## "Unsportsmanlike"

"DEAR DR. JACOBS:

I am writing to you before the football game between Santa Barbara and Redlands so that you may know that the result of that game whatever its outcome, has nothing to do with our attitude as set forth in the following letter.

"First, regarding Mr. Morelli. The information which we expected previous to the meeting of the conference committee did not arrive until too late to be of use in providing our contention that Morelli played in more than one game with your freshman team, during his first year in your institution. You admitted that he played in one high school game and the conference committee granted him eligibility on that basis. However, if it had been known, as you may easily find the information, that Morelli played in a game with Black Foxe on November 11 and in a game with California Polytechnic school of San Luis Obispo, I doubt that granting him eligibility would have been seriously considered. The information regarding the Black Foxe game may be found in the Ventura Country Star of November 13, 1934. Similarly, the information regarding the other game may be found in a Santa Barbara paper dated October 26, 1934. The above information we expect to present to the conference committee for their consideration at the December meeting. We have purposely withheld this information until after the Santa Barbara-Redlands game, so that we cannot be accused of poor sportsmanship in the matter.

### BERATED IN PUBLICITY

"Even after the granting of eligibility to Mr. Morelli, although your faculty committee admitted his 'technical ineligibility,' your publicity department has continued to berate Redlands for questioning his eligibility. Little thanks for voting against our judgment to help you 'keep the student body in line' and 'prevent them from free lancing' in athletics, etc!"

"Continual reference to officials of past games at Redlands and elsewhere leads us to refer to the Redlands-Santa Barbara game of last year, two former Santa Barbara players were acting as officials. Upon the advice of one of these men the referee, not knowing him to be a Santa Barbara State college man, allowed a touchdown, when in his own judgment the ball had not crossed the goal line. Trying to be good losers as well as good winners, we have not previously publicized the matter.

"The officials for the game of Friday night have been appointed by Mr. Badenoch from lists of men approved by both Santa Barbara and Redlands. It is poor form, then, to begin crabbing about the officials several days before the game.

"Aside from the Morelli matter, there evidently is such a feeling of ill will manifest for Redlands by the Santa Barbara student body and publicity department that it seems, to the faculty athletic committee and the physical education department of the University of Redlands, necessary, for the best interests of all concerned, to discontinue all further athletic relations with Santa Barbara State college until such a time as they may be resumed with mutual good will and good sportsmanship. This is something we have never done before and have now done very reluctantly and only after much thought and discussion.

"Copies of this letter are being sent to all members of the Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic conference and, since it seems impossible to avoid publicity in this matter, to local and Los Angeles papers."

## JACOBS Answers

October 19, 1937

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE FACULTY ATHLETIC COMMITTEE OF THE SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETIC CONFERENCE:

The situation regarding the eligibility of Robert Morelli and the assertions made by the University of Redlands concerning his competition in the California Polytechnic game as a freshman involves the interpretation as to when he actually enrolled in Santa Barbara State College. It is claimed by Mr. Harder, director of athletics, that his actual registration was completed the day following the game, and he first attended classes the following Monday (October 29). As such it was claimed that he played but one game as a freshman at Santa Barbara State College, that game being the one with Black Foxe Military Academy, an institution of high school ranking.

The controller's receipts show that Mr. Morelli paid his pre-registration fee on October 23rd, some three days before the game. During the intervening time Mr. Morelli returned to Bakersfield, his home town, for his belongings. He came back to Santa Barbara the day of the game, October 26th and finished registration the following Monday, October 29th when he began his classes. Mr. Morelli did participate in the Cal-Poly game during the closing minutes with the full permission of the Cal-Poly coach and with the understanding that Morelli was not yet a student in the college.

It is regrettable that such a misunderstanding existed or that the information may have been misleading. We believe that it is only just to state that the letter referred to by Redlands was received by Dr. Charles L. Jacobs on Monday (October 18), three days following the game. Had it been prior to the game, the player in question would have been withheld as in the Occidental game.

## Redlands Severs State Athletic Relations

Morelli Protested Second Time As Publicity Department, Students Are Accused of Ill Will

A second protest regarding the playing of Bob "Scooter" Morelli along with the severing of athletic relationships with Santa Barbara State college by the University of Redlands last weekend tossed another bombshell into conference circles.

In a letter dated Friday, October 15, and written, by its own statement, previous to the Friday night game which saw the Gauchos shellack its southern opponents, S. Guy Jones, chairman of the Redlands faculty athletic committee said that it seemed necessary, "for the best interests of all concerned, (for Redlands and State—editor's note) to discontinue all further athletic relations with

Santa Barbara State college until such a time as they may be resumed with mutual good will and good sportsmanship."

### Ill Will Charged

Basis for the action which they termed as "regrettable" was chiefly on the contention that Santa Barbara has been unsportsmanlike in its attitude toward Redlands. Accusations named in upholding this charge referred to the continued reference to conference officiating both at Redlands and elsewhere, and to recent crabbing about officials several days previous to the Friday encounter. The student body and the publicity department are both charged with showing evident ill will towards Redlands in the letter from Professor Jones.

