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
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Intercollegiate Football Appears **Once Again at Harder Stadium**

Gauchos Roll to First Win; Top Redlands

It was a long time coming, but it was well worth the wait. In its first intercollegiate game since 1971, the UC Santa Barbara football team rolled to a 28-2 victory last Saturday night at the University of

'In a perspective sense, this is just the beginning," said second-year Head Coach Mike Warren, whose team travels to Humboldt State for a 7 p.m. game Saturday. "One (win) is what we wanted, but one is not

Led by the two-touchdown performance of freshman runningback Kenneth Smith, the Gauchos easily transformed their highly-strung, pregame emotions into post-game relief.

"To go out and finally feel the emotion of a game, it was really fun," Warren admitted. "I thoroughly enjoyed every second of it."

That feeling began early in the contest. After the Gauchos forced Redlands to punt on its first possession, Gaucho quarterback Paul Wright capped off a 67-yard scoring drive with a one-yard plunge into

Still in the first quarter, the Gauchos upped their lead when Smith, who ran for 118 yards, swept right out and sprinted past the secondary for a 72-yard touchdown. The point-after try failed.

Redlands scored a safety when the Gauchos' center snapped a punt attempt into the endzone. Smith finished off the scoring in the first half with a two-yard scamper in the second quarter, leaving the score at

With five minutes remaining in the game, Wright connected with Bob Capuzello on a 57-yard sideline toss for a touchdown.

UCSB's defense was also noticeably improved over last year's, as Redlands averaged only 2.5 yards per rush. Junior cornerback Mike Hoffman claimed three interceptions, tying an all-time Gaucho mark.

In case anyone doesn't know by now: intercollegiate football is back at UCSB. After an unusually long off-season, 15 years to be exact, the Gauchos are fielding a 75-man Division III team this fall.

The upcoming season will undoubtedly prove to be pivotal. Can the Gauchos compete and win at the intercollegiate level? Will the Gauchos receive enough support to maintain an intercollegiate team? These questions and more will be answered in 1986.

For now, second-year coach Mike Warren will toss these questions aside in lieu of the task at hand — the upcoming schedule.

The team's schedule consists of five other Division III schools, as well as four Division II schools, a big improvement over last year's

"Last year, we played at almost all the levels that you can play at," Warren said. "We didn't play a high school team and we didn't play an NFL team. Other than that, we probably played them."

Not only has the competition changed, but so has the number of interested athletes.

"Last year we didn't have nearly as many come out," Warren said. "It was a whole different deal, we just hung out a sign that said we were going to have football and the guys that came out, played."

In the past year, Warren has talked with over 1,000 players at the junior college and high school levels. Over 500 visited the campus, approximately half of them applied, and half of those were accepted. Warren saw 115 players turn out for the first four days of practice. Due to a limited amount of uniforms, however, Warren had to pare the roster down to 75.

Fifteen players returned from last year's squad, and Warren hopes to integrate the 60 new players with an emphasis on a positive experience.

"We have some real fine players and I think the students will be impressed when they see the talent we have."

An example of that talent is returning starting quarterback Paul Wright. A 6-2, 190 senior, Wright possesses the size and strength to lead Warren's aerial attack.

"Paul has paid his dues," Warren said of the one-year starter. "As last season went on he improved both his touch and

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Water Polo Preview:

Bound for Championship in 1986-87?

In 1979, the West German water polo club, Spandau, came to the United States to scrimmage UC Santa Barbara. Three months later, under the direction of Head Coach Pete Snyder, UCSB won its first NCAA Division I championship in the school's history.

This year, in the first week of September, Spandau, one of the top three European teams, returned once again. Will this pattern lead to another national title? UCSB will know in three months.

Hard work and positive attitudes paid off for Snyder's 1985 squad as they finished 9-3 in the PCAA and 21-11 overall. Advancing to Long Beach for the NCAA tournament, the 1985 Gauchos finished fourth in the nation.


"By and large, our players in the NCAA last year were inexperienced in that competition," Snyder said. Inexperienced entering the competition possibly, but certainly not after. The Gauchos used that experience this Summer at Berkeley for the Summer Outdoor Nationals, where they finished third.

But the 1985 collegiate and summer seasons are as much a part of history as the 1979 Hall of Fame team. As the beginning of the 1986 collegiate season approaches, another story surfaces, one that Pete Snyder, now in his ninth year with UCSB, believes will be a successful one.

"The athletes that we have here at UCSB are going to rise or fall with the amount of work that we want to put in, and last year it paid off with a trip to nationals,' Snyder said.

