Gauchos' Weekend Spoiled By #5 Pacific and #6 Long Beach

The #8 UCSB women's volleyball team exhibited flashes of brilliance and showed that it is a team to contend with in matches with #5 University of the Pacific and #6 Long Beach State this past weekend in Thunderdome. the However, the Gauchos ultimately came up short against the two powerhouses, losing both matches

In Friday's contest with Pacific (22-2 overall, 12-1 in the Big West), the Gauchos (20-5, 10-4) were able to go the distance with the Tigers as the teams battled through a five-game Tiger victory, 2-15, 15-5, 15-7, 9-15, 11-15.

"Our tempo just wasn't there tonight," UCSB Head Coach Kathy Gregory said. "By the end of the match, they were better than us offensively. Our serving wasn't good enough and their defense was outstanding."

After a dismal game one for UCSB, in which it hit a paltry .041 to the Tigers' .395 hitting percentage, the Gauchos stormed back in the second and third games. In game two, the Gauchos ran out to a 7-0 lead behind the serving of senior outside hitter Roberta Gehlke, who swung for a team-high 21 kills, and sophomore setter Brooke Rundle, who

digs. UCSB led by as much as 13-3 before finally ending the game 15-5 on a Gehlke kill. Game three was a closer affair as the Tigers got as close as 13-7, but the Gauchos out-hit Pacific .304 to .143 and ended the game 15-7 on a kill by Michelle Christ. The senior middle blocker recorded 13 kills while hitting at a .409 clip.

With the Gauchos up two games to one heading into the fourth frame, it seemed as if they had the Tigers by the tail. Ahead 4-0 in game four, however, things went downhill for UCSB and it ended up losing 15-9.

"Our communication kind of broke down," said freshman outside hitter Brooke Niles, who contributed 12 kills and nine digs. "We were ahead 4-0, so I think we may have gotten a little bit ahead of ourselves. We just couldn't finish the game."

In the thrilling, rallyscored final game, the Gauchos were down 4-1 before climbing back to within a point, with the help of two Gehlke kills. UCSB was down 12-9 but scored twice more with another Gehlke kill and a block by senior outside hitter Charlene Conley and sophomore middle blocker Jutta Weissenborn. But that was as close as UCSB would get, losing the game and the match 15-11.

Following the pre-game ceremony Saturday to honor and retire Gehlke's

recorded 64 assists and 15 No. 6 jersey, the Gauchos were able to take game one from Long Beach State 15-11, in contrast to the game-one loss to Pacific the night before. Although Santa Barbara stayed close with the 49ers (21-2, 13-1) throughout the four-game match, the Gauchos just didn't have enough firepower to take down the Beach, as five of Long Beach's hitters recorded double-digit kills in the 15-11, 13-15, 11-15, 4-15 49er victory.

> "They were just too good of a physical team," Gregory said. "I thought we had enough emotion tonight, but we just didn't have enough energy."

The Gauchos were again led by Gehlke, whose match-high 32 kills put her over the 2,000-kill mark with 2,019 career kills — a Gaucho record and second best in Big West history. Gehlke also went down for 13 digs. Conley added 15 kills and seven digs, and sophomore defensive specialist Desireé Rook recorded a team-high 18 digs. Christ and Weissenborn chipped in with 10 and nine kills, respectively.

While Santa Barbara started off the match redhot, out-hitting the Beach .310 to .288 in game one, the Gauchos ended up hitting .200 for the match compared to Long Beach's .340 clip. UCSB showed how great a team it is though, as it came back from a 13-2 deficit in game two and fought back Gauchos gave up an 8-4



Exhibition games are usually one-sided, but the UCSB men's basketball team found itself on the wrong side of an 83-68 tune-up contest Sunday afternoon at the Thunderdome, losing to the Mount Gambier Pioneers of Australia.

The Gauchos looked good in the first two minutes of the game, as senior guard Erick Ashe nailed a jumper and then converted on a layup, and a three-pointer by freshman forward Mark Hull put Santa Barbara up 7-0. But that would be the biggest lead UCSB would hold the rest of the game, as the Pioneers went ahead 14-13 on an alley-oop from Damien Anders to Barry Bowman. The Pioneers feasted on a steady diet of alley-oops and easy transition buckets for **Sporting Events Calendar**

"We were really jittery, we were tentative," UCSB Head Coach Bob Williams said. "Guys made a lot of mistakes, which is probably to be expected with as many new bodies that we put out on the floor."

Ashe added to his coach's point.

"Our transition defense was just terrible," Ashe said. "I think it's just going to take its time for everyone to get used to playing with each other. I don't really think we did anything that great this game to be honest ... Our transition D, our blocking-out and rebounding, there was a lot of stuff we just didn't do tonight."

Despite all the problems, Santa Barbara went into the locker room at the half only down by seven points, 42-35. Ten minutes into the second half of action, the Gauchos tied the game for the first time at 53. However, UCSB's transition defense, or lack thereof, once again gave the Pioneers easy baskets, and the Australians went on a 7-0



The Pioneers also out-shot Santa Barbara, making 50 percent of their shots compared to the Gauchos' 40 percent, shooting from the floor.

Leading the way for the Gauchos was Ashe with 11 points on five of 11 shooting, two rebounds and two assists. Sophomore forward Mike Vukovich recorded a double-double with 11 points and had a team-high 13


