Special Brings 150 Friscoans to Game

Rally Committee Welcomes Visitors at Depot; Four Events Honor Alumni, Northerners Invited

Scheduling a special train, approximately 150 students of San Francisco State college will arrive in Santa Barbara at 4:45 p.m. Friday afternoon, November 6.

The Northern rooters will be met officially by the rally committee and State students at the Southern Pacific depot, where transportation will be provided to the campus. The train will be derailed for the night, and will leave for San Francisco at 1:30 a.m. Sunday.

An invitation to attend the Friday night Homecoming rally and parade will be extended to the guests. Included in the calendar of events will be the high school football game at Peabody Stadium, in which the unbeaten and untied Vaqueros of Santa Barbara will meet Whittier High school. Members of the Golden Gate grid squad and the rooters will be guests of honor at the Homecoming dance Saturday night at Rockwood.

Additional entertainment will be provided by the rally committee, with "Gardy" Gardenhire in charge of arrangements, and guests may be taken on a tour of Santa Barbara Saturday afternoon in the Gaucho bus.

LABOR SYMPATHY BLOCKADE

A sympathy blockade has spread to the eastern and gulf ports in support of the Pacific Coast longshoremen's strike. Five unions walked out of a meeting called by the federal maritime commission. They declared the unions could not recognize the authority of the commission to decide any of the issues in the strike. The effects of the strike have been felt inland—railroads refusing to transport freight destined for re-shipment through Pacific ports—lumber and other industries are closing down.

MUSSOLINI DICTATES

Mussolini warned Great Britain that conflict with Italy would lead to European war. He offered to exchange pledges to respect each nation's rights. Disarmament is an illusion and to disarm completely is impossible and absurd according to Mussolini. Speaking of Communism, he said, "It is time to be done with it. Communism is a

Reno Round Trip Becomes College History

Nevada Demonstration Scenery and Cooperation Mark Jaunt

As the Reno special pulled into the Southern Pacific station yesterday morning, the first train trip chartered collectively by State college students became another page in Gaucho history.

Looking back over the highlights of the trip—the goodwill gesture on the part of the University of Nevada as its student members massed at the Reno depot stands as an example of the spirit of friendship which prevailed throughout the grid battle and short sojourn in the distant city.

Another outstanding incident was the marching of the Santa Barbara State band through the streets of Reno in the Admission Day parade, for which they received honorable mention as a non-competitive entrant.

The sudden departure of the coast-bound limited, resulting in the temporary abandonment of three Staters who raced madly down the track, added to the fun and excitement.

A marked characteristic of the trip was the cooperation and interest on the part of the faculty sponsors, Miss Helen Sweet, Miss Hazel Severy and Harrington "Pop" Wells. To this, the cooperative attitude of the college students themselves may well be added.

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The Optimistic View

Perhaps it is an overly-optimistic statement to say that prosperity is back again, but judging from the large gains in enrollment in most of the universities and colleges throughout the country, it is well on the comeback road.

A recent survey of 80 schools in the East, West and South showed an increase of 18,072—6 per cent. Not one of the 26 institutions in Central and Western United States chosen at random lost in attendance. On the contrary, these colleges and universities, collectively, showed an increase of 8.2 percent. Three-quarters of these schools have chalked up the largest registration in their history.

Registrars from coast to coast attribute the new "high" to improved economic conditions. Strange as it sounds, one college accounts for its decreased enrollment in the new prosperity. None of the registrars believe that the N. Y. A. student aid has in itself influenced the enrollments. Only six of the 80 consider it even a major factor, responsible for as much as half the increase. Many officials laud the N. Y. A., however, as an economic problem solving factor for many modern students of America. A. C. P.

Summer Session Statistics

Statistics from the summer session held on the Santa Barbara State College campus this year, show a total enrollment of 458 students, a 28.7 percent increase over previous summers.

Of this total, 7.6 percent came from other states. The remainder represented 31 counties of California. 84 percent came from ten counties: Santa Barbara, Los Angeles, Kern, Ventura, San Bernardino, San Diego, Orange, Riverside, Alameda and Tulare.

