Master of Ceremonies is Jim Scott who has done considerable drama work including summer theatre at Alhacama and the Roadrunner Revue in the spring of last year.

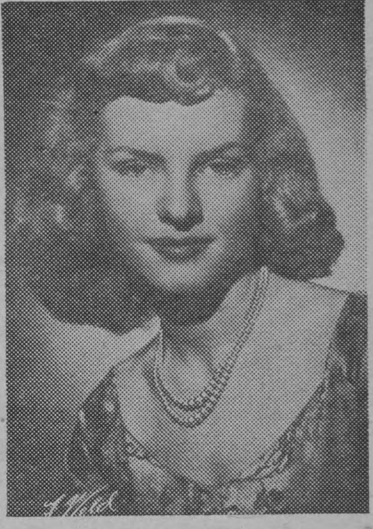
Quick sale of the remaining tickets is expected in view of the popularity of this show as an annual event. Tickets are 60 cents student price and 90 cents reserved.

Twenty Seven Floats Entered in Parade; Huge Crowd Expected

"This year's Homecoming parade will be bigger and better than ever before," according to Beverly Purdum and Ken Trevey, co-chairmen of Homecoming. The show rolls down State Street from East Haley at 2:30 tomorrow.

Floats representing "the campus with the CAL-ossal future" are being rushed to completion in strict secrecy by twenty-seven organizations. A dozen convertibles will transport key dignitaries before an expected crowd of 20,000 students and townspeople.

Employees to Give New S.B. Fight Song Address Changes Will Be Introduced at Gaucho-Wave Game

L. N. Jacobs, Senior Accountant, has issued an urgent request for all persons employed by the University who have had a change of name or address during the past year to fill out Form No. 2194 within the next few weeks.

This applies to students, as well as academic and non-academic personnel, on the University payroll.

Jacobs explained that the filling out of this form is necessary so that the proper name and address may be shown on all Withholding Tax Receipts, issued in January for income tax purposes.

The forms may be obtained from the chairman of the department in which a person is employed.

Unless this form is completed, Jacobs said, persons concerned may not receive their withholding tax receipts at all or only after considerable delay.

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Gov't. Foreign Scholarships Available; Should Apply Now

Government scholarship awards provided by the Fulbright Act are available for graduate study in 11 foreign countries, it was announced today.

Dean Helen E. Sweet, secretary of the Committee on Honors and Scholarships at Santa Barbara College of the University of California, stated that students wishing to compete for the 1950-51 scholarships must file their applications by December 1 at 104 Administration Building. She urged interested students to start preparing their papers now. Application forms and additional information may also be obtained at this office.

Candidates who are not presently enrolled in college may apply directly to the Institute of International Education, 2 West 45th Street, New York 19, N. Y., according to an announcement by the Department of State.

This is the second year in which American graduate students will get a chance to compete for these awards, which provide travel, tuition, and maintenance for study abroad for one academic year.

The countries in which the graduate study may be taken for the 1950-51 academic year are the United Kingdom (Great Britain, Northern Ireland, British Colonial Dependencies), Belgium, Burma, Netherlands, Philippines, Greece, New Zealand, France, Italy, Iran, and Norway.

To be eligible a candidate must be an American citizen, have a college degree or its equivalent by the time he takes up his award, and know the language of the country sufficiently to carry on his studies abroad.

For students who will be en-

rolled in Santa Barbara College for 1950-51, Dean Sweet stated, scholarship applications should be filed not later than March 1, 1950. Application forms for this purpose may be obtained after November 15.

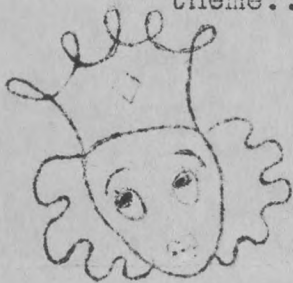

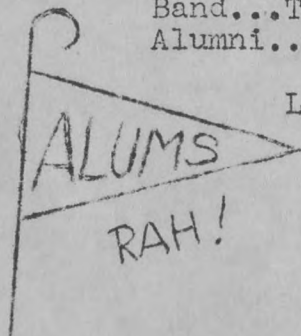

Stunt Day Shows Campaign Technique, Competitive Spirit

Events of Homecoming Week took a spirited step Tuesday with a "Stunt Day" for the ten Santa Barbara College Homecoming Queen candidates. It was a golden opportunity for the campaign managers to bring out original ideas—and they did.

