of the next council will be to have the new constitution which is being formed adopted."

"The proposed constitution will tend to do this particularly in emphasizing class organization and class spirit," continued the newly-elected student body president.

At present the student committee is practically redrafting a new constitution with changes that will bring about a better unity of student affairs and more cooperation between students, classes, and the general student body including the faculty.

"The new constitution will be completed and posted for inspection this semester and will be up to student vote," said Basham. "There is no question in my mind but what this constitution will be a vast improvement over the old constitution which has outgrown its usefulness."

Concerning school activities during the coming year, Basham said, "The new council is particularly interested in fostering school activities on a higher and more progressive plane. It is my opinion that this end can be accomplished through the encouragement of student participation in student body activities, a more adequate representation from the student council and an increased knowledge on the part of students as to just what is taking place in their student council."

Summing up all his statements, Basham said, "It is my purpose to establish student government which is essentially more representative of students and will be more satisfactory to individual and collective interests. I am deeply appreciative for the opportunity of leading the student body in their activities next year and will do my best to carry out the principles I have started."

State Colleges Change Names

California State Teacher's colleges completed the first stage of their fight for liberalization and extension of courses when Gov. Frank F. Merriam began consideration of a bill which will change the names of the institutions to state colleges.

The senate has already passed a bill which would allow the colleges to teach such liberal art courses as may be appropriate for students intending to enter the teaching profession, in addition to the name change.

Educators at the University of California opposed the measure on the ground that the state should concentrate on a major university rather than scattering facilities.

Members of the local and alumni chapters of Pi Sigma Chi, national industrial education fraternity, will gather for their annual semi-formal dance and installation of officers on Saturday evening at the Margaret Baylor Inn. The officers to be inducted will be elected at a meeting that afternoon. Ralph Porter, present president, will preside at the ceremonies.

E. E. Ericson, sponsor of the organization, said that he expects at least thirty alumni and guests from the Los Angeles chapter, eight members from Santa Barbara, several from other localities and fifteen active and guests to be present at the affair. Phyllis English's orchestra will play for the dancing.

The greatest change advanced by the committee in the new document is the reorganization of the student council. The body is changed from an executive to legislative group in which the students elect their own representatives to the council. Each class provides two delegates to the group. The three elective student body officers, the presidents of the Men's club and of the Associated Women's students along with an alumni representative and three faculty advisors composes the Students' Legislative council.

Members of the present council will become ex-officio members without vote. This change is suggested in an attempt to get away from the present activity, committee, and departmental bickering which is now prevalent in the Executive Council meetings. The change will also give representation to the students at large. It will be noted that the name of the governing council has been changed to Legislative Council, in order to denote its character and type of functions.

Outstanding Step

The Executive Cabinet, made up entirely of students is one of the outstanding steps toward Student Government. Its chief function will be to advise the President and form administration policies.

The Chairman of the Finance committee is in truth the treasurer of the Associated Students. The change was instigated for the purpose of providing for a body to assist the student body controller in the myriad of details which he must perform. The chairman is to be appointed so that an efficient and responsible person can be obtained.

New Award System

The new award system provides a fair system which enables the Associated Students to recognize outstanding service of any kind through the centralized administration of the system.

Among the notable changes in the new Constitution and By-Laws is the new set up in Inter-collegiate athletics, and the speech arts organization. Provision has been made for a publicity manager, as

"You are the younger generation, said the speaker as he pointed to the audience, and it is up to you and to you only whether or not this thing continues or not."

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A Revised Constitution

The new proposed constitution is indeed a document which deserves long consideration and concentrated thought for a clear analysis. The revision committee in preparing the new foundation of student government has put in many, many hours of research in compiling information and authentic data to be incorporated into the final writings.

As a unit the new revision can not be compared to the present constitution for there are too many complete and revolutionary changes in the new document. All of these changes have been included in the revision for the specific purpose of increasing and building up of the student government.

It is notable, however, that even though the whole thing has the one purpose of increasing the student control, it has found favor in the eyes of many members of the faculty. Among which are to be listed President Phelps, Dr. Jacobs, Miss Severy, Fred Allred and many others.

Some of the outstanding changes incorporated into the revised constitution include the reorganization of the student council. This change without a doubt will tend to co-ordinate the Associated Students for their own advancement and the progress of the school at large.

