UCSB Loses in Final Minutes to Wolf Pack, 65-61, on Road

■ Flick Hits Three Treys in Last 6:40 in Conference Defeat

Senior forward Mark Flick sank three three-point baskets in the last 6:40 against the University of Nevada, Reno, but it wasn't enough as the UCSB men's basketball squad fell 65-61 to the Wolf

Pack Saturday on the road.
In the final 4:42, the Gauchos (11-12) overall, 8-7 in the Big West) made only one field goal as UNR (15-9, 8-6) went on a 9-0 run to go ahead 60-53 late in the game to seal the much-needed conference victory in front of 6,389 at the Lawlor Events Center.

"We made some mistakes, there's no question about it. When you make mistakes at that point of the game it's going to cost you," said UCSB Head Coach Jerry Pimm in a radio interview.

The game wasn't decided until the final minute, though, when Reno guard Brian Green missed a free throw with 10 seconds left but collected his own rebound to seal the contest and deny Santa Barbara a final chance to tie the match.

"To be totally frank, what happened was he choked the second free throw ... and he realized that and charged the center lane right away and got the rebound," said Gaucho Sports Information Director Bill Mahoney. "I'm not sure there was anything [the Gauchos] could do about that. That wasn't a matter of being outrebounded, that was a matter of Green knowing that he missed the free throw so badly that he was able to jump into the lane and recover the ball quick enough."

The Gauchos have now dropped four of their last six games, but did have a chance to win down the stretch as senior guard Phillip Turner drained two free throws to make the score 63-61 in favor of the Pack. However, Santa Barbara didn't

take advantage of its chances in the last few minutes of the game.

"We had some things going our way and there's no question we had a chance to win the game if we would have executed. We did not execute down to the wire and a lot of the times I like to give the defense credit, but tonight I can't do that," Pimm added.

"There's no question that we had a couple of good looks, but some of those, Lelan [McDougal] looked like he was try-ing to get off too quickly. I think a couple of those threes we forced a little bit and

Mark didn't get his feet set on a couple of his earlier ones," he said.

UCSB shot only .388 from the floor on the night and 7-21 from three-point land, while Nevada was a little more proficient with its .434 shooting on the night.


Gaucho sophomore forward Kealon Wallace led all scorers with 22 points, which augmented with his seven re-bounds gave Wolf Pack interior players a

"We did put pressure on [Daniel] Watts and [Dallas] Spears inside, they did get in foul trouble, we did have the one-andone situation in the last 11½ minutes of the game," Pimm explained. "We had a lot of things going our way because we did execute well, we did get the ball inside and we did cause them problems, but we didn't take advantage at the end of the

Senior guard McDougal threw in 15 points and five rebounds, while Flick had 13 points and seven rebounds of his own. And what's more, UCSB out-rebounded UNR 36-33 and sank 16 of 19 free throws in the game.

Another positive thing for the Gauchos is that they will play their final three games at home and need to win only one

After defeating the University of Hawai'i, 57-49, last Friday at home, UCSB was only half a game from becoming the conference's sole possessor of first place. But Hawai'i's bitter loss to Long Beach State Sunday afternoon placed the Gauchos in the lead.

But there was also a great deal of emotion at the ECen as the six seniors of the Big West's top squad gave their final farewell.


Seniors Dio Aguinaldo, Lauren Goldstine, Kristine Grazzini, Amy Hughlett and Kellie Cook bid the Thunderdome a last goodbye before taking to the road later this week for the last three conference matches and the tournament in March in Reno,

The Gaucho squad started off slow against the Snartans who took quick 6-0 lead before Goldstine put the team on the scoreboard with a jumper from the baseline. Seven minutes into the game, UCSB took its first lead when freshman Sheila Frial nailed a threepointer to put Santa Bar-bara ahead 11-10. From then on, the Gauchos continued to increase the point margin for good.

Frial led the team with 11 points, ahead of both Scardino and freshman guard Michelle Duckworth, who each tallied 10 points. Frial, Duckworth and the other younger members of the squad played a significant amount time on the court and proved that next year's squad has much potential.

"Going into the game [on Sunday], we wanted to celebrate the seniors. But at halftime, we decided that the seniors played hard so that the freshman could get some time as well," Grazzini said.

SB Baseball Squad Takes 2 **Against Broncos Up North** With Help of Willis' Play

SANTA CLARA — Going into its weekend series at Santa Clara University, the UCSB baseball team had one goal: to win two of three games.

With an All-American effort from Gaucho junior catcher/designated hitter David Willis, who went 9-12 on the weekend, including a 5-5 performance with three doubles on Sunday, the Gauchos (9-2 overall) reached their goal by beating the Broncos (4-7 overall) 4-3 on Friday, losing Saturday, 6-2, and bouncing back in the se-

ries finale on Sunday to win, 9-6. "I think the weekend went very well. We went in and played our game and got what we wanted — two of three," Willis commented. "I was feeling pretty good this weekend. The loss on Saturday was upsetting so I was really focused for Sunday's game. I was seeing the ball really well, which made hitting easy."

Santa Barbara Head Coach Bob Brontsema was espe-

cially appreciative of Willis' effort on Sunday.

