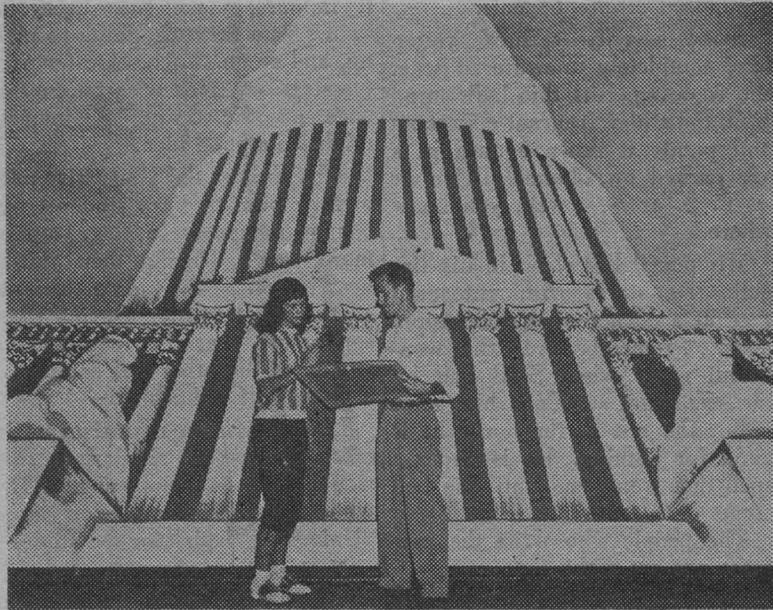
Delta Sigma Phi fraternity was in much the same circumstances last year when a large amount of their house funds were stolen.

UCLA Council Works On Liquor Edict

UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA, Los Angeles.—Resolutions aimed at student regulation of the liquor situation were introduced by Willis Morrison, rep-at-large, at a recent Executive Council meeting.

Morrison has been working with Dick Dickey, vice-president of Intra-Fraternity Council, on the liquor edict recently handed down by President Gordon Sproul.

Lawyers were unable to discover any legal loopholes in the ban at a special meeting called by IFC, which gave rise to the idea of sending a communication to Dr. Sproul. It would be, in effect, an offer to regulate the drinking situation through IFC or some other student organization, in return for administration withdrawal of the ban.

ingly different musical comedy more truly characteristic of modern American life.

Several ever-popular tunes are in the show including "Wintergreen for President," "Of Thee I Sing, Baby" and "Love Is Sweeping the Country" which are well-known today. Other songs in the show are "Who Cares," "The Illegitimate Daughter," "Jilted Am I" and "Posterity Is Just Around the Corner."

In making the Pulitzer Prize award, critic George Jean Nathan, speaking for the committee, said, "This award may seem unusual but the play is unusual. Not only is it coherent and well knit enough to class as a play, aside from the music, but it is a biting and true satire on American politics and the public attitude toward them.

"Its effect on the stage promises to be very considerable, because musical plays are always popular, and by injecting genuine satire and point into them, a very large public is reached. The spirit and style of the play are topical and popular, but of course the work is all the more spontaneous for that, and has a freshness and vitality which are both unusual and admirable. The play is genuine, and it is felt the prize could not serve a better purpose than to recognize such work.

"In 'Of Thee I Sing,' I believe that we discover the happiest and most successful native music-stage lampoon that has thus far come the way of the American theater."

New Econ, Chemistry Professors Added To UCSBC Faculty

A new position in the Department of Social Sciences at Santa Barbara College has been filled by Joseph D. Phillips, Jr., lecturer in economics, according to an announcement by Acting Provost J. Harold Williams.

Before coming here, he was assistant professor of economics at Wesleyan University in Connecticut.

When the war ended, Phillips was attending the Army's officer candidate training school at Fort Benning, Ga. Prior to that he had served as economist for the Office of Price Administration, the National Resources Planning Board, and the War Shipping Administration in Washington, D. C.

He also has done research work for the Institute of Pacific Relations and the Social Science Research Council in New York.

After receiving his A. B. at the University of California, Berkeley, in 1937, he did graduate work there and at Columbia University. He is a candidate for the Ph.D. at the latter institution.

Phillips is a member of Phi Beta Kappa and of the American Economic Association. He is the author of Part II, "Foreign Trade," in the "Economic Survey of the Pacific Area," published by the Institute of Pacific Relations.

New Chemistry Instructor

Dr. John William Sutton has been added to the faculty of Santa Barbara College as an instructor in chemistry, according to Provost Williams.

Dr. Sutton comes here from the University of Nevada, where he was instructor in chemistry in the '48-49 school year. The year before that he had studied under a post-doctorate fellowship at Stanford University.