Santa Barbara furnished 32.3 percent and Los Angeles 23.2 percent of the total number.

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Gauchos March On With 13-0 Win

Passing in Review

After a week-end at Reno, it is going to be hard to get back into the swing of writing this little epistle to the sport-minded student, but here goes an attempt. The Gauchos showed that they are not a one-town team and that their trip to the "divorce capital" did not hurt them, by displaying a lot of power and a strong defense against any form of running attack that the Nevadans chose to try.

The high light of the game was Earl Fredburg's bid to fame in the third quarter when he intercepted a Wolf pass on the Green and White 25 yard line, and ran it back 35 yards before he lateraled the ball to Danny Mulock, who in turn flipped the palote to Morelli. Something went wrong with the last pass and Morelli was stopped on the Wolf 40 yard line. Credit should go to Fredburg for his alertness in nabbing the ball, it stopped a Nevada drive down the field and supplied the local rooters with another thrill. One of the reporters in the press box remarked that "I don't see how we can expect to win when even their tackles are broken field runners."

Ohrt of the Wolves, gave the Santa Barbarans a few chills in the third period when he slipped through his own right tackle and ran 35 yards to the 44 yard line before Morelli stopped him. The Wolves played a wide open game, but it did them no good as the Gaucho defense stopped it cold before they could slip through to do any scoring.

Danny Mulock was forced out of the game in the first half, and his place was taken by Ollie Seeley who did a good job of filling in. Danny returned in the third quarter to play a bang up game during the rest of the struggle.

Howard Yeager almost broke away on the kickoff opening the second half. He was moving at a good rate of speed when he was stopped on the Gaucho 43 yard line. One of the Nevada ends who chased that kickoff down the field and managed to lay a hand on Howie said about that run, "I hit him on the 25 yard line and the next thing I knew he was 20 yards away and I was biting dust. He sure is the fastest back that I ever played against."

Morelli played his usually high type of ball and was in for a lot of good comment by the fellows up in the press box. His recovery of a fumble and return up to the line of scrimmage in the second quarter was one of his plays that was in for special comment.

By comparison of scores the Gauchos are 53 points better than the Trojans, and also by the same method the Trojans are about 40 digits better than the Staters, all of which leads us nowhere.

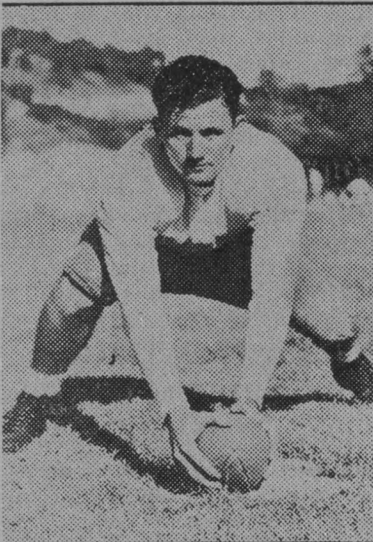

From Bakersfield High school comes another member of the Gaucho team and center on the squad, Don Hart, Donk, the "Sheik from Buttonwillow," has played center for 6 years now and his previous experience at the position is coming in mighty handy.

At the Bakersfield institution he turned in two years of good performance on the lightweight team, and one on the heavyweight team. After graduating, he came to Santa Barbara and played on the frosh eleven of 1934 under Coach "Bud" Cummings, that gave to the Varsity such players as Yeager, Morelli, and Oldershaw. He also turned in some sensational playing that year and in '35, gained a berth on the varsity. Early in the season he injured his knee and was forced to retire from the game for the rest of the season.

This year, Donk has been steadily improving and as his trick knee has healed sufficiently to allow him to play he is destined for plenty of action. Already he has been mentioned as one of the likely candidates for All-Conference honors which are given out at the end of the season. He is an all-around good player as well as a good sport. He really knows his football and can prove it.

Besides football, Donk plays basketball and baseball, and is a member of the Gaucho track team. In the manly sport of self-defense, he knows his stuff too. In his freshman year, he knocked down a) opponents to become the heavyweight champion of the school, and his title is still undefeated.

