Open House will be held on Santa Barbara College's new campus at Goleta next Monday, July 26. This event has been planned especially for you and your friends and family. For your convenience, maps will be available at the Goleta Beach entrance to the campus. Buildings open for inspection will be designated by "Open" signs. The new science building and library will be among those open, as well as most of the classrooms and a few of the residence halls. Promoted to the rank of professor are Dr. William D. Altus, psychology; Dr. Willard L. McRary, chemistry; Dr. Philip W. Powell, history; Dr. Stanley E. Rauch, mathematics; Dr. Lester B. DR. BELLAMY TO SPEAK--This free lecture especially for the summer session by one of the leading authorities on the radiological effects of the atomic and thermo-nuclear warfare will be given on Thursday, July 29, at 7:30 p.m. in the Mesa Campus Auditorium. All students and faculty are invited to attend. Dr. Albert W. Bellamy is on leave from his position as professor of zoology and biophysics at UCLA and is now serving as chief of the radiological services for the State Office of Civil Defense.
