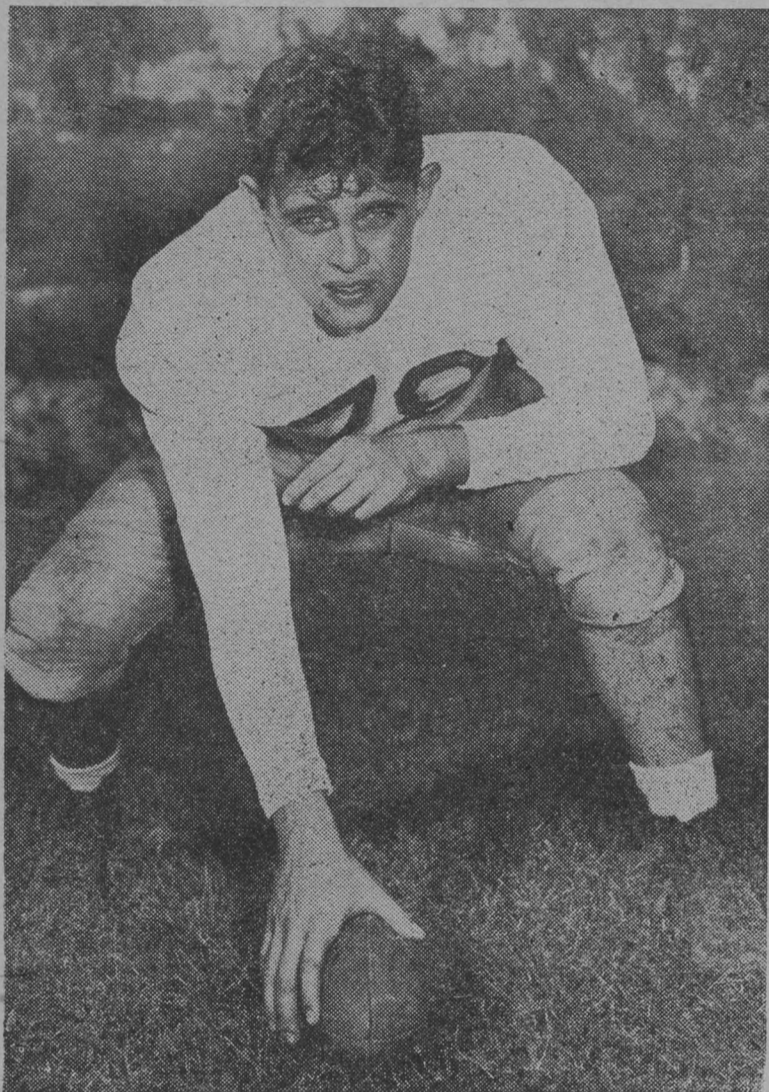

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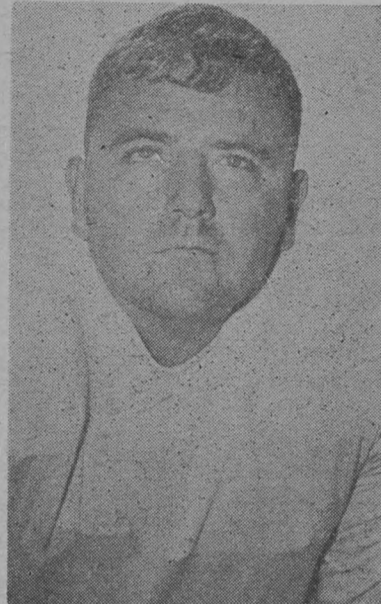

8 Gridders to Trade Pigskin for Diploma

This year's highly successful Gaucho grid squad finds itself facing the loss of eight of its members through graduation. The absence of every one of these men will be felt next season when Coach Stan Williamson begins to look over the new aggregation.

Heading the list is 6'4" George Anderson, who gave support to the left end spot. A returning letterman who served his pigskin apprenticeship at George Washington High in Los Angeles, Anderson has been one of the team's most dependable men.

Bob Bowman, stellar right tackle, will be another man sorely missed. Bowman began his football career at our own Santa Barbara High and then added to his experience at Oregon State and at Oberlin College only to stray back to his own neck of the woods, where Gaucho grid mentors soon put his talents to good use. He saw plenty of action this season, and there was, doubtless, more than one opposing back who wished that the jersey bearing the numeral 87 had not been on the other side of the line.

All-CCAA Center
A man who suffered bad luck all season was last year's first string, all-CCAA center, John Daniels. Daniels, one of the outstanding men on the squad, was all-league center at Long Beach High before his enrollment at University of Oregon where he earned his first college letter. Injuries haunted him all through the season; in the C. O. P. tilt Lady Luck really turned against him, and he emerged from the game with a badly injured wrist. In spite of these misfortunes, however, Daniels turned in an excellent performance.

Michigan Invited to Train Here for Rose Bowl Game

The Michigan Wolverines have been invited to use Santa Barbara College athletic facilities for last-minute training for their expected Rose Bowl appearance on New Year's day.

