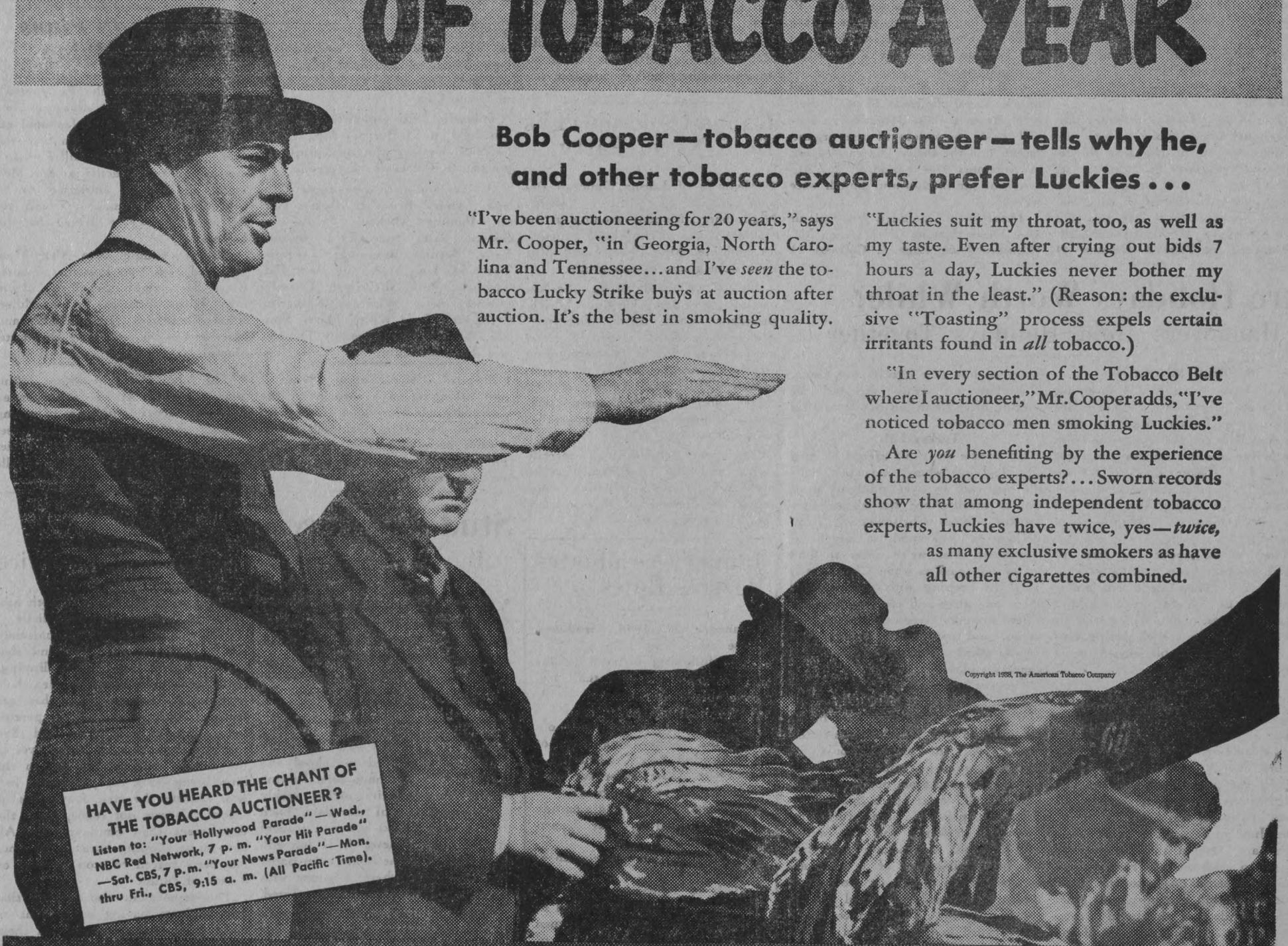

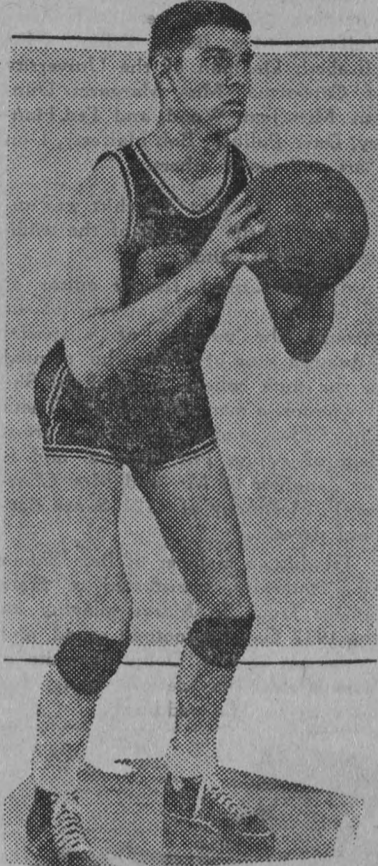
Elks' Dinner Set for Gauchos

• Stretching out into new fields and stiffer competition Coach Spud Harder announced a continuation of the policy of stronger opponents on every gridiron encounter in 1938.

The policy will see the Gauchos opposing teams such as University of San Francisco, Fresno State and Colorado State.

An outstanding step came with the signing of San Francisco Monday for a game October 7 in the Bay city. This will follow a game with Colorado State on September 30. Then the following week they travel to Texas to complete a home-and-home series with Texas College of Mines.

The season will be closed with an encounter with Fresno State at Fresno on November 24. Fresno has twice won the Far Western conference and completed the last season by beating the Arkansas Teachers, 27-26.

Questioned by reporters Harder stated, "Signing of these games bears out our policy of playing the tough ones in the future. The rest of the schedule will be announced within three weeks."