Another change which will lead to the betterment of the student spirit is the reorganization of the Activities committee. Many of its present powers are divided between the Publication board and the Welfare committee, both of which are new provisions in the revised constitution. Further on the Activities committee is that its name has been changed to that of Rally committee with its functions centering more around the point of the creation of pep and spirit among the students. The chairman of the committee is to be elected by the students at large as the yell leader will be such by virtue of office. Through this move the revision committee hopes to get a responsible person in the position who would have the power to act before the students.

A rather uncommon change has been proposed in the withdrawal from the student elective officers the two positions of Student Body Treasurer and of the Manager of Drama and Debate. In the former case, it is believed by the revision committee that by the appointment of this office a person of a responsible character who has had some experience in the field of finance can be obtained. Under the present constitution the position of treasurer is one of general inactivity and limited duties. The revision provides for the appointee to be Chairman of the Finance committee and act as the assistant to the student body comptroller.

In the case of the drama and debate the change has been to make the position an appointed one for somewhat the same reasons. This new arrangement provides for sub-managers for each of the various speech arts; drama, debate and oratory.

Some of the other changes which should be listed as important are the creation of the Welfare committee, which is really the reorganization of the Extra Curricular activities committee which at present is practically inactive. The Publication's board which has been active on the campus for several years has never been provided for in the constitution has been given full authority for all of the State College publications.

A new set-up in the Athletic Board of Control has been instigated in the new document. The re-arrangement has been for the primary purpose of co-ordinating the inter-collegiate athletic organizations and also to make it possible for the student body to be represented at a point where a high degree of its budgeted moneys are spent. At the present time there is no actual student representation on the board of control other than the athletic department itself.

Still another means of student advancement and progress of the school at large is the provision for a Publicity department to handle all advertisements for the school as well as all the publicity.

Many other of the changes could be pointed out if time and space were permitted. They are numerous throughout the new revised constitution and each has its underlying principle for the advancement of the student government in the Santa Barbara State college.

Unemployment at State

Wanted: Sixty college men to work Saturday, June 1.

This item was published in a recent issue of El Gauchito for the purpose of relieving some of the so-called unemployment present on our campus and it was expected that the positions would be filled at once. All applicants were requested to leave their names in Dean Ashworth's office.

So far only fifteen men out of the three-hundred and one enrolled at our institution have registered with the employment secretary to work Saturday!

The position which is working for the Gilmore balloon circus, to be presented in Santa Barbara this coming week-end, will last for approximately three hours and each man participating will receive a dollar.

Is this work, which consists of wearing clown suits and holding down inflated balloons while parading up and down State street, too hard and tiring for college men or are they so well fixed financially that they do not need to work?

At the present time in Dean Ashworth's office, there are four letters on file from firms and townspeople asking for college students to fill various positions. No one has been sent to fill these positions because of lack of enough interest on the part of the students to fill out an application blank and leave it with the employment secretary.

It is not the duty of the employment office to go out and look for students to come in and take a job. If the students are not interested enough in their own welfare to inquire about work they will find that no one is going to come after them.

Not only does the above situation if allowed to exist reflect back upon the college's ability to furnish men for positions but in the future the townspeople will look elsewhere for workers.

Art—Music—Drama

Mae West's "Goin' to Town" offers her public nothing new except for the opera debut of the lady in question which was certainly someone's mistake. The Diamond Lil formula has again been used and again is not as effective as in the original "She Done Him Wrong." Her style is definitely connected with bar-room and beer-hall society and when she steps out of this element, except where it is burlesque, she does not ring true. The West conception of a new show seems to be a full roster of fresh supporters and a new background rather than any change in her own technique, which is created with swagging clothes, oscillating hips, and wise-cracking gags. Especially pleasing was the blend of their voices in the final duet. No doubt the success of this production will lead to the future filming of other popular musical comedies of this calibre, and none can deny that they are not good entertainment.

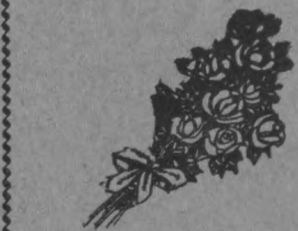
Fraternity Installs Formally at Dinner

Mr. Rust has had many years experience in the mechanics of this field, and is the holder of a first class projectionist license.

