

Men's Tennis Takes Third at Big West

An up-and-down season finished on a high note for UCSB's men's tennis team as the Gauchos won two of three matches in the Big West Championships, finishing third this weekend at the Ojai Valley Racquet Club.

UCSB ended the year at 11-13, with a very young team that grew quickly in the face of injuries and adversity. The last dose of that adversity came just before the start of the tournament.

Last week, #1 singles player Lazslo Markovits was suspended by the NCAA for receiving money as a professional. The preliminary suspension was indefinite, but after UCSB Coach Don Lowry made a case in Markovits' behalf, the suspension was reduced to a half-match. with the senior being forced to sit out the doubles portion of the Gauchos' quarterfinal with Nevada.

Both parties were happy with this settlement, especially the Gauchos, who could use Markovits in singles against Nevada, while being able to reinsert him for the doubles in the other two matches.

Lowry thought the saga ended there, but the NCAA changed its collec-tive minds, deciding to suspend Markovits for the doubles part of all three weekend matches. Markovits' absence in the doubles proved to be crucial in the 5-1 semifinal loss with UNLV, but UCSB held together and performed admirably.

"If we had Laszlo for UNLV, it would have been another story," Lowry said. "The doubles sets the tone, and against UNLV. when you lose the doubles point, it's a long way back.'

The fifth-seeded Gauchos started the weekend on Friday in the quarterfinals with their grudge match against fourth-seed Nevada. UCSB's 4-0 win avenged an earlier 4-3 defeat suffered at the hands of Nevada on April 5th.

Gauchos Continue Domination Over Conference Rivals

If the third time is a charm, don't tell that to the UCSB women's tennis Head Coach Chris Russell, who has won the Big West Tournament and Coach of the Year honors for the fourth straight year in a row.

The Gauchos clinched their 37th consecutive league match in the finals as they defeated UNLV, 5-3, at the Ojai Valley Racquet Club on Saturday.

"It's a fantastic feat," Russell said. "They really played with a lot of confidence against the schools in our conference. They can turn it up a notch when they need to because they expect to win when the match is on the line."

Santa Barbara has had two mottos this year "believe it to achieve it"

and "aiming for Athens" - referring to the location of this year's NCAA Championships. They must have believed, because in the first two rounds against Long Beach State and the University of Hawaii, UCSB did not lose a match, winning 5-0 in each competition.

And as far as Athens is concerned, their aim was deadly. They hold the inside track for the national bid to go to NCAAs over two traditional tennis powerhouses, USC and the University of Arizona, who both have been beaten by the Gauchos

this season.
In the Big West semifinal match versus Hawaii, Jean Okada was in a tough fight at #1 as she barely beat her older sister Diane Okada, 7-6, 7-5.

Sloppy Fielding Helps 49ers Sweep at Home

The Long Beach State 49ers had their brooms working last weekend, sweeping the UCSB baseball team in a threegame series at Long Beach.

The #8-ranked 49ers (30-11 overall, 10-5 Big West) won the series 1-0, 11-2, and 4-2, on the strength of their excellent pitching staff, which allowed the Gauchos (17-25, 5-7) only three earned runs and 16 hits over the entire series. UCSB's pitchers also threw well, limiting Long Beach to four earned

"They're like Fuller-

ton," shortstop Matt Bokemeier said. "They had some good arms throwing at us, and we really didn't hit anything hard.

Friday's game was a well-played pitching duel, matching UCSB's hottest pitcher, Steve Lane (4-5), against Long Beach State's Mike Fontana (8-2). The 49ers scored the only run of the game in the fifth inning, as both pitchers went the distance. Fontana earned the win, allowing only five hits and one walk. Lane was nearly as impressive, giving up eight hits and one walk.

Gaucho Lineup at Full Strength as Team Sweeps UOP, SJSU

With a lot of expectations for the complete Gaucho lineup, the UCSB softball team (23-23, 10-12 in Big West) blew away the competition this weekend, defeating both San Jose State on Saturday, 4-3, 4-1, and the #19-ranked University of the Pacific on Sunday, 3-2, 2-1.

