## Gym Circus Performs Friday

Dr. Elmer Noble Directs Tumblers in First Jinx Frolic

### 20 ARTISTS ACT

Song and Dance Features Hop, Skip and Jump Program

Agile, lightfooted boys and girls, 20 of 'em, today announce themselves in top form, ready for the highly touted, long awaited Gym Jinx, Santa Barbara State's own little circus of big time acrobats. With the auditorium for a "big-top," Dr. Elmer Noble's flip-flop-pers will present their show to students and townspeople Friday night, April 30, at 8:00 p.m.

### Diversified Program

Dr. Noble and his cohorts have arranged an evening nearly as diversified as a Barnum and Bailey three-ringer. The only things that seem to be lacking are a menagerie and a wild-west show. The program for the Gym Jinx will include such breath-taking stunts as the girl on the flying trapeze, balancing acts, the man suspended in midair, the smallest gymnast in the world, and dazzling bits of tumbling. Nor will the aesthetic side of the program be neglected. There will be group singing, a solo instrumental number and two dance solo numbers, one an acrobatic dance and the other, "Rolanda, the Dancing Divinity." For comedy, there will be a bar-bell, weight lifting exhibition and some groan-and-grunt wrestling. Pyramids, triple, double, and single stunts on the mats and apparatus will complete this full evening's entertainment.

### Star Gymnasts

Heading this group of gymnastic performers Friday night will be Dr. Noble and Norman Thompson. The athletic zoology prof was co-captain with his twin brother, Glenn Noble, now a teacher at the San Francisco Junior college, of the University of California Tumbling Team of 1931. He holds the distinction of defeating the Stanford team single-handed during his time with the tumblers of the Golden Bear. This was in a dual meet between the two schools, when Noble scored five first places, more points than the entire Indian team.

Norman Thompson, Eagle Scout, and former director of athletics at Ramsay Military camp and Lake Arrowhead, relates a curious story of the beginning of his interest in gymnastics. He and a friend were standing at the top of Glacier Point in Yosemite when the friend wagered that Thompson would not dare to stand on his hands over the 3,000 foot drop. Norman accepted the wager and, needless to say, was successful in performing the stunt. Since that time, he, like Dr. Noble, has spent a great part of his spare time in perfecting himself in athletic stunts and in teaching them to others.