A Shetland pony, well decorated, was led around the campus during the day. Most of the students patted her nose and found out her name was "Trixie."

Between classes a puppet show was given through holes cut in a sheet and attracted a great deal of attention.

Floating over the campus was a balloon advertising one of the hopeful candidates and there were a multitude of small balloons about the campus. Candy was given away by costumed young ladies and assorted masks and hill-billy costumes were worn by one group of campaigners.

Many students were wearing signs and posters and dressed in various costumes to catch the attention of the male student body. Small vocal groups sang the praises of their mandate while instrumental groups paraded under banners.

It was hard to say whether the day was more like a political convention, a carnival or Halloween.

Wednesday the campus men cast their votes. The results of this election will be revealed at the Galloping Gaucho Revue tonight in the Riviera Campus Auditorium.

U.S. Professional Theater Declining Asserts Ted Hatlen

The professional theater in America is declining. Fewer productions are tried each year, and the road show has nearly disappeared.

One possible hope lies in the college and university theater which, freed from the necessity of box-office appeal, can give new plays and playwrights a chance.

These views were expressed recently by Theodore Hatlen in a lecture on the campus.

Hatlen, chairman of the Speech Department, spoke on "Drama in the Modern Theater." His lecture was another in the All-College series sponsored by the Committee on Drama, Lectures, and Music.

He pointed out that the development of drama in any period is closely bound up with the development of the theater. Playwrights need a place where their works may be seen and heard.

One of the primary forces which regenerated the art of art of playwriting, Hatlen asserted, "was the establishment of independent theaters in Europe at the end of the 19th century. The commercial theater had stagnated and was no longer open to new plays and new ideas. Hence a number of independent theaters sprang up which were open for experimentation."

Referring to the present decline in the professional theater, Hatlen said that it is becoming more difficult for the playwright to have his works produced. This problem cannot be solved easily, he added, since the costs of production are difficult to reduce. Some other experimental theater must be established to give the playwright a chance.

The speaker then turned to the college and university theater as a possible solution, after pointing out that the community and civic theaters have failed to develop new playwrights.

Unless the spirit of the independent theaters can be revived, he warned, the progress of contemporary drama during the past three quarters of a century seems threatened.

STAGE DROPS TO BE INNOVATION IN "OF THEE I SING" PRODUCTION

Stage drops will be used for the first time on the Riviera Auditorium stage in the forthcoming presentation of the Gershwin musical, "Of Thee I Sing," December 7th through 10th, according to Mr. Robert L. Clark, whose stagecraft class is constructing the sets.

The sets will be a combination of draperies and drops representing the Capitol steps, the Yellow Room of the White House, the outside of Madison Square Garden, and the Atlantic City Boardwalk.

Wally Jonason, an art major, is designing the entire scenery, and Clark's class is at work building the sets. One drop has been entirely painted and two other drops are ready to be painted. Clark estimated that it will take at least fifteen hundred man hours to complete the sets.

Due to the lack of height above the stage, one of the drops will be

a trip drop. Also, in order to save expense, another drop will be painted on both sides, added Clark.

The stagecraft class is also constructing part of the props, including twelve senatorial desks and the desks for the President and Mrs. President. It will be necessary to borrow most of the other props, however.

Enrollment Same Over University; Slight Drop Here

Although enrollment decreased this fall, as it did at Berkeley and Riverside, statewide enrollment for the University of California remained almost identical with that of last year.

This was revealed in figures released today by President Robert G. Sproul. Final total registration was 43,426—two more than last year.

Total veteran registration fell off by 14.1 percent on all campuses. The figure was 16,957 as against 19,736 veterans for last year.

Final registration figures for Santa Barbara College showed a total of 2328 this year compared to 2507 last year. The present enrollment includes 909 veterans as compared to 1077 in the spring semester.

There was a decrease in undergraduate enrollment on all campuses with the exception of Davis. All campuses offering graduate work reported significant increases in graduate student enrollments over last fall.

Enrollments other than Santa Barbara are as follows:

Berkeley 22,681, as against 23,145 last year; Los Angeles 14,995, as against 14,570 last year; Davis 1,723, as against 1,655 last year; San Francisco 1,861, as against 1,656 last year; La Jolla, Mr. Hamilton, and Riverside combined had 50 students as against 52 last year.

Band Does Good Job Over Weekend Had Full Schedule

Our mighty Gaucho band was, as you all noticed, in fine shape at the All-Cal Week-end. Their activities were, to say the least, one of the greatest factors in putting the week-end over with a large bang. On Friday the band took part in the coronation ceremony held in the morning. In the afternoon, they had a mass rehearsal with the other Cal bands. Then in the evening, our band marched in the Parade and later participated in the Rally.

