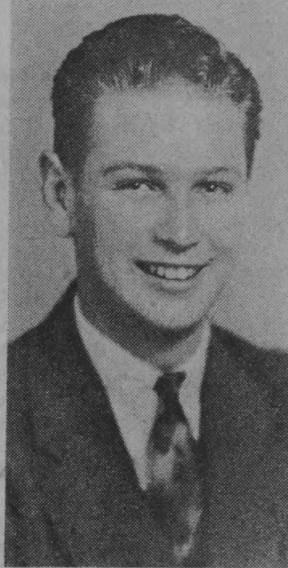

Kathryn Stock As Old Lady

IS SOPHISTICATED PLAY

Star of 'Dulcy,' 'Outward
Bound' Again Takes
Leading Part

The presentation last night in the college auditorium of Somerset Maugham's play, "The Circle," attracted some 300 people; a good-natured crowd that awaited the rise of the curtain, caught the first lines of dialogue, and listened attentively until the end of the drama.

The acting of each student was creditable, but the performances of Kathryn Stock as the old, but flirtatious Lady Kitty, and Elbert Phelps, as her husband, were especially convincing and colorful. Betty Card, as Elizabeth, expressed convincingly the feelings and emotions of a dissatisfied young wife, while Carlos Bee, her husband, succeeded, as his part was designed, in receiving the universal dislike of the audience.

Morrison, Davis Act

Mike Davis, playing the part of Ted Luton, a breezy young business man from the Malay States, claimed to know little of love-making, but managed to steal Elizabeth from Arnold, Orville Morrison portrayed the part of Arnold's father, a man somewhat of a philosopher and the most nearly normal personage in a cast of abnormal, neurotic characters. Season Receipts Surpass Record

Gate receipts for the football season of 1936, have surpassed that of any other year at Santa Barbara State college, according to figures released yesterday by Fred Allred, student controller.

Total gate receipts for home games totaled \$7,056.17. The Whittier game had the largest receipts of the season with \$1,820.20 taken in.

Over 27,000 people watched the Gauchos in action at their clashes this year. Total attendances at the games include Cal Tech, 2,449; La Verne, 1,357; Whittier, 3,877; San Francisco, 2,484; Occidental, 2,732; Redlands, 3,159; Nevada, 4,000; San Diego, 6,000, and Flagstaff, 1,500.

'Nick' Carter Enjoys Novel Peruvian Life Former State Track Coach Writes Interesting Experiences

"Nick" Carter, former faculty member in the P.E. department here, who recently obtained a teaching position in a military and aviation school at Peru, is enjoying his novel experience and the hospitality of the people, according to a letter received recently. In a letter to Captain Charles Gordon Davy, president of the Santa Barbara Chamber of Commerce, Carter said, "They have treated me wonderfully. We have met many people of prominence, including the Secretary of Education to the President, and we are to meet the President soon." The Peruvian school is centrally

located and of good standing. Carter, who arrived at the South American country November 4, started teaching the following Monday on a full program. Two mornings a week are spent in the Academy, two in the Lima Military school and two at the Aviation school.

When Nick Carter arrived in Peru, he and his companion were greeted by members of the Federation Peruane de Athletismo, and sport writers from the papers. The same evening, the group was escorted to the four leading newspaper offices in Lima, and in all four papers, the pictures of the

men appeared the following day. Later he visited the Agricultural college and the San Marcos university.

Carter was fortunate in getting the athletic equipment needed. Most of the articles were ordered from San Francisco and Los Angeles, among which were forms and charts for grading and checking the physical education students, and starting guns and blank cartridges for the students of the Military school.

The former State faculty member was introduced to prominent people through letters of introduction from Captain Davy.

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Park Here, Please

When students are forced to comply with demands each day that continually call upon them to make difficult adjustments, a certain phase of their respective attitudes is wrong or an error is prevalent in the existing set-up. With regard to the parking situation, the latter seems to be the case.

In a college of 1,000 students, a great majority of whom drive automobiles to and from campus, it does not seem exactly fair that they should be asked to park their cars in out-of-the-way places, or in spots where the car is endangered during the day's traffic.

With the establishment of the driveway as strictly a one-way thoroughfare, the main item of consideration was to avoid confusion. This problem has been increased with the parking regulations and accommodations, rather than lessened. Cars are halted at random, on or too near the roadway. The vehicles are wedged in and are rarely parked parallel. Visitors to the college are alarmed at the prospect of having to wait in line for cars to leave the grounds, or edge their way down the road, weaving in and out to avoid various fenders and bumpers.

The parking problem is one that deserves the serious consideration and cooperation of both faculty and students. Students are at fault in that they become highly indignant of reserved space set aside for State's professors while, on the other hand, faculty members are intolerant to a certain extent of student-manipulated methods of transportation blocking paths, entrances, exits and even reserved spaces provided for the instructors themselves.

The situation is acute, and one that applies to each person at the college. It is a common problem, and should be met on common ground. While deplorable, it is but a temporary set-up, and requires the cooperative attention of all until remedied.

The Royal Perrogative

With the eyes of the world directed toward London and the proposed marriage of King Edward VIII to Mrs. Wallace Warfield Simpson, comes the announcements of a new time limit set by members of the British Parliament on pending decision of the young ruler to wed the "Wally," American society matron.

Serious question is raised throughout the hemispheres as to whether or not the English population would stand by forced abdication of Edward or if the sincere love of the English subjects for their monarch will stand regardless of any action he sees fit to make.

Steeped in custom and tradition, the British love the pomp and ceremony connected with royal marriage, and attaches a stigma to the thought of the marriage of King Edward with a plain American. Contemplation of the former marriages of Mrs. Simpson is a shock to the English, who are accustomed to a country in which divorce is not prevalent.

However, the people of the United States, having perused histories of love-less matches between members of European royal families, are seemingly content with the "Wally"-Edward romance, and only time will tell the strength of the influence of the heart versus the British high-and-mighty.

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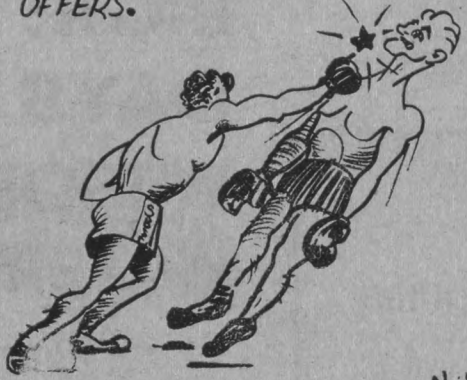
