## Couples Participate in Symbolic Matrimony

Rainbow balloons and wedding cake marked the finale of a week of pride events as members of the queer community said, "I do."

The eighth annual Queer Pride Week culminated in a wedding in Storke Plaza at noon Friday. The event was both a celebration of lifestyle as well as a protest for equality, said Queer Student Union Co-Chair Melanie Corn.

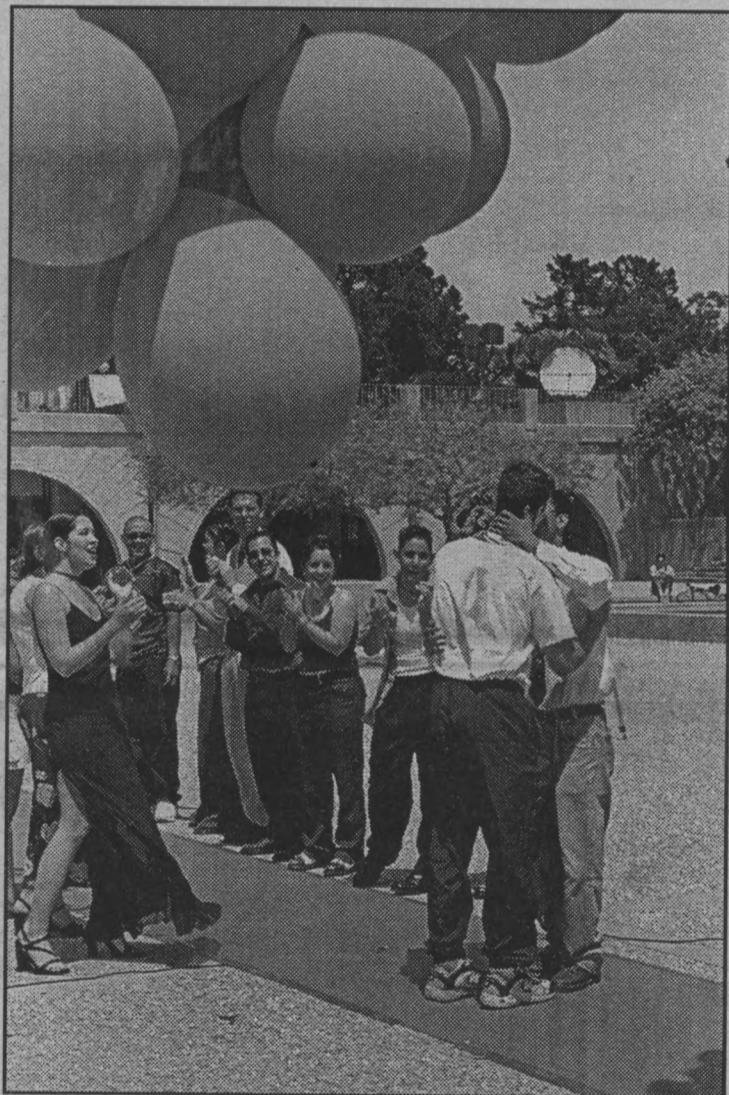
"It is for couples who are in relationships and want to have some sort of commitment ceremony, as well as a political protest speaking out against the laws which exclude same-sex couples from being able to legally marry," she said.

When opening the ceremony, Corn reminded the crowd that advances are being made in the struggle.

"Despite the fact that there's an incredibly high suicide rate for queer teens and an incredibly high dropout rate for queer college students, those numbers are decreasing as people feel more comfortable, more willing, and more safe in a homophobic society," she said. "There are more and more people willing to come out, come out at a younger age."

The term "queer" is being redefined as all-encompassing, according to senior Chicano studies and art studio major Veronica Madrigal, who attended the wedding.

"I'm saying queer community because the word 'queer' is more inclusive of not just gay men and gay women but bisexual women, transgender women, people who are allies — who are straight and

embrace the struggle that the queer community undergoes," she said.

The wedding's ceremonial vows were issued by Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs Michael Young. Senior Chicano studies and sociology major Sergio Morales emphasized the significance of the vice chancellor's support.

"Michael Young heading the ceremony is a revolutionary act. He's done it before, but this year he's doing it again to show there's some type of good vibes going on here," he said.

Young said the administration

## Week Will Encourage Taking Back the Night

Putting their statement into practice on the streets, the women of UCSB will make their stand in the ongoing fight against sexual assault and rape by taking back the night.

