BOOLOOTIAN TO TALK ON BEHAVIOR OF SEA OTTERS, ELEPHANT SEALS

A special illustrated lecture on "Sea Otters and Elephant Seals: Some Aspects of their Behavior," will be given this afternoon at 3 p.m. in South Hall by Dr. Richard Boolootian, Assistant Professor of Zoology at UCLA.

The marine biologist will cover aspects of the biology and behavior of the two mammals—the sea otter, highly prized for its fur; the elephant seal for its oil.

Dr. Boolootian received his B.S. and M.S. from Fresho State and his Ph.D. from Stanford. He has been at UCLA since 1957 and has been a research associate at the Hopkins Marine Station in Pacific Grove since 1954.

Last summer he was a visiting investigator to Samoa and Hawaii where he examined poisonous marine organisms. He has also been a visiting investigator with the Atomic Energy Commission at Eniwetok Atoll.

Author of 30 articles in professional journals, the marine biologist has written one book and has another underway as well as six papers in the process of publication.
