

# Gov't. Foreign Scholarships Available; Should Apply Now

provided by the Fulbright Act are for 1950-51, Dean Sweet stated, available for graduate study in 11 scholarship applications should be foreign countries, it was announc- filed not later than March 1, 1950.

Dean Helen E. Sweet, secretary of the Committee on Honors and Scholarships at Santa Barbara College of the University of California, stated that students wishing to compete for the 1950-51 scholar-ships must file their applications by December 1 at 104 Administration Building. She urged interested students to start preparing their papers now. Application forms and additional information may also be obtained at thi soffice.

Candidates who are not presently enrolled in college may apply directly to the Institute of International Education, 2 West 45th Street, New York 19, N. Y., according to an announcement by the Department of State.

This is the second year in which American graduate students will get a chance to compete for these awards, which provide travel, tuition, and maintenance for study abroad for one academic year.

The countries in which the graduate study may be taken for the 1950-51 academic year are the United Kingdom (Great Britain, Northern Ireland, British Colonial Dependencies), Belgium, Burma, Netherlands, Philippines, Greece, New Zealand, France, Italy, Iran, and Norway.

To be eligible a candidate must be an American citizen, have a college degree or its equivalent by the time he takes up his award, and know the language of the country sufficiently to carry on his studies abroad.

## **U.S. Professional Theater Declining Asserts Ted Hatlen**

The professional theater in America is declining. Fewer productions are tried each year, and the road show has nearly disappeared.

college and university theater class is constructing the sets. which, freed from the necessity of box-office appeal, can give new plays and playwrights a chance.

These views were expressed recently by Theodore Hatlen in a lecture on the campus.

Hatlen, chairman of the Speech and the Atlantic City Boardwal. Department, spoke on "Drama in the Modern Theater." His lecture designing the entire scenery, and another in the All-College se ries sponsored by the Committee on Drama, Lectures, and Music.

He pointed out that the development of drama in any period is closely bound up with the development of the theater. Playwrights need a place where their works may be seen and heard.

One of the primary forces which regenerated the art of art of playwriting, Hatlen asserted, "was the establishment of independent theaters in Europe at the end of the 19th century. The commercial theater had stagnated and was no longer open to new plays and new ideas. Hence a number of independent theaters sprang up which were open for experimentation."

Referring to the present decline in the professional theater, Hatlen said that it is becoming more difficult for the playwright to have his works produced. This problem cannot be solved easily, he added, since the costs of production are difficult to reduce. Some other experimental theater must be established to give the playwright a

The speaker then turned to the college and university theater as a possible solution, after pointing out that the community and civic theaters have failed to develop new playwrights.

Unless the spirit of the independent theaters can be revived, he warned, the progress of contemporary drama during the past three quarters of a century seems threat-





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