Today marks the beginning of activities for the annual women's event Take Back The Night. Organized by Associated Students Women's Commission, TBTN will include a variety of rallies and workshops in order to bring a diverse group of women together against the dangers of sexual crimes, according to Akanke President Natasha Thompson.

"I think that it is important that we are represented because it instills a common bond between people, and the common bond is that we are all women," she said.

Take Back The Night is not only about female unity but is an ongoing project about sexual reform and rape, according to Women's Commission Co-Chair Rebecca Prather. As one of the event's coordinators, Prather believes TBTN will provide a forum to raise awareness about gender-related crimes.

"The activities and workshops especially are geared towards re-examining and redefining sexual assaults through different groups," she said. "People at UCSB who attend will understand the intensity of the issues and they will know that rape is not a simplistic one. So what we [as TBTN organizers] are saying here is a bunch of issues and we are challenging everyone to understand, listen and take action."

Take Back The Night will begin with a noon kickoff rally today in Storke Plaza, and will end with a day of reflection Friday at the Women's Center. The week's central event is a street march through Isla Vista. The march will take place Thursday, beginning in Anisq' Oyo' Park with keynote speaker Gloria Anzaldúa, according to Legislative Council Off-Campus Representative Alana Tillim.

Although the workshops are female-oriented, everyone is encouraged to attend, Prather said.

"Men are totally encouraged and are responsible to participate in this week," she said. "The reason why the march is exclusively for women is because it is such a powerful statement symbolically for women to walk in the streets at night. It is doubly symbolic because we are having women both in the streets, where we are not supposed to be, and at night, which is what we are taught to fear."

According to Tillim, the education and awareness of sexual crimes need to be community-centered.

"The goal is to expand the definition of rape. ... Ninety-eight percent of

## Missing SLO Women's Bodies Found; Sex Offender Identified as Suspect

SAN LUIS OBISPO, Calif. (AP) — The bodies of two missing college students in San Luis Obispo were found Friday on the property of a convicted rapist.

Rachel Newhouse, 20, a junior at California State Polytechnic University SLO, and Aundria Crawford, 20, a sophomore at Cuesta Community College, were identified from dental records after being discovered at the remote Davis Canyon Road home of Rex Allen Krebs.

Krebs, a 33-year-old registered sex offender, moved to the community eight months ago, not long after serving 10 years in a state prison for rape, sodomy, assault with intent to commit rape and three burglaries. He has been in custody since March 20 for parole violations. Although he has not been formally arrested in connection with the women's

deaths, police say murder charges are imminent.

"I don't have to rush out and arrest him. He's already in jail," San Luis Obispo Capt. Bart Topham said.

Police have been tight-lipped about details of the investigation, including what led them to Krebs and how he might have known the victims. In Crawford's case, locals believe that Krebs stalked her after seeing her at an auto parts store where she worked and where he was a customer.

"There have been a lot of rumors," Topham said. "Some of them have been completely wrong. We all need to be careful about too much speculation. This is a critical time [in the investigation]. We need to do

## Oil Embargo Discussed at NATO Summit



WASHINGTON (AP) — In a summit-ending show of solidarity, NATO leaders promised military protection and economic aid to Yugoslavia's neighbors for standing with the West against Slobodan Milosevic. President Clinton, in a telephone call with Boris Yeltsin, urged Russia to press the Yugoslav president to accept a peaceful solution to the crisis.

Clinton and fellow NATO leaders sat down Sunday with officials from the seven "frontline states" bordering Yugoslavia to hear firsthand reports. "The nations of the region have risked, and even faced, armed confrontation with Serbia by facilitating and supporting our campaign to end the bloodshed in Kosovo," Clinton said.

Albania and Macedonia have been particularly hard hit, taking in nearly 500,000 Kosovar Albanian refugees fleeing from Yugoslav military action. The other neighboring countries are Bosnia, Bulgaria, Croatia,

Romania and Slovenia. "They need help and we are giving it to them," NATO spokesperson Jamie Shea said. "We will not tolerate threats against them or attacks on them by Belgrade."

Summing up the three-day meeting, NATO Secretary-General Javier Solana said, "The most important message that you are going to get from this summit is the determination of all the allies and all the partners to reverse the situation in Kosovo."

"The refugees are going to be back in their place, in their country, and ethnic cleansing will not be victorious in our continent as we approach the 21st century," Solana said.

Clinton and Yeltsin talked for nearly an hour by

phone. Russia has expressed outrage about NATO's airstrikes in Yugoslavia and has threatened to ignore a Western oil embargo. Yeltsin briefed Clinton on former Prime Minister Viktor Chernomyrdin's mediation efforts in Belgrade, which NATO officials say have failed to produce results warranting a halt to the

bombing.

