Library News

In a change which a semester's experience with completely open access to library materials has proved desirable, the library is asking the cooperation of all of its patrons in showing all books, brief cases and other materials as students leave the main library on the second floor of the Administration Building.

According to Donald C. Davidson, Librarian there has been an increase in the number of books which have not been checked out. Much of this, he believes, is the result of carelessness rather than a planned breaking of University rules.

During the summer session, the main library and the Reserved Book Room in Building "A" will be open from 7:45 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. Mondays through Fridays, 7:00 to 9:00 P.M. Mondays through Thursdays, and 9:00 through 12 noon on Saturday mornings. The Mesa branch library will be open from 8:00 AM to 5:00 PM Mondays through Fridays

UC SBC CAGERS AT IT AGAIN

PICKARTS IS EUROPE BOUND

In the opening game of the Alhambra Summer Basketball League schedule, the Santa Barbara All American Sports team won a hard fought 39 to 36 victory over Phelps Terkel of Los Angeles last Thursday night. The Santa Barbara squad is composed of Gaucho basketballers, along with four men from the Riverside Junior College who may possibly be wearing the blue and gold this next year. Phelps Terkel's squad is composed of USC cagemen, including Pelka, Christy, and others of the Trojan squad.

Del Pickarts, UC SBC ace javelin thrower, has been chosen as a member of the United States AAU track and field team which will compete in two big meets in Europe this coming month. By tossing the spear 220 feet, 7 3/4 inches last Saturday at the National AAU meet in Fresno, Pickarts qualified for the trip, with all expenses paid. Pickarts placed third in the javelin to Bud Held of Stanford who threw 232 feet, 2 1/2 inches, and to Martin Biles.

Bob McCutcheon led locals in scoring with 13 points. Big Ralph Polson, outstanding Riverside center, played a fine game on both backboards and contributed 10 markers. Also in on the scoring which downed the Te kels were Quentin Sims, Gene Snyder, Mel Streeter, Jack Moore, Bob Wagner, Patty Hill, and Jack Voorhees.

Another Gaucho star, Willie Dancer, failed to duplicate his brilliant record in the high jump; although Dancer tied for fifth with a leap of almost 6 feet 3 inches, he had cleared the bar at 6' 6" several times this past season.

The Alhambra League is a City Recreation Program, conducted on a strict AAU basis, which meets the approval of collegiate conference rules.

There is a possibility that Gaucho Trainer Don Gill, who has earned a fine reputation in his profession, may be able to accept an invitation to serve as Trainer for the United States AAU team. Gill has been invited to make the trip, but has yet to make necessary clearances with the University of Florida, who has signed Gill as their trainer next year.