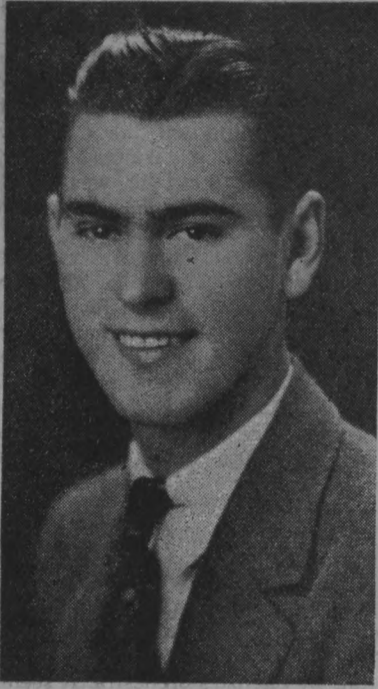

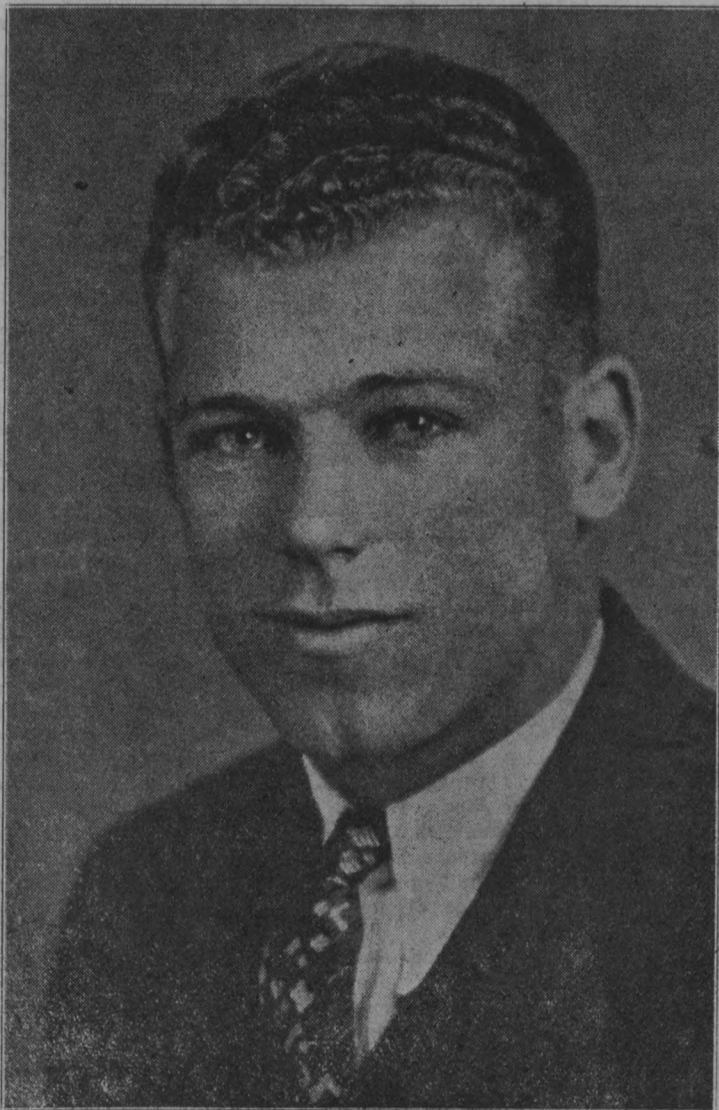

## Candidates Vie Again in Vote

D'Alfonso and Sanderson Compete in Run-Off for Presidency

### 540 VOTES CAST

Seymour, McArthur, Kitchen Capture Positions As Student Officers

Student voters will go to the polls again today to choose a president for the coming year in a run-off election between Danny D'Alfonso and Harold Sanderson. Barry Simmons, head of the election board announced that the student body office would again be the scene of the balloting, with the doors opening at 7:30 a.m. and closing at 4:00 p.m.

### Friday Election Close

In the first election held last Friday, D'Alfonso received 229 votes with 203 going to Sanderson, and 105 to Dave Pollock, necessitating a run-off today.

### Seymour Wins

Ann Seymour was victorious in the vice-presidential race, defeating Millicent Lincoln, by a total of 381 to 180 votes. Jean McArthur, candidate for the secretaryship of the student body defeated Lois Scheppele, 336 to 204 to win the office for the coming year.

Jack Kitchen, only candidate for yell leader, was automatically given the title, with only a few write-in names appearing on the ballots.

In the first election 540 votes were cast, with occasional blanks being left in the choice of some position, thus accounting for the discrepancies of the vote totals for the various offices.

### Candidates Speak

Both candidates for the presidency in the second election appeared yesterday morning before the student body meeting second hour in the auditorium.

Returns from the second vote will be released at approximately 6 p.m., unless a recount of the ballots is necessary. Capt. Paul Jones, faculty adviser of the election board will have charge of the election, assisted by the committee composed of Dorothy Riche, Al Lathim, Jo Denman, and Barry Simmons, vice-president of the student body.

All students are urged to cast a ballot in today's election. Those students not bringing student body books, will be asked to obtain identification slips from the office of Fred Allred, student controller, in order to vote legally.

In addition to the election committee, representatives of El Gaucho and campaign managers, including, Irene Minikin, Petie McKinney, John Twaddell, George Smith and Nat Hales, acted as official checkers in the counting of election ballots.