Again, Redlands is protesting the use of Bob Morelli, charging that he played in two games in 1934 as a State student, instead of one, as was presented at the conference reinstating meeting. Morelli was made eligible according to Prof. Jones with Redlands voting against their own judgment to help State college "keep the student body in line" and to "prevent them from free lancing in athletics."

### Wide Publicity

Receipt of the letter by Dean Charles Jacobs, chairman of the local athletic board, was not until Monday morning, after the matter had been thoroughly publicized by Los Angeles and Santa Barbara papers. The Redlands letter also promised to bring Morelli up for eligibility trial again at the December meeting of the conference committee, saying that they had withheld their information until after the Redlands-State game to avoid being called poor sports in the matter.

## Sophomores Meet to Elect Kinsell As Faculty Head

Officers were elected at the sophomore class meeting yesterday to fill the offices vacated since last year. New officers elected were Dr. Kinsell, class sponsor; Theda Call, social chairman; and Alice Boeseke, Council representative.

In accepting sponsorship of the class, Dr. Kinsell stated: "I feel honored in being selected by the class for the sponsorship, and hope that with the cooperation of the members of the sophomore class, we can make this one of the most successful and best-known classes that Santa Barbara State has ever seen."

Stressing the payment of dues as his opening remarks of the meeting, David Jones, sophomore prexy, remarked: "Last year this class collected a high percentage of dues. This year collections have been very slow, and we, the class officers, are making an appeal to the members of the class to pay their dues so that the class can really begin to go places and do things." Similar remarks were made by Al Merrill, vice-president; Dave Wright, treasurer; and Theda Call, newly elected social chairman.

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### Regrettable Action

In charging the State college, its student body and publicity departments of ill will and unsportsmanlike action, on the basis of which the University of Redlands broke off athletic relations, it seems to us that they have been unfair. To our thinking, Redlands is in the position of making a mountain out of a molehill, and has thus caused a very regrettable incident.

It is almost unbelievable that two educational institutions can not find it in their power to have their college men compete in a nation-wide sport, controlled by well established rules without the presence of such manifestations as our southern conference school has charged us with.

We do not contend in any sense, that the accusations of Redlands are wholly imaginary. Nor do we believe that the material presented will show, when investigated, that ill will and an unsportsmanlike attitude towards Redlands prevails on this campus. There is little but that in regard to football competition, our team, our students, and the townspeople strongly desire that we finish the season with the championship. This feeling was most evident in the fine type of football the Gauchos played Friday night when they felt their bid was endangered. It was also shown by the large attendance of locals to a game so many miles to the south. And behind it all was an inward spirit which believe that we had a team which could win in fair competition.

We also do not understand the action taken by Redlands in presenting the matter to the public press even before it arrived in the hands of the conference representatives of Santa Barbara State, thus preventing us from knowing what Redlands felt were the facts of the case and thereby enabling us to straighten out any wrong done, or to clarify facts which might prove the contentions of Redlands to be misleading and poorly based.

As is shown in the Morelli case, all of the facts were not clear, either to our representatives in the eligibility conference meeting or to others there at the time. The facts presented in the letter to conference members on page one of this issue will answer any question on this matter.

It is true that newspaper articles used by Redlands to base their contention of ill will, such as the one enclosed in the letter to Dean Jacobs, were not the product of our publicity department. Other articles appearing in local papers evidently were believed to be an official expression of the feeling of the student body, if the charges of Redlands are true. At no time has our publicity department released stories which carry more than the ordinary feeling of healthy competition. Neither has El Gaucho shown ill will towards Redlands. We publicized the fact that the latter school presented the original protest against Morelli, in fairness to Occidental. Certainly there is no denial of that fact—that Redlands made the protest. We have mentioned and certainly with some justification, the obstacles presented to the football team and to local rooters in maintaining a feeling of good sportsmanship, in the use of certain officials. We have not, as a student body, as a college, or as a college newspaper accused any conference official or conference school of dishonesty or poor sportsmanship this year. Furthermore, no objections have been made to the conference about officials chosen to referee grid contests during the current season.

It is beyond the power of any student body or its press to eradicate completely ideas which will cause ill will and could be taken as unsportsmanlike. Certainly we cannot be held responsible for the expression of local newspapers or local citizens.

## Hearing Board El Toro Rules on Ills

### Administration Group Moves to Curb Inebriation of College Students

The members of the student body acted Monday to curb student drinking at football games with the formation of the Student Hearing Board made up of a cross section of those groups who should have something to say on offenses against the college.

Heretofore violators have been dealt with by the dean's office, but according to Dean William Ashworth the new setup is more desirable.

"It gives the student government a chance to do something vital in the administration of the school," commented the dean yesterday.

The apparent need for such a board was brought out by the actions of several Staters at the State-Redlands game last Friday night. Two of the offenders were put on probation for the rest of the semester.

