Music for the program will be under the direction of Dr. Van A. Christy and will feature Vernon Leidig as the outstanding senior music major.

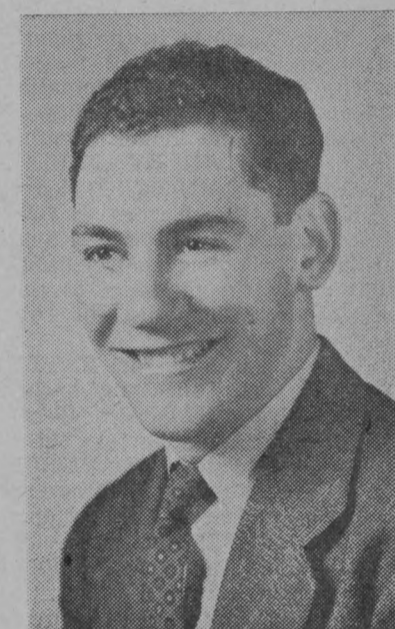

# Wilton, Rauch Leave Campus To Take Up Navy, Army Duties

Santa Barbara State college acknowledged another severe setback to the interest of national defense this week, as two members of the college faculty left campus to assume war duties and numerous others declared their intentions of leaving during the summer.

First to leave in the new group was Coach Wilton Wilton who reports to Chapel Hill, North Carolina as a lieutenant (j.g.) in the U. S. Navy. Lt. Wilton has been serving as head of the physical education program at State since the departure of Lt. Theo "Spud" Harder.

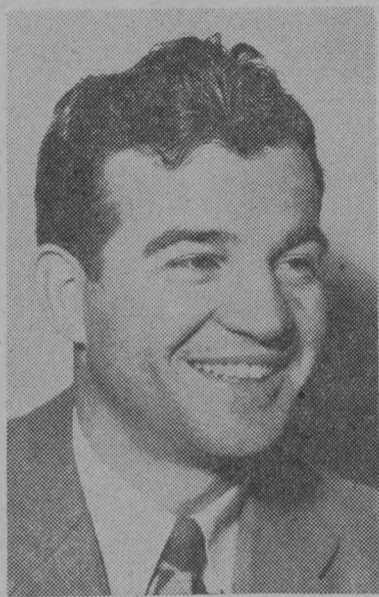
Known as one of the coast's outstanding basketball coaches in 1941 Wilton won the 2C2A championship and took his team to the National Inter-collegiate basketball tournament in Kansas City. At that conference Tommy Guerrero, now Lt. Guerrero, was named All-American. During his stay at State, Wilton has been instrumental in bringing out such basketball stars as Guerrero, Paddy Caudillo, Crash Brewster, Gordon Gray, Dick Rider, Lowell Steward, Bill Leveille, Don Druliner, and many others.

Wilton received his B.A. from U.C.L.A. in 1935 and has done graduate work at Claremont college. While attending U.C.L.A. he was a member of the varsity football team playing half back. He was considered the best punter in Western college football at that time and was named on the second team for the Pacific Coast.

Also scheduled to leave campus this week is Dr. Stanley E. Rauch, instructor in mathematics and physics, who will accept a post as assistant professor in mathematics and physics at the University of Oregon under the Army's meteorology program.

Dr. Rauch came to State in the spring of 1941 after serving two years at the University of Washington and two years at Stanford University.

He has been active on campus as a sponsor of Beta Sigma Chi fraternity and with his wife as patron and patroness for numerous student body affairs.
