Touring I.V.

Isla Vista. The town in which most of us have lived, breathed, studied and partied for the last four (or even five or six years). It's been our home away from home, a way station as we've readied ourselves to take our place in society as enlightened, educated adults.

But important a symbol as I.V. is to the UCSB Student, the minute our parents show up, the first thing we think of is to shuffle them off to downtown Santa Barbara. The beauty and varied points of interest of Santa Barbara make it the perennial attraction that it is, but for graduating seniors, showing off to their parents the place where "the real education begins" is not such a bad idea.

It may be hard to take a step back and look at I.V. as a tourist attraction, but there are a number of sights, sounds and even smells that set the town apart to make it a mark of interest.

Starting from Pardall tunnel, I.V. stretches out before your eyes. Take a walk down the street and turn left at the first Embarcadero, and pass by the infamous Versateller, pizza rivals Woodstocks and Pizza Bob's, and two of I.V.'s best restaurants, The Blue Dolphin Cafe and Borsodi's.

As you take a right to pass through Anisquyo Park, off to the left will be the Graduate, the only dance club in I.V. and also the only restaurant with a full bar. Show off your civic awareness and recount

the history of the club, which is housed in the building that used to be the Bank of America. One of the darker moments in the history of Isla Vista was the night back in 1970 when Vietnam war protestors fire bombed the bank and UCSB student Kevin Moran was killed by a stray police bullet.

The Park will be a good place to rest and digest the history of I.V., and the mood is easily lightened by telling Mom and Dad about the events that take place in the park, like the annual Juggler's Festival and the live bands that play from time to time. Some of the town's permanent outdoor residents may be sitting on a bench near the other side of the park, enjoying the view and the day. The flowers in the pond have been in bloom lately, adding a touch of beauty to a town that has its fair share of trash.

Exiting the park on the other side, take a left again and continue the stroll around back towards Del Playa. You can point out Pruitt's and the I.V. Market, where you've bought macaroni and cheese for much of the past four years. As you pass by Spinnakers you might recommend a stop to enjoy a beer on the patio, so your parents can get a feel for the true atmosphere and ambiance that is Isla Vista.

From there, cut over to Del Playa and start wandering down toward Dog Shit Park. Tell them the story of your miraculous survival of the madness of Halloween '86, when 30,000 people descended on that one narrow street. As they begin to notice the impacted parking and the overall crowded conditions, explain that Isla Vista has the highest population density of any town west of the Mississippi.

The stroll west toward Devereaux can be enjoyed from either road or beach, depending on how much tar you feel like removing later, but that too is I.V. Once the journey has taken you as far as Deveraux Point and it's time to enjoy the journey back, suddenly I.V. doesn't seem like such a boring place after all.


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The Four-year Trip Down Graduation

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Seeing the Sights

The end of the school year is approaching for your son or daughter. You've spent thousands of dollars on their education, driven or flown hundreds of miles to be with them on this special day and share all the joys and pleasures that accompany their graduation. And what do they

Hey, it's okay. Don't despair. After all, soon they won't be able to see their buddies at a minute's notice. You get to be their parents all their lives. But still, you have all this time on your hands. What are you going

The solution is called State Street.

If your child hasn't told you about all the days and nights spent shopping and loitering and sipping coffee on Santa Barbara's most popular strip of land, well, at least they bought you a Christmas present last year. State has just about any gift item, decoration or edible imagined in the Western culture. And it's only as far away as the 101

Parents who have brought their own cars just need to speed down that familiar highway southwards until the Arrellaga or Mission Street exit. State Street is just after Chapala. But if you flew in, or you don't want to deal with the limited parking problems, you can find alternate transportation through the MTD bus system. The number 24 express bus outbound will take you from the campus bus stop located just beyond North Hall or anywhere along El Colegio Road. Or else you can take the scenic route with the number 11 bus that traces Hollister Avenue all the way to Santa Barbara. This bus will also take you past the La Cumbre

So once you're there, you can start from almost any point from Valerio Street to De La Guerra without getting bored. For the sake of continuity, we'll start from Valerio. The first sight of potential interest you'll see is J.K. Frimples, a pleasant restaurant that has an enclosed patio so you can watch the all the people in the street. It's also open twenty four hours so there should be no reason to rush your stomach.