Unfortunately, many of these key players were lost to graduation. Among those departed are All-Americans John Anderson, Pat O'Brien and goalkeeper Andy Barnes

"What's going to be new for us this year is that we're not going to have to rely on the exploits of

players who have graduated, obviously we can't," Snyder said. "We have to have other players pick up the slack and come through and contribute offensively, and be able to play a sound defense."

The 1986 squad did have one major obstacle to overcome, however, as Campus Pool was given a face lift last spring. "The pool situation spring quarter was definitely a hinderance, as we started one lane behind," Snyder said. "But we are in a good situation now. We have a lot of work to do and we need to make every day, every hour and every minute count for us."


Snyder, with the assistance of John Anderson, a 1985 UCSB alumnus and two-time AllAmerican, will emphasize the ability to shut teams down, as defense is the Gauchos' strongest point this year. Then, using their good team speed, the Gauchos will fastbreak their opponents, and apply offensive pressure.

Such pressure will be expected from a pair of former members of the Mexican National team, who are returning for their second year at UCSB. Senior Antonio Iniguez, the only returning All-American of 1985, is a left-handed player who scored 42 goals last year, second behind Anderson. Iniguez will be the Gauchos' top offensive player. Junior Roberto Aguilar, with 21 goals last year, will also be a threat on offense.

Neal Sorensen, another southpaw, and Kriss Dellota return for their senior seasons and will be expected to shoulder a good deal of the scoring burden this year, especially when opponents key on Iniguez.

The Gauchos will also look to seniors Scott Seely and Fred Hepp. "These are players that are very work-ethic-oriented and very conscientious of what they are doing. Like our other seniors, they know what it takes and have a lot of pride in what they do."

Other players to watch are junior Ryan Balance, a steady player on defense who will be expected to carry the load at the two meter position, junior Terry

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Women's Volleyball Preview:

Taking One Match at a Time

To say that the UCSB women's volleyball team left an impression at the University of the Pacific on Sept. 7 would be, at best, an understatement.

In the season opener for both teams, the Gauchos handed the 1985 national champions their first loss in 27 matches. For the topranked Tigers, it was their first season opening loss in eight years.

The Gauchos left more than an impression, all right. They left an estimated 2,000 UOP fans "very disappointed," according to UCSB Coach Kathy Gregory. If the first match is any indication of things to come, UCSB's 1986 season could be one to remember.

Gregory has no trouble at all remembering the UOP match.

"We did not play our best," Gregory started, "but it was good enough to win. We were ranked 14th in the coaches poll and 12th in Volleyball Monthly. It was a great way to start the season."

The Gauchos, who finished the 1985 season with a 24-16 record and ranked 10th, bowed out of the 1985 NCAA Tournament with a first- girls who can play. round loss to Cal Poly San Luis Obisbo. This season, Gregory hopes to improve on that record thanks to an effective weight settled into her position as a leader

program.

Along with added strength, another plus is overall depth. "Last year we only played six to eight girls in a match and we lost six matches in five games," Gregory said. "This year if we're in the situation where we get into a five game match, we have a lot of

Perhaps one of the greatest strengths of the team is sophomore Liz Towne. A freshman sensation with a physically stronger team, at setter last year, Towne has now

on the court.

"She (Towne) is becoming a very experienced setter," Gregory said, "and our offense is much quicker. We have a better look offensively because our transition game is much faster. playing at a faster speed.'

So for the 1986 Gauchos, speed will not be a question mark.

However, height is a different story. Here lies UCSB's greatest weakness, according to Gregory. The Gauchos lost a pair of sixfooters in Kathie Luedeke and Lisa Moore, leaving this year's squad a little short.

"Our average height, for a top-10 team, is very short," Gregory admitted. "How do we compensate for that? Again, by quickness, playing fast and also by using another one of our greatest strengths, our team defense. Because we're shorter we're very quick and we dig a lot of balls. That's really how we beat UOP. There was not one hitter that could get through us at UOP and they have all six-footers.'

The team remains intact this season except for the two departed seniors. Leading the team as "the (See SPIKERS, p.10C)

Cross Country Teams Change Roles in '86

In 1985, the men's cross country team owed much of its early season catastrophies to inexperience and youth. Of the top runners there was a transfer student (a converted sprinter), two freshmen and two sophomores. Not exactly encouraging odds when compared to the other seasoned teams in the PCAA.

Head Coach Jim Triplett, however, felt that his team would fare well enough in their first meet against Westmont College. UCSB proceeded to lose a close race to the Warriors, ending an 11-year winning streak in the process.

"As the season wore on," Triplett described, "the guys got conditioned and started racing well when it counted most, at the conference meet." The Gauchos placed sixth out of nine PCAA teams and scored 139 points, the best performance by the Gauchos in years.

