Gauchos Turn the Lights Out on Cal

Harder Stadium Blackout Postpones UCSB's 2-0 Victory Over #11 Bears

As the Harder Stadium lights slowly flickered to black just minutes into the UCSB's women's soccer match against UC Berkeley Saturday night, Gaucho Head Coach Tad Bobak silently wondered what else his team would have to go through this season. The inevitable postponement of the match until Sun-

day morning quickly gave him an answer. After a week of preparation - both mentally and physically - for the team's biggest match of the season so far, the Gauchos

would have to wait another 12 hours.

The Sunday daylight provided more than enough illumination, and it was easy to see that the Gauchos did not lose any of their concentration from the previous night. Santa Barbara shut down #11 Berkeley, 2-0, and now has people wondering what else the team can do this season.

"We were focused to exercise our (game plan), and we did for the 12 minutes that we played, and then all of a sudden everything shut off," said Bobak, whose team meeting after the postponement helped keep the Gauchos (11-5-0) thinking about the Bears. "We had to face adverse conditions again, we had to refocus, re-group ourselves, and not lose sight of what we were working on. It was tougher (Sunday) because of all the

If it's true what they say about soulmates, about those who share common feelings without ever meeting one another, then the UCSB football team probably has a pretty good idea how the Atlanta Braves are feeling right now.

Just like the Braves, Santa Barbara had battled some mighty tough odds this year, even to have a football team at all. And just like the Braves, the Gauchos had performed above their heads in getting to where they were Saturday, poised for a dramatic win in a season full of such wins. But, just like the Braves, it was the Gauchos who were

devastated Saturday, as they went north to face a superior St. Mary's team and were then promptly manhandled by the Gaels, 41-3, on a blus-

tery, rainy day at St. Mary's Stadium in Moraga.

UCSB thus had its season-high three-game winning streak halted, and in the process, had its highpowered offense thor-oughly shut down by St.

Mary's. The Gauchos were held to a paltry 88 yards passing Saturday, falling far short of the 340-yard average it had posted through the first six weel:s of the season.

Gaucho starting quarterback Jon Barnes had a very forgettable day, hitting only seven-of-26 passes for just 61 yards with one interception. Backup QB Dave Franco didn't fare much better, completing just four-of-14 passes for 27 yards and an interception. In direct contrast to the struggles of the Santa Barbara

duo, Gael QB Scott Wood had a day he will most likely never forget, as he broke school season records for passing yards (2,065), completions (145), and total offense (1,987) in hitting for 379 yards and three touchdowns on 28-of-47 passing. His cause was helped considerably by the futility of the Gauchos to mount an effective pass rush, which al-lowed Wood to hit UCSB with numerous long pass plays. It was the big play, according to UCSB junior inside line-backer Eric Marshall, that was the death knell for Santa Barbara Saturday.

"Their big plays were really what killed us," said a bruised Marshall. "(They) just totally took the steam out everybody. When it's third-and-18, and the defense is thinking, 'Yeah, we're going to get off the field,' and then they get a 22-yard pass play or something, it's hard to keep coming back again and again."

The defense was kept on the field for long periods against

LONG BEACH - UCSB women's volleyball Head Coach Kathy Gregory liked her lineup against Long Beach State Friday night at University Gym. It was the 49ers' group of players that she wasn't too thrilled about.

The Gauchos, looking to add some more offensive punch to their arsenal, employed a new and improved lineup on Friday but it wasn't nearly enough to overcome second-ranked CSULB's spectacular firepower, as the 49ers pounded #9 Santa Barbara, 15-6, 15-8, 15-7 in front of 874 fans.

Saturday night, Gaucho middle blocker Tina Van Loon became UCSB's all-time block leader as Santa Barbara bounced back to defeat UC Irvine, 15-5, 15-1, 15-8 at Crawford Hall. Van Loon, only a junior, had one block left to pass Kathie Luedeke (1982-1985) and now has 384 total blocks in her Gaucho career.

UCSB is 9-4 in Big West Conference play and has an overall record of 14-7. CSULB is 10-1 and 22-1, while the Anteaters are 7-12, 2-9 in the league.

Santa Barbara's new look, which moves Ana Elisa Franca from the outside to the middle and puts Julie Pitois back into the lineup as a right side hitter, showed signs of effectiveness against Long Beach St. However, the 49ers complemented their lethal offense with sensational defensive play to make quick work of the Gauchos.

"I really think our defense is better than our offense — we just don't get many chances to test it," said Long Beach St. Head Coach Brian Gimmillaro, whose team entered the UCSB match leading the nation with a .351 hitting percen-tage. "We spend 70 to 80 percent of our practices playing defense. My goal is to (have us) be good volleyball players

Water Polo Splits Four in Long Beach

#10 Poloists Win 2, Lose 2 at the 49er Invitational

It was another up-and-down performance for the UCSB water polo team at the 49er Invitational in Long Beach last weekend, as the Gauchos split four games and settled for a 10th-place finish.