Further down he street you'll notice a bit of construction going on. Once past this you'll come by the Trinity Evangelical Church, one of the more beautiful pieces of architecture in the area, and one of the ideal places to take snaphots. An I. Magnin store is located on the right on Sola Street. Nobody with access to a credit card could can hope to avoid

About this time you'll notice that State opens up to a plethora of different and exciting stores, making the buying possibilities practically limitless. Among the things to see after I. Magnin to check out include Gervasoni's My Flowers, not just a flower shop, Brigette's, a cosy little restaurant with emphasis on its wines, Maison Robert, a cosy little French restaurant, and the Arlington Center, Santa Barbara's landmark performing arts center that also features movies.

Once you reach Victoria St., no browser will want to miss the Earthling Bookshop to the left, noted for the several thousand books in stock that Walden's wouldn't touch. The next sight to catch is Victoria Court, an enclosed section that sports Mc Donald's as well as a half-dozen other shops. Across the way is the Granada Theatre which features first-run films. And for pre- and post- movie snacking there is no better places than Hobson's Ice Cream or Cinnamon Roll Fair located next door. Over to the right you find another notable restaurant for your dining pleasure, State A bar and grill. This also features outdoor dining which is a very pleasant experience on a warm Santa Barbara day.

Further down the street, you'll surely come across the Santa Barbara Museum of Art. It's free, and the exhibits are always the object of great interest. Definitely a must see. But you might want to note that it is closed on Monday, but it also offers daily tour at 2:00. The Arcada center on the right hand side features more shops, including the Acapulco restaurant and bar for weary travelers. It has a cool fountain right outside and is a real nice place to just relax for a spell.

Passing Carrillo will take you by such favorites as Penguin's frozen yogurt, the Fiesta Four Theatres, and Stonehenge Jewels. Past Canon Perdido, Piccadilly Square is a great place to browse. It's an enclosed mini-mall with all the tiny shops integrated into the same two-story building like a small community, complete with clothing stores, refreshments, and game shops.

If you want to stop for a quick snack or just coffee, Ruby's Cafe and

Stearn's Wharf Pier

The view of Santa Barbara from Stearn's Wharf pier says it all. On the one side, the ocean expands with the Channel Islands looming on the horizon, 20 miles off the coast. On the other side, the city and homes reach up into the backdrop of the Santa Ynez Mountains. The Harbor Department calls it the "only place in the state where one can see both a sunrise and a sunset by simply turning sideways."

Stearn's Wharf, once owned by Jimmy Cagney, was built in 1872. At the time it was the longest deepwater pier on the coast between Los Angeles and San Francisco. It is still the oldest working pier in California. The half-mile long pier is now owned by the City of Santa Barbara and maintained as a historic and scenic sight.

A fire in 1973 forced the closure of the wharf, which then remained in disrepair due to a lack of oil revenue to fund a renovation. The city bought the pier in 1975, and restoration began in 1979. The new Stearn's wharf opened in the fall of 1981

There have been isolated fires since the 1981 restoration, but Stearn's Wharf Pier continues to stand as a proud landmark of Santa Barbara. Flanked by Ledbetter's Beach and East Beach, Stearn's Wharf attrects 11 million people annually to enjoy the sea and the sun. The Santa Barbara Harbor, with over 1,000 boat slips, is just south of the pier.

The Bicentennial Friendship Fountain of three leaping dolphins, greets visitors at the pier entrance. The sculpture was designed by Bud Bottoms and finally dedicated in 1985, three years late for Santa Barbara's 100th birthday celebration which it was intended to commemorate. Choosing an appropriate design proved to be a difficult and controversial task for the city, but the approval rating among residents has been high, and the statue has become a symbol of the city.

The Sunday art fair brings together a collection of local artists who congregate along Cabrillo

Boulevard in front of the pier. In addition to the arts fair, often young trick riders come to show off their extraordinary talents on ordinary bikes to the delight of the crowds watching the display.