Clinton believes Russia is very serious about trying to resolve the Kosovo crisis, National Security Adviser Sandy Berger said. Clinton urged Yeltsin to continue peacemaking efforts and said the two leaders would stay in touch. They did not discuss NATO's threatened blockade of oil shipments, officials said.

Berger said Russia would not be exempt from the embargo. "Obviously, any regime that we establish has to apply to everybody," he said on CNN's "Late Edition." "I

would expect that the Russians would comply."

The 19 NATO allies met in a summit finale with leaders of two dozen other Central and Eastern European countries that have banded in partnership with the alliance. Russia boycotted in protest of NATO airstrikes against Yugoslavia.

Anxious about inflaming tensions with Moscow further, the allies said they were trying to avoid a confrontation at sea over blockading oil supplies to Serbia. The summit authorized NATO military commanders to draw up plans to inspect ships suspected of carrying oil to Milosevic.

Foreign ministers of the European Union will gather Monday in Luxembourg to ratify their oil embargo against Yugoslavia. Alastair Campbell, spokesperson for British Prime Minister Tony Blair, played down the risk of confrontation if a Russian tanker refuses to abide by the embargo. "The Russians have been helpful in this conflict and we are confident they will continue to be helpful," he said.

## Venezuelans Vote on Adoption of Chavez's New Constitution



CARACAS, Venezuela (AP) — The centerpiece of President Hugo Chavez's agenda for a "social revolution" in Venezuela — his proposal for a new constitution — went before the people Sunday in a nationwide referendum.

Some 11 million Venezuelans were eligible to vote on whether to form an assembly to rewrite the constitution, and whether to approve the terms Chavez has laid out for electing the assembly's members.

Polls opened on schedule Sunday, but lines were short

and voters appeared to be staying away. Still, Chavez is highly popular — his approval ratings top 80 percent — and the measure was expected to pass.

Chavez's opponents fear he will use a new constitution to install an authoritarian regime. But the president contends the change is needed to overhaul a corrupt political system that has impoverished most of Venezuela's people.

Many scholars say Venezuela's 1961 constitution could be reformed without a costly and time-consuming

constituent assembly. The country has had 25 constitutions since 1811, and some of Chavez's opponents believe adopting No. 26 will do little to address Venezuela's fundamental malaise.

But the proposed writ has come to symbolize Chavez's vow to shake up a system that most Venezuelans believe has failed them.

"What I want is for him to put the corrupt in chains and justice for poor people," said Rosa Garcia, a 56-year-old grandmother in Caracas.

The president said he wants to break the traditional parties' stranglehold on public institutions and make them more

representative.

Critics fear that debilitating Venezuela's old power brokers will only lead to more power for Chavez, who has said that among other things, the proposed assembly should extend his term to up to 14 years. It wasn't clear if Chavez forces would control the assembly, which would be elected in July.

The rest of Latin America is watching Venezuela's political dramas unfold with profound interest. Chavez's ascent to power is seen by many as a warning sign in a region that has failed to reduce poverty and corruption.

## Racist Groups Target Minorities in London Bombings



LONDON (AP) — Britain's ethnic minorities may be facing a wave of racially motivated violence, police said Sunday, a day after a neo-Nazi group claimed responsibility for a nail bomb that injured seven people.

The bombing in an area of London heavily populated by immigrants was the second of two attacks in eight days that have injured a total of 46 people, prompting fears of a systematic campaign to terrorize minorities.

"We retain very serious fears that this could be a continuing series of vicious attacks," said David Vaness of the Metropolitan police force. "We cannot in any way rule out the fact that those attacks might be taken to locations outside the London area."

A neo-Nazi organization, Combat 18, claimed responsibility for Saturday's afternoon explosion on a busy street in Brick Lane, home to a large Bangladeshi community. Authorities said the blast was caused by a nail bomb planted in a parked car.

London's *Sunday Telegraph* quoted the document as stat-

ing that all "non-whites and Jews" still in Britain by the end of the year would be exterminated. The newspaper, quoting unidentified sources, said police dismissed the document as a prank.

The victims from Saturday's bombing — all but one of them Bangladeshi — suffered slight injuries, police said.

Britain's state-funded Commission for Racial Equality said the bombings were an apparent reaction to an official inquiry into the bungled police investigation of the fatal stabbing of a black London teenager in 1993. The report, released in February, said the London police force was riddled with racism.

