SB Unveils New-Look Squad in Scrimmage

More than 500 students, parents and fans showed up at the Thunderdome on Friday for the annual Blue-Gold game when the UCSB men's basketball program tipped off its preseason with an intrasquad scrimmage.

The team played two halves of 20 and 15 minutes with three players from each side switching squads at halftime. For most of the players, it was their first opportunity to wear a Gaucho uniform in front of the public.

This year's Santa Barbara squad will feature three redshirt transfers, three junior college transfers and three high school walk-ons to begin the year - none

of whom have ever played at UCSB. "Everybody was a little nervous and anxious out there," said junior redshirt transfer Raymond Tutt, who led all scorers with 28 points and grabbed eight rebounds. "This game really helped us see where we're at and what we need to work on. My job is to do whatever it takes for the team to win. I can score with the best of them, and that's what I'm going to do.'

* With the first-game jitters out of the way, the coaching staff will now concentrate on the deficiencies they saw in the game.

"Our execution is poor right now," said UCSB Head Coach Jerry Pimm, who watched the game from press row. "We had good energy and good enthusiasm, but everything else needs to get better. We were playing better in practices. That's what these [exhibition] games are for."

There were some positive signs for the Gauchos. Three players scored in double digits — besides Tutt, junior center Matt Pinkney had 13 points and eight rebounds, all of his points coming in the second half. Pinkney, who transferred from Salt Lake Com-


crease overall team depth. She accomplished that by using all 12 members of the team over the course of the two games.


they were able to easily dispose of the Titans in straight games.



Losses Continue to Mount for the Santa Barbara Water Polo Team

The recurring theme of the 1996 UCSB men's water polo season has been the story of the young squad gaining the experience vital to succeed.

Saturday afternoon, the #14 Gauchos (2-16 over-all, 1-6 in the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation) had another opportunity to play the role of spoiler as they faced #6 University of the Pacific in Stockton. The veteran Tigers (10-10, 3-4), however, proved too strong and handed Santa Barbara a convincing 13-5 defeat.

"The biggest thing was probably experience," said UCSB Head Coach Joe O'Brien. "[Pacific] ad-justed to situations really quickly. They were really cohesive. They've been playing water polo, whether it be in official games or playground games, together for about four years, and they played like it."

Coming out sluggish and allowing Pacific to take an early 4-0 first-quarter lead also factored

UCSB committed a total of 21 turnovers for the game.


"Early in the season, the games are famous for be-ing sloppy," said freshman walk-on guard Josh Skarsgard. "It's because we're working out our new offense and defense."