"He had a great weekend, or a great day, or even a great year is basically what it was. That was great to see because we had more of our defensive lineup in and we were hoping someone would step up, and David did it."
The Gauchos came out tough in Friday's narrow 10th-

inning victory. Santa Barbara slowly moved out to a 3-1 lead halfway through the ninth inning after a sacrifice fly from senior infielder Shad Knighton in the second and solo blasts from senior center fielder Wynter Phoenix in the fourth and Willis in the ninth.

It may have seemed like it would be smooth sailing from there, but the Broncos fought back in the second half of the ninth. After pitching strongly for 81/3 innings, sophomore Seth Bean started slowing down, so the Gauchos then brought in junior left-hander Steve Cain, who allowed the tying run. Junior John Minton (2-0) then came in to clean up and got the Gauchos out of the inning to notch the win.

Santa Clara wasted no time in the 10th, earning a

Gauchos Get Back in Winning Shape

"It's good to get back on the winning track, that's the bottom line."

Senior setter Todd Rogers was referring to the #3 UCSB men's volleyball team's three-game sweep over San Diego State on Saturday that put the Gauchos (5-3 overall, 5-2 in the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation) back in the win column after dropping two straight matches to #1 University of Hawai'i and #6 Cal State

Northridge. Santa Barbara came out smoking in game one with a somewhat different lineup to pound the Aztecs, 15-3, 15-9, 15-8, in front of 412 fans at Rob Gym.

"I think we proved we are a good team tonight. We've had two games in a row where we haven't shown that - tonight we did," said sophomore outside hitter Jeremy Darner. "This is what we should have been doing all season, it shouldn't have come as a surprise to anyone."

UCSB came out fast in game one by blocking sev-eral SDSU (3-6, 2-4) hitting attempts to get out to a quick 6-1 lead. Darner crushed a cross-court service ace and junior outside

hitter Amaury Velasco roofed San Diego State to end the first game in just 15 minutes — a time that set the tone of the rest of the


On one hand, the Gauchos owned the net, amassing 33 blocks and giving the Aztec hitters troubles — only hitting .101 with 28 errors.

On the other hand, Santa Barbara hit at .381 with only 12 errors on the night, while SDSU was no threat at the net with only two blocks.

"I thought we blocked a lot better, obviously. don't know if it's the result of the people we had on the floor or it was the result of San Diego hitting," said UCSB Head Coach Ken Preston. "I think our ball control's pretty good with that team. I thought we passed real well tonight and that opens up a lot of options for us."

Preston decided to mix things up by giving junior outside hitters Donny Harris and Jason Crone as well as senior outside hitter Morgan Chapman the night off in lieu of senior outside hitters Doug Hughes and Brant Chillingworth, and Darner.

The strategy paid off as Hughes led the UCSB at-tack with 12 kills at a .625 clip, while Darner had 10 kills of his own. Chilling-

worth was third on the team with his seven kills, but had only one error for a .667 hitting percentage.

see what other guys could do. We know what the guys that had been on the floor could do," Preston added. "We also knew how they've responded in the first game of a match. Somehow they weren't getting the job done in the first game of a match. I couldn't put a finger on it so I wanted to put some

new blood in the lineup."

Hughes seemed appreciative of getting the opportunity to show what he can do on the court.

"I just wanted to try and prove something out there because it's not that often that I'm getting the start with such a deep squad," he said. "The crowd was great, all my friends were out here cheering for me. I feel like I owe it to them and to our team [to play

well]."
"We practiced all week with this lineup and it was working good in practice. San Diego State's not necessarily one of the toughest teams, so we fig-ured why not stick with it," he explained. "It was working good and every-body was having fun, which is something we were missing in the games against Hawai'i and Northridge."

apparent double that sent Kritscher home, but it wasn't to be. Santa Clara successfully argued that Hardy had missed first base, and that instead retired the side.

SCU wrapped the game up with two runs the following inning, and Santa Barbara junior right-hander Jorvic Salazar (0-1) took the loss after striking out four and walking one in 51/3 innings.

"I think we might have been a little overconfident going into the game," Willis said. "But Coach talked to us after the game and got us ready for Sunday."

Both teams came out hard on Sunday, and with UCSB up by three runs in the fifth inning, the Gauchos ran into some pitching trouble. Junior right-hander Bryan Noyes gave up three runs in the inning, allowing the Broncos to tie the score at 6-6. Santa Barbara brought in Clint Pearson, and the junior right-hander stepped onto the cold, rainy field and allowed only two hits and struck out three, while the Gaucho offense took control to earn Pearson

(1-0) the win.

Willis broke the tie in the seventh inning with an RBI double and later scored off a single by Phoenix. At the last half of the inning, Minton came in and struck out two to earn his second save of the

"I am very satisfied with the weekend. The pitching has been amazing all year and everyone continued to step up this weekend," Pearson explained. "I am happy with my performance. I've always had trouble pitching in the rain, but I just kept my focus and didn't think about the weather.

"It was really important that we won [on Sunday]," Pearson added. "It is really easy to let it go after a tough loss, but we really picked it up."

"You're not going to play 55 games all great," Brontsema explained. "The big key was how we were going to come out and play and perform [Sunday], and I thought we did a good job coming out ready to play. Now, we weren't perfect, but we did a lot of good things."

Atwood finished her strong weekend performance at the plate by cranking out five hits - a double, a home run and three RBI — including the go-ahead run.

"[Atwood] got her first win of the season and hopefully she can go on from there," Kelly said.