Five white youths suspected of killing the teenager, Stephen Lawrence, have never been successfully prosecuted. Commission Chair Claude Moraes told Britain's GMTV that far-right elements "don't like the idea of lifting the rock and seeing racism underneath. ... Those elements are creating a backlash."

Ethnic minorities, mostly descendants of immigrants from former colonies in Asia, Africa and the Caribbean, comprise only 7 percent of Britain's population, but are mostly concentrated in inner-city districts.

## Who's the Bitch Now!?

Isla Vista Foot Patrol officers responded to the 6700 block of Abrego Road on Wednesday, April 21, at 5:16 p.m., after receiving a call about a "female adult running after a male, holding a bat and a knife," reports state.

According to reports, the victim — a Hispanic male in his mid-20s — had an argument with an unidentified female who he only knew by a nickname. During the verbal altercation, reports state, the suspect called the victim a "nigger," to which he replied, "Bitch!"

"[The victim] said that after the argument she left the area and returned holding a baseball bat in one hand and a kitchen knife in the other," reports state.

The suspect then chased the victim around a parked vehicle with the weapons, before giving up and leaving on foot. According to reports, officers searched the area, but the suspect, as well as her knife and bat, were nowhere to be found.

## That's Asking for It

On Saturday, April 24, at approximately 8:30 p.m., officers responded to a call of a possibly intoxicated male disturbing the peace in front of a fraternity house on the 800 block of Embarcadero Del Mar.

After making contact with the suspect, who was yelling in the street, officers moved him out of the road and he "had a difficult time sitting down, almost falling over into the gutter," reports state.

Officers questioned the suspect as to his background and identity, but he responded with "Fuck you" and "Who cares?" according to reports. Deeming him too intoxicated to care for himself, officers

arranged for transportation to the Santa Barbara County Jail.

According to reports, during the ride the suspect "became combative and started banging his head on the cage." After two warnings to cease being combative or face a shot of pepper spray, "the suspect replied, 'Fuck you. Go ahead and spray me.'"

The deputy discharged a one-second blast of pepper spray into the suspect's face, at which point, reports state, "[the suspect] quickly became cooperative."

Due to the extreme level of intoxication, the suspect was transported to Goleta Valley Cottage Hospital before being cleared and taken to the County Jail to be housed pending sobriety.

## Multi-Talented

During a routine patrol of the 6700 block of Pasado Road on Thursday, April 22, at approximately 11:30 p.m., a Foot Patrol officer noticed two males, one of whom was bent over and leaning against a parked vehicle, reports state.

According to reports, "[the suspect] was trying to open his fly to urinate in the street with one hand and stick his finger down his throat with the other."

The other male suspect was encouraging him, saying, "Hurry up, dude, and pee so we can go. Stick your finger down your throat and make yourself puke. You're going to puke anyway," reports state.

Upon making contact with the suspects, officers asked them how much they had had to drink, to which one responded, "Too much." According to reports, the suspect who was attempting to simultaneously urinate and vomit was visiting his

UCSB's students know an acquaintance that has been raped, and most go unreported," she said. "TBTN is about men and women turning the ignorant into the educated."

Take Back The Night has been practiced at all nine

UC campuses and at many state schools for over 20 years, according to Prather, who stressed the event's history.

"According to legend, [TBTN] originated 70 years ago in Berlin — it is a worldwide event that was in fact started by prostitutes to really raise awareness," she said.

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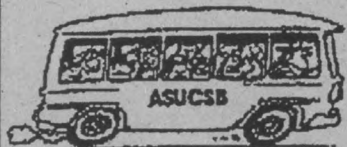
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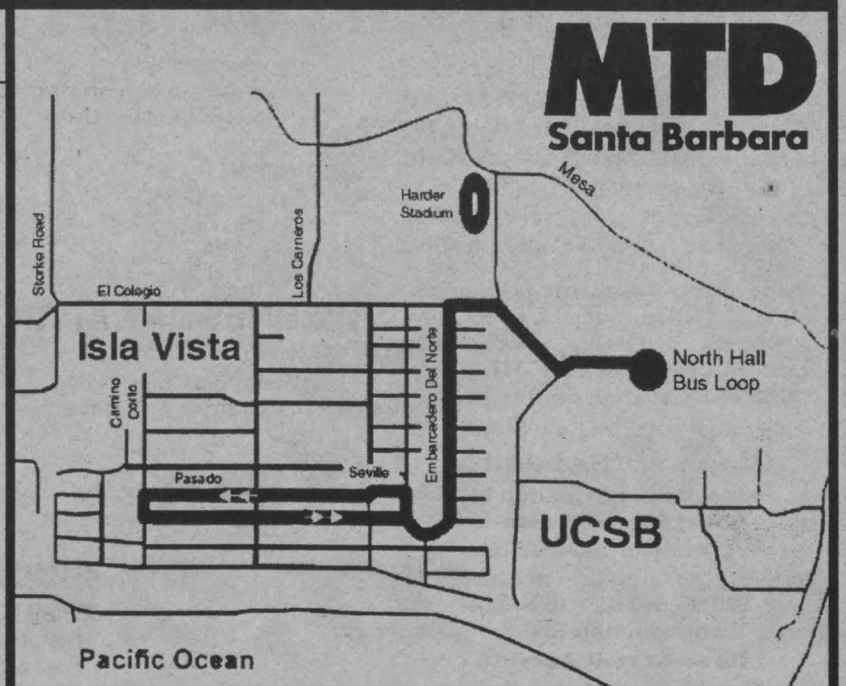
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## Greeks Hit the Beach to Score for Charity