This year, however, the odds favor the Gauchos in early season competition. No longer young and inexperienced, the top runners are at least one-year veterans with solid summer training entering this season.

"After several meetings last season the team agreed upon more training during the summer," Triplett said. "Their workouts have been structured since June, with more miles, intervals and road runs added in August."

Such increased training will undoubtedly improve the team's performance.

"We could be the most improved team in the conference this year," Triplett said. "I think we could score less than 139 points and could place in the top five of the conference."

However, Southern California Track and Running News apparently do not share Triplett's optimism, both ranking UCSB eighth out of nine schools in their coaches polls. Triplett feels that that will change early in the season.

"Our placings will be much higher in the early season," Triplett predicted. "This (the early season) is where we gain our experience, develop our racing skills and get fit, sharper, for the end of the season. Everything is geared toward the conference and regional meets."

Although the Gauchos should have a very good team this season, they still aren't favorites in their first race, again against a strong Westmont team. "They will have already had two races by the time we race them," Triplett explained.

The Gauchos have three potential front runners returning from last season's squad.

Jeff Jacobs, top runner most of last year, is expected to continue to lead the pack this year. "Jeff is a tough, durable runner," Triplett remarked.

Another front runner for UCSB is Rob Styler, who was injured most of last season but returned to become the top Gaucho in the conference meet.

Bert Esparza, consistently a topthree finisher for the Gauchos, is expected to remain in top form this season.

Other Gaucho returnees who may figure prominently in the team's conference plans are Robert Theide, Pete Weinerth and Dan Howard.

Leading the newcomers this season is freshman Ted Brown, UCSB's top recruit and a 9:32 two-miler. Phil Noyes, a freshman recruit from Massachusetts nicknamed "the Beast from the East" by Assistant Coach Pete Dolan, is a 9:37 two-miler.

While the men's team is becoming more mature this (See ROLES, p.11C)

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
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
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Men's Soccer Team Starts New Season with Added Experience

The 1985 season was like a carnival for U.C. Santa Barbara men's soccer. At times the Gauchos were close to grabbing the brass ring, narrowly losing to eventual National Champion UCLA 1-0, holding then top-ranked Virginia scoreless for 80 minutes before losing, losing to PCAA Champion UNLV only 2-0 and defeating PCAA rival and toptwenty tenant Fresno State, 3-2.

At other times, the Gauchos' season took on a rollercoaster effect and bottomed out. UCSB lost to: USF 7-1, the school's worst defeat under Head Coach Andy Kuenzli; U.C. Irvine, 1-0; Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, 2-0; and Cal State Northridge by a 1-0 count.

When the final curtain fell on 1985, U.C. Santa Barbara had its first losing season (8-12-1) since

Realistically, the carnival of 1985 stemmed from UCSB's youth: nine of the 18 players were freshmen. This year the team will once again be made up of a solid group of freshmen. However, one thing will be different. Along with those new freshmen and the few juniors and seniors will be nine sophomores,

those same players who took their knocks in 1985.

'The nine freshmen we had in 1985 will know how to play together even better in 1986," Kuenzli said. "I think the prospects of playing together for a long time is very good for them. Not only do they get to know each other's styles and talents, but they can grow as a unit."

While sophomores will make up the majority of the roster and will undoubtedly be UCSB's bloodline in 1985, they will have to take a backseat to the team's heart and soul, goalkeeper John Guthrie.

"John Guthrie has almost no weaknesses," Kuenzli said of the 6-1 senior. "He occasionally has some trouble with positioning, but he is so quick and comes off the line so well that he covers things up. Most importantly, Guthrie is powerful. He'll dominate the box with his physical assets. He'll simply outmuscle people."

While Guthrie leaves few questions, the Gaucho offense, poor in 1985, presents a host of questions.

Gone from the 1985 team is top goal producer Michael Sanchez. Expected to pick up the slack will be sophomore foreward-turnedmidfielder Chris John. Last season "C.J." scored four goals and played well in the latter half of the year. In addition to John, Kuenzli will look to returning midfielder Richard Hilton, who scored six rehabilitating from knee surgery.


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

Stan Morrison Named As UCSB's Athletic Director

In June, UCSB Athletic Director Ken Droscher announced his resignation, citing a "summary of reasons" for his decision. A nationwide search for a replacement yielded former USC basketball coach, Stan Morrison.

Droscher accomplished a number of goals during his sixyear tenure, among them was the reinstatement of UCSB's football team to intercollegiate level.

