Radio Broadcasting Class Plans 13-Week Play Series

The largest radio broadcasting class in the history of Santa Barbara College met Tuesday, taking advantage of the speech departments new curriculum emphasizing radio production. Courses in radio writing, acting, announcing, and technical studies are included in the curriculum, according to Mr. Virgil Bergman, head of the division, has been overhauled and is in good shape for future work.

A tentative outline of this semester's work includes: a weekly news program; a radio play over some local station; and a weekly program for the local "Bugs Bunny" club in a downtown theatre.

SERIES OF PLAYS

A thirteen-weeks' series of great plays, including *She Stoops to Conquer*, *Antigone*, *Camille*, *The Lady of Lyons*, *The Drummer*, and *The Miser*, will be presented by the advanced radio broadcasting class, under the direction of Mr. Bergman, who points out that positions on the staff and parts in the plays are open to any member of the student body who cares to participate.

A few student-written scripts will be produced during the semester, and announcing for all student shows will be handled by the division.

The speech clinic, which undertakes the problem of correcting speech or hearing defects, is in operation again this semester, according to Dr. Snider, head of the department of speech. This clinic is open to any member of the student body who feels the need of remedial work.

COMING ATTRACTIONS

The next stage production of the school year, to be presented the tenth and eleventh of April, will be directed by Mr. Palmer, newest member of the faculty. The play will be chosen from the following list: *The Inspector General*, a Russian farce by Gogol; *Shoemakers' Holiday*, by Dekker; *The Little Clay Cart*, an East Indian play; and *Moliere's School For Husbands*.

Later in the semester, members of the class in technique of acting will present an evening of one-act plays.

The stagecraft class will design the settings for both productions.

Additional Gauchos Adopted by Cal Club

Six students on the local campus were honored recently by receiving appointments from Dr. Robert Gordon Sproul, president of the University of California, to be members of the Santa Barbara chapter of California club council. The new members were recommended to President Sproul by chairman Sharon Smith, and Dr. Elmer Noble, sponsor of the local group.

An honorary organization composed of 20 members plus student body president and vice president and campus newspaper editor, Cal club is active on five UC campuses. Its goal is to promote University spirit among the students on this and the other Cal campuses.

STUDENTS CHOSEN

According to Sharon Smith, local Cal club head, new members were chosen for their activities, grades, character, and other leadership traits. George Graves, Owen Van Buskirk, Kermit Schotts, Marianna Richardson, Junemarie Davidson, and Naomi Dyer are the newly initiated members in the Santa Barbara college group.

A dinner at Arnoldi's cafe last night was the first event of this semester. At this meeting the six new initiates were welcomed into the organization.

Since Cal club was formed on this campus in November of 1945, all present members are charter members, and the new group is the first group of new members to be initiated, with the exception of the honorary members, including student body president and editors; the latter were initiated at the beginning of the fall semester.

All housing arrangements must be registered and approved by the Assistant to the Dean of Women, Miss Ellen E. Bowers.

Any student who located housing not on the housing list must report immediately to Miss Bowers. Parent's permission must be on file for any woman student living in an apartment or room with a relative (not a parent).

Any contemplated change in housing during the semester must be approved by the Assistant to the Dean of Women before change occurs. Change of address forms must be filled out in the Office of the Dean of Women, to be recorded on college records in order to communicate with student.

Students to Have Free Chest Tests

Free chest X-rays are being made available to all students and employees of Santa Barbara college through the cooperation of the county Tuberculosis and Health Association when they bring their new 70 mm portable X-ray unit here beginning March 3 and extending through March 7, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The Faculty Student Health and Welfare Committee strongly recommends that the unit receives 100 per cent patronage from this institution. Even veterans who have recently received X-rays while in the service are urged to avail themselves again of the photographic process.

It is to be noted that disrobing is not required, as the X-ray machine is of the new type that photographs through clothing and non-metallic objects. Remember, the service is free!

Bowers Named Aide To Dean of Women

Miss Ellen Bowers has been named new assistant to the Dean of Women, succeeding Miss Alice R. Strickland, it was announced recently. As one of her new duties, Miss Bowers will be advisor for the Phrateres college.

A graduate of Pomona college, the new assistant comes to Santa Barbara from Washington, D. C., where she was director of a residence hall housing over 600 girls. Previous to the former job, Miss Bowers was assistant dean of women, and acting dean at her alma mater, Pomona.

The new assistant has done graduate work in personnel at Columbia university, and she received her master's degree in Diplomatic History at Claremont colleges.

