DEAN NOBLE NAMED ACTING PROVOST

Dr. Elmer R. Noble, Dean of Letters and Science, today was named Acting Provost of the University of California, Santa Barbara College, by President Robert Gordon Sproul. He replaces Dr. John C. Snidicor who is going on sabbatical leave beginning July 1. Dr. Snidecor has been Acting Provost since February.

Dean Noble, also a Professor of Zoology, has just returned from a year's sabbatical research in marine biology at United Kingdom laboratories in Plymouth, England.

The new chief local administrative officer received his BA, MA and PhD degrees from the UC, Berkeley. He joined the Santa Barbara College faculty in 1936 and became Dean of Letters and Science in 1951.