Morrison, the man who brought the Trojans twice to the NCAA playoffs during his six years as the team's head coach, visited the campus a short while after Droscher announced his decision. Campus officials stated only that Morrison was one of many applicants under consideration. However, when it became apparent that Morrison was the only one invited to visit the campus, many believed that Stan was, indeed, the man.

In late July campus officials announced that Morrison would replace Droscher as athletic Director.

"I am genuinely thrilled to have the opportunity to work for such a prestigious university,"

Morrison said. "I am enthusiastic about the people in Santa Barbara, the coaches, and the university community, who I believe want to help us reach our athletic goals."

Morrison had recently taken an associate athletic director position at USC where he was in charge of the drug testing

Only three times did they allow three or more goals to be scored, and on 10 seperate occasions, they gave up one or zero. Overall they produced six

The Gauchos will have a strong, albeit a young defense. Sophomore fullbacks Jess "J.B." Frost, Tim Vom Steeg and Jack Nick form a solid defensive core, while the

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
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National Title No Longer a Dream

Women's Soccer Sets Higher Goals

Since the close of the 1983 season, the UC Santa Barbara women's soccer team has taken up a seemingly permanent residence in the Nation's Top-20. Head Coach Andy Kuenzli is hopeful that the Lady Gauchos can extend their lease in 1986.

"Overall, I believe we have a better team this year than we did last year," Kuenzli said. "Our only concern is at the goalkeeper position, but we believe that that position can become strong as well."

The Gauchos welcome back the majority of a squad that finished at 17-5-1. The team also finished among the final eight in the NCAA Playoffs, winning their first round match against a previously unbeaten Cal State Hayward squad.

The one major loss from last year's team will be two-time All-American goalkeeper Monica Hall.

Women's Soccer Roundup

The women's soccer team has played two games so far and has an early season record of 1-0-1. A brief game-by-game description follows:

Sept. 7: UCSB 1, University of Santa Clara 1—Kris Spiegel scores for the Gauchos on a header during the game at Harder Stadium, but Santa Clara is able to tie the game with only 15 seconds left to play. The UCSB booters outshoot Santa Clara 24-5.

Sept. 10: UCSB 2, UC San Diego 1 — Freshman Diane Manore scores both goals for the Gauchos as the team comes from behind during the game at Harder Stadium.

Slated to replace Hall is junior Denise SanVicente. Though she has been a Gaucho for two seasons, SanVicente has seen very little time on the field. Although playing in only 35 minutes in one game last season, Kuenzli believes she has what it takes to do the job.

"Denise is a very hard worker," Kuenzli explained. "She has her strengths and her weaknesses just like every other player. We need to work on her confidence, and once that is in place I believe she'll be fine. There is no doubt we can be successful with her in the goal."

The only other goalkeeper on the roster is freshman Diahn Matzner from Agoura Hills, but Kuenzli feels that 6-0 sophomore fullback Kristen Schritter is another possibility for goalie.

"(Schritter) is a tremendous athlete," Kuenzli said. "Because of her size and strength, she could be successful, at least in a backup role."

While there is only a slight question at the goalkeeper position, there is little question about the foreward slots. Leading the way for the fourth straight year will be senior, three-time All-American Carin Jennings.

Jennings has scored 78 goals and 34 assists in her first three seasons at UCSB. Last year she scored 20 goals and passed off 14 assists for a total of 54 points.

"Carin is the best forward in the country," Kuenzli said.
"Statistically last season was not her best, but she was keyed on so greatly by our opponents that at times she couldn't get any room. This year we hope to have some more help for her."

Last season Durell Petrossi and Lisa Busch, Jenning's usual linemates, each scored four goals, with Petrossi adding 12 assists. However, neither has gained the offensive consistency that Kuenzli believes they can.

"We need more balance at the forward position," Kuenzli said. "I think we can get much of that from Busch and Petrossi, but I also believe our new players will play important roles."

The Gauchos add to their squad the 1986 CIF player of the Year, Dianne Manore and 1984 CIF Player of the Year, Nancy Payne

"Manore and Payne can both develop into great offensive threats almost immediately," Kuenzli said. "Payne is very strong and Manore is one of the best players we've ever recruited."


Beyond the forward line, the Gauchos are also very strong. In the midfield they return senior Kris Browne, juniors Laura Venezia and Liz LeDuc, and sophomore Cathy Lameira. In addition, former Gaucho spiker Debbie Rutherford, transfer Jody Romero and two freshmen, Lisa Telk and Jenni Matt could be instrumental.

"We will be strong on the midfield," Kuenzli said. "We lost Julie Taylor, but we have enough experience and talent (See GOALS, p.11C)

best all-around player" is Charlotte Mitchel, a senior outside hitter and an All-American candidate. Last year Mitchel led the Gauchos with 383 digs and was named to the Second Team All PCAA.