## San Jose Beats Gauchos in Track Meet 81-50

Ray Stalmack Sets Javelin Record While Team Lacks Man Power to Win; Yeager Wins Lows

Taking six first places and a tie for another, but failing to have enough team strength to take the necessary second and thirds the Gauchito track team suffered an 81 to 50 set back at the hands of the cindermen of the San Jose State college last Saturday morning in the northern city. The Gauchitos also dropped a 76 to 39 score to the Spartan babes. Ray Stalmack was the only Gauchito who was enough up to snuff to establish a new school record, and he did so by tossing the javelin 179 feet 9 inches to better the old standard by almost two feet.

### Staters Win Firsts

The Hilltoppers came in ahead of the field in the 100-yard dash, the high and low hurdles, the high jump, the 880 and the javelin. Neil Beat's 11 foot 6 inch effort in the pole vault was good enough for a tie in that event.

Howard Yeager showed more improvement by taking two first places, in the 100 and low hurdles, and a third in the broad jump to lead the Dennomen in points scored. Howie came through and beat his team mate, Ray Stalmack, in the lows in the fast time of 24.4.

### Middle Distance Men Star

The local lads were bothered by the San Jose track and so turned in rather slow times in the dashes and high hurdles. Wells Gibson ran a fast race in the 440 and unofficially tied Larry Bowlus' record of 50.3 for that event while taking third to Collins and Sawtelle of Sparta.

Tooley Palmer continued his improvement in the 880 and negotiated the distance in 2:04.8 to win. Bill Jessup of the Green and White Frosh won the peagreen half-mile in just two tenths of a second faster than Palmer's time.

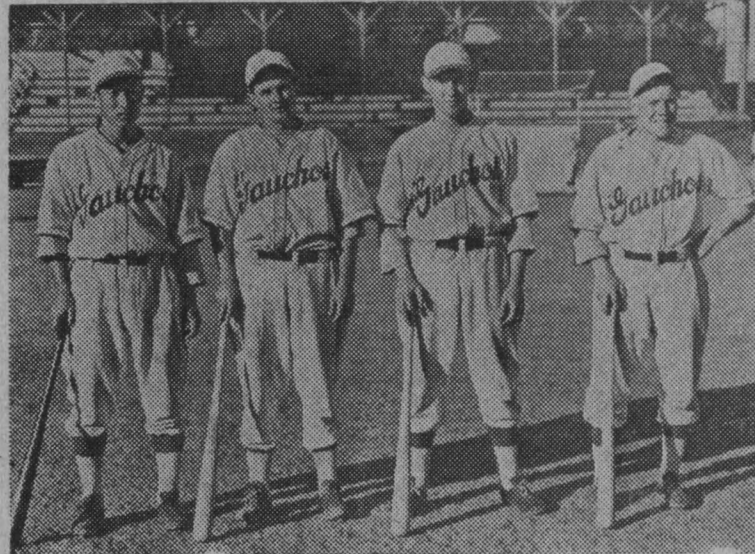

Claire Busby and Earl Homan collected home runs, Busby getting his in the first game with no one on base and Homan getting his with Powell Lee and Al Young scoring ahead of him. Dale McNeice and Earl Homan took a turn at pitching for the locals while McNeice received credit for the win. Following Lyons on the mound in the second game for the Bengals were the southpaws Roy Tweedie and Ted Ellison.

### Anderson Bats

The Gauchos garnered nine hits in the second contest to shut the Tigers out in a most unusual manner. The complete happening was as follows. The Tigers hopelessly behind as they came to bat in the last half of the seventh inning, which was to be the last of the ball game, and the majority of the players took to the showers. With only six men competing, the Santa Barbara State college Freshman track team won the second of a series of three meets to be held with the local high school by a 59 7-12 to 52 5-12 score yesterday in Peabody stadium.

Fleet footed Billy McArthur lead the Peagreeners to victory by winning the broad jump, high hurdles, and placing second in the 100 and 220. Times for the low hurdles and 220 were held back by a stiff cross wind that blew during the entire meet, but in the 100 and low hurdles it was right on the athlete's back to aid them along.

The Gauchitos won every running race except the mile which was taken by Valentino of the Dons. Fujimoto of the Gauchitos came through with a surprise win in the 880 and followed it up with a second in the mile, his time in the half was slow, but he didn't have to run any faster to win.