Saturday, the Gaucho band opened the game by forming HI, they then played a Howdy song. Later, our versatile band formed a windmill, signifying Cal Aggies and played the Aggies' fight song. The most fabulous stunt performed was the Mission formation, which the band's leader, Hank Use, hopes will be traditionalized by the band. While the band formed the Mission, the Glee Club sang "Romano." The Gaucho fight song was then played, and the band marched off the field.

During the afternoon half-time, our band participated with Cal, U. C. L. A., and Davis. Our band spelled out the words "All-U," then in fitting with the theme of the week-end, they spelled out "U-All."

This is just a brief resume of the major part of the band's activities during those two days. We Gauchos have a band to be well proud of, let's always back them up as we did this week-end!

Deadline for filing application to take Federal Civil Service examinations as described by federal representatives on campus last week, is November 8. Announcements, applications, and sample questions are available at the Registrar's office. Competitive exams will be given for Junior Professional Assistant, Junior Agricultural Assistant, and Junior Management Assistant.

All homecoming parade floats will be on display at La Playa Field during the entire evening for observation. The police department requests, however, that observers stay away from the far side of the field, where the floats will be parked, until after the game. The lights will remain on for half an hour after the game for observers to examine the floats first-hand.

Any float chairmen who desire to leave their floats at La Playa overnight may move them out Sunday morning between 10 and 11 a. m., at which time the field's gate will be open.

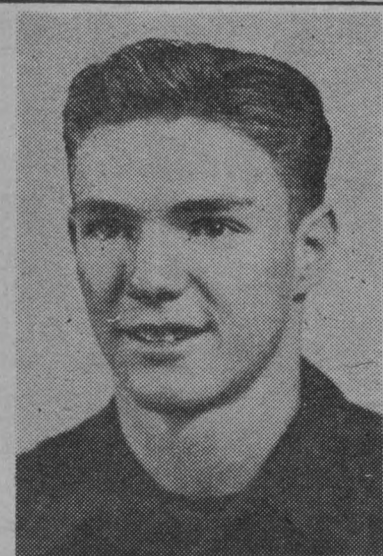

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More Women Among Frosh; Tide Turning?

While men students still outnumber the women at Santa Barbara College of the University of California, figures compiled by Registrar Jerry H. Clark indicate that the tide has turned. In a few years the picture may be reversed. The total enrollment of 2328 this semester includes 1329 men and 999 women, but a glance at the freshman class figures shows 264 co-eds as against 124 men. In the sophomore class the females run a close second—219, compared with 230 male students. The juniors have 384 men and 234 women, while in the senior class there are 533 men and 259 women. Of the postgraduates and special students, 58 are men and 23 are women.

Listed by the department in which their major fields of study are, the undergraduate students are distributed as follows:

Docter Wakes Nostalgic Over Homecoming; Recalls Defeats

"In the present task of reconstructing Germany and re-educating the German people the exploitation of the best in their own traditions should be a primary factor."

So declared Dr. Rolf N. Linn, instructor of German at Santa Barbara College of the University of California, in a lecture last night at the Alhecama Theater.

He spoke on "Goethe and the Dignity of Man." It was the second lecture in a series on the Ideas of the Age of Goethe sponsored by the University of California Extension in cooperation with several departments of Santa Barbara College.

Dr. Linn asserted that Germany has a tradition in its own historical and literary background thru which may be re-established the dignity of the individual and a philosophy of tolerance. This tradition was exemplified by Goethe's life and works.

Dr. Linn traced briefly the German literary development from the Renaissance to the time of Goethe. He also reviewed the more important events and achievements in Goethe's life. Giving special emphasis to the classical period, the speaker referred to Goethe as "the outstanding figure of German classicism."

The series will be continued on November 10, when Dr. Elliot Evans, chairman of the Art Department at Santa Barbara College, will speak on "Art in the Time of Goethe."

"Rolling Home to Harvest Homecoming" was the slogan of the 1947 festivities. The speech department had just presented "Joan of Lorraine" starring Maggie Wheeler, when Homecoming stole the spotlight. Barbara Balthis emerged victorious from a field of nine lovelies.

Sigma Phi Epsilon took highest honors in the parade with their float depicting a Gaucho "Rolling Home to Harvest" on a surf board. I hate to mention it, but we lost the Homecoming game to Cal Poly 44-19.