Earlier Dr. Sutton had been an instructor in physics at Central College, Fayette, Missouri, where he received his A. B. in 1944. While studying at Stanford University for his M. A. he served as teaching and research assistant.

Also at Stanford in 1946-47 he held two fellowships, the Abraham Rosenberg Fellowship and the E. I. duPone de Nemours Co. Fellowship. He received the Ph.D. degree in 1948.

Dr. Sutton is a member of Sigma Xi, science research honorary society, and Phi Lambda Epsilon, honorary fraternity in chemistry.

The long-debated name change question will once more be submitted to public opinion today when the Rally Committee distributes 1000 questionnaires to UCSBC students from 9 to 2 in the Quad.

Today's vote marks the second time that criticism of the name Gauchos has brought to the attention of the student body the question of whether or not there should be a name change. During the final two weeks of the 1949 Spring semester, a student body election was held to decide the issue. Results of the June 8th election showed victory for the name Gauchos, but placed the majority of votes in favor of some type of change.

Final tally of the election was: Gauchos 156, Cubs 130, Grizzlies 64, and Bear Cubs 51. In a meeting following the election, the Council noted that the majority of students favored a name change, but decided to carry the name Gauchos until the present semester.

The Council also criticized the holding of the election during finals which may have caused the lack of turnout to the polls. The total number of voters was 214, a small percentage of the 2306 enrolled.

Sproul Instigates Change

The idea of a name change was instigated by President Robert G. Sproul. President Sproul desires a more "bear-like" name for the Santa Barbara College. He passed the idea to the Cal Club which favors a re-vote on last year's issue. The name question was picked up by the Rally Committee which organized today's poll to test the opinion of the student body.

Today's student opinion poll will be run on a "first come, first serve" basis with the first 1000 students to arrive at the polls receiving the chance to express their views.

Five Choices Submitted

The main question on the ballot will be whether or not the voter desires a name change, which will be answered by yes or no. If the answer is yes, the following name changes will be submitted to the voter: Bear-cubs, Cubs, Grizzlies, and Pandas. The Rally Committee desires that other choices be put on the ballot.

Spanish Consul Visits Santa Barbara Campus As Guest of Provost

Following a visit at the Riviera campus, luncheon was held at El Paseo. Those attending, in addition, were Dr. William F. Aggeler, chairman of the Department of Foreign Languages; Dr. Pablo Avila, assistant professor of Spanish; Dr. Paul Perigord, professor of French Civilization; and Dr. Philip W. Powell, associate professor of History.

Dr. Avila recently attended ceremonies held in Los Angeles under the auspices of the Spanish Consulate celebrating Columbus Day.

One of the subjects which will be discussed is scholarship opportunities for American students in Spain.

LET'S CHANGE THE DEANS' RULINGS

Student opinion on the Addenda to President Sproul's rules governing living groups issued by the Deans has cried out in strong opposition to the local rulings.

THESE RULINGS CAN BE CHANGED. The Dean of Men and the Dean of Women have expressed their desire to the student council that they are open to suggestions concerning the organization rulings. However, they stipulate that suggestions come from the groups themselves and not from a theoretically representative group of the students—i. e., the student council.

The Deans' request is a logical one. If we, the students, are to effect any change in the administrative rulings, we must promote a concerted effort on the part of all groups and organizations. Public opinion is the ruling force in a democratic community or government such as that of our Associated Student Body.

But public opinion must be heard to be forceful. One editorial, one recommendation by student council is not enough. Nor is a mere statement of protest enough. Negative action will accomplish nothing.

Concrete suggestions WILL bring pressure to bear if they are intelligent, constructive, and speak for the majority. Let's get together on suggestions for revising the Addenda.

The last council meeting was relatively short, but the discussion during the meeting was of major importance.

A last-minute request of the Activities Control Board to exceed its budget of \$10 by another \$100 for "Of Thee I Sing" publicity was questioned by the council, since the proper channels were being bypassed.

There was no doubt that the request was a legitimate one, but rather that a precedent should be set, allowing organizations to force council into action, thus necessitating council to act in the stead of the proper committee channels. The request was passed, but the more important consideration of whether the committees were doing their job accurately, correctly, and according to policy was left unanswered.

The crux of the matter is that some of our student leaders are falling down on the job. There is not the close coordination and interest between council and committees that there should be. We are afflicted with the disease of apathetic student leaders—not all, understand; some are doing outstandingly good jobs in their appointed or elected positions. But the time-worn, hackneyed saying, "A chain is only as strong as its weakest link" aptly applies to our government. An efficient, working government needs that strong chain.

Solution: Incite the student leaders to action and a realization of responsibility; if that fails—get some new leaders.