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ASSOCIATED STUDENTS PROPOSED CONSTITUTION

May 28, 1935

SANTA BARBARA STATE COLLEGE

Santa Barbara, Calif.

We, the undersigned members of the Constitutional Revision Committee do hereby submit for the approval of the Associated Students of Santa Barbara State College, the revised Constitution and By-Laws with its proposed changes. The main aim of the committee was to set up a type of government which will be thoroughly representative. The classes have been given representation on the Legislative Council, while the committee chairman, managers, and department representatives have been placed on the committee as ex-officio members, although without vote. By way of explanation, the term ex-officio means "by virtue of office."

We have endeavored to set up a definite procedure wherein the lines of responsibility have been clearly and definitely drawn. We have read the constitutions of a number of other colleges, in an effort to get as many ideas as possible to work with. The ideas submitted to the committee by interested students have been given consideration, many of them being incorporated in the Constitution and By-Laws. Many hours of deliberation have been given to every detail of the new Constitution in order to give the students of Santa Barbara State College real student government.

We are requesting, however, that in order to facilitate such improvements in the proposed Constitution and By-Laws as may be desirable, all proposals for change or objection to any of the features in the proposed Constitution and By-Laws be submitted in writing to Don Follett, chairman of the committee, not later than one o'clock on Monday, June 3.

CONSTITUTION of the Associated Students of Santa Barbara State College

PREAMBLE

In order that we may promote and control all matters of student interest, and efficiently govern our business, we, the students of Santa Barbara State College, establish this Constitution and its By-Laws.

ARTICLE I. Name

Section 1. The name of this organization shall be "The Associated Students of Santa Barbara State College."

ARTICLE II. Membership

Section 1. All regularly registered students of the Santa Barbara State College who have paid their Associated Students dues, shall be active members of this organization.

Section 2. Faculty members of the Santa Barbara State College shall be considered as associate members. Their privileges are defined in the By-Laws.

Section 3. All non-regular students, alumni, and others who pay dues as stipulated in the By-Laws shall be regarded as associate members.

ARTICLE III. Government

Section 1. The Associated Student organization shall be governed by a Legislative body and an Executive cabinet.

Section 2. The Legislative body shall consist of the following voting members:

- a. Ex-officio
 - 1) President of the Associated Students
 - 2) Vice-President of the Associated Students
 - 3) Secretary of the Associated Students
 - 4) President of the Men's Club
 - 5) President of the Associated Women Students
- b. Elective (As designated in the By-Laws)
 - 1) Alumni representative
 - 2) Two representatives from each class, one a man and one a woman.

Section 3. Ex-officio members of the Legislative body without vote:

- 1) Comptroller of the Associated Students
- 2) All Chairmen of standing committees as listed in the By-Laws
- 3) Editor of El Gaucho
- 4) Editor of La Cumbre
- 5) Publicity Manager
- 6) Men's Athletic Manager
- 7) Women's Athletic Manager
- 8) Manager of Musical Organizations
- 9) Manager of Speech Arts.
- 10) One faculty member appointed by the President of the College
- 11) The Dean of Women and the Dean of Men as ex-officio members.

Section 4.

a. The Executive Cabinet shall consist of:

- 1) The President of the Associated Students
- 2) The Vice-President of the Associated Students
- 3) The Secretary of the Associated Students
- 4) The Chairman of the Finance Committee

b. The Executive Cabinet shall function as an advisory committee to the President of the Associated Students.

Section 5. Election of the officers of the Associated Students shall take place by secret ballot prior to a month from the end of the current college year. The manner of the election shall be in accordance with the plan set forth in the By-Laws. Likewise appointments shall be in accordance with the provision of the By-Laws, except that the appointment of the Comptroller shall be as set forth in Article IV. of this Constitution.

ARTICLE IV. Comptroller

Section 1. The Comptroller of the Associated Students shall be an alumnus of Santa Barbara State

College. He shall be recommended by the Legislative Council and be agreeable to and appointed by the President of the College.

Section 2. His salary shall be fixed under contract by the Legislative Council.

Section 3. His term of office shall be indefinite and shall be terminated by written notice given either by the Comptroller or the Legislative Council with the approval of the President of the College at least three months in advance.

ARTICLE V. Meetings

Section 1. Associated Students meetings shall be called at regular or special times by the President of the Associated Students. Special meetings shall be called on the request of a majority of the Legislative Council, or upon presentation to the Associated Students Secretary of a petition bearing the signatures of ten percent (10%) of the regular members of the Association.