The pier itself hosts a variety of restaurants and shops. Everything from bait and tackle to local wines is available. The Santa Barbara Shellfish Company features fresh fish caught by local anglers, served either uncooked or in a variety of plate specials. Moby Dick Restaurant, The Harbor Restaurant, and Char West Restaurant also feature local seafood on their menus.

Stearn's Wharf Vintners offers wines from vintyards in Santa Ynez, Santa Barbara, Sonoma, Napa, Amador, Mosel, and Loire Valleys. Visitors over 21 can buy wine buy the glass to taste or arrange a picnic to enjoy on the balcony overlooking the water.

The Nature Conservancy also has an office on the pier. The Conservancy is dedicated to preserving natural diversity by protecting the bast examples of national lands and waters. The office offers literature and exhibits on the management of Santa Cruz Island for public display.

Other shops on the pier have candy, seashells, fossils, ice cream, clothing and home decorations. Visitors can stop in at Madame Rosinka's for a palm reading telling the past, presnt and future. The family of palm readers is in its third generation on the pier.

Trolleys run daily on regularly scheduled routes from the wharf up State Street to La Cumbre Shopping Plaza and back to the pier via Anacapa Street. The route is designed to connect visitors and residents with major hotels, shopping areas and local tourist and cultural attractions.

Stearn's Wharf is at the base of State Street at the intersecton of State and Cabrillo Boulevard. Most shops are open 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. daily. Parking on the pier is free with a \$3 purchase validation.

Espresso Roma after De La Guerra are two good places to kick back and enjoy the atmosphere. The Roma features baked breads, and Ruby's has a pretty good menu. Other things in this section to see include the Oldtown Mall, which lives up to its name, and for more eating pleasure of a low overhead variety, Alex's Original Mexican Cafe.

An important mental factor in touring the shops of State Street is that you shouldn't hurry, and you shouldn't worry. The atmosphere is built in a way to relax you, to make you feel comfortable. Many of the residents feel that way too, so don't be put off by the folks just sitting around and watching people go by. Nobody is out to hurt anybody else. This is Santa Barbara, after all.

All right, now you've bought the town out and youp graduate is all ready to accompany you and your gifts to any sight you want to see. Admit it, you want to come back and look at all the goodies you couldn't bring yourself to buy. Then. It's okay. And maybe after the stores are closed you'll even want to let the kid take you to a midnight showing of The Rocky Horror Picture Show on Friday night. Great! Everybody thinks their parents need to loosen up. Just don't forget your water spray bottle.

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Superior Vintages

We all like grapes, especially when they are fermented. So did a Persian king many years ago. As the legend goes, he was so enchanted by grapes that he stored an enormous amount in his cellar. After they had fermented the CO2 that was released was thought to be poisonous. One of his many wives, who had been rejected, went to the cellar to put an end to her unbearable existence. But the only suffering she might have subsequently endured was a nasty hangover resulting from her discovery of the chemical change in her husband's grapes. She staggered back up the cellar stairs in complete bliss.

From that time on wine has become the drink for lost lovers (give me a bottle now.) And since everyone in their own way is a lost lover we can all enjoy a glass or two (maybe even three).

Most people are under the mistaken impression that the only people to have mastered the art of winemaking are the French. But to get a nice bottle of wine one does not need to travel to France because the Santa Barbara and Santa Ynez Valley wineries are now producing award-winning wines that rival French imports. We are privileged to have a number of wineries in the area where we can taste the wines critics are raving about. With this new found interest and information on locally made wines, we began a quest for the best tasting bottle in Santa Barbara County.

Our wine tasting day was overcast with threatening gray clouds that attempted to dampen our spirits as determined but inexperienced wine tasters. Our first stop was the Santa Barbara Winery. We were a little dissapointed that tasters were limited to only three glasses, but as newspaper critics we were allowed to exceed the limit.

Before treating our palates to the fine wines available, we toured the facilities to learn how grapes are miraculously turned into the drink for lost lovers. We learned that the damp, cob-webbed cellars stereotypical of a winery are a thing of the past. Wine producers must keep their equipment free of bacteria and very clean in general.