In Santa Barbara's final game Sunday, the 10thranked Gauchos suffered another seemingly self-inflicted defeat, losing to #12 Air Force, 8-5. Once again, the Gauchos struggled enormously on their six-on-five powerplay opportunities, scoring only once in nine chances.

"We were absolutely terrible on our six-on-fives," Head Coach Pete Snyder explained. "We didn't capitalize on our passing and shooting opportunities and we lacked the teamwork that's neccesary to be successful on six-on-fives. That defi-

nitely cost us the game." The Gauchos played well in their third-round match Sunday morning, as they defeated #15 Bucknell, 10-6. Sophomore driver Nik Ivanovic had a great game offensively for the (auchos, scoring on four occasions. UCSB played very tough through the first three periods of play, holding Bucknell to only four goals. But Santa Barbara struggled in the final period, allowing two goals while scoring no goals of its own.

"It was a good all-around effort and we played with a lot of enthusiasm," Snyder said.

Loyola Marymount was Santa Barbara's victim in Saturday's second-round match, as the Gauchos prevailed, 16-10. Junior MIKASA 1313151

two-meter men James Dent and Matt Teeple provided the offensive fireworks for the Gauchos, scoring four and three goals, respectively.

Although Loyola Marymount was a much weeker team, the Lions gave the Gauchos some trouble in the second and fourth periods of the match, scoring eight goals.

'Our counterattack worked very well and we were able to get on top early, which helped us," Snyder explained. "But we played bad defensively in the second and fourth periods, and that worries me."

Santa Barbara lost a close one to #11 UC San Diego in the tournament opener Saturday morning, 11-7. The Gauchos were only trailing the Toreros by two goals, 9-7, with 6:30 remaining in the game. But Santa Barbara was unable to mount any serious threats, and allowed San Diego two more goals before the game was over.

With the split last weekend, Santa Barbara's record is now 8-15, and still winless in the conference at 0-5. The Gauchos take on Fresno State and the University of the Pacific this weekend at Campus Pool to begin the second half of league play.

On Friday, UCSB hosted the University of Nevada, Las Vegas. Unable to muster a serious offensive game in the Gauchos' 2-0 loss to the Rebels, Santa Barbara managed only four shots during the entire game. While the team came back two days later to outshoot Fullerton (11-10), the woeful offensive performances during the two losses were clearly the cause for the disap-

pointing weekend. The Gaucho forward line

was operating without leading scorer Sean Redmond, who has been out of the lineup since being injured on Oct. 11 in a game against UC Irvine. Redmond, who had scored seven goals before his injury, has been the top Gaucho playmaker all season. Although the severity of his injury isn't known, with only one weekend left in the season, Redmond may be gone for the year. "I hope he's back next

week," Gaucho Head Coach Cliff Draeger said of the junior offensive sparkplug. "He's been out for the past four games. It's hurt us."

Draeger said that without Redmond's quickness up front, UCSB just could not keep up with the two Big West opponents it faced this weekend.

"If you don't have quickness, the other teams are going to pressure you," Draeger said. "That kills you." The losses drop the Gauchos' overall record on

the year to 3-12-1, with a conference mark of 2-6. For the team that posted a 7-3 Big West record a year ago and finished only one game behind conference-champ Fresno State, this season has been a nightmare. It began with a six-game losing streak, and although the team bounced back from a 1-9 record to go undefeated in a four-game homestand, a loss a week ago to last year's conference doormats - the Anteaters of UC Irvine and this weekend's two defeats, have left UCSB fighting to stay out of the Big West cellar.

"I've never been on a team that lost like this," said team co-captain Curtis Jimerson, echoing the frustration felt by many members of the team.

While the abundance of youth on the squad forecasts a bright future, the present the UCSB soccer team finds itself mired in the woes of a "rebuilding season."


Though 13 minutes and eight seconds had run off the clock when the lights went out, the match was resumed Sunday with a full 45 minutes left in the first half. Both squads had difficulties creating scoring opportuni-ties early, and the teams combined for only 21 shots in the match.

Berkeley (9-6-0) had an excellent chance to get on the board first, when Devon Fitzpatrick got past the Gaucho defense and faced UCSB goalkeeper Jan Urich one-on-one at the left post. Urich pounced on the loose ball to keep the game scoreless.

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



After being competitive solely during the early moments of the first game of the CSULB match, the Gauchos appeared to have bounced back from the first game defeat when they erased a 6-3 Long Beach lead in game two to go out in front 7-6. But after Santa Barbara led 8-7, the 49ers scored nine consecutive points to finish the game. Long Beach jumped out to a 7-1 lead in the third game and then stopped a late Gaucho rally to close out the match.

UCSB now has a full week off before resuming action once again against Cal State Fullerton Saturday at the Events Center. The Gauchos play their next three matches at home.

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
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