Gaucha Cagemen Trip Oxy in Opener, 37-33

The Santa Barbara Gaucha basketball team lifted the lid on the '49-50 season last Saturday night with a 37-33 win over the Tigers from Occidental. An extremely low-scoring contest was due to the inability of either side to find the loop. The casabamen thoroughly squelched the Oxy fast break and, although looking rough at times, kept the Bengals from down south almost completely at bay.

Big Bob McCutcheon and Gene Snyder led the scoring department with 14 and 9 points, respectively. Casual Bob had trouble finding the hoop in the first half but came on strong after intermission to garner individual scoring laurels for the evening. Snyder played his usual stalwart game at the forward slot, getting the rebounds and making a good share of the digits.

Both Nick Fasola and Bill Kelso, guards, did a great job in clearing the backboards for the Gauchos and special credit should be given to Kelso for his fine defensive play. Bill held the Oxy flash, Gene Haas, down to a mere 8 points. Haas has been voted the most valuable player in the Redlands Tour-

namment for the past two years and sports quite an average. All seven reserves who saw action played creditably and Wilton is sure to have depth this year.

This week the cagers trek to Redlands for the annual pre-season tourney. Play runs from December 1 through 3, and the Gauchos were slated to tip off against Caltech last night at 7 p. m. in the opener. The winner of this tournament automatically secures a berth in the Los Angeles Invitational Basketball Tournament, December 12-16, which is fast becoming one of the biggest tourneys in the west.

Grid men Lose Finale To Rival Aztecs, 22-0

Traveling to San Diego on Thanksgiving day to play the San Diego Aztecs this season ended in defeat for the Gauchos as they lost their last game of the 1949 season to a fighting and heavy Aztec eleven by a score of 22-0.

Although the Gauchos were shut out, the game was still thrilling to see. For most of the first half the game was a see-saw affair with the Gaucha line holding the Aztecs two times when they were inside of the one-yard line.

San Diego's line almost completely outplayed the Gaucha line, otherwise, and were slashing them open to give their runners plenty of room to go through. However, as mentioned above, the Gaucha line did outplay the Aztec line when the ball moved inside of the ten-yard stripe.

Ternquist Trapped

The first score came in the second period after the Gauchos were forced to kick and the Aztecs took over on Santa Barbara's 44-yard line. The Aztecs worked down to the Gaucha 34 and a first down, and then Quarterback Leon Parma took to the air and heaved a pass to End Bud Milke who went over for six points. Lyle Hufford, the Aztecs place-kick specialist, kicked the extra point and San Diego led at half-time, 7-0.

The second half started with Santa Barbara kicking off to the Aztecs, and within a few minutes of play in the third period, the San Diego machine scored again when Halfback Art Preston went around his own right end 54 yards for six more. Hufford's kick made the scoreboard read 14-0. The rest of the third period was un-kicking of Bob Baker who kicked the Gauchos out of a few tight spots.

Usual Rough Sked

Things started looking bad for the Gauchos after the start of the last period when Halfback Ron Ternquist was trapped behind his goal line by Fullback Red Herrill. The final score of the game came a few plays after the Gauchos kicked off to the Aztecs when Jim Simmons went through the line for three yards to pay dirt.

All in all the Gauchos played a good brand of ball, but after the

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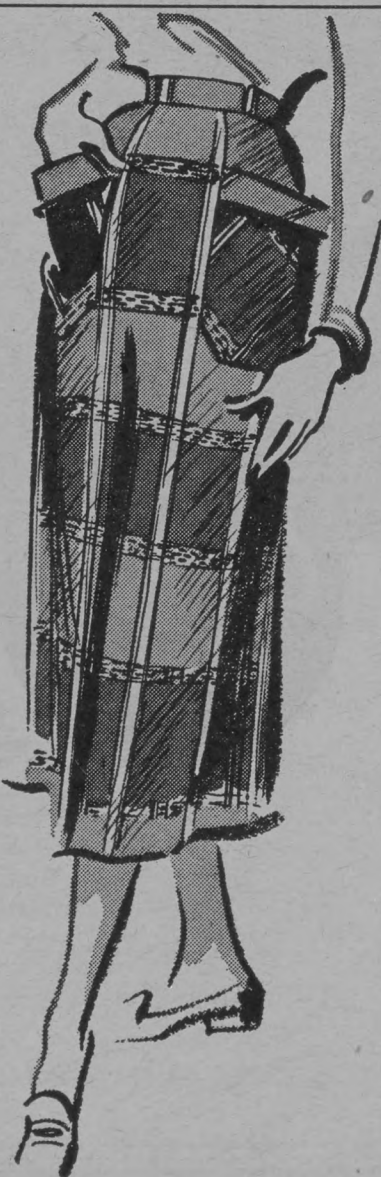
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Campus Cuttings