The first step in the long process of wine-making is crushing the grapes. Once the grapes are crushed they are put into a cylindric stainless steel container where the juice is filtered into a pan. From the pan the juice is pumped into tanks where it is allowed to ferment until the alcohol conversion process is complete.

The wine is then put into wooden aging barrells, most of which are imported from France. White wines are aged for approximately six months and reds normally ripen for two years. The longer aging period of the reds is required to produce a stronger tasting wine. The barrells give the wines their slightly charred or roasted flavor.

The local wineries have their hands full in the fall when the hard chore of harvest time comes and the grapes are put through fermenting procedures. Santa Barbara County's 11,000 acres of vineyards demand a great deal of time and effort on the part of the vintners to bring in the best possible crop.

The acreage is divided into two regions, the Santa Ynez Valley and the Santa Maria Valley. The varieties of grapes harvested from these regions include: Chardonnay, Sauvignon Blanc, Pinot Noir, Cabernot Sauvignon, Riesling, Merlot, Gewurtztraminer and Chenin Blanc.

The climate and soil in the region of the Santa Barbara County vineyards is comparable to the wine regions in France. Being so close to the ocean assures the vintners the cool breeze and temperate evenings that contribute to a fine product.

After sitting through an explanation as to how the wines are produced, we charged exuberantly to the tasting table. But just as there is an art to making the wine, there is also an art to tasting it. Technique is acquired from experience, but the novice wine taster is offered helpful tips from resident experts at the various wineries. Basically, a good wine pleases the senses of sight, smell, taste and touch.

First, the sense of sight must be satisfied. An easy way to judge the purity of a wine is to hold the glass up to the light to determine that it is brilliantly clear; there should be no orange color to the wine.

After establishing the appearance of the wine, the fragrance must be tested. The method is simple. By swirling the wine in the glass the scent is released. Then, take a strong sniff to determine the bouquet or aroma of the wine. Aroma is noticable in young wines; bouquet is the complex odor of an aged wine. An experienced nose should be able to distingish the difference. Following these tests, sip the wine and roll it in the mouth to reach all taste bud areas. The taste should be harmonious with the sight and smell.

Roll the wine once again in the mouth to recognize its feel. It should never be cloying or thin. After tasting the wine, swallow it and note the taste sensations remaining. The aftertaste should always be pleasant.

To avoid fuller wines overpowering the more dry wines it is always a good idea to begin with white wines and work up to the reds. The word work is used but actually the task is quite fun. The subtle taste of the white wines provides a pleasurable preface to the stronger, fruitier taste of the red wines.

Shuffle Avoids Hollywood Formula

Once upon a time there was a young man, raised in typical middle class style, trying his best to succeed. He lives with his mother, grandmother, and little brother in a modest home; he works a boring job as he bides his time waiting for the big break. He kisses his' mother and grandmother on the cheek as he goes out the door. His neighbors wave to him as he drives his Honda down the street on his way to an audition. He stops to see his girlfriend at work; she gives him her scarf as a good luck charm.

The young man has above average looks, an engaging smile, and a pleasant, intelligent voice. His little brother adores and emulates him. He is the typical hard-working unknown actor pursuing his dream, but one thing sets him apart.

The young man is black.

Hollywood Shuffle is the direct result of the experiences of its star, Robert Townsend, who also has credits as co-writer and directer. After roles in American Flyer and A Soldier's Story earned Townsend a chunk of money and a name in Hollywood, he went to the major studios to secure backing to produce Shuffle. But after being turned down at every juncture, he enlisted the support of fellow actors and friends willing to take a chance on his vision, and an opportunity to get back at the Hollywood establishment that offers roles to blacks only when the part calls for a pimp, junkie or

The film was shot in only 14 days - spread over three years time and was completely financed by Townsend's earning from other films, a retainer from Richard Pryor's production company (now out-of-business), and \$40,000 run up on credit card advances. The rough product, shot on the total budget of \$100,000 dollars, was picked up by Samuel Goldwyn Studios, who gave Townsend another \$750,000 to re-shoot and pay actors, plus a two million dollar advertising and promotion budget. Plus they covered his