Thousands of greek men and women descended upon Santa Monica this weekend for competition, charity and fun in the sun.

The 23rd annual Inter-Sorority Volleyball Tournament brought approximately 1,000 women from 30 colleges all over the state to Will Rogers State Beach on Saturday. The philanthropic event was sponsored by UCSB's chapter of the Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity. According to Lambda ISVT Director John Gardner, the event attracted nearly 5,000 spectators.

"We're just hoping to make it bigger and better every year," he said.

Each team paid a \$150 registration fee, which raised \$1,000 for Heal the Bay, according to Gardner. The fraternity chose a group that helps to keep beaches clean as this year's charity because it hopes to ensure a clean playing field for itself and others in the years to come, he said.

"We felt that they were a very worthwhile cause," Gardner said.

Lambda also drew a number of co-sponsors, including Animalhouse.com, Raisin's Swimwear and Clothing Line, Budweiser, KROQ FM and Coldbeer Entertainment, Gardner said.

Several UCSB sororities joined the competition, with Kappa Alpha Theta and Pi

Beta Phi making it to the semifinals. Pi Beta Phi advanced to the finals, "but unfortunately they were defeated by the mighty Kappa Alpha Theta at UCLA," Gardner said.

Lambda game referee Ryan Voeltz said the first rounds of the tournament were fairly relaxed, but the competition level rose rapidly.

"The final game was real exciting," he said. "It was an intense game."

Pi Beta Phi President Christy Leonard, who played on the house's A team, said the most important part of the weekend was the fun the team had. Most of the women from the sorority came to cheer the players on, she said: "One of the key things was the whole house was there for all the games."

The house took home first place two years ago, according to Leonard, who said the team takes the competition very seriously.

"We hope to make it again next year," she said.

Voeltz said the whole weekend was even better than previous years when he had been a spectator.

"To do it this year being a part of the house was really fun," he said.

Because the goal was to keep the beach clean, Lambda worked hard on the cleanup efforts after the day's festivities were over, according to Voeltz.

"We left [the beach] cleaner than it was," he said.

