## THIRD NSF LECTURE JULY 9; PUBLIC INVITED

The third lecture in the National Science Foundation special series will be given Thursday, July 9, at 8 p.m. in the Science Auditorium. The public is invited free of charge.

Dr. Robert L. Fisher, research geologist of the University of California, La Jolla, will be the speaker. His subject will be, "Subsidence and Life or Caught in a Tectogene." (For needed definition and commentary thereof, we refer you to our "Letters" Department on page 3.)

On Wednesday, July 15, Dr. Joel W. Hedgpeth, Director of the Pacific Marine Station at Dillon Beach will lecture on "The History of Marine Biology."

## DR. GOULD NOW AT DESK

Dr. Samuel B. Gould officially occupied the chair as Chancellor of the Santa Barbara campus on Wednesday. The Goulds arrived in Santa Barbara on Friday to take up residence in their Hope Ranch home. A foot-high stack of correspondence containing many congratulatory messages, and consideration of the 1960-61 budget were the first projects for the former president of Antioch College.

## DR. E. W. DOLCH TO GIVE 2nd ALL-COLLEGE LECTURE JULY 7

The second All-College lecture scheduled for Tuesday, July 7, will be given by Dr. Edward W. Dolch, famed pioneer in modern reading methods. The public is invited to attend the talk, which will begin at 3 p.m. in the new classroom lecture hall. His topic will be, "Why the Controversy About Reading?"

Both visiting faculty members for the 1959 Summer Session, Dr. Dolch and his wife, who has assisted him throughout his lifetime career, are professors emeritus from the University of Illinois.

In nearly 40 years of direct concern with reading problems, they have together evolved a variety of techniques which virtually revolutionized teaching theory. They are credited by many authorities with launching the word control movement dominant in today's school readers.

In addition to their national reputations gained as writers and lecturers on the subject, the Dolches are joint developers of the famed "Dolch Materials" - over 60 reading-aid devices acclaimed and used throughout the country.

Two All-College lectures remain. On July 14, Dr. Charlotte E. Elmott, visiting professor of education, Santa Barbara City Schools, will speak on "Juvenile Delinquency and the Schools." Dr. Rodney P. Dales, visiting lecturer on zoology from Bedford College, University of London, will give the final address on July 21. His topic will be, "On Living in Sand: Problems of Life on the Beach."

## 1959 SUMMER ENROLLMENT RECORD FOR NEW CAMPUS

As 1959 summer enrollment passed the 850 mark - with late-comers still dribbling in - a new record in summer session attendance on the new campus has been reached. Last year's figure was 795 registrants.