Reviewing and rating the film is not an easy task, probably for the same reasons Townsend originally had difficulty getting backing: it follows no formula. It is a satirical look at the difficulties of a black actor trying to find work without resorting to playing those roles that perpetuate the negative image of blacks. To those raised on those negative roles, showing a black in the middle class setting always reserved for whites in the media reinforces the message that a negative image of blacks in society will continue so long as actors accept the stereotypical parts. For lead character Robert Taylor, it is establishing a career as an actor, but also the compounded struggle of a man trying to make it without

losing sight of his values and ideals. As an avid movie and television viewer, it was hard for me to laugh at men and women of color parodying the syste by which they've been so exploited. It evoked disconcerting memories of almost any program I've ever seen where the roles played by blacks almost invariably paralleled the caricatures the cast presented in Shuffle. The jive-talking pimp or street kid, the fractured English, the runaway slave; I knew I'd seen it all before, but I'd never seen it like this.

Hollywood Shuffle is billed as a comedy, but trying to laugh as the message is absorbed felt as uncomfortable for me as laughing at racial jokes. This discomfort is the mark of the movie's success. I don't look at educational television and say it was entertaining, that it was good or bad; the standard I use to judge such a presentation was whether or not I learned anything. Rather than a comedy, Hollywood Shuffle is an educational film about American society, and the film industry in particular. It's not a laugh-riot formula comedy, but its provocative story makes it worth

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The point is well made that black actors (like major league ballplayers) possess more then passable faculties when it comes to tackling any role. One scene shows Townsend playing a standard King Lear; the other woman in the scene is Hispanic. Capable black actors are out there, but they're not getting the parts.

Innovative as the film is, the lowbudget feel can be distracting. It not as bad as Love Boat-style 30second scene jumps, but Taylor's slips into a daydream sequence, back into reality, into his car, and over to his job at Winky Dinky Dog, border on irratic and come dangerously close at times to crossing the line that induces viewer headache.

The acting of the players, who assume a variety of different roles throughout the movie, is superb, and if Townsend's vision is wellreceived at the box office, I'll be looking forward to the next ensemble presentation. Townsend has said that he hopes to emulate Woody Allen, who returns to his friends again and again in each project.

Townsend has shown that a serious consideration of problems faced by blacks need not be a somber drama or a prosletyzingdef speech. He has exposed the stereotypes for the myths they are and preserved dignity with his parody. Maybe the film will help to turn the Hollywood Shuffle into a Malibu Stroll, and open up the entertainment industry to more than just the Websters and Eddie not only the typical struggle of Murphy's of the world. Hollywood Shuffle is worth a look.

Not only is wine tasting fun, but it is a necessary education. One doesn't want to appear gauche by ordering a bottle of Chardonnay to accompany a New York steak. Although such a situation may not be life threatening, there is an importance to complimenting a meal with the correct wine. To avoid embarassment, wine tasting provides the opportunity to gain experience in ordering the right bottle, without the pressure of failure

The tasting room at wineries gives novices a chance to gain experience. At the Santa Ynez Winery, visitors can sip from five different varieties and learn a little about the wines from the lovely woman serving behind the counter. Those running the winery also recognize the value of the tasting room because it also increases sales of their wines since they can be purchased right on the premises. The vintners also feel they are offering a public service by educating visitors in wine appreciation, Santa Ynez Tasting Room Manager Reka Badger said

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People travel from all over the country to taste the award-winning products of the local wineries. "We're impressed. The wines here are very good compared to other wineries we have been to," Los Angeles resident Cathy Schaffer said. "We are having a great time."

After experiencing many different wines we finally ended our quest to find the best bottle in Santa Barbara County. The Santa Ynez Winery stumbled upon a discovery that they may never come up with again. Because they left some of their grapes on the vines too long, they were able to achieve a unique mold which may never again be duplicated. From the moldy grapes they were able to produce an exquisite dessert wine, which they very appropriately named Nectar of The Gods.