Section 2. Regular Legislative Council meetings shall be held twice monthly. Special meetings may be called by petition of five members of the Legislative Council or by order of the President of the Associated Students.

ARTICLE VI. Amendments

Section 1. Amendments to this Constitution shall be proposed in the following manner:

a. Upon the unanimous recommendation of the Legislative Council, or upon three-fourths vote of the Council, in which case this fact must be made public.

b. By signed petition of fifteen percent (15%) of the regular members of the Associated Students.

Section 2. The proposed amendment, in triplicate with the list of signatures on one of the copies, shall be filed one week prior to the student body meeting at which it is to be presented. The original copy, with the signatures, shall be immediately posted on the bulletin board and printed copies of the amendment made available to all members of the Associated Students.

Section 3. Voting on the amendment shall be by secret ballot; the polls to be open immediately following the meeting in which the amendment is discussed, and closed not sooner than four hours following the opening. In case three-fourths of the student body fails to vote within the period stated above, the polls shall be re-opened on the following school day and shall remain open for an additional four hours, beginning approximately at eleven o'clock in the morning.

Section 4. It shall require two-thirds of the total votes cast to carry an amendment to this Constitution.

ARTICLE VIII.

Section 1. Robert's Revised Rules of Order shall be the authority for rules of procedure not provided for in this Constitution and its By-Laws.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I. Membership Privileges

Section 1. All regular active members of the Associated Students shall be entitled to:

- a. Admission to all athletic, debating, and oratorical contests in which Santa Barbara State College teams participate, under the conditions prescribed by the Legislative Council.
- b. Subscription to El Gaucho.
- c. Subscription to La Cumbre upon two semester student body memberships.
- d. All privileges of class membership.
- e. Admission to social events.
- f. Hospitalization privileges.
- g. All rights of membership in the Associated Students.

Section 2. An assessment of ten dollars (\$10) per semester shall be levied against each student, to cover privileges of this organization.

Section 3. Associate members shall be all members of the college faculty, part-time students (those taking less than 6 units), alumni, and any others who are interested in college activities. Their dues shall be five dollars (\$5) per semester. This shall entitle them to:

- a. Admission to all athletic, debating and oratorical contests, in which Santa Barbara State College teams participate, under the conditions prescribed by the Legislative Council.
- b. Subscription to El Gaucho.
- c. Admission to social events.

ARTICLE II. Elections

Section 1. The President, Vice-President, Secretary and Yell Leader shall be elected by secret ballot following nomination by petition. The signatures of ten percent (10%) of the regular members of the Associated Students being necessary to so nominate.

Section 2. The President, Vice-President and Secretary shall all be upper classmen and shall have been members of the Associated Students for two consecutive years.

Section 3. An election committee shall manage all regular and special elections. The Vice-President of the Associated Students shall be ex-officio chairman of the committee with the power of appointment of two other members.

Section 4. Only active members of the Associated Student body shall be permitted to vote at any election or meeting of the Associated Students.

Section 5. In the event that no candidate for an office shall receive a majority of the votes cast for that office, a special election shall be

held not more than a week following the regular election, at which time the office in question shall be filled from the two candidates who receive the highest number of votes in the regular election.

Section 6. In case an office shall become vacated, the Legislative Council shall select a substitute to fill the office until a special election is held, which shall be within a month of the vacancy.

Section 8. Senior, Junior and Sophomore class officers and council representatives shall be elected by secret ballot in their respective class elections in May. Freshman class officers and council representatives shall be elected in the month of September.

ARTICLE III. Duties and Powers of Officers

Section 1. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Associated Students. He shall be:

- a. Chairman of the Legislative Council
- b. A member of all committees and joint councils
- c. Empowered to appoint such committees as are required.
- d. Presented with his Associated Students membership each semester during his administration.

Section 2. The Vice-President shall perform the duties of the President in his absence and shall be chairman of the Election Committee.

Section 3. The Secretary shall:

- a. Keep in a proper book accurate records of all meetings of the Associated Students and the Legislative Council.
- b. Read same at next following meeting.
- c. Handle the correspondence of the Associated Students.
- d. Be custodian of its archives.
- e. Give due notification of all Associated Student meetings and Legislative Council meetings in El Gaucho, outlining the business to be discussed.
- f. Have a summary of all business transacted published in El Gaucho as well as a complete record on file in the office of the Associated Students.