Her new jobs here at Santa Barbara College will include counseling on women student's housing, and employment of women students.

"We are most happy to have Miss Bowers working on our difficult housing situation," said Miss Helen E. Sweet, dean of women. "We only wish our new assistant had an apartment rather than just a room."

LIMITED NUMBER

Speech Proficiencies

EDITORIAL

The beginning of a new semester, bringing as it does a renewed and refreshed attitude with respect to our goals, is at hand. It is, moreover, a challenge to reevaluate and examine the ends towards which we strive.

Carnival Set For March 7 and 8

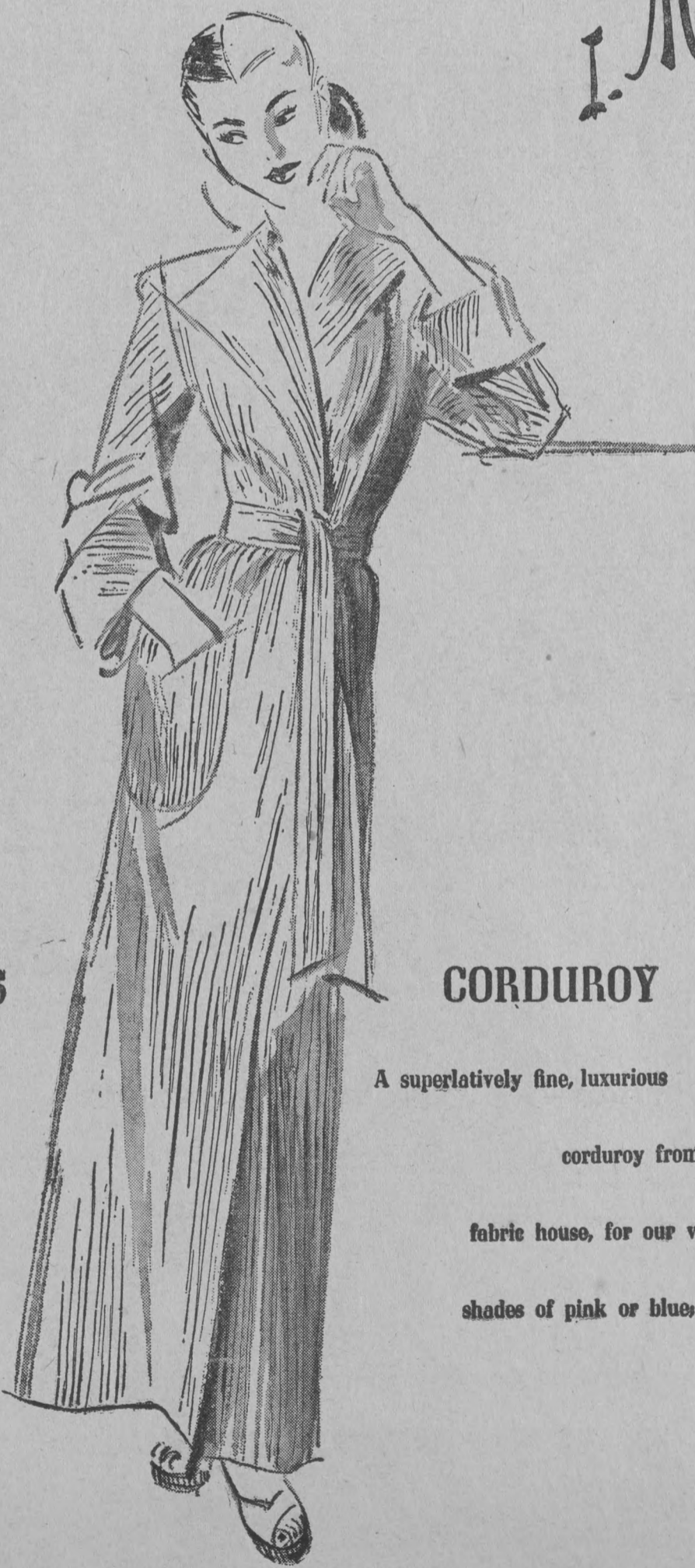

Any Gaucho is eligible for entry, with the deadline on applications set for March 4.

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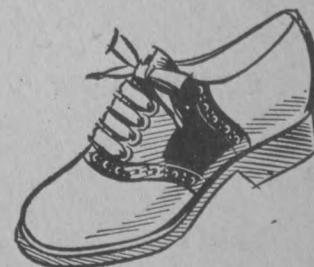
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JV Squad Slated To Grapple With Westmont Quintet
