Rehearsals For Lenten Play Start

April 2 Chosen For Date Of Production

The first rehearsal of the entire cast for "The Mantle of the Virgin," the play by Vida Sutton which will be presented in the college court under the auspices of the Literary Forum on the evening of April 2, was held last Tuesday. Members of the cast will be given until next Tuesday to learn their parts after which rehearsals will be held regularly under Dean Ashworth, director, and Roscoe McGuire, assistant director.

The setting of the play calls for some elaborate art work and Hamilton Wolf, art instructor, has already started work on the creation of a rose window which occupies the center of the stage set.

Costuming for the play has been turned over to Margaret Cronise, who will supervise the making of most of the costumes. Phil Davis will have charge of the properties and Mr. Peters will manage the lighting.

Those who are taking part in the play include Hazel Kramer, Anita Deardorf, Jean Christy, Ted Marshall, James Rhinehart and Fred Diehl, all of whom have speaking parts. Minor parts will be taken by Elsie LeBlanc, Lois Pearson, Jane Ames, Anna Lincoln, Madeline Klinke, Edwina Kenney, Catherine Berrey, Mabel Sorem, Lorraine Miller and Monroe Langlow.

Those who have been appointed to handle the details of the play are Phil Davis, Marget McTavish and Miss Severy in charge of properties; Margaret Cronise and Miss Frye in charge of costuming; Hamilton Wolf in charge of art and stagecraft; Mrs. Barnett in charge of music; William Peters in charge of lighting; and Margaret Burke, Sidney Doner and Dorothy Kimes who will handle the printing and publicity.

A letter from Vida Sutton, author of the play, expressing her willingness to have the play produced here was recently received by the manager.

Student Body Constitution Amended

Matters Pertaining To Athletics Brought Up

Proposed amendments to the Student Body constitution pertaining to athletics were discussed and acted upon at the regular meeting of the Student Body held Tuesday. Because of the short time allotted for the meeting all the amendments were not brought up but definite action was taken on four of them.

The first amendment discussed pertained to women's athletics and the point system. The plan as outlined in the constitutional amendment was adopted last year but has never been incorporated in the Student Body constitution. It provides for the awarding of the English "S" to participants in women's athletics who make a total of one hundred fifty points as outlined in the point system.

Another proposed amendment providing for the awarding of service stars for each additional year's work in a given sport aroused considerable discussion and was finally rejected. As the constitution now stands service stripes are to be awarded in the place of additional letters.

An amendment was passed prohibiting the awarding of the Block "S" for participation in schedules consisting of less than four games in football, basketball and baseball. According to this amendment no letters will be awarded hereafter in any of these three sports unless at least four scheduled games are played.

A fourth amendment pertaining to the awarding of the Circle "S" to participants in minor sports or light weight games was rejected after considerable discussion in which the possibility of no further schedules of minor or lightweight sports was brought out.

Other minor amendments pertaining to the awarding of student body emblems and the purchase of the same will be brought up at the next business meeting.

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Letter Received From Hockey To Organization

The services of one coach is quoted at the price of seventy-two dollars per week. Coaches are only asked to coach two hours a day and six days a week.

If enough college women are interested in securing such a coach an attempt will be made to enlist the interest and financial aid of other women's athletic organizations of the city to cooperate in securing an English coach for Santa Barbara. 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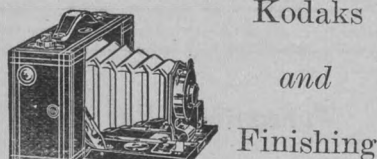
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