The return of the three suspended starters and Head Coach Frann Wageneck gave way to a "new and improved" Gaucho lineup.

"Our goal was to go 4-0 this weekend and that's what we did," assistant coach Heather Clark said. "It was better than if nothing ever happened. We really came together and did what we needed to do."

For Santa Barbara, the weekend games took on extra significance. After losing both games of a doubleheader earlier this season to San Jose, the Gauchos had fal-len behind SJSU in the Big West standings. This time against the Spartans, UCSB got a solid effort from its pitchers.

"The reason why we won was because our pitchers were extraordinary and there was always someone stepping up to get the job done," AJ Vitulli explained.

In their first meeting with Pacific this season, in Stockton, the Gauchos pulled a two-game sweep on the Tigers. UCSB was able to do it again this weekend at

Sweeping Pacific again and creating a five-game winning streak was especially sweet for Gaucho senior Margo Melendrez, who celebrated her 23rd birthday over the weekend.

"Everyone put everything behind us

this whole weekend and really came through," Melendrez said. "The hitting was really great, because it wasn't so much that we hit a lot this weekend ... we hit when we needed it most."

Early in the sixth, the Tigers made their move with runners on first and third. On a called ball four, a wide pitch went past catcher Michelle Ray, enabling a runner to steal home, narrowing the Gaucho lead to 3-2.

Fortunately, with a little relief from pitcher Megan O'Brien, UCSB managed to hold onto the lead. After two straight singles and only one out, O'Brien came in to relieve Kathy Shortall, ending the game with a dramatic strikeout.


"It was a great weekend for our pitchers," Clark commented. "Kathy came in and pitched great after not throwing a pitch at all the past few weeks. But it was really impressive for Megan, a freshman, to come in and save the game.'

Stacy Atwood continued her domination on the mound in game two against UOP, allowing only one run on eight hits

with four strikeouts and no walks.

The Gauchos started the scoring in the first inning with an RBI single to center field by Krissy Kyriazis. Neither team scored for the next five innings until Pacific scored on a single from Tristan Austin early in the sixth inning.

But in the clutch, the Gauchos came back. Late in the seventh, UOP pitcher Lea Lopez walked two batters in a row. After advancing the runners with a well-placed hit by Vitulli, Melendrez hit a sacrifice fly just over the infield, allowing Danelle Lovetro to tag up and score the game-winner.

"I had a really good week in practice, and I came out ready to throw,"

Smith said.

The weekend's meet was a small invitational featuring Whittier College, Westmont, and several individuals. The resulting competition was much lighter than the Gaucho team has been used to recently, and to some team members that was quite

"It was pretty much just us competing against each other out there," UCSB's Becky Levy said after the meet. "It was hard to get psyched up for this weekend's meet because the big-time competition was not there."

Apparently, Levy was psyched enough to run well, as she won the women's 1500 race, an event dotted with personal re-

cords for many Gauchos. One runner, Deanna Hadley, shattered her former record by an amazing 10 seconds. Levy felt the race restored some of the charge that she had lost at the start of the year.

"I felt like I got a lot of confidence back this race," Levy said. "I think everyone got a lot of confidence at this meet and that will really help us going into the State Championships."

The State Championships will be held next weekend at UCLA. Following that, the UCSB track and field teams will gear up for the annual Big West Championship Meet, which will be held at New Mexico State on the weekend of May 13.

Though the record may indicate otherwise, this was a successful year considering UCSB's youth. The Gauchos sported a lineup with four sophomores, one freshman, and just one senior. They were competitive in many matches, played a tough schedule, and survived under bizarre

circumstances.

"I'll take third place," Lowry said. "In the beginning, it looked to be a developmental year, but it turned into a solid year. Next season, we have the potential to be conference champions."

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




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
