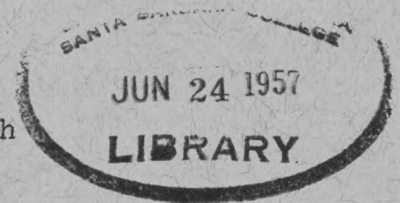

SEE THE FLOWER FIELDS

The Lompoc Flower Festival this week will enable you to see the famous flower fields of this leading flower-seed producing country. Lompoc is located about 45 miles to northwest. Take 101 north, turning off on route 1 at Las Cruces or route 150 at Buellton. For more scenic trip take the San Marcos Pass and route 150 through beautiful Santa Ynez Valley by Lake Cachuma.

SYMPOSIUM LECTURES SCHEDULED

The Spanish Colonial period in the Southwest, 1540-1840, will be explored in the third summer arts program through an integrating lecture course, "Symposium of Spanish Colonial Arts," taught by Dr. Kurt Baer, professor of art. Interdepartmental offerings in several areas will contribute to the Spanish Arts theme.

A weekly lecture series on Spanish Arts will be held in the lecture hall of the new Classroom Building. The opening lecture on Thursday at 2 p.m. will be given by Dr. George Hammond, Director of the Bancroft Library, UC, Berkeley, whose subject is "Heritage of the Borderlands," an account of the colorful history of the northern states of Mexico and California. Dr. Hammond has written numerous books on this period.

There is no charge for summer students. Guests will be admitted for an auditor's fee of 50 cents.

A beach supper will be offered at 5 p.m. July 2, on the campus beach. Dinner is only 75¢ per person and free to campus residents. Get your ticket at Graduate Manager's office, in Student Union patio by July 1.

A tour of the Mission and other areas of Santa Barbara is scheduled for a Tanner Gray Line event on Saturday, June 29, leaving at 1 p.m. from parking lot adjacent to Science Building. Make reservations by Thursday noon at Graduate manager's office. Cost about \$3 with a minimum of six persons necessary.

Recorded music will be played each noon in the Choral Room of the Music Building. Bring your requests and lunch.

For those interested in gymnastics, volleyball and badminton, the gym will be open Thursday evenings from 7:30 to 9:30 and Monday through Friday from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. Ed Cody of men's physical education department, will give special individual instruction in gymnastics.

There are many other events coming up. In cases of off campus events, including tours and boat trips, reservations must be made 48 hours in advance at the Graduate Manager's office which is open 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Proficiency tests will be given on the above date for those teacher credential candidates who have failed in any part of these examinations. New examinees will be admitted at this time.

The following schedule and rules of procedure will be observed. Doors will be opened at the beginning of the administering of each of the Divisions only.

Students deficient in any section of any division of the test must retake the entire division, and will be held responsible for any part taken whether passed formerly or not.

No appointment is necessary in advance. Students appear at the time scheduled above for a particular make-up division. However, a Statement of Study is required of each student. This Statement of Study may be obtained at the office of the student's major department or the department of Education. Before signing it a student should spend at least ten hours in study--preferably with a tutor. This Statement of Study must also be signed by a faculty member.

MEALS ON CAMPUS

The Student Union Coffee Shop will be open from 7:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. serving short-order type menus. Week-end hours will be posted. Hours may be changed to meet the demand. The campus dining hall will serve three meals a day and is open to both resident and non-resident students.

HOUSING ON CAMPUS

Ample accommodations are available for men and women on campus, but not for couples or families. The rate for the six-week session is \$168 for single occupancy of a room and \$147 for double occupancy. This includes three meals a day with two meals on Sundays and holidays. The halls are now open and rooms may be obtained by applying at the Housing Office Building 401, room 209.