The Santa Ynez Winery is located just outside of the quaint little Dutch town of Solvang. The lush green wine vineyards and fields of wheat of the surrounding landscape are beautiful. Although our earlier forays into wine-tasting had left us slightly tipsy, we could not pass up the opportunity to purchase a bottle and enjoy the scenery.

We didn't have the money on hand to purchase a \$25 bottle of Nectar of The Gods, so we settled instead for a bottle of Johannisberg Riesling 1981 and enjoyed it with our photographer and his girlfriend in the midst of ripening grapes.

The vineyard is located off Refugio Road just south of the Reagan Ranch, but politics were ignored as we enjoyed our wine in the delightful atmosphere of the grape orchard.

Wine-tasting provides a welcome getaway from the tried and true activities of Santa Barbara; for those wishing to see this area of the central coast in a new light, why not set aside a day to explore the sensory delights of the local vintners.

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Fine Showings at Local Museums

If you are a first time visitor to UCSB or are making your final return visit to celebrate a parting good-bye, don't miss the opportunity to sample the university and surrounding community's selection of fine art establishments. UCSB has some quality talent-filled shows easily accessible and on view this week. If you will be visiting downtown Santa Barbara, there are an abundance of art galleries and museums to experience. Here is a sample of the wealth of the art world to see in and around UCSB.

On Campus

University Art Museum

Currently on view at the UCSB museum is the *Annual Undergraduate Exhibition*. It is a beautiful displayed show with some very mature pieces by Letters and Science Art Studio students. There are a multitude of medias ranging from etchings, photography series, paintings and computer generated works.

Some of the more impressive entries include two Willia.m. Dole Memorial Scholarship winners. Rose Bilat's Paix, 1987, is a large bright oil, dripping with washed colors and symbolic images and Equestrian Avenue, 1987, by Lydia Emard is the distorted image of a white door and slanted ceiling fixed on color copuler print. The photography series of the exhibition are also brilliant. Don't miss Sonya Knapp's Sister Atlantis, 1987, black and white photo done in a David Hockney style with an overlayed perspective.

The University Art Museum is located on the first floor of the Arts building west of Storke plaza. The museum is open Tuesday through Saturday 10-4, and Sunday 1-5.

Women's Center Art Gallery

This gallery is a prominent source of women artists' exhibitions at UCSB. Currently on view is Home/Less a photographic installation by Ginny Brush. The subtle, yet thought provoking exhibit is complimentary to the intimate setting of the Women's Center. Home/Less is a mixed media

combination of large photographs, suitcases with recorded messages inside, and graphics of facts about the homeless. The combination gives an odd still-life yet moving image production that is profoundly unique.

The Women's Center Art Gallery is located in building 434 just north of Storke tower and ajacent to Student Services. Their hours are Monday through Friday 8a.m.-5 p.m..

College of Creative Studies Art Gallery

The current exhibition is a solo show of charcoal drawings by 1973 CCS graduate Mary Heebner.

Creative Studies is east of the University Center across from the psychology building and is open Monday through Friday 8a.m.-5 p.m..

In Santa Barbara

Santa Barbara Museum of Art

The Santa Barbara Museum of Art houses a large collection of ancient to contemporary world works. The building's spacious high-ceilings and sky-lit entry make it the perfect compliment to the Santa Barbara life style. The permanent collection is so large that the museum must operate on a rotational basis, but their selections always include a variety of distinctive well positioned works.

Fred E. Miller: Photographer of the Crows is the museum's current special exhibition. Located upstairs, the photographs are rare images of the Crow Indians of Montana. The sepia-toned photos include both vintage and contemporay prints made from his original glass plate negatives recently discovered by his great grandaughter, Nancy Fiels O'Conner.

The Santa Barbara Museum of Art is located at 1130 State Street and is open Tuesday through Saturday, 11a.m. to 5 p.m.; Thursday evenings until 9 p.m.; Sunday, noon to 5 p.m.. Daily docent tours of the permanent collections and special exhibitions are given Tuesday through Sunday at 2 p.m..