The invitation was wired to Coach Fritz Chrisler and his hard-hitting squad by the manager of the Santa Barbara Chamber of Commerce, after Provost J. Harold Williams and Athletic Director "Spud" Harder had extended all Gaucho football facilities to the team which, having defeated all Big Nine competition, will logically be named to meet the West Coast champions.

The Michigan coach has said that he does not want to train in Pasadena, location of the Rose Bowl.

Another graduating gridder is shifty Max Diamond, a two-year letterman. He is noted for his ability to take advantage of a quick-opening play, and once in the clear, he is a little harder to catch than a jack rabbit. During his three years as wingback for the Gauchos, Diamond has caused heads of the opposition to turn white with his versatile jaunts.

Capable Halfback
Right half Delmar Holloway, a product of Arroyo Grande High School and Santa Monica J.C., has had only one season with the Gauchos, but during this brief time he has proved himself to be very capable in performing the halfback assignments.

Tackle's Share
Before coming to Santa Barbara, Gordon Sheldon lettered at Poly High in Los Angeles, and at

Jack Miller, co-captain of the team, has been a stalwart of the Gaucho lineup for the last two years. One of the nation's leading punters last year, Miller is the team's most consistent player. His fine punting has, more than once, pulled Santa Barbara's eleven out of a tight spot, and his jarring line plunging has set up many a score. It will be no easy matter to find a suitable replacement for Captain Miller.

Before coming to Santa Barbara, Gordon Sheldon lettered at Poly High in Los Angeles, and at

Traditional Rivals to Meet In 1947 Football Wind-Up

The traditional rivalry between the Santa Barbara College Gaucho and the San Diego State Aztecs will be renewed for the 17th time this Saturday when the Gaucho squad, accompanied by hundreds of fans, travels south to battle the Aztecs on their home grounds. The contest will close the 1947 football season for Santa Barbara College.

Train, Caravan to Descend on Dago

All indications point to a record on-to-San-Diego Gaucho Rooters' train ticket sale. With Quad sales near the 200 mark, and the Santa Fe ticket office in the Carrillo Hotel prepared for a last-minute rush next Friday, Santa Barbara college will be well represented at the "grudge" game November 29, and San Diego will meet with some strong yell competition.

In addition to the Rooters' Special, a large car caravan captained by Cal Reynolds will rendezvous directly opposite Camp Mathews just beyond Five Points, about 30 miles north of San Diego, and proceed to meet the train and then to a downtown rally.

The rally, to be held with Aztec rooters, in the vicinity of the San Diego train station, was announced by the Rally Committee last Tuesday afternoon. The car caravan will join the Rooters' Train migrants at 4 p.m.

Students planning to travel by private car in the caravan are urged to decorate their automobiles. A prize for the most attractively festooned car will be awarded during the half-time period.

Maps and posters on campus this week will outline the best automobile route to San Diego, to the rally, and to the game.

Game plans include a seven-minute Gaucho half-time show, in which campus talent will present a series of spectacular stunts. The college band, which plans to travel by bus, will be on hand. Blue and gold "beanies" (on sale at the Graduate Manager's office) should be worn gold side out by all Gaucho rooters.

'Inquiring Mind' Radio Show Features SBC Faculty, Students

In an effort to acquaint the public with the work of the various departments, Santa Barbara College is sponsoring a series of 14 radio programs heard on station KTMS, Monday evenings at 8:30 p.m. The series is called "The Inquiring Mind."

The program is conducted in round-table fashion, presenting each week a representative faculty member discussing with three students the particular objective of his department. A moderator assists in some cases.

Six programs have already been given, those remaining are December 1, Dr. Elmer Noble, biological science; December 8, Dr. Robert Beachboard, foreign languages; December 15, Dr. Gwynne Nettler, social science; December 22, Dr. Schofield, industrial education; January 5, Mr. Theodore Hatlen, speech; January 12, Col. McKee, military training; January 19, Dr. Jacob Hansen, art; January 26, Dr. William E. Hayes, education and psychology.

The rivalry between the two schools, both members of the CC-AA, dates back to 1923. Since then Santa Barbara has won only three games from the Aztecs, lost 12 and tied one. This year's Gaucho squad, having played some very fancy football, has high hopes of evening up the score a little.

The Aztec tally-sheet this season sounds almost like that of Santa Barbara. They have had an equally good season, winning three, losing two, and tying one. They held College of Pacific to only 13 points, but were unable to tally themselves. This would show them to be better on the defense than the offense. However, they next lost to San Jose 32 to 7.

Rock of Gibraltar

Although comparative scores are as a rule inconsistent in proving the merit of a football squad, the Aztec lineup gives ample proof of their strength. They have a well-rounded backfield and a large, powerful line led by former All-American George Brown. Brown, a veritable Rock of Gibraltar at guard, gained All-America recognition at Annapolis in 1943 where he captained the strong "Middie" squad. His running mate at left guard will be Keith Curry, one of San Diego's more consistent players, while at the center spot will be George Coleman, who played a whale of a game, last year, for the Aztecs' frosh team.