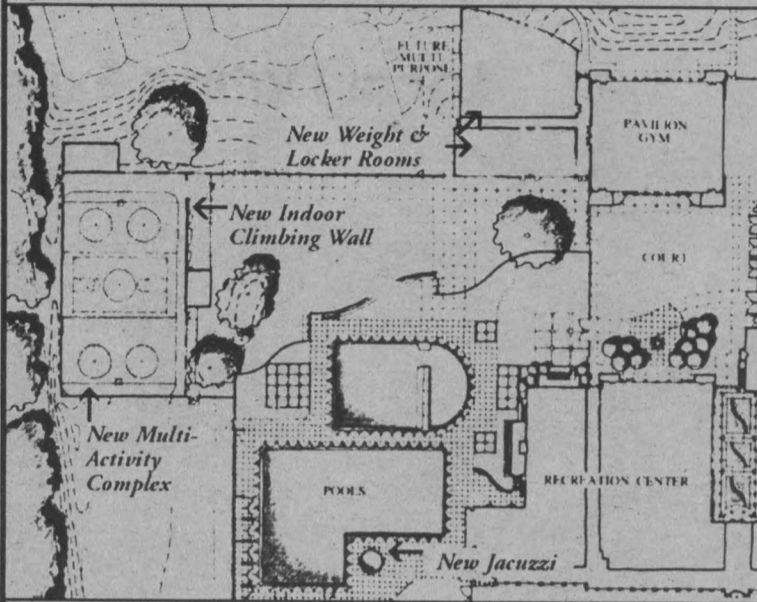

- 84% of survivors of rape were under the age of 24.
- 35% of college men who voluntarily participated in a psychological research conducted at several universities indicated they might commit a rape if they knew they can get away with it.
- 75% of women surveyed were raped by an acquaintance.
- Rapes committed by strangers were more likely to be reported to the police than by non strangers.
- 84% of rape survivors did not report the rape to the police.
- 30% of gays and lesbians experience some form of abuse in their intimate relationships
- Federal statistics show a remarkable similarity in the characteristics of prisoners categorized as rapists: 99 in 100 are male, 6 in 10 are white, and the average age is early thirties.
- 80-90% of violent crimes against women are committed by someone of the same racial background.

this right."

Crawford has been missing since March 12, when she was kidnapped from her duplex near downtown San Luis Obispo. Newhouse has been missing since she was assaulted near the Amtrak station Nov. 12 as she walked home from a fraternity party at a local bar. Her blood was found on the nearby Jennifer Street Bridge.

Identified as the prime suspect in the disappearances and deaths of the two students, Krebs says he's a monster and deserves to die.

"The two girls are dead. If I'm not a monster, then what am I?" Krebs said Saturday in an interview with *The Fresno Bee* at the San Luis Obispo County Jail.

He also apologized to the parents of the two women and told the newspaper he hopes to receive the death penalty. "I hope they give it to me," he said.

Krebs' home is in Davis Canyon, a remote area about a mile from a road that snakes nearly 15 miles behind Avila Beach, where neighbors sometimes go months without seeing each other. He certainly kept his dark side from his girlfriend, his co-workers and other

police suspect

locals who met him as he went about his business.

One of Krebs' favorite watering holes was Carlin's BBQ & Brew. Eric Wilkins, a 22-year-old Cal Poly student who lives across the street from Carlin's, said he and his roommates often saw Krebs there alone or

with his dog, especially Tuesday nights, when beers are 25 cents.

"Quarter night is a big college night," Wilkins said. "He'd be there quite a bit. There's quite a few people there those nights."

Wilkins said he never remembered either Crawford or Newhouse being at Carlin's, which is on the outskirts of downtown.

"He'd be over there many times," Wilkins said. "We talked about his dog a lot. He seemed like a nice guy."

Cal Poly senior Maggie Romweber, who remembers seeing Krebs around town, said it is disturbing and slightly eerie that the prime suspect could be living in the community without raising much suspicion, and come across as such a regular guy.

"It's scary," she said, adding how she and her friends have taken extra safety precautions — changing daily running routes, getting escorts to their cars at night, and not walking around downtown after dark.

strongly supports the goals of Pride Week.

"I stand before you as part of the senior leadership of the University of California at Santa Barbara to support the rights of all people regardless of their race, their religion, their points of view, their health, their physical ability, their sexuality. That's my role; that's my responsibility," he said. "It seems to me that civil rights are civil fights and human rights are human rights. We can't separate them out depending on what we think of other people."

Young reminded the audience that they were serving as witnesses, similar to attendants at a legal ceremony. While the vows he used were based on traditional vows, some had been changed to better suit the event.

The modified vows were, in part: "For richer or for poorer, and since we are not given the traditional financial benefits of marriage, it just might be for poorer, in sickness and in health, even if we have to scale the hospital buildings to visit each other after being denied access for not being related by blood or marriage, 'til death do us part."

Although most of the 15 couples in the event are involved in committed relationships with each other, some participants had other motivations, such as sophomore English major Raja Farah.

"It's almost like a complete coming out for me. I've been out, but never so publicly," he said. "I just wanted to show support."

Sophomore law and society and Spanish major Adriana Lopez was Farah's partner in the ceremony. "I'm straight but

I got married for him, 'cause he's my best friend and I love him," she said.

Onlookers, including junior math major Omar Perfino, felt the event was positive. "I think it's a nice way for the queer community to express themselves and educate others," he said.

Despite the generally positive sentiments that surrounded Queer Pride Week, QSU and the event's other organizers encountered some difficulties, according to Corn.

"There is a giant fence on the corner of El Colegio and Embarcadero Del Norte, and we had to put up at least three or four posters there in the course of three days," she said. "They were not being blown down by the wind; they were being ripped down maliciously simply because they have the word 'queer' on them."