A definite attempt to keep the board impersonal will be made. The board is simply a hearings board and makes recommendations to the offices of either the dean of men or the dean of women. Three courses of action are open to the members, they may recommend expelling, suspension or probation.

I feel that extra curricular activities are very essential in a college such as ours and there can not be too much stress on them.

## PREXY PREDICTS TEACHER NEED

An optimistic forecast in regards to accredited teachers' positions for the 1938-39 term was made this week by President Clarence L. Phelps following his detailed study of a placement bureau report from this institution.

It was revealed in the report that all of the 162 available teachers graduated from State last June had been placed and that calls are now coming into the bureau that cannot be filled. These positions are in the kindergarten-primary, elementary, and industrial fields.

"After survey of our own situation and from what I learn from other state colleges and institutions carrying teachers' courses," said President Phelps, "California is facing a shortage of qualified teachers. At the present rate of graduation from teacher-training courses there will not be enough graduates next year to fill the gap made by replacements and the additional needs. The answer is an apparent demand for more earnest young people to become candidates for the teaching profession. I believe the situation is similar in our six sister state colleges—San Diego, Fresno, San Jose, San Francisco, Chico, and Humboldt.

"The University of California at Los Angeles and many private colleges in the state authorized to certify teachers appear to be facing the same problem of not graduating sufficient teachers to fill increasing demands.

### Scribe's Individual Style Describes New Teacher of Dramatics

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# Gauchos Hit Stride in Redlands Encounter

## Real Power Exhibited in 31-0 Win Over Southerners; Four Breaks Pave Way to State Touchdowns

State's "dream" team proved itself to be a line pounding, sure-tackling, quick-thinking reality last Friday night when Redlands university became the second decisive victim of these championship bound Gauchos in two weeks. The Bulldogs never had a ghost of a chance as they fell before a far superior ball club, 31-0.

All the favorable descriptive adjectives in the book could hardly do justice in picturing the Gauchos as they took advantage of four breaks to score touchdowns and held Redlands' vaunted razzle-dazzle game to a near standstill. As for individual stars, the State squad had none. Discrimination in the play of any back or lineman would be difficult—they all were outstanding.

### Laurels to Pollock

If any laurels are to be awarded, however, they should, surprisingly enough, go to Quarterback Dave Pollock. During the game Dave would now and then step from his roll of chief blocking back and do a little ball toting. He did it so well and so frequently that his gains through the line averaging 6.6 yards per try.

Although the Gaucho goal line was not crossed once, Redlands played a better offensive game than her end of the score shows. The Bulldog's wide open play was always to be feared, even though no threats were made. Handsome little Jimmy Blaisdell was almost the whole team—passing, running and acting as target for a good many of his teammate, Raitt's, tosses.

### Score in Six Plays

It took but seven plays after Hart had recovered a Redlands fumble soon after the opening kick-off, for Santa Barbara to score from the 33-yard line. Pollock turned in some smart quarterback by running the first six plays through the middle and to the left and then sending Bobby Morelli around the right on a reverse for the touchdown.

Howard Yeager chalked up the second touchdown from the four yard line. In the latter part of the first period, a poor kick by Pazder of the Bulldogs had put the ball on his own 23 and State had not been long in moving it up to a scoring position. An intercepted pass at mid-field by Morelli started Santa Barbara on a drive for its third tally. It was Yeager who again scored, thus cleansing his slate with Police Judge Fred Harsh.

### Frisholtz Scores

Not until the fourth quarter did the Hilltoppers score again. A recovered fumble by Trewhitt allowed Clyde Frisholtz to score from the six, and then an intercepted pass by Frisholtz paved the way for Freddy Monson to tally the final touchdown on a buck from the four yard marker.

Redland's only semblance of a threat came in the second period after the Gauchos were penalized half the distance to the goal line because of slugging by Donk Hart. The all-conference center was tossed out of the ball game. Following a first down on the Gaucho 24, the losers were held for downs.

Captain Doug Oldershaw played well as usual, although his three tries at conversions after touchdowns were missed. Besides the fine play of

## Passing in Review

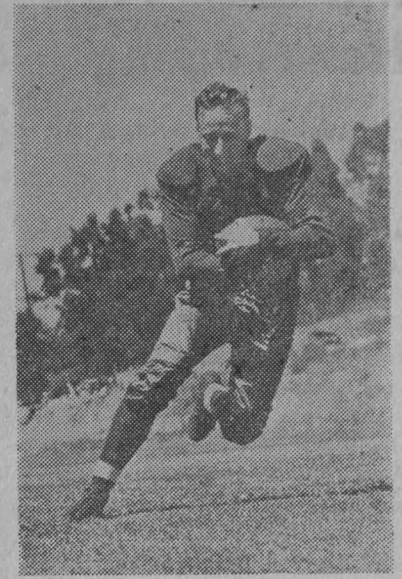