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Golden Tide to Play Big Green Saturday Nite

San Francisco State Ready to Attone for 1935 Defeat

Coming south with the express purpose of avenging their defeat at the hands of the Gauchos last year the Golden Tide of San Francisco State college will flow into Santa Barbara Friday afternoon to do battle with the Big Green team on Saturday night.

The San Franciscans will bring a squad of about 35 men being lead by Bill Harkness fullback who was the outstanding player in the Tide's recent victory in their "big game" with San Francisco Junior college. Another athlete who during the last track season gained nation wide publicity as a decathlon performer, and Olympic prospect is Runar Stone, at end. This Harkness fellow is quite a punter having averaged 42 yards a boot in the game with the Frisco Jaysee team.

The Golden Gaters do not go in for a strong offensive game, but rather tend toward the defensive points of football. The Jaysee Rams piled up nine first downs to the Tide's four, but were still unable to cross the Stater's goal line. Another point to look at is the fact that the only score of the game came when one of the Tide men caught a Ram behind he goal line for a safety.

The Golden Gaters have in their pivot position 185 pound Bill Ferem who the Bay city scribes are boosting to the sky. Two tough men fill up the starting guard post with Ralph Kauer and Harold Cunha, the former weighing 173 and the latter 182 pounds. A brace of big tackles in Bill Plutte, 229 pounds and Howard Hanrahan, 192 pounds will be in there trying to bust up the Gaucho plays. Alongside the big tackles will be Gorden Thomas and Dick Quarg two 160 pound ends. The backfield will be composed of Bill Harkness, fullback; Dave Schiller, left half; Daryl Hopkins, right half and Bill Abbey, quarter.

Gauchos Tame Nevada Wolves at Reno Fray

State Line Stops Nevada on Ground, 'Divorcees' Gain by Air Attack

RENO, Nev., Oct. 31.—Scoring in the opening minutes of play the galloping Gauchos from Santa Barbara State college held a seven point lead until the final minutes of play when they pushed across another touchdown to win 13 to 0 over the Wolves of the University of Nevada.

The Staters showed a surplus of power and deception in their attack, but were sadly lacking in the passing department of the game. Howard Yeager lead the Gauchos by amassing 96 yards in 12 tries for a 7.75 average per try. Bobby Morelli came in close behind him with a 5.4 average in 15 attempts.

The Big Green team went right to work after the opening kickoff to march the ball 77 yards up the field to score with Yeager going over from the 19 yard line. Yeager returned Eaton's kickoff to the 23 yard line. In two plays Morelli and Monson took the ball to the 40. Yeager made two on a reverse and then Monson again made a first down by plunging to the 50 yard line. Monson picked up five yards and then Morelli went around end, broke away from several tacklers and was brought down on the Nevada 20 yard line. Pollock hit the line for one yard and Yeager went around end on a reverse, eluded three men to score standing up. Doug Oldershaw kicked the extra point to make it seven to 0.

Yeager Breaks Loose
The second touchdown came with about two minutes left in the game. Ohrt punted to the Gaucho 48 yard line. Pollock made one in the line and then gave it to Yeager, who sprinted through his own left tackle to run to the four yard line. Nevada called time-out, but when play was resumed Yeager took it over on another reverse through left tackle. Oldershaw's kick was wide and the score remained 13 to 0.

The Nevadans showed a good passing attack that worked inside their own 50 yard line, but the Santa Barbara defense tightened up when they began to get close to the Gaucho goal line. The closest the Wolves got all afternoon was to get on the Gaucho 25, here Fredburg intercepted a pass and ran it back 35 yards before the surprised home boys could stop him and the laterals that came after that.

Ohrt was the outstanding back for the Wolves, and Showalter and Cashill stood out on the line. Ohrt averaged a little better than 32 yards on his punts, and gained more than half of the yardage that they chalked up.

Everyone on the Gauchos worked as a team and no particular player could be classed as a star. The team played at a disadvantage of an altitude of 4,500 feet and in weather that threatened to rain or snow at any minute during the first half.

The band put on a good skit during the half time. It consisted of playing "Who's Afraid of the Big Bad Wolf" and several other numbers.