Storke Plaza was also found graffitied Thursday morning, the day of the drag show. The message "drag = lies" was written on a wall while "don't flaunt my oppression" was spray-painted on the ground.

"It was very interesting graffiti because it seemed to come from the inside or even from a conservative feminist end ... it wasn't your typical homophobic graffiti," Corn said. "But we got it covered up."

Corn encouraged spectators to attend the reception that followed the wedding.

"Rather than standing where you are, gazing upon the spectacle of some of the most courageous and amazing people on campus, after this wedding is over, get to know them," she said. "You need to embrace them into your community, into our community."

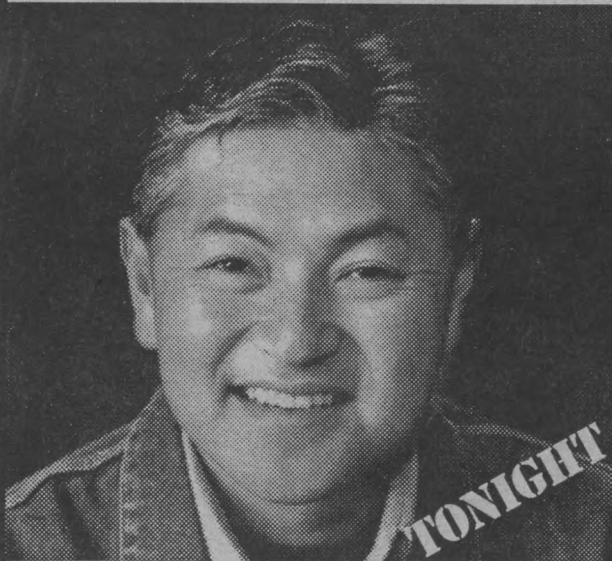

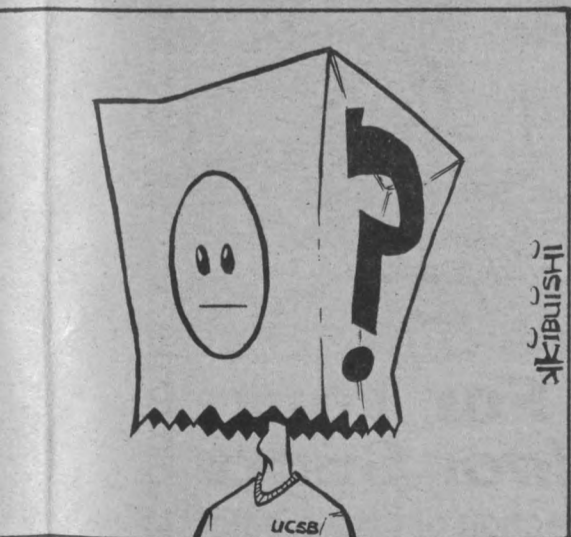

# A.S. Constitutional Amendment

## Vote No Audit/Review Option

An amendment is a piece of legislation that seeks to alter an already existing piece of legislation, such as a constitution. So when voting on the A.S. Constitutional Amendments, it is helpful to know exactly what is being amended. Unfortunately the ballot does not provide a copy of how the constitution currently reads, so it will be included in the Daily Nexus Endorsements. The Audit/Review Option now states, "Approve and publish the annual audit by a Certified Public Accountant chosen by the Executive Director and subject to the majority approval (50 percent plus one) of the Legislative Council members present."

Therefore, should this amendment be passed, an audit will no longer be required; a review could take the place of an audit. Why is this problematic?

Well, an audit is a legally binding investigation into the financial practices of an organization. A review, while conducted by a Certified Public Accountant, is not legally binding. Therefore, if an error or problem emerges from the review, A.S. will not be held accountable to fix it. However, A.S. is responsible for the distribution of a huge amount of money to campus groups, and it should not have only a review of its financial practices.

While this will cut costs for A.S., this is not an area where penny-pinching should be practiced. Large organizations need a yearly audit to ensure that things are on track. Financial accountability is not an area to cut costs.

## Vote Yes A.S. Recycling Program

Again due to the shadiness of not including the existing legislation on the ballot, the current state of the A.S. Constitution will be reprinted here. The Associated Students Recycling Program Amendment will change the current text which reads, "\$.75 per ASUCSB Membership per quarter for the Environmental Affairs Board campuswide recycling program." This amendment will change the wording from "EAB campuswide recycling program" to "A.S. Recycling Program."