Other top returnees include junior Bonnie Bright, an outside hitter who started most games last year, and Shari Rodgers, a senior outside hitter who is expected to be "the mainstay of the offense," according to Gregory. The versatile Rodgers, who recorded 233 kills a year ago, will also see some action as setter this season. Bright, a fine beach volleyball player, has been a two-year starter since arriving as a freshman.

Two of the most improved players are 6-0 junior Anne Wyatt, who could start at middle blocker

this season, and sophomore outside hitter Annette Juptner, who will be seeing increased action this season. Junior outside hitter Merilee Hicks and sophomore middle blocker Susan Bakker round out the rest of the returnees. Both are expected to battle for playing time in 1986.

Leading the newcomers are transfer students Judy Bellomo and Yami Menendez. Bellomo, a junior outside hitter, comes to UCSB after two fine seasons at UNLV, which dropped its program last season. She ranked third in the PCAA a year ago with a kill average of 3.56 per game. Menendez, another junior outside hitter, was named the California Junior College Player of the Year while at El Camino College last season.

Even with such quality players, Gregory still expects the freshman to be an integral part of the team. Freshmen Nancy Young and Jill

Horning, two outside hitters/-middle blocker, are both established players out of high school and should see limited action this season.

Gregory, entering her 12th year as Gaucho head coach, is realistic about the upcoming season.

"Every team in the PCAA is very strong, so even if you're ranked fourth, fifth, or sixth, you are capable of being number one," Gregory said. "There is so much balance in women's volleyball that you can't look past the next game."

With that in mind Gregory has set reasonable goals for the team: winning as many games as possible, to be in the top four in the conference, and to have a winning record.

Coaches and players may not be able to look past the next game, but for fans it is almost irresistible. And when they inevitably do, 1986 could be a season to remember.

Other quarterback prospects include freshman Dan Costa, transfer Tom Geeting, and sophomore Jed Curtis. All could see limited playing time.

Whoever launches the ball will have three returning players scrambling to catch it. The receivers are junior Chris Morrison (6-2, 180), sophomore Chris Horntlein (5-10, 170) and senior Steve Marks (5-11, 165). Bill Harrison, Bob Capuzello and Bill Russell, all junior college transfers, can expect to see action as receiver as well.

Starting at tight end is Brian Harrison (6-2, 215), a returnee from the club team. Freshman Khaled Shahbou (6-3, 200) is expected to see time at tight end.

Leading a talented corps of runningbacks is freshman Kenneth Smith (5-11, 190), a graduate of Verbum Dei High School. Smith, who runs a 4.3 40, was recruited by Pac-10 and PCAA schools. Other runningbacks include J.C. transfer Eric Johnson and club returnee Adam Peterson.

Junior college transfers will

make up much of the offensive line. That group includes Eric Zwierlein (6-3, 260), Mark Erskine (6-3, 235) and Tim O'Neil (6-1, 230). Returnee Steve Dethlefsen (6-2, 215) will start at left guard, leaving transfers Dan Ott (6-1, 230), Everett Webb (6-2, 285) and John Lassallette (6-5, 230) vying for playing time.

Defensively, the Gauchos are much improved over 1985.

"We're bigger up front, we're tougher up front, and we have more depth," Warren said of his defense.

The defensive line is made up of many club returnees, among them 5-11, 210 nose guard Pat Farley. Also returning from the club team are Steve Clausen (6-4, 219) and Keith Stapp (6-1, 227). A pair of freshmen, Charles Brown (6-3, 215) and Richard Ortiz (6-3, 208), are both expected to help out.

Chris Humphreys (6-1, 200) and Klaus Leitenbuaer (6-0, 210), both returnees, will be the starting inside linebackers. Other candidates for the inside linebacker position are J.C. transfers Rick Priest and Jon Barnes. On the outside UCSB looks to two freshmen, Vince Moss and Scott Eberlein, along with J.C. transfer Jim Crossman.

Heading a solid list of safeties are returnees Tim Duray, Robert Davey and Brian Scher. J.C. transfer Mike Hoffman, along with two freshmen, Darvell Williams and Darryl Thomas, will lead the cornerbacks. Other defensive backs include freshmen John Hill and Derek Rusk, and J.C. transfers Dan Demarchi and Mike Hennigan.

Freshman John Corrigan will be UCSB's placekicker, while Greg Friedman will punt and be backup placekicker.


Warren stresses how important student support is to the team.



Triplett is hoping for a few surprises himself this season.

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
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
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