Three years ago when long skirts looked ridiculous and we were just getting used to being part of the University system, Marilyn "Mike" Melvin was elected queen. Billie Mitchell and Margaret Monahan were princesses.

I hate to admit that we've lost so many Homecoming games, but we dropped the 1946 contest 9-7 to a fast, hard-hitting aggregation from San Diego State.

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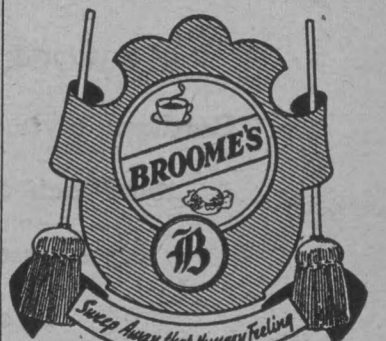

Gauchos Overpower Aggies, 40-6, for Season's Second Win; Cal Dumps UCLA

The Civil War in the Coliseum last Saturday ended up all even as California whipped their southern brothers at UCLA to the tune of 35-21, and Santa Barbara countered with an inspiring 40-6 triumph over their northern rival, Davis, for their second win of the year.

Clyde Francisco pounced on a Davis fumble shortly after the 11 a. m. kickoff and six plays later Rollie Brice was in the enemy end zone and the Gauchos were enjoying a 7-0 lead they never relinquished.

Scoring almost at will against a team that had won three straight games and was a slight pre-game favorite, the Gaucho machine rolled for two scores in each of the first, second, and fourth periods as it ran up the largest tally since the Shrine Bowl game last December.

Dick Gorrie sparked the offense by tossing three touchdown passes, one to Tom Kelley, one to Ron

Ternquist, and another to LeRoy Criss. Kelley scored his T.D. after Wawne Templeton recovered another Aggie fumble on their own 36. Gorrie threw one incomplete pass, then hit Kelley for six points and the Gauchos had themselves a 13-0 lead with only six minutes gone in the ball game. Criss made one of his famous glue-fingered catches in the end zone early in the second quarter on a 19-yard, fourth-down pass from Gorrie after a Gaucho drive had nearly run out of gas.

Glenn Mullaney engineered the next score, starting from midfield shortly before the half. Mullaney faked beautifully into the line, then pitched out to Ternquist who ran down the south sidelines all the way to the 8, from where Ivan Johnson, on the same play around the end, plunged into the end zone. Francisco converted for the third time and the Gauchos led 27-0.

Big Bill Starkey got one of a linesman's infrequent scoring thrills when he intercepted a pass on the Aggie 16 and ran over unmolested as the fourth quarter started. The last Gaucho score was possibly the most deceptive and cleverly executed score of the game. Gorrie faded to throw, Ternquist darted down-field, slowed up and faked to the left, then streaked down the north sidelines to take Gorrie's pass under full throttle on the 5, dragging the Aggie defender with him into the end zone.

Cage Men Prep for Oxy Opener Nov. 26

Coach Willie Wilton sent his 30-odd casabamen through a stiff scrimmage last Tuesday as he prepared to step up basketball practice from a four-a-week to a five-a-week schedule starting next Monday.

The Gaucho cagers must smooth out the rough edges in preparation for their first game of the season on November 26, at which time they travel to Ventura to meet the Occidental Tigers on a neutral court.

After this opener, the squad will set their sights toward copping the annual Redlands University Tourney held on December 1, 2 and 3 at Redlands. If the Gauchos can win this event, they will be assured a berth in the Los Angeles Invitational Basketball Tournament slated for the Christmas holidays. This is one of the most important events of the year for California basketball, and the tourney always draws a half dozen of the best teams from out of state along with several more California fives. The Olympic Auditorium is the site of the program.

Jack Moore and Hudson Scott, two guards returning from last year's squad which finished second in the 2C2A, have not come out for practice as yet but are expected to be on call by the end of football season. Moore will attempt to fill the shoes of All-Conference Quentin Sims.

Otey Scruggs, who participated on the Santa Barbara Retreads Recreational League team last winter, is expected to give the Gauchos some much-needed help with his valuable experience. Otey's team won the City League title. Also new this season but an old hand around the college campus is Bill Kelso, golfer, and freshman basketball player from Kansas State University. He is trying out for the guard position, which is the most deeply contested position on the squad.

Outstanding among the transfer students are Don Bradshaw and Tom Moss, both from Pasadena C. C. Bradshaw is a forward and Moss a center. Bob McCutcheon and Gene Snyder, last year's are forwards, are expected to alternate at the center slot to make up for the loss of Harvey Hubler and Frank Schimandle.

