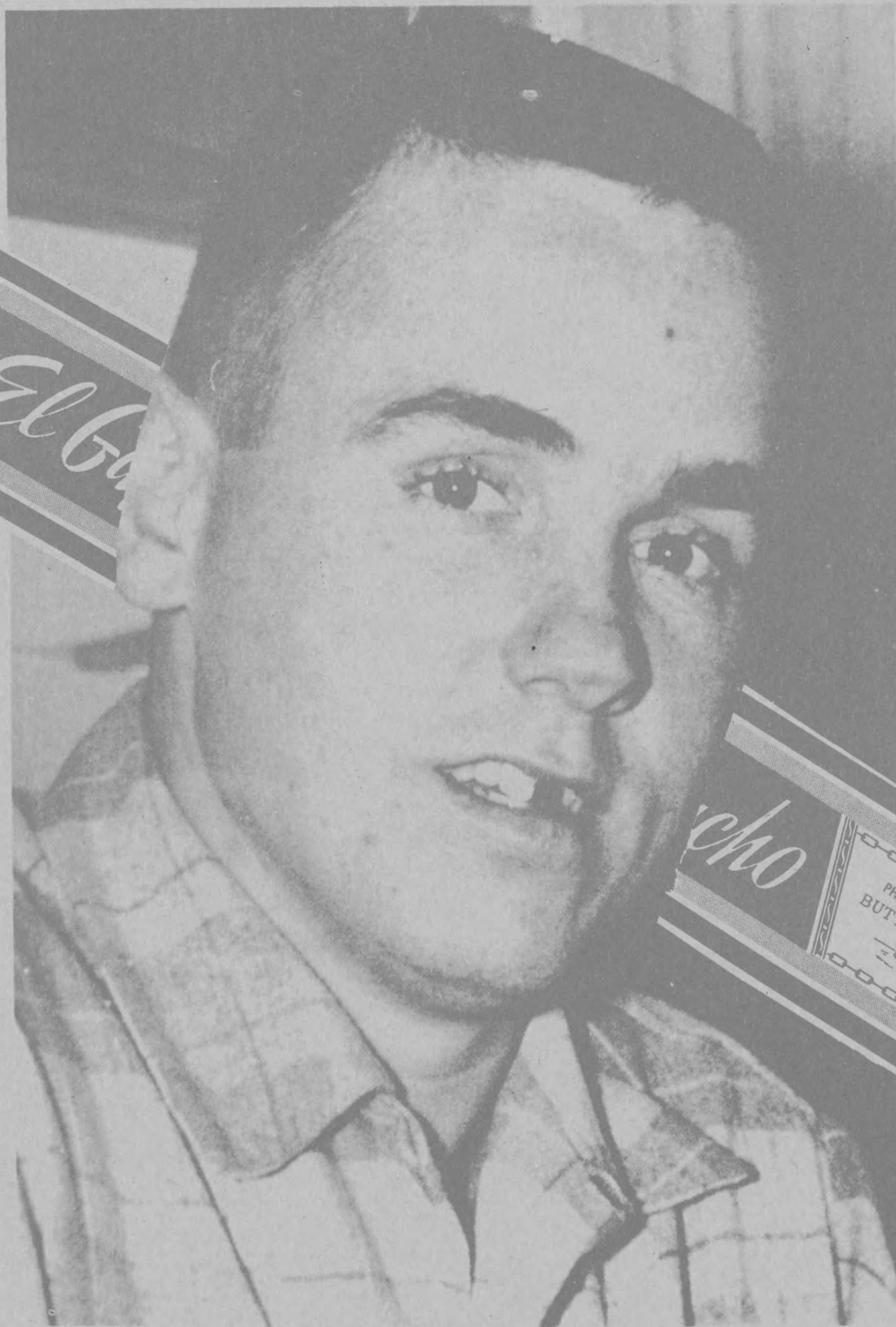

Hatlan Plays At It Again

Slough U.'s own scholar, wit, professor, playwright, and sometime drama director Theodore Hatlan has again won critical praise for a Little Theatre production "Off With His Honorable Head."

Hatlan's play, a two act farce written and directed by the head of the Slough U. drama department, is a parody on the manners and conventions of the 17 century French royal court.

Dr. Hatlan has ingeniously employed such diverse elements in his play as center-staging,

Brechtian props, Greek masks, and costumes by Dior -- all leading to a grand quasi-epic final view.

Lead character, Jean Sans-Jean, has the guile of a Wycherly hero, yet also the tragic dignity of a Shakesperian figure. Emile de Boef who is won by Jean has the tender eaterness of Mistress Quickly.

