Violinist Plays for Assembly

Jacqueline Duke, Virtuoso of Thirteen Years Will Present Violin Concert Before State College Assembly Tuesday

Jacqueline Duke, 13 year old violin genius, will play a recital before the student body next Tuesday morning at 9:00 a.m. in the college auditorium. The young genius' program will be interesting to both musicians and laymen and will only be ten cents per student.

Miss Duke who was born in Portland, Oregon, showed marked interest in music when only two years old and began the study of the violin when not yet four years of age. Though slender of build Jacqueline produces a volume and quality of tone that would be amazing in a mature violinist.

Gives Concert Downtown

Jacqueline is to play a concert program downtown on Sunday afternoon, November 3, and will give recitals in Carpinteria, Ventura, Los Angeles, Hollywood and Pasadena on this particular tour.

The heads of the various departments have waived their regular departmental meetings scheduled for that day in order that the student body might have the privilege of hearing this little artist.

Mrs. Helen Barnett, head of the music department arranged for this concert last Spring and personally made the necessary guarantee, as she feels sure that the college students will respond eagerly to the appeal of this child prodigy.

Group Attends Relations Meet

Delegation of International Relations Club at Pomona Hear Famous Doctor Speak

Six members of the International Relations club, accompanied by their sponsor, Raymond G. McKelvey, have gone South to attend the conference of International Relations clubs being held today and tomorrow, November 1 and 2, at Pomona and Scripps colleges, Claremont, California.

Dr. Cornelius G. S. deVilliers, a distinguished scientist from the University of Stellenbosch, South Africa, who is spending some months in the United States as a visiting Carnegie professor, will speak to the conference today on some aspects of "British Foreign Policy in the Present World Crisis." Baron Paul d'Estournelles de Constant will be heard on Saturday.

In addition to listening to Dr. Villiers and other distinguished speakers at the banquets, the delegation will attend student round tables. Elizabeth Denman and Christina MacKellar will go to the discussion on "Disarmament and the League of Nations"; Bill Ogle, to "The Central European Situation"; Shurer Moe, to "Economic Nationalism in Relation to Germany, Italy and Ethiopia"; and Dorothy Horner and Allan Frick to "Problems of Central Europe." Elizabeth Denman, who will direct the entire discussion at her round table, will also report to the conference on the accomplishments of the club during the past year.

The International Relations clubs are groups of students organized under the auspices of the Carnegie Endowment for international peace.

Gauche Rooting Section and State Band Will Feature New 'Song of El Gauchito' at Grid Battle Saturday

The Santa Barbara State "Gauchito" band will make its first trip this season when they will go to Eagle Rock for the Occidental-Gauche football game at Patterson field.

"Song of the Gauchito," State's new school song, will be the feature of the band Saturday afternoon. Organized rooting sections are being roped off to accommodate three hundred rooters on the south side of the football field.

Section Sings New Song

Copies of the new school song will be passed in the section so that everyone present may participate in putting our new school fight song over. Among the other numbers to be played by the Gauche band will be "Tiger Roar," Occidental's new fight song. It will be played and sung, according to Cliff Leedy, band director.

A bus has been chartered to transport the bulk of the band, and those of transportation are urged to be members who have no other means at the music hall at 9:00 a.m. Saturday, in full uniform and with instruments.

The Decision Is Upon Us

There seems to be some question in the minds of those concerned as to just what happened in the last student body meeting of last year. It seems that there was a motion to provide \$300 for basketball, the money to be taken proportionately from each of the activity budgets. The question now seems to be whether or not the motion was ever actually passed. The motion was made, an affirmative vote taken, but a negative vote was never called for, thereby defeating the motion.

Nothing has been done so far this year to provide funds for basketball, although a schedule has been tentatively drawn up. The problem before the students now is to decide whether or not they want to carry basketball this year, and if so, how large a schedule should be taken on. If it is decided to run basketball, the money would have to come from the surplus fund, which has already been beaten into insensibility.

The band trip is a good will tour which is extremely valu-able to the school, bringing El Gaucho symbol before many new schools and putting the name of the institution before thousands of high school students. On the other hand, if bas-ketball were dropped, the fact would be publicized in all the southern California newspapers, thereby harming the school a great deal. The mere fact that this school was unable to spon-sor a basketball team would cause many students to think twice before enrolling here. Perhaps this is purely hypothetical rea-soning, but it is a difficult question to settle. It is not up to the legislative council to settle the matter, nor is it up to the director of the band or the coach of basketball; it is a question to be settled by the students themselves. The students pay for these things, and for that reason if no other, they should decide the issue—D. F.

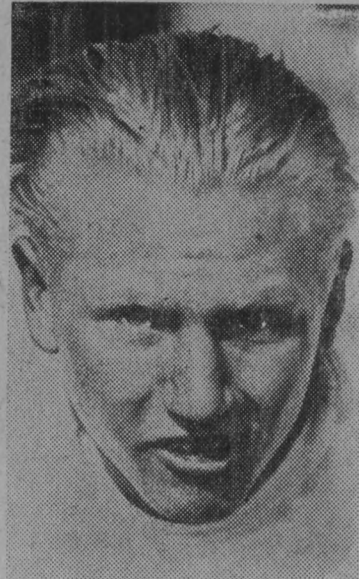

Social Committee Outlines New Campus Regulations for School Social Year

By ruling of the social committee the following regulations on all social affairs should be observed:

All social affairs sponsored by campus organizations must be held on the campus or at places approved by the administration. Dances may be held at approved halls only when the halls are closed to the public. Functions should be scheduled only when the cost is not above the average range of Santa Barbara prices. Approval for the place of function should be received from the office of the dean of women (or from the dean of men in the case of fraternities.)

Social evenings are Friday, Saturday or the evening before a school holiday. Social events shall close at 12:00 p. m. Permission to use other evenings than these, must be obtained from the dean of women. Weekly or monthly business meetings shall not be turned into social vents.

Social events of all organizations shall be scheduled on the calendar in the office of the dean of women. The registration of a social event blank shall be filed at least three days before the event. Reservations for the auditorium must be made with the dean of men.

Each campus organization shall have a patron, sponsor or satisfactory substitute present at all social functions.

An organization card shall be filed in the office of the dean of women at the beginning of each semester.