Section 4. The Yell Leader shall select the song leaders and Pianist, with the approval of the Legislative Council. The Yell Leader shall choose his own assistants. The Yell Leader, Song Leaders, and Pianist shall perform their respective functions on all appropriate occasions.

Section 5. The Editor of El Gaucho and the Editor of La Cumbre shall edit and manage their respective publications subject to the approval of the Legislative Council and under the supervision of the Publication Board.

Section 6. The Comptroller of the Associated Students shall supervise collection, receipts, and expenditures of all monies of the Associated Students under the direction of the Legislative Council.

ARTICLE IV. Committees

Section 1. A. The following are the standing committees of the Associated Students:

- a. Finance Committee
- b. Welfare Committee
- c. Social Committee
- d. Rally Committee

B. The Chairmen of these committees shall be appointed by the President of the Associated Students with the exception of the Chairman of the Rally Committee, who shall be the head Yell Leader.

Section 2. All of the standing committees shall keep in record books furnished for the purpose accurate records of business transacted in all meetings. These record books shall be kept on file in the office of the Associated Students.

Section 3. Finance Committee:

- a. All matters pertaining to financial matters shall be referred to the Finance Committee for study and report. This committee shall supervise the expenditure of all budgeted monies and make such reports as are stipulated by the Legislative Council. This committee shall receive all requests for budgetary allotments, shall study all requests and recommend allotments to the Legislative Council for approval.
- b. The Finance Committee shall be composed of:

- 1) Chairman as provided for in Article IV, Section 1, B.
- 2) A student representative recommended by the Chairman and agreeable to the Legislative Council, who shall manage all ticket sales of the Associated Students.
- 3) President of the Associated Students.
- 4) Comptroller of the Associated Students.
- 5) A faculty representative appointed by the President of the College.

Section 4. Welfare Committee:

a. The Welfare Committee shall determine policies on extra-curricular activities, act as a judicial body in any such matters pertaining to the Associated Students as are brought before it for consideration, and act as a committee on tradition. Meetings of this committee shall be held monthly throughout the college year, the schedule to be made up at the first meeting. Special meetings may be called by the President of the Associated Students or any three members of the committee.

b. The Welfare Committee shall be composed of:

- 1) Chairman, as provided for in Article IV, Section 1, B.
- 2) Comptroller of the Associated Students.
- 3) President of the Associated Students.
- 4) Two faculty representatives appointed by the President of the College.
- 5) Two upper class students appointed by the President of the Associated Students with the approval of the Legislative Council.

Section 5. Social Committee:

a. The Social Committee shall direct all social activities of the Associated Students.

b. The Social Committee shall be composed of:

- 1) Chairman, as provided for in Article IV, Section 1, B.
- 2) Five student members appointed by the Chairman of the committee.
- 3) The Dean of Women and the Dean of Men as ex-officio members.

Section 6. Rally Committee:

a. The Rally Committee shall arrange and stimulate interest in all demonstrations, rallies, and other activities of a pep nature.

b. The Rally Committee shall be composed of:

- 1) The Head Yell Leader, as Chairman.
- 2) Song Leader and Pianist.
- 3) One representative from each class, elected in the May election.
- 4) One faculty representative chosen by the committee and agreeable to the President of the College.

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ARTICLE V.
Boards

Section 1. Inter-Collegiate Athletic Board:

a. The Inter-Collegiate Athletic Board shall:

- 1) Recommend athletic awards to the Legislative Council.
- 2) Keep an accurate record of all athletic insignia won and records made.
- 3) Foster proper conditions in athletic activities of the Associated Students.
- 4) Have charge of student athletic management system.

b. This Board shall be composed of:

- 1) The General Inter-Collegiate Athletic Manager, as Chairman.
- 2) Senior manager of each major sport.
- 3) One representative from the Block "S" Society.
- 4) Two members selected at large by the President of the Associated Students and approved by the Legislative Council. These two members shall be non-participants in inter-collegiate athletics, and not majors in Physical Education.
- 5) Comptroller of the Associated Students.
- 6) The head coach of each sport entered in inter-collegiate competition supported by Associated Students funds as ex-officio members without vote.

c. Senior Managers of each student supported inter-collegiate activity shall be determined by joint agreement of the outgoing manager of the activity, the coach of the activity, and the Comptroller of the Associated Students.