There will be no change in fees and

recycling will continue, thus making this an acceptable amendment. The recycling program has taken good care of campus environmental needs; recycling centers are located all over the university in visible areas, and the bins frequently get changed. This amendment will not take away any of the recycling program; it will only change the name of who the funds are allocated to.

## Campuswide Mandatory Fee Measures

### Track Repair

Many buildings and facilities on our campus are in dire need of renovation. Renovations are expensive and students are sometimes asked to foot the bill. But if there is anything on our campus that is in need of immediate repair, it is the campus track. Unbalanced and worn-down, it is so decrepit that our own track team is unable to compete on it.

The Campus Track Repair Initiative is as clear-cut as initiatives come. It asks for a specific amount of money for a specific amount of time. The purpose of the initiative is to restore the campus track to NCAA competition standards, allowing the return of on-campus intercollegiate track and field competition.

What level of pride can we boast of our athletics when our facilities are so worn down that our track team must carpool to Santa Barbara City College for its home meets? Why has this gone on for the past two years? We have

state-of-the-art facilities for our other athletic teams; why not extend that degree of pride and professionalism to track and field?

While other organizations also requested funds, what sets this fee apart is that the measure is defined and specific. It asks for \$4.50 per student per quarter (excluding summer) for one year only; there is a concrete plan to see it institutionalized.

Campus track renovation is not solely an issue of bringing back on-campus intercollegiate track competition. It is a wider issue of providing adequate athletic facilities, recreational opportunity and campus pride. A simple, well-researched plan has been presented to the students. Vote yes on the track measure to support the track team and the organized effort to acquire funding.

After all, when did we have to start paying for our own buildings? Just wondering.

Moving on to the other problems associated with the building: This campus is already overdeveloped. Constructing another new building would only worsen the problem, and at the same time it would send the wrong message to Chancellor Henry T. Yang, Mr. Overdevelopment himself. In addition, too many things are going to be moved around to accommodate this building. The plans are crazy and confusing; parking lots and grassy areas would be moved around, leaving every-

one wondering whether they should be parking their cars or themselves in the space before them.

It is not a question of whether this building would be useful, but the plans associated with it are just a mess. Students should not have to pay for their own building. Other sources should be sought out before attempting to impose this burden on the student pocketbook. The UCen is overcrowded and the portables are not perfect, but they will suffice until a less confusing plan is brought to the students' attention. However, if students decide they want it now, they need to start paying for it now (\$28.18 per student per quarter — excluding summer — beginning Fall 1999), rather than imposing the fee on students yet to come (\$36.58 per student per quarter — excluding summer — beginning Fall 2002).

The students should not be responsible for the upkeep of heating and cooling systems. And what will happen if the students don't bend over and give the money? Will the Events Center actually shut down? No. The administration is threatening to go to outside sources if the students do not

foot the bill. Now let's think about that for a minute, folks; it is *threatening* to go to outside sources. Outside sources are where it should have gone first before trying to cram maintenance fees down students' throats.

The Events Center is an important facility that hosts games and camps over the summer, so its upkeep is important. However, the students should not be liable for its repair. Should this pass, it will set a precedent for the future that buildings can be built without long-term planning and the students will just bail the builders out. Is that a precedent you want to start?

### Shoreline

UCSB has been referred to as the "Jewel of the Coast." And what is the critical component of the title? You guessed it, the coast. The Shoreline Initiative will serve the interests of the coastline adjacent to campus by setting aside funds for organizations to use in maintaining a clean and safe coastline.

A clean campus-adjacent coastline should be a priority of both the university and the community, as it provides countless recreational and educational opportunities. Clearly, it is one of our greatest assets.

Beach access is the first issue addressed by the Shoreline Initiative. The stairways leading to Campus Point and Goleta Beach are in bad need of repair. The current state of the stairs makes beach access dangerous, especially at night, and this initiative will allocate funds for the construction

of safe points of access.

Beach cleanups will also be funded by the initiative. Any organization wishing to participate in them will find funding accessible through the university, with cleanup supplies made available as well. Funding will also cover the restoration of coastal habitats and environmental education for the community. These are all issues that need to be addressed and will benefit from the fee measure.

A clean campus-adjacent coastline is in the interest of the common good, and we believe this initiative will properly maintain our coastline. Our beach is priceless, and the \$3 per student per quarter (excluding summer) cost to keep it pristine is minimal.

Also, it did not escape our attention that the fee will be instituted in 2002, when most of the current students will have already graduated.

Admittedly, the RecCen does suffer from overcrowding. But there are enough alternatives to consider before the need actually arises for students to shell out \$35 per quarter per student for approximately the next 30 years.