Jean Seamons has created the role of the slender beauty Emile as one to be remembered for many days to come. Her graceful handling of the two-step in the Grand Ball scene is a marvel of choreographic staging.

Phillipe Gland as the French Don Juan figure almost leads one to believe that the rumors linking him with Errol Flynn and Cheryl Turner may be true. His bravado in protecting his favorite dish in the Great Banquet scene is handled well, with sword and fork.

Hatlan's drama violates all the Unties, but because it had children in mind when first written, it deserves the community's full attention. Playwright Hatlan deserves his absurd reputation.

SB Leg Council Finally Approves South Seas Cruise

Legislative Council Tuesday night approved a two week luxury cruise through the South Seas on the 190 foot Vanderbilt yacht for its 14 voting members.

The move came as a reversal of council's decision to return AS bookstore profits to students through free blue books.

The UCSB group, including AS President Joe Sorrentino and Vice President Bob McCord, embarks from Los Angeles early Saturday morning. Chaperoning will be Dr. Stephen S. Goodspeed, Vice-chancellor of student affairs.

Calling the decision "momentous" and "unparalleled in the history of university student gov-

ernment," Sorrentino said using bookstore profits for the luxury cruise is a project of "more lasting value" than supplying free blue books.

Apparently council had contemplated the move since earlier this month when a graduate student charged that it could have found a better way of returning the bookstore profits.

A strong council majority overrode the objections of Gail Grigsby, Charities Commission chairman, who contended the funds should go to Camp Conestoga.

"This is our last chance to meet the \$2,000 commitment without dipping into general funds of the AS treasury.

However, council calmed the

harrassed chairman in another surprise reversal, this time approving a 75 cent admission charge to the annual Spring Sing.

"Using bookstore profits to meet the Conestoga commitment would be taking the back door out," Sorrentino said. "I don't feel the student body has authorized us to take such an irresponsible and drastic measure."

Sorrentino said the cruise would present "an ideal opportunity" for a council retreat.

Also dissenting was Dick Collover, men's representative-at-large, who wanted the funds to be used for funding a new Future Farmers of America chapter here.

A candidate for the AS vice president post next year, Dolliver said, "The future of our great country depends vitally on how versatile the knowledge students of today gain in universities and colleges is. I believe the virtues of the farmer have not been emphasized enough in training our future leaders.

However, Dolliver said he would take the cruise because he felt "obligated to do what the majority of council wants."

Council members expect to return to the UCSB campus April 20.

The Vanderbilt yacht cruise will take them to Hawaii, Mid-

way Island, the Virgin Islands, Guam, the Solomon Islands and the New Hebrides.

Chancellor Vernon I. Cheadle also may accompany the council members.

McCord extended an invitation to Dr. Cheadle, whose academic field is botany, after noting the cruise would enable the chancellor to add South Sea specimens to his plant collections.

The chancellor already has journeyed to Berkeley and UCLA collecting vegetative specimens.

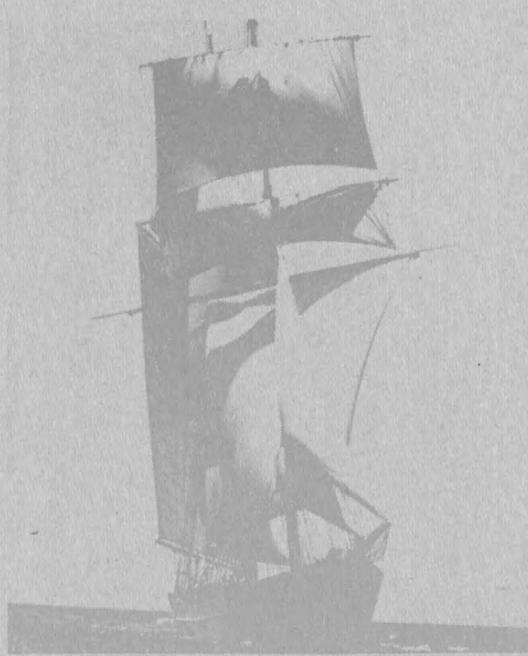
In a special council meeting Saturday night at the bar of the Valley House, it was decided by unanimous vote to abolish the

UCSB administration.

"At the rate student government is expanding," explained AS president Joe Sorrentino, "I don't see why we shouldn't absorb administration duties into the associated student bureaucracy.

"It would be easy to establish a Committee on Governing the Campus and set up subcommittees on Handling the Faculty, Admission Standards, etc. ad nauseum. The main problem will be that of finding enough interested freshmen to chair all these stupid committees.

"After all," he said, "they are the only ones we can dupe into slaving on frustrating, ungratifying committees."