Section 2. Speech Arts Board:

a. The Board shall:

- 1) Recommend schedules.
- 2) Foster Dramatics, Debate and Oratory within the college.
- 3) Recommend awards.

b. The Speech Arts Board shall be composed of:

- 1) Manager of Speech Arts as Chairman.
- 2) A representative of the English Department chosen by the department faculty and agreeable to the President of the College.
- 3) One student recommended by the English Department Faculty and confirmed by the Legislative Council.
- 4) One member for each speech art active in the current year.

Section 3. Publications Board:

a. The Publications Board shall determine all matters of policy concerning the student publications. Recommend the Editors of El Gaucho and La Cumbre, recommend the publicity manager, and be the final authority on all matters pertaining to student publications. These publications shall include:

- 1) El Gaucho
- 2) La Cumbre
- 3) Handbook and Directory.

b. The Publications Board shall be composed of:

- 1) President of the Associated Students, as chairman.
- 2) President of the Senior class.
- 3) President of the Junior class.
- 4) Editors of El Gaucho and La Cumbre.
- 5) Head of the Print Shop.
- 6) Instructor in Journalism.
- 7) Head of the English Department.

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a. The Social Committee shall direct all social activities of the Associated Students.

b. The Social Committee shall be composed of:

- 1) Chairman, as provided for in Article IV, Section 1, B.
- 2) Five student members appointed by the Chairman of the committee.
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- 3) One representative from each class, elected in the May election.
- 4) One faculty representative chosen by the committee and agreeable to the President of the College.

8) A representative of the Faculty appointed by the President of the college.

ARTICLE VI.
Finance

Section 1. All Associated Students monies shall be allocated by the Legislative Council.

Section 2. Requests for budget allotments shall be made to the Legislative Council by the outgoing chairman or manager of the activity concerned after consultation with the faculty advisor or coach of that activity.

Section 3. The manager or chairman of the activity concerned shall be responsible to the Legislative Council for the proper expenditure of money provided and for keeping within budget allotments.

Section 4. All requests for purchases by the manager or chairman of any activity shall be made on the standard requisition form, provided by the Comptroller's office, signed by themselves and co-signed by the faculty representative or coach of the activity. This form shall then be presented to the Comptroller whose duty it shall be to see that it is a proper order and does not lead to an overdrawal of the budget allotment.

Section 5. All budgetary surpluses shall revert to the Associated Students Surplus Fund and allocation of such funds must have the approval of the Legislative Council.

Section 6. Deficits in any budget shall not be permitted without the official approval of the Finance Committee and authorization of the Legislative Council.

Section 7. An audit of the Associated Students books shall be made by a public accountant at least once a year. The cost of the audit shall be budgeted under Administration expenses.

ARTICLE VII.
Awards

Section 1. All Associated Students awards shall be made by the Legislative Council upon the proposal of the coach or faculty advisor and shall be on the basis of standards approved by the Council and on file in the office of the Associated Students.

Section 2. The Legislative Council may authorize the giving of special awards or other awards for exceptional meritorious service to the Associated Students. The character of the award shall be designated by the Legislative Council.

Section 3. The Legislative Council shall pass upon the character and specifications of all awards. The approved specifications shall be kept on file in the Associated Students Comptroller's office and shall be the guide for ordering all awards.

ARTICLE VIII.
Recall

Section 1. Upon the presentation to the secretary of the Associated Students of a petition signed by ten percent (10%) of the regular members of the Association, any student officer may be subject to recall.

Section 2. A recall election shall be conducted in the same manner as a regular election and shall be held within ten days of the presentation of the petition.

Section 3. It shall be necessary for a two-thirds majority of all the votes cast to constitute a legal recall.

Section 4. Class officers are subject to recall in the same manner, by the class which elects them.

Section 5. An appointive officer or student manager may be recalled by a two-thirds vote of the Legislative Council.

ARTICLE IX.
Amendment to By-Laws

Section 1. These By-Laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any student body meeting, provided that the signed proposal is posted at least one week in advance and is published in full in El Gaucho. Such an amendment shall upon recommendation of the Legislative Council be presented to the Associated Students in writing and published not less than a week previous.