Returning men at the forward spot are Patty Hill, Jim Schleuter, Bert Guiness, Jack Aldrich, and Bernie Fox, clue man.

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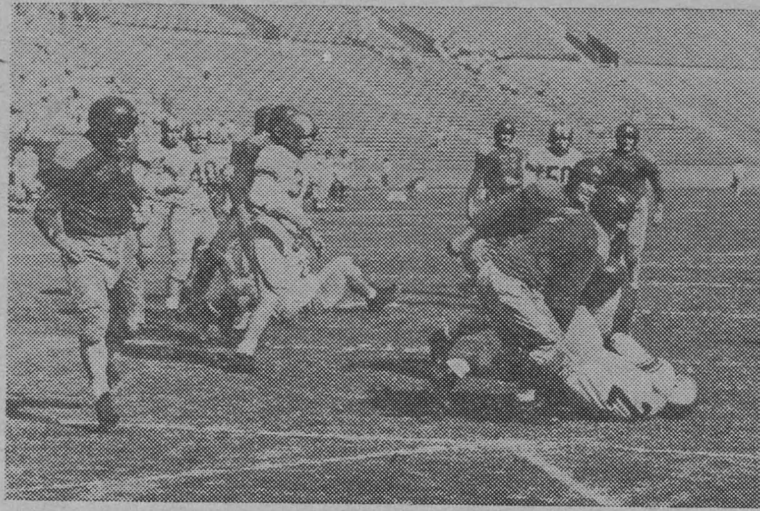
S.B. Harriers Lose; Face Waves Next

In what promises to be another even-steven football tilt, Santa Barbara's Gauchos play host to Pepperdine College in the homecoming game of the year tomorrow night at La Playa Field. Kickoff time is set for 8:15.

This will be the Waves' first appearance against the Santa Barbarans. Although Pepperdine is a new candidate for the CCAA conference, they will not be admitted as regular members to the gridiron loop until next year, since they couldn't schedule enough games with 2C2A teams this season.

Waves Also After Third

Coach Ray Richards will field a team that has two wins in five starts to date on their ledger. They sport wins over Arizona State at Flagstaff, and the University of Portland. Pepperdine has lost three games to Arizona State of Tempe, San Diego State, and San Jose.

Sparking the Pepperdine offense is their leading aerial artist, Ed Hyduke. Hyduke has completed 29 passes out of 62 attempts for 398 yards and 6 touchdowns. Fullback Dick Meltvedt powers the Waves on the ground with his adeptness as a shifty fullback. Meltvedt has an average of seven yards per carry.

Pass receivers are plentiful in the Pepperdine camp, with Left Half Bobby Hayes, Left End Pat Murphy, and Right End Bill Hicks all snagging plenty of pitches for long yardage gains. Over half of Pepperdine's tallies are via the air lanes, so tomorrow's tussle should prived fans with a wide-open game.

ing the right guard's boots. Bob Quine and Martin Cook play a couple of tackles and tip the scales at well over 200 pounds. Center Bill Scott is a 195-pound sophomore from Redlands.

Kelley vs. Bell

Like Santa Barbara's Tom Kelley, Richards keeps his ace-in-the-hole, diminutive scatback, Terry Bell, on reserve call. Bell pulled games out of the fore more than once for the Orange and Blue last year.

Due to injury trouble in the Gaucho backfield, Dick Johnson has been moved to spell injured Russ Bertell at right half. This move will necessitate starting Tom Kelley at Johnson's previous position of left halfback. Don Fredrickson has been changed from defensive halfback to offensive fullback. Don Casida, who sustained an injury in the two-week-old San Jose tilt, is still sidelined. Fullback Gibby Dear, who has continued to look better and better all season, played his best game of the year against the Cal Aggies. But "injuries" hit Dear in the form of an injured leg muscle and he will probably have to sit out this week's game. Bill French is also out with a wrenched knee.

Looking on the bright side of things finds Head Coach Roy Engle fully recovered from his case of the flu, and a 40-6 score over the Cal Aggies to back the Gauchos at La Playa tomorrow night. Engle is hoping for additional fine performances from Dick Gorrie's passing arm, and from Ron Ternquist, who also did a fine job in packing the pigskin for S. B. last Saturday.

Other creditable performances from last week's game were linemen Wayne Templeton, Gene Bynum, and Fred Lloyd.