At tackle, a couple of 220 pounders, Tom Dahms and Jim Boles, should be potent threats, especially with the assistance provided by the ends, Dick Adair of San Bernardino P. C. fame, and Bob Rogers, a Los Angeles Dorsey High boy.

Country Mile Passer

San Diego's backfield boasts of one Bob Tomlinson, who has an average of 8.35 yards gained rushing from his left-half position, and of a right-half back, John Simcon, who has tallied in every Aztec game but two. Simcon, incidentally, alternates at quarterback and has an enviable passing record. However, Art Filson, a boy with an arm trained to throw the pigskin a "country mile," will probably start at the "brains" position with Simcon filling his usual right-wing back spot.

Fullback will no doubt be played by Dick Simmons, who also does

A "Hen Party" assembly, sponsored by the Associated Women Students, under the direction of president Willie Wigger, will be held Tuesday night, December 9, at 7:30 p.m., in the campus auditorium. Admission is free to all campus co-eds and the affair is for women only.

Cup Presentation

Entertainment will include skits, musical renditions by several groups, and an introduction to the famous Bloomer Girls by a well-known speaker, according to Connie Peugh and Shirley Wolfe, who are handling publicity details. A highlight of the program will be the presentation of the Panhellenic Scholarship Cup to the sorority with the highest grade average for last year.

June Rice is general chairman of the event, and assisting her are Barbara Abbott, refreshments; Marge Mayers, props and technicians; Key and Scroll, serving; Las Espuelas, ushering; and WAA, clean-up.

Change in Location

The San Diego-UCSBC game will be held in Balboa Stadium, not the San Diego college bowl as originally scheduled. The Balboa Stadium is located in town.

Game time will be Saturday the 29th at 8:00 as originally announced. A 750-seat Gaucho rooting section, section 8, has been reserved between the 30 and 40 yard lines, and students are asked to enter the West and Southwest gates, the only gates where student body cards will be honored.

Drive for \$500 for Friendship Train On Campus Tomorrow

A campaign to raise \$500 for the Friendship Train will be conducted on both campuses all day tomorrow. Collections will be forwarded by check to Mayor O'Dwyer of New York City for delivery to officials of the Train which reached that city last week with food for Europe.

Under the slogan, "Catch a plane for the Friendship Train," the drive is the second on the Gaucho campus. The first was a last-minute affair, however, with little or no publicity, and most students had no opportunity to contribute to the project which has taken the country by storm. Among those who took part in the first drive were Chi Delts, Alpha Theta Chi, AWS and AMS, each contributing \$5 from their treasuries. AWS also gave a sack of flour, and \$22 was collected in the cafeteria.

The Friendship Train, after a highly successful trip across the country, arrived in New York with over 200 carloads of food and provisions for the hungry peoples overseas. Even while the initial cargo is being loaded on ships, additional carloads are still coming in from all parts of the country.

Members of Key and Scroll and Las Espuelas will conduct the drive on the Riviera campus, and Alpha Phi Omega will make collections on the Mesa. Goal of the campaign is 75 cents per student.

The German masterpiece is the story of a man who searches for a lifetime to find a meaning for life that will satisfy his inquiring mind. Discouraged, he bargains with the devil, promising to trade his soul for a supreme moment of happiness in which his mind can have peace. The remainder of the story deals with how Faust eventually finds satisfaction in life, and the devil fails to collect his bargain.

"Faust" is the embodiment of the modern spirit of inquiry into what makes life meaningful. The first book deals with inquiry on the part of the individual; the second is concerned with the world's search for happiness.

Next Tuesday Gauchos will go to the polls to decide whether the fee for membership in Associated Students shall be boosted from \$7.50 to \$10.00. Since the fee is compulsory and collectible at the time of registration, a favorable vote means an extra \$2.50 out of everybody's pocket.

But let's face it, comrades: we, the Associated Students, need that extra money in the treasury. A look at all the increased costs that must be met with Associated Student funds brings home the hard fact that we are operating on a frazzled shoestring.

The \$7.50 dues were fixed back in the happy days of 1938, when there was ten-cent beer. Since then, it is true, student enrollment has increased; but that means more people to spend money on, and prices have doubled, tripled, quadrupled. Bill Russell recites doleful figures at the drop of a "beanie": football socks up from 50 cents to \$1.50 a pair; football shoes from \$7.50 to \$15.00; dance halls from \$50 to over \$100; *El Gaucho* from \$50 an issue to \$110.

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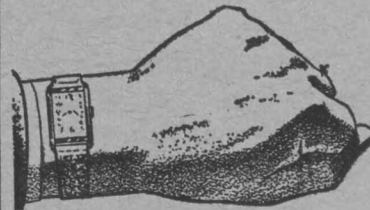