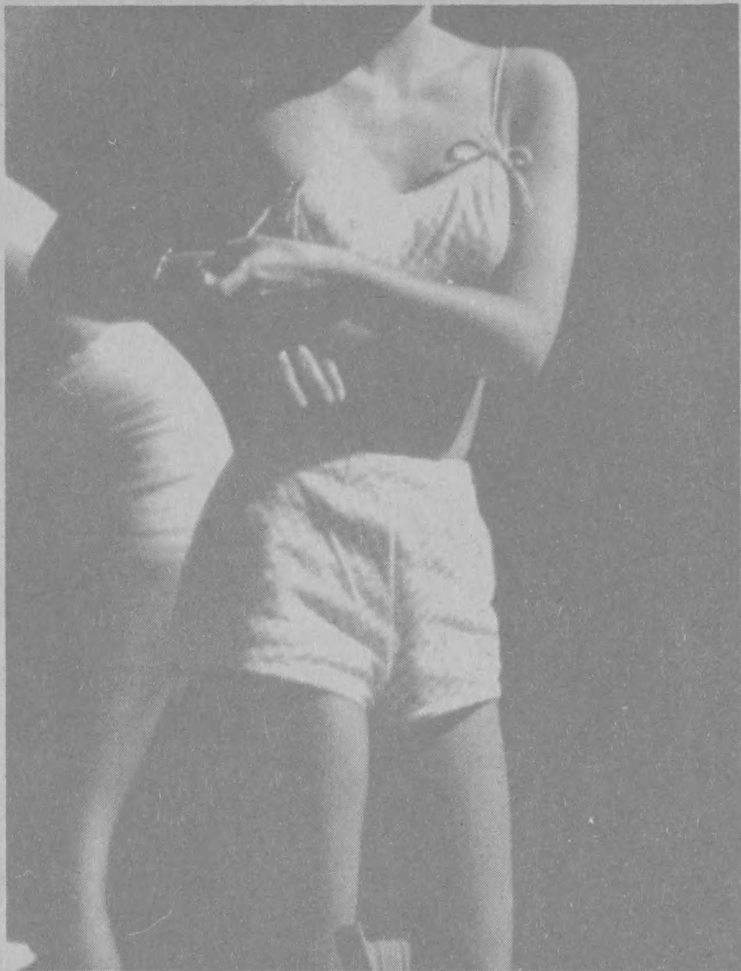
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Old UCSB Sport Now Becomes Official

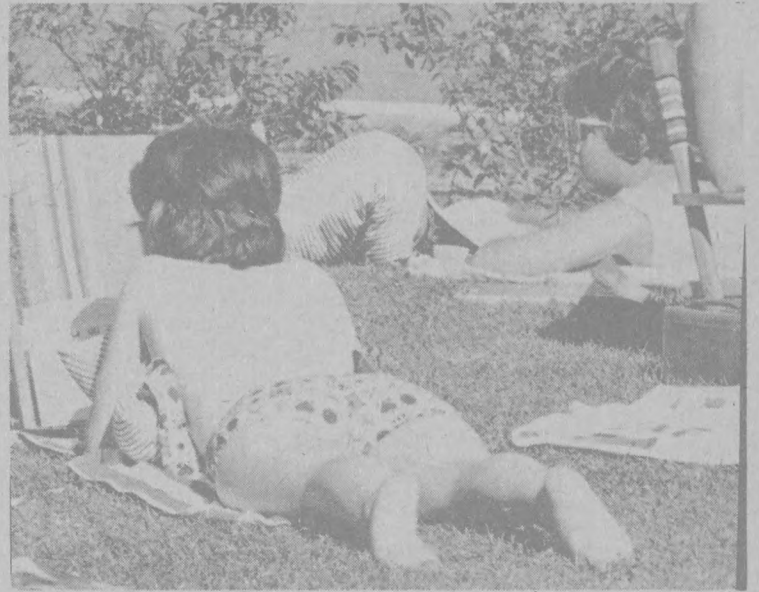
Tentative plans at this time include trips to such well known glomping areas as Balboa, Santa Monica beach, and possibly Fort Lauderdale, Florida.

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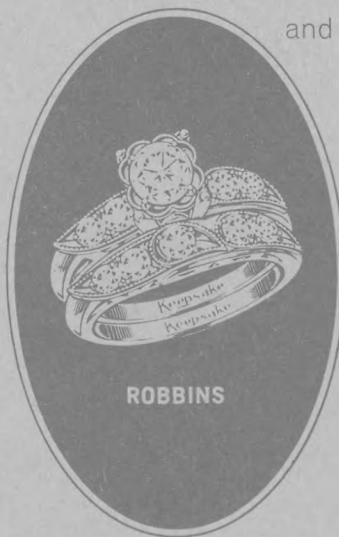
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
